FURTHER AMENDED STATUTES OF THE ORDER OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, to all to whom these Presents shall come: Greeting.

WHEREAS by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the said United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster the fourth day of June, 1917, in the Eighth year of Our Reign, We have thought fit and been pleased to institute, erect, constitute, and create an Order of Knighthood, to be called and known for ever hereafter by the name, style, and designation of "The Most Excellent Order of the British Empire," whereof We, Our heirs and successors for ever shall be Sovereigns:

And whereas by Our aforesaid Letters Patent We did ordain

And whereas by Our aforesaid Letters Patent We did ordain that the said Order should be governed by Statutes and Ordinances and that the Statutes to be observed within the said Order should be established by Us and sealed by the Seal of the said Order which Statutes so given and in future to be given by Us, Our heirs and successors, to which the said Seal shall be affixed should be of the same validity and said Seal shall be affixed, should be of the same validity and

taken and read as if the same and every Article of them had been verbatim recited in the said Letters Patent and passed under the Great Seal of Our said United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland:

And whereas in conformity with the said Letters Patent of the fourth day of June, 1917, We did enact and issue certain Statutes and Ordinances to be observed within the said Order bearing the same date wherein a power was reserved to Us, Our heirs and successors of annulling, altering, augmenting, interpreting or dispensing with these Statutes and Regulations or any part thereof by a notification under the Sign Manual of the Sovereign of the Order:

And whereas we deemed it expedient that alterations should be made in the Statutes of the said Order. We therefore in pursuance of the power vested in Us by the said Letters Patent did make, ordain and establish certain amended Statutes bearing date the twelfth day of April, 1918:

And whereas it is expedient that certain further alterations should be made in the existing Statutes of the said Order:

Now know ye that in pursuance and in exercise of the power vested in Us by the said Letters Patent We have abrogated and annulled and do hereby abrogate and repeal

And further know all ye to whom these Presents shall come that in substitution thereof We have made, ordained and established, and by these Presents, sealed with the Seal of the said Order, do make, ordain and establish the following Statutes and Ordinances, namely:—
1. It is ordained and enjoined that this Order of Chivalry

1. It is ordained and enjoined that this Order of Chivalry shall be styled and designated in all Acts, proceedings, and pleadings "The Most Excellent Order of the British Empire" as in Our said Letters Patent is directed, and by no other designation.

2. It is ordained that the said Order shall consist of the 2. It is ordained that the said Order shall consist of the Sovereign and a Grand Master and of five several classes:—
I. "Knights Grand Cross" and "Dames Grand Cross."
II. "Knights Commanders." and "Dames Commanders."
III. "Commanders." IV. "Officers." V. "Members." And it is further ordained that each and every of these five Classes shall likewise contain two sub-divisions whereof the first shall be styled "Military," and the second "Civil," each of which sub-divisions shall be composed partly of Ordinary and partly of Honorary Members.

3. It is ordained that We, Our heirs and successors, Kings or Queens Regnant of Our said United Kingdom, are and

or Queens Regnant of Our said United Kingdom, are and for ever shall be Sovereigns of this Order, to whom doth and shall belong all power of annulling, interpreting, explaining, or augmenting these and every part of these Statutes.

4. We do hereby ordain, direct and appoint that a Prince of the Blood Royal or such other exalted personage as We, Our heirs and successors shall hereafter appoint shall be Grand Master of the said Order, and shall in virtue thereof be the First or Principal Knight Grand Cross of the said Order, to whose custody shall be confided the Great Seal of the Order, which he shall affix to all Statutes, Ordinances, and Instruments according to the regulations touching the issues of every of the said Instruments; and it is further ordained that it shall be his special duty to enforce the due observance of the Statutes and Ordinances of this Order, and that he shall likewise direct the issue of all letters of Summons whenever the Sovereign shall be pleased to command an Investiture of the said Most Excellent Order.

5. It is ordained that all commissioned, warrant and subordinate Officers subject to the Naval Discipline Act or employed under the Order of the Admiralty, and all commissioned and warrant Officers recommended by any Commander-in-Chief in the field or elsewhere, or by the General Officer Commanding, Independent Force, Royal Air Force, or employed under the War Office or Air Ministry, or under the Administrative Headquarters of Dominions or Overseas Forces, Administrative Headquarters of Dominions or Overseas Forces, or employed under the Ministry of Munitions or the Ministry of National Service on work which, but for the creation of those Departments, would have been performed by the War Office; and all members of the Naval, Army, Dominions, or Overseas Nursing Services, or officials of the Women's Royal Naval Service, Queen Mary's Army Auxiliary Corps, or the Women's Royal Air Force, and such commandants of the Women's Legion or similar organizations as are under contract with or employed by the Admiralty, War Office or Air Minis. with or employed by the Admiralty, War Office or Air Ministry shall be eligible for appointment to the Military Division of this Order.

