HEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand intituled the Prisons Act, 1908, it is provided that the Governor-General may, by Proclamation published in the Gazette, declare any house, building, enclosure, or place to be a prison; and from and after the gazetting of any such Proclamation, or from any time later specified in the Proclamation, such house, building, enclosure, or place shall be deemed a prison;

Now, therefore, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance of the above-recited power and authority, do hereby declare that the area of land described in the Schedule hereto, and all buildings and enclosures used or occupied thereon, shall, from and after the date of the publication of this Proclamation in the Gazette, be a prison, known as the Timaru Prison, within the meaning and for the purposes of the Prisons Act. 1908.

In exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby make the following regulations prescribing the deer-shooting season in the Auckland Acclimatization District, comprising the Counties of Rodney, Waitemata, Eden, Manukau, Franklin, Thames, Ohinemuri, Piako, Raglan, Waikato, Waipa, Kawhia, Awakino, Waitomo, and Ohura, and that part of each of the Counties of Matamata and West Taupo lying north of a right line extending south-westerly from the summit of Puwhenua Mountain, at the easternmost corner of Matamata County, to the summit of Rangitoto Mountain, and the conditions affecting the same, and also the form of license conditions affecting the same, and also the form of license and the fee payable therefor.

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand,

do hereby make the following regulations prescribing the deer-shooting season in the Buller Acclimatization District, comprising the County of Buller, and the conditions affecting the same, and also the form of license and the fee payable therefor.

REGULATIONS.

1. Red-deer stags may be taken or killed within the Buller Acclimatization District from the 1st April, 1919, to the 31st May, 1919 (both days inclusive).

2. Licenses to take or kill such deer may be issued by the Chief Postmaster at Westport, on payment of a license fee of £1, in the form prescribed in the Schedule hereto, and subject to the said Act and these regulations; provided that not more than one such license shall be issued to the same person.

No licensee shall take or kill more than three stags, and no stag shall be killed carrying antiers with less than eight

RED-DEER stags may be taken or killed within the Otago Acclimatization District, in the Hunter Valley, Dingle, Hawea Flat, and Makarora districts from the 1st day of April, 1919, to the 20th day of May, 1919 (both days inclusive), and in the Greenvale, Wart Hill, Upper Pomahaka, and Whitecomb districts from Monday, 24th March, 1919, to 13th May, 1919 (both days inclusive). In accordance with the above estimates, the total yield of wheat for the Dominion should be approximately 6,265,000 bushels, as against an actual yield of 6,807,536 bushels in 1917-18.

The percentage of the oat crop threshed in 1916–17 was 31 44, and in 1917–18 32 00. Assuming that a similar proportion is threshed this year, the total yield of grain should be 5,140,000 bushels. The oats threshed in the previous season yielded 4,942,759 bushels.

Owing to the wet and cold season experienced, the harvest will be exceptionally late, and whether the above estimates will be realized depends on the weather during the next few weeks.

The reports of the Field: Inspectors as to the condition of the crops in the various districts may be briefly summarized

as follows :-

Auckland.-The grain crops in this district are principally used for chaffing or for green fodder. Generally speaking, they are in fair, clean condition, although light.

Hawke's Bay.—Crops light, but in good condition. Harvesting has been commenced in parts of the district, and the

weather so far is favourable.

Taranaki.—Some good crops are to be seen, but in most cases grain not well filled. Caterpillar has appeared in places.

Wellington.—Some crops, particularly oats, are good; others stunted and light in grain owing to unfavourable season.

Nelson.—There are some very fine crops, but yields gene-

rally will not be heavy. Blight is in evidence to a small extent.

Marlborough.—With the exception of Awatere County,
wheat crops are in good condition. Oats fair to good through-

Canterbury.—Wet weather retarded growth of crops, but recently considerable improvement has taken place. Harvest will be late, but, with reasonably good weather, yields should be better than last year.

Otago.—Crops generally in good, clean condition, but heavy rains have done considerable damage in parts. Southland.—There are some good crops, but in most cases yield will be only fair owing to continued wet and cold weather.

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OR Deaf Children of sound intellect. The pupils are taught to understand and use ordinary speech. The full charge for board and education is £40 a year, but less is accepted from parents who cannot afford to pay this amount. In case of necessity admission is free.

By the Education Act it is compulsory for deaf children to come under instruction at the age of six, and to continue until the age of twenty-one unless the Education Department previously grants exemption. Though a child is, as a rule, best fitted to begin the school course at the age of six, advice should be obtained as soon as any sign of deafness is observed.

The following classes of deaf children are admitted to the School for the Deaf (sound intellect being always a necessity):—

necessity):—
1. Children born deaf, or who have lost their hearing

1. Children born deaf, or who have lost their hearing before learning to speak.

2. Children who can hear a little, but are too deaf to be taught in a public school.

3. Children who have lost their hearing after having learned to speak.

The Act imposes upon every parent, teacher of a school (either public or private), constable, or officer of a charitable or kindred institution who is aware of the place of residence (either temporary or permanent) of a deaf child, and the householder in whose house any such child resides, an obligation to send notification of the fact to the Minister of Education, giving the name, age, and address of the child; and any neglect or failure to comply with this provision involves liability to a fine.