6. It is ordained that the persons to be admitted to the Civil Division of the said Order shall be such persons, male or female, as may have rendered or shall hereafter render important services to our Empire.

It is ordained that foreign persons upon whom We may think fit to confer the honour of being received into this Order shall be deemed to be, and described as, Honorary Knights Grand Cross or Honorary Dames Grand Cross, Honorary Knights Commanders or Honorary Dames Commanders. ary Knights Commanders or Honorary Dames Commanders,

Honorary Commanders, Honorary Officers, and Honorary Members, according to the classes in the Order to which they

8. It is ordained that persons already appointed to this Order who are qualified for the Military Division shall, on the recommendation of the First Lord of the Admiralty, the Secretary of State for War or the Secretary of State for the Royal Air Force as the case may be, be transferred to the Military Division of this Order.

9. It is ordained that when We, Our heirs or successors shall be pleased to nominate and appoint any person to this Order such appointment shall be made by Warrant under Order such appointment shall be made by Warrant under Our Royal Sign Manual sealed with the Seal of this Order and countersigned by the Grand Master of the said Order.

1. It is ordained that the insignia of the Sovereign of this Order shall be of the same material and fashion as are hereinafter appointed for the Knights Grand Cross, save only with those alterations which distinguish Our Royal Dignity.

12. It is ordained that the Grand Master shall wear the Insignia of a Knight Grand Cross, the badge of which for the Grand Master shall be augmented in accordance with the commands of the Sovereign.

13. It is ordained that the Military and Civil Knights and Dames Grand Cross of this Most Excellent Order shall upon all great and solemn occasions wear the badge of the Order, all great and solemn occasions wear the badge of the Order, which shall consist of a cross patonce, enamelled pearl, fimbriated or surmounted by a gold medallion with a representation of Britannia seated within a circle Gules inscribed with the motto, "For God and the Empire," in letters of gold ensigned with the Imperial Crown Or, the whole suspended from a purple riband which in the case of Knights Grand Cross shall be of the breadth of three inches and three-quarters with, for Military Knights Grand Cross, the addition of a vertical red stripe in the centre of the ribbon of the width of about five-sixteenths of an inch and in the case of Dames Grand Cross shall be of the breadth of two inches and one-Grand Cross shall be of the breadth of two inches and one-quarter with, for Military Dames Grand Cross, a vertical red stripe in the centre of the ribbon of the width of about onequarter of an inch, passing from the right shoulder to the left side, and they shall wear on the left side of their coats or outer garments an oval Star composed of eight points and charged with a medallion as above.

14. It is ordained that the Military and Civil Knights Commanders shall wear around their necks a riband of the same colour and pattern as that of the Military and Civil Knights Grand Cross of the breadth of one inch and three-quarters, but in the case of Military Knights Commanders the vertical red stripe is to be of the width of about three-sixteenths of an inch, and pendent therefrom the Badge of the Knights Commanders of the Order, which shall be of similar form and pattern to that appointed for the Knights Grand Cross, but of smaller size, and also that they shall wear on the left side of their coats or outer garments a silver Star composed of

four equal points and four lesser, charged with a medallion as before, and it is ordained that the Military and Civil Dames Commanders shall wear a badge of similar form and pattern as that appointed for Knights Commanders attached to a riband also similar to that worn by Military and Civil Knights Commanders but tied in a bow and worn on the left shoulder,

and that they shall wear a like Star.

15. It is ordained that the Military and Civil Commanders shall in the same manner wear the like riband and badge as that appointed for the Military and Civil Knights and Dames Commanders respectively, but that they shall not be entitled

wear the Star

16. It is ordained that the Military and Civil Officers shall wear a badge of similar form and pattern as that appointed for the Military and Civil Commanders of the Order, but of a smaller size and silver gilt, attached to a riband of the same colour and pattern of the breadth of one inch and a half, but in the case of Military Officers the vertical red stripe is to be of the width of an eighth of an inch, attached to the left breast of their coats or outer garments by men, and tied

in a bow on the left shoulder by women.

17. It is ordained that the Military and Civil Members shall wear in like manner the same ribands and badge as that appointed to the Military and Civil Officers of the Order except that the badge shall be in silver.

18. It is ordained that upon the nomination of any person to be a Knight Grand Cross, Dame Grand Cross, Knight Commander, or Dame Commander of this Order, he or she shall be invested with the Insignia of his or her dignity in the Order by Us, Our heirs and successors if he or she be resident at the time in this country, but if he or she be in India by Our Viceroy of India in Our name and on Our behalf, and of the or she be in Canada, Australia, New Zealand, or South Africa by Our Governors-General of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, or South Africa respectively in Our name and on Our behalf; and that on the day of the Investiture the person to be invested shall be introduced into the presence of the Sovereign, the Viceroy of India, or the Governor-General of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, or South Africa, as the case may be, by the Officer of the Order or other Officer deputed to be in attendance bearing the proper Insignia of the Order, when the Sovereign, Viceroy, or Governor-General having in the case of Knights Grand Cross and Knights Commanders the case of Knights Grand Cross and Knights Commanders conferred the Honour of Knighthood upon the person so nominated if he have not previously received the said Honour, will then proceed to invest him or her with the Ensigns of the said Order in the following manner:—The Sovereign, Viceroy or Governor-General will invest the new Knight Grand Cross, Dame Grand Cross, Knight Commander or Dame Commander with the riband and badge and will deliver or place on his or her left side the Star of the said Order appertaining to his or her dignity.

19. It is further ordained that it shall be competent for Us, Our heirs and successors by a Warrant or Warrants under Our Sign Manual countersigned by the Grand Master and sealed with the Seal of this Order to authorize some distinsealed with the Seal of this Order to authorize some distinguished person in Our Service or other person to perform in Our name and on Our behalf the Ceremony of investing Knights Grand Cross, Dames Grand Cross, Knights Commanders, or Dames Commanders with the Insignia of their respective dignities or to permit the Ceremony of Investiture to be dispensed with. And we reserve to Ourselves, Our heirs and successors, by Our or their Warrant or Warrants as aforesaid, full power and authority to permit and authorize the person or persons not invested by Us to wear the Insignia and enjoy the privileges appertaining to their respective dignities in as full and ample a manner as if they had been invested by Us, Our heirs and successors

20. It is ordained that on the promotion of a person to a higher class of this Order the Insignia of the class theretofore worn by him or her shall be returned to the Registrar of the Order for the service of the Order, and that on the resignation or decease of an Official of the Order his Badge of Office shall

be restored for the service of the Order.

21. It is ordained that for the greater honour and dignity of the Knights Grand Cross and Dames Grand Cross of this Order it shall and may be lawful for them upon all occasions to bear Supporters to their Arms; and We do by these Presents direct and command Our Garter Principal King of Arms for the time being to grant Supporters to such Knights Grand Cross and Dames Grand Cross of this Order as shall not otherwise be entitled thereto and it shall also be lawful for Knights Grand Cross and Dames Grand Cross of this Order to surround their Armorial Bearings with the circle and motto of the Order and to suspend therefrom a representation of their riband and badge and for Knights Commanders, of their riband and badge and for Knights Commanders, Dames Commanders, and Commanders of this Order to sur-round their Armorial Bearings with their circle and motto of the Order and to suspend therefrom a representation of their riband and badge and for the Officers and Members of the Order to suspend a representation of their riband and respective badges from the bottom of the escocheon containing their Armorial Bearings.

ing their Armorial Bearings.

22. It is ordained that the Seal of the Order shall have engraved thereon as follows (that is to say) a representation of Britannia surrounded by a circle containing the motto of the Order "For God and the Empire," and that the Statutes of the Order shall be sealed by and with the same.

23. It is ordained that it shall be competent for Us, Our

heirs and successors by an Ordinance signed by the Sovereign and sealed with the Seal of the Order to cancel and annul the appointment of any person to this Order, and thereupon his or her name in the Register shall be erased. But that it shall be competent for the Sovereign to restore to the Order any person whose appointment may have been so cancelled and annulled when circumstances render it just and expedient so to do.

24. It is ordained that a Military and Civil Medal of this Order shall be awarded to persons, not being Members of or eligible for appointment to the five classes of Our said Order, whose services to Our Empire would warrant such mark of Our Royal appreciation and that persons subordinate to those who are eligible for the Military Divisions of the various classes of this Order shall be eligible for the said Military

Medal.

25. It is ordained that the Medal of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire for men and for women shall consist of a circular medal in silver, having on the obverse a representation of Britannia within the circle and motto of the Order and on the reverse Our Royal and Imperial Cypher, and shall be worn on the left side suspended by a ring to a purple riband of one inch and one-sixteenth of an inch in width, with the addition in the case of recipients of the Military Medal of the Order of a vertical red stripe in the centre of the riband of about one-tenth of an inch.

26. It is ordained that it shall be competent for Us, Our heirs and successors by a Warrant under Our Royal Sign Manual to cancel and annul the award of any Medal of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, and that thereupon the name of the recipient in the Register shall be erased, but it shall be competent for the Sovereign to restore the medal to any person whose name may have been so erased when circumstances render it just and expedient so to do.

27. It is ordained that the twenty-fourth day of May every year shall henceforth be taken and deemed to be the anniversary of the institution of this Order.

28. It is ordained that the following officials shall be appointed to this Order, that is to say, a

It is ordained that the Prelate of this Order shall wear around his neck pendent to a riband similar to that which is assigned to the Knights Commanders an escocheon of gold enamelled on a field purpure the badge within the circle and motto of the Order, the whole surmounted by an Imperial Crown. Moreover, it shall be lawful for the Prelate to surround his Armorial Bearings with the circle and motto of this Order.

30. It is ordained that the King of Arms of this Order shall be nominated by Us, Our heirs and successors, and that he shall seduously attend the Service of the Order. And further it is ordained that he shall wear around his neck pendent to a purple riband an escocheon of gold enamelled on a field purpure a representation of Britannia impaling the Arms of the Sovereign surrounded with the circle and motto of the Order and surmounted by an Imperial Crown, that he shall carry the Rod of this Order, which shall have on the two greater squares the Arms of the Order impaled with those two greater squares the Arms of the Order impaled with those of the Sovereign, and on the lesser squares the Arms of the Order, the whole surmounted by an Imperial Crown, and that at all Coronations he shall precede the Knights Grand Cross and shall carry and wear a Crown as Our other Kings of Arms are accustomed to do, which badge, rod and crown shall all be of the same materials with those used and borne

31. It is ordained that the Registrar of this Order shall be the person for the time being holding the Office of Registrar and Secretary of the Central Chancery of the Orders of Knighthood, that he shall record all proceedings connected with the Most Excellent Order in a register to be appropriated for that purpose and shall, under the directions of the Grand Master, prepare all Warrants and other Instruments to be passed under the Seal of the Order and engross the same, that he shall summon the Knights Grand Cross to attend the Sovereign at all investitures of this Order, that he shall wear around his neck pendent to a purple riband an escocheon of gold enamelled on a field purpure the Cross of the Order surmounted by a representation of a closed book Gules, clasps

Or, within the circle and motto of the Order, the whole sur-

mounted by an Imperial Crown.

32. It is ordained that the Secretary of this Order shall be the person holding for the time being the office of Permanent Under-Secretary of State for the Home Department or such other member of the staff of the Home Department as may be nominated by Us, that he shall collect and tabulate the names of those persons who are to be submitted to Us for admission to this Order or to be awarded the Medal of this Order, that he shall wear around his neck pendent to a purple riband an escocheon of gold enamelled on a field purpure the badge of the Order with two pens saltirewise between the angles in pearl enamel within the circle and motto of the Order, the whole surmounted by an Imperial Crown.

33. It is ordained that the Gentleman Usher of the Purple Rod of this Most Excellent Order shall be appointed by Us, Our heirs and successors, shall wear around his neck pendent to a purple riband an escocheon of gold enamelled on a field purpure a representation of Britannia surrounded by the circle and motto of the Order and surmounted by an Imperial Crown, and that he shall carry the Purple Rod of the Order, having at the top an escrol thereon the motto of the Order surmounted by a representation of Britannia.

34. It is ordained that all and every of the officials of this Order shall over and above the duties more specially imposed by the foregoing Statutes execute diligently whatever the Sovereign or Grand Master may be pleased to command touching the interests of the said Order, and that the said Offices of Prelate, King of Arms, Registrar, Secretary, and Gentleman Usher shall be holden during good behaviour.

35. We do hereby command and enjoin that these Statutes shall be of such and that same force, virtue and effect in every respect as if they had been duly made and the said acts, deeds, matters and things had been duly done on the fourth day of June, 1917.

Lastly.—We reserve to Ourself, Our heirs and successors, full power of annulling, altering, abrogating, augmenting, interpreting or dispensing with these Statutes and Regulations or any part thereof by a notification under the Sign Manual of the Sovereign of the Order.

ALIENS ORDER, 1919.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 18th day of August,

Present:

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

HEREAS by virtue of the Aliens Restriction Act, 1914, His Majesty is empowered to make Orders in Council imposing restrictions on aliens:

And whereas His Majesty in exercise of the powers conferred upon Him by that Act has been pleased to impose restrictions by the Aliens Restriction Order upon aliens and to make various provisions for carrying those restrictions to make various provisions for carrying those restrictions into effect:

And whereas it is provided by the said Act that His Majesty may by Order in Council revoke or add to any Order in Council made thereunder:

And whereas it is now expedient to revoke the said Aliens Restriction Order and to substitute therefor the provisions

hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:-

PART I.

Admission of Aliens.

-(1.) An alien coming from outside the United Kingdom shall not land in the United Kingdom except with the leave of an immigration officer.

(2.) Leave shall not be given to a former enemy alien to land in the United Kingdom, except by permission of the

Secretary of State.

(3.) Leave shall not be given to an alien to land in the United Kingdom unless he complies with the following conditions, that is to say :-

(a.) He is in a position to support himself and his

- dependants;
 (b.) Being desirous of entering the service of an employer in the United Kingdom he produces a permit in writing for his engagement issued to the employer hy the Minister of Labour;
- (c.) He is not a lunatic, idiot, or mentally deficient;
 (d.) He is not the subject of a certificate given to the immigration officer by a medical inspector that for medical reasons it is undesirable that the alien should be permitted to land
- (e.) He has not been sentenced in a foreign country for any extradition crime within the meaning of the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906;
- (f.) He is not the subject of a deportation order in force under the Aliens Restriction Act, 1914, or any Order in Council thereunder, or of an expulsion order under the Aliens Act, 1905;
 (g.) He has not been prohibited from landing by the
- Secretary of State;
 (h.) He fulfils such other requirements as may be prescribed by any general or special instructions of the Secretary
- (4.) An immigration officer may in accordance with general or special directions of the Secretary of State attach such conditions as he may think fit to the grant of permission to an alien to land, and the alien shall comply with the conditions so attached.

 (5.) For the purposes of this Port of the Conditions.
- (5.) For the purposes of this Part of this Order the Isle of Man shall not be deemed to be outside the United Kingdom.
- 2.—(1.) An alien coming from outside the United Kingdom shall not land in the United Kingdom elsewhere than at an approved port
- (2.) For the purposes of this Order the ports specified in the Second Schedule to this Order shall within the limits defined therein be approved ports.
- (3.) The Secretary of State may by order add any port to the list of approved ports or remove any port from that list and prescribe or alter the limits of any approved port, and this
- Order shall thereupon have effect accordingly.

 3.—(1.) An immigration officer or a medical inspector may inspect any alien seeking to land in the United Kingdom, and any such inspection shall be made as soon as practicable after his arrival.

(2.) For the purpose of any such inspection an alien may land subject to such conditions as may be imposed either by an immigration officer or by the Secretary of State and any alien on whom any such condition is imposed shall not, for the purposes of this Order, be deemed to have landed so long as the conditions are complied with. An alien conditionally landed may, however, be detained in the prescribed manner, and whilst so detained shall be deemed to be in legal custody. The Secretary of State may prescribe for security to be given by the owners, agents, or master of the ship in the case of aliens conditionally landed.

(3.) An alien landing in contravention of this Order and an alien arriving at any port other than an approved port may, until dealt with under this Order, be detained in such manner as the Secretary of State may direct, and whilst so detained shall be deemed to be in legal custody.

(4.) Where leave to land is refused to an alien and the ship

(4.) Where leave to land is refused to an alien and the ship in which he arrived is not leaving the port of arrival within 48 hours the alien may with the leave of an immigration officer be placed temporarily on shore and detained at some place approved by the Secretary of State, and whilst so detained shall be deemed to be in legal custody.

An alien so placed on shore shall not for the purpose of this Order be deemed to have landed, and shall on the first opportunity be removed from the United Kingdom by the owners, agents, or master (as the Secretary of State may direct) of the ship in which he arrived.

4. Nothing in this Part of this Order shall prevent the landing in the United Kingdom of any alien who satisfies an immigration officer either—

That having taken his ticket in the United Kingdom and embarked direct therefrom for some other country after a period of residence in the United Kingdom of not less than six months, he has been refused admission to that country and has returned direct therefrom to a port in the United Kingdom.

5. The master of any ship landing or embarking passengers coming from outside the United Kingdom at any port in the United Kingdom shall furnish to such person and in such manner as may be prescribed a return giving the prescribed particulars with respect to any passengers who are aliens, and any passenger shall furnish to the master of the ship any information required by him for the purpose of the return return.

PART II.

SUPERVISION AND DEPORTATION OF ALIENS.

- -(1.) An alien shall comply with the following requirements as to registration:
 - (a.) He shall as soon as may be furnish to the registration officer of the registration district in which he is resident particulars as to the matters set out in the First Schedule
- particulars as to the matters set out in the First Schedule to this Order, and shall, unless he gives a satisfactory explanation of the circumstances which prevent his doing so, produce to the registration officer either a passport furnished with a photograph and duly issued to him not more than five years previously or some other document satisfactorily establishing his nationality and identity;

 (b.) He shall furnish to the registration officer of the registration district in which he is resident particulars of any circumstance affecting in any manner the accuracy of the particulars previously furnished by him for the purpose of registration within seven days after the circumstance has occurred, and generally shall supply to the registration officer all information (including where required by the registration officer a recent photograph) that may be necessary for maintaining the accuracy of the register
- by the registration officer a recent photograph) that may be necessary for maintaining the accuracy of the register kept under this Order;

 (c.) He shall, if he is about to change his residence, furnish to the registration officer of the registration district in which he is then resident particulars as to the date on which his residence is to be changed, and as to his intended place of residence, and on effecting any change of residence from one registration district to another he shall within forty-eight hours of his arrival in the registration district into which he moves report his arrival to the registration officer of that district.
- (d.) If at any time he is absent from his residence for a continuous period exceeding two months, he shall, on the expiration of the two months, forthwith report his current

address to the registration officer offthe district where he is for the time being, and shall, until he returns to his sidence, report every change of address to the registration officer of the district of each new address. He shall also report his return to his residence to the registration officer the district of his residence.

(e.) He shall—

(i.) On his registration obtain from the registration

officer a registration certificate;
(ii.) On every subsequent alteration or addition of any entry in the register relating to his registration produce the certificate to the registration officer in order that, if necessary, a corresponding alteration or addition may be made in the certificate;

(iii.) Produce the certificate upon demand to any police officer or immigration officer or to any other person authorized by the Secretary of State for the purpose.

(2.) If an alien has no residence in the United Kingdom he shall report his presence in a registration district to the registration officer of the district and conform to such instructions as to registration or otherwise as may be given him

by that officer.

(3.) If an alien who is required under this article to register or report is lodging with, or living as a member of the houseor report is longing with, or living as a memoer of the household of, any other person, it shall be the duty of that person to take steps, either by giving notice to the registration officer of the presence of the alien in his household or otherwise, to secure compliance with the terms of this Order in respect of the registration of or reporting by the alien.

(4.) A registration certificate shall be in such form and shall contain such particulars as may be prescribed.

contain such particulars as may be prescribed.

(5.) The provisions of this article shall not apply to any person under the age of sixteen years or to any alien not resident in the United Kingdom who has been in the United Kingdom for a period of not more than one month since the date of his last arrival.

7.—(1.) It shall be the duty of the keeper of any premises to which this article applies, to keep a register of all persons staying at the premises who are aliens not being under the

age of sixteen years.

The keeper of any such premises shall, on the arrival of any such alien at the premises, ascertain and enter or cause to be entered in the register kept for the purpose the name and nationality of such alien, together with the date of his arrival and the address from which he last came; and on the de-parture of any such alien the keeper of the premises shall enter or cause to be entered in the register the date of departure and destination on departure of the alien, and he shall also ascertain and enter in the register from time to time such other particulars as to the alien as may be prescribed.

(2.) The keeper of any premises to which this article applies shall also, if directions for the purpose are issued by the Secretary of State, make to the registration officer of the registration district in which the premises are situate, such returns as to the persons staying at the premises, at such times or intervals, and in such form, as may be specified in such directions.

(3.) It shall be the duty—

(a.) Of every person (whether an alien or not) staying at any premises to which this article applies to sign, when so required, a statement as to his nationality and, if an alien to furnish and sign a statement of the particulars. alien, to furnish and sign a statement of the particulars

required under this article;

(b.) Of the keeper of any premises to which this article applies to require any person who stays at the premises to sign the statement and furnish the particulars required from him under this article and to preserve such statements for such period and in such manner as may be prescribed.

(4.) Every register kept, and all particulars furnished, under this article, shall at all reasonable hours be open for inspection by any officer of police or by any person authorized by the Secretary of State.

(5.) The Secretary of State may prescribe the form in which a register is to be kept or statements furnished under

this article.

(6.) This article applies to any premises where sleeping accommodation is provided for reward.

8.—(1.) There shall be provided and maintained under the directions of the Secretary of State a central register of aliens in which there shall be registered such particulars in

such form as may be prescribed.

(2.) (a.) For the purposes of this Order the chief officer of police of each police district shall be the registration officer for that district, and the police district shall be the registration

(b.) A registration officer shall-

(i.) Keep for his registration district a register of the aliens resident therein and required to be registered under this Order, and enter in the register particulars as to the matters set out in the First Schedule to this Order, and such other particulars and in such form as may be prescribed; and

(ii.) Furnish to the Secretary of State for the purposes of the central register at such time, and in such manner as may be prescribed, copies of all entries in the register or such of them as may be prescribed; and
(iii.) Supply registration certificates to aliens in accordance with the provisions of this Order and on such terms

as to payment or otherwise as may be prescribed.

9.—(1.) The Secretary of State, on the recommendation of the Admiralty, Army Council, or Air Council, may by order declare any area to be a protected area.

(2.) The Secretary of State may as to any protected area

by order

(i.) Prohibit any alien or any class of aliens from entering or remaining in the area;
(ii.) Impose on any alien or class of aliens entering or being in the area such conditions or restrictions as he may think fit as to (a), registration with or reporting to the police or any naval, military, or air-force authority, (b) surveying or making sketches or photographs, (c) the use or possession of any machine, apparatus, or other article of any description, (d) the acquisition of land or any interest in land within the area, (e) any other matter or thing as to which he may deem it necessary in the interests of public

to which he may deem it necessary in the interests of public safety to impose conditions or restrictions;

(iii.) Impose on any householder or other person the obligation to report to the police or any naval, military, or air-force authority, the presence of any alien in his household or in any premises occupied by him or under his control, and the departure of any such alien;

(iv.) Exempt from the restrictions imposed in respect of the area aliens or any class of aliens who pass through the area in the course of a continuous journey:

Provided that the Secretary of State may authorize, subject to any general or special directions, the registration officer to grant to any individual alien a special permit dispensing with compliance with any general order made under this section.

10.—(1.) A chief officer of police, if so authorized by general or special order of the Secretary of State, may direct that any premises within his jurisdiction which, in his opinion, are used for the sale of refreshments to be consumed on the premises, or as a place of public resort or entertainment, or as a club, and which are or have recently been frequented by aliens, shall be either closed altogether or kept closed during such hours or for such purposes as may be required by him, if, in his opinion, either

(a.) The aliens so frequenting the premises are of criminal or disloyal associations or otherwise undesirable; or (b.) The premises are conducted in a disorderly or improper manner, or in a manner prejudicial to the public

good; and if any premises are kept open in contravention of any such direction the occupier or person having control of the premises shall be deemed to have acted in contravention of

(2.) Where any premises have been closed under this section the occupier or person having control of the premises shall not occupy or control any other premises which are used for the sale of r freshments or as a place of public resort or entertainment or as a club without the consent of the chief officer of police for the district in which the premises are situate.

(3.) Any constable, if authorized by the chief officer of police, may, for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this article, enter, if necessary by force, and search or occupy any premises in respect to which an order under this article has been made by the Secretary of State.

11.—The Secretary of State may by order impose on any alien or class of aliens such restrictions (either in addition to or in substitution for the other restrictions imposed by this Order) as to residence, reporting to the police, registration, the use or possession of any machine, apparatus, arms, and explosives, or other article, or otherwise, as he may deem to be necessary in the public interest, and any alien in relation to whom any such order is made shall comply with the terms of the order.

12.-(1.) The Secretary of State may, if he deems it to be conducive to the public good, make an order (in this Order referred to as a deportation order) requiring an alien to leave and to remain thereafter out of the United Kingdom. The Secretary of State may, by a deportation order, require the alien to return to the country of which he is a subject or citizen.

(2.) An order made under this article may be made subject any condition which the Secretary of State may think

(3.) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made shall leave the United Kingdom for the destination

and at the time prescribed by the order, and shall thereafter, so long as the order is in force, remain out of the United

Kingdom.

(4.) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made may be detained in such manner as may be directed is made may be detained in such manner as may be directed by the Secretary of State and may be placed on a ship about to leave the United Kingdom, and shall be deemed to be in legal custody whilst so detained, and until the ship, if British, reaches the port (if any) fixed by the Secretary of State or, whether British or foreign, finally leaves the United Kingdom.

(5.) The master of a ship about to call at any port outside the United Kingdom shall, if so required by the Secretary of State or by an immigration officer, receive an alien against whom a deportation order has been made and his dependants, if any, on board the ship, and afford him and them a passage to that port and proper accommodation and maintenance

during the passage.

13.—Where a deportation order is made in the case of any alien, the Secretary of State may, if he thinks fit, apply any money or property of the alien in payment of the whole or any part of the expenses of or incidental to the voyage from the United Kingdom and the maintenance until departure of the alien and his dependants (if any).

GENERAL.

14.—The Secretary of State may direct that any person or class of persons shall be exempt either unconditionally or subject to such conditions as the Secretary of State may impose from all or any of the provisions of this Order.

impose from all or any of the provisions of this Order.

15.—(1.) Every person (other than a person under the age of sixteen years or an alien to whose landing Part I of this Order does not apply) landing in the United Kingdom shall be in possession of a passport furnished with a photograph and duly issued not more than five years before the date of his arrival, or some other document establishing his nation. ality and identity to the satisfaction of an

(2.) Every person landing or embarking in the United Kingdom shall furnish to an immigration officer such infor-

Kingdom shall furnish to an immigration officer such information in such manner as may be prescribed.

(3.) This article shall not apply to any person not coming from or embarking for a place (other than the Isle of Man) outside the United Kingdom.

16.—(1.) Immigration officers for the purposes of this Order shall be appointed by a Secretary of State, and the Secretary of State may arrange with the Commissioners of Customs and Excise for the employment of officers of Customs and Excise as officers under this Order.

(2.) Medical Inspectors for the purposes of this Order may be appointed by the Minister of Health with the concurrence of the Secretary of State, and shall in the exercise of their powers under this Order act under instructions issued by the Minister of Health with the concurrence of the Secre-

tary of State.

(3.) Subject to any such instructions, officers and inspectors (3.) Subject to any such instructions, officers and inspectors appointed under this Order shall have power to enter or board any vessel, and to detain and examine any person arriving at or leaving any port in the United Kingdom who is reasonably supposed to be an alien, and to require the production of any documents by such person, and shall have such other powers and duties as are conferred upon them by or under this Order or as may be prescribed for giving effect to this Order.

17.—(1.) The Secretary of State may make regulations for prescribing anything which is by this order to be prescribed.

(2.) Any order made, directions or instructions given, or conditions imposed by the Secretary of State or by any immigration officer or other person under this Order may be revoked or varied either wholly or in part by any subsequent order, direction, instruction, or condition.

18.—(1.) If any person acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, any provisions of this Order, or any order or rules made or conditions imposed thereunder, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Order.

(2.) If any person aids or abets any person in any contravention of this Order, or knowingly harbours any person whom he knows or has reasonable ground for believing to have acted in contravention of this Order, he shall be guilty of an offence against this order. appointed under this Order shall have power to enter or

(3.) Where a person lands in contravention of this Order, the master of the ship from which he lands shall, unless he proves the contrary, be deemed to have aided and abetted

the offence.

(4.) Any person shall be guilty of an offence against this Order if, in reply or in relation to any immigration officer, inspector, registration officer, or other person lawfully acting in the execution of the provisions of this Order, he—

(a.) Refuses to answer any question reasonably put to him or to produce any document in his possession; or

(b.) Makes or causes to be made any false return, false statement, or false representation; or

(c.) Alters any certificate or copy of a certificate or any entry made in pursuance of this Order; or (d.) Obstructs or impedes that person in the exercise

of his powers or duties under this Order; or
(e.) Without lawful authority uses or has in his possession any forged, altered, or irregular certificate, passport, or other document.

(5.) A person who is guilty of an offence against this Order shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, and the Court before which he is convicted may, either in addition to, or in lieu of any such punishment, require that person to enter into recognizances, with or without sureties, to comply with the provisions of this Order or any order or regulations made thereunder as the Court may direct.

(6.) If any person fails to comply with an order of the Court requiring him to enter into recognizances, the Court, or any Court of summary jurisdiction sitting for the same place, may order him to be imprisoned for any term not

exceeding six months.

exceeding six months.

(7.) Sections six hundred and eighty-four, six hundred and eighty-five, and six hundred and eighty-six of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 (which relate to the jurisdiction of Courts and Justices), shall apply with respect to jurisdiction under this Order as they apply with respect to jurisdiction under that Act, and section six hundred and ninety-three of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894 (which relates to the levying of sums ordered to be paid by distress on a ship), shall apply with respect to any fines or other sums of money to be paid under this Order by the master of a ship as it applies with respect to fines and other sums of money to be paid under that Act. paid under that Act.

(8.) Proceedings for an offence under this Order, which consists of making or of causing to be made any false statement, false representation, false return, or false information, or of furnishing or of causing to be furnished any false particulars, may be instituted at any time within two months after the statement, representation, return, information, or particulars, as the case may be, was or were discovered to be

false.

(9.) For the purpose of the trial of a person for any offence under this Order, the offence shall be deemed to have been committed either at the place in which the same actually was committed or at any place in which the offender may be.

was committed or at any place in which the offender may be. (10.) Where any offence under this order consists of failure to comply with any of the provisions of this Order requiring any particulars to be furnished, or any report or return to be made, or any notice to be given, the offence shall, for the purposes of this Order, be deemed to have continued so long as such failure continues, whether or not any time is specified at or within which the particulars, report, return, or statement are to be furnished, made, or given. given.

19. Any person who acts in contravention of this Order, or is reasonably suspected of having so acted, or being about so to act, may be taken into custody without warrant by an immigration officer or by any constable.

SUMMARY FOR THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER, 1919.

November proved another dry month for the greater portion of the Dominion. The whole of the North Island, parts of the East Coast, and the northern and southernmost districts of the South Island reported less than the average rainfall. In the Napier, Gisborne, and Bay of Plenty districts the deficiency ranged from 50 to as much as 80 per cent.

Weather conditions during the month were very unsettled, but precipitation was usually of a showery nature, and was invariably followed by strong, drying winds.

The most notable disturbance was an intense westerly low-pressure area which ruled during the first six days of the month, and which was responsible for very unsettled and, at times, stormy conditions in many parts. Some snow fell in the East Coast districts of the South Island on the night of the 2nd. There were numerous other disturbances of a similar type, but of only moderate intensity. Frosts were rather more frequent than is usual during this month, and several did extensive damage in various parts of the Dominion.

REGULATIONS.

(Under the Gaming Act, 1908.)

(c.) All persons under disqualification inflicted by any racing or trotting club in the Dominion of New Zealand, the Commonwealth of Australia, or elsewhere, if affiliated to the New Zealand Racing Conference, or the New Zealand Trotting Association, or the New Zealand Trotting Conference.

(d.) Common prostitutes, and persons who habitually consort with thieves or with persons who have no lawful visible means of support.

(e.) Professional tipsters, persons convicted of house-breaking or pocket-picking, forgery, uttering or possessing counterfeit coin, theft, false pretences, receiving stolen goods, mischief, assault, or any offence or crime of any kind under the Crimes Act, 1908, and also idle and disorderly persons, rogues and vagabonds, and incorrigible rogues convicted under the Police Offences Act, 1908, and persons convicted of an offence under the Gaming Act, 1908.
