New County of Hauraki Plains divided into Ridings, &c.

## A PROCLAMATION.

A PROCLAMATION.

In pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in me by the Counties Act, 1908, and the Hauraki Plains, Thames, Ohinemuri, and Piako Counties Act, 1919, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby divide the new County of Hauraki Plains, as constituted by the said Acts, into five ridings, to be called the Tahuna Riding, the Netherton Riding, the Turua Riding, the Patetonga Riding, and the Waitakaruru Riding, and declare that the boundaries thereof shall be those set forth in the Schedule hereto.

And I do hereby declare that one member shall be elected for the Tahuna Riding, two members for the Netherton Riding, two members for the Turua Riding, two members for the Patetonga Riding, and two members for the Waitakaruru Riding. And I do further declare that Wednesday, the twelfth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, shall be the day upon which the election of the Council of the said County of Hauraki Plains shall take place; and Wednesday, the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, shall be the time, and Ngatea Hall at Ngatea shall be the place, at which the first meeting of the said Council shall be held.

## SCHEDULE.

Section 3, Block V; thence along the north-western boundaries of Sections 3, 2, and 1, and along the north-eastern boundary of the last-mentioned section to a point where the said boundary is intersected by a right line from the junction of the Waitoa and Piako Rivers passing through the junction of the Waitakaruru-Morrinsville and Waiti Roads; thence along the said right line and down the centre of the Piako River to the northern boundary-line of the Waitoa Survey District; thence easterly along said line to the southwestern boundary of Te Awaiti No. 11 2B 4 Block; thence along said boundary and the south-western and south-eastern along said boundary and the south-western and south-eastern boundaries of Te Awaiti Block 1B 2B 3 to the aforesaid survey district boundary-line; thence easterly along that line to the centre of the Waihou River. Bounded towards the east, south, and west by the county boundary to the northern boundary-line of Block VII, Hapuakohe Survey District, the point of commencement.

## NETHERTON RIDING.

All that area in the Hauraki Plains County, in the Land District of Auckland, bounded on the north by a line commencing at the southernmost corner of Opou No. 1 Block, and proceeding thence along the south-eastern and north-eastern boundaries of that block to and along the north-western boundary of Section 43 on deposited plan No. 7492; thence along the north-western boundaries of Sections 44 and 60 on same plan and the north-eastern boundary of the and 60 on same plan and the north-eastern boundaries of Sections 44 and 60 on same plan and the north-eastern boundary of the last-mentioned section and its production to the county boundary. Bounded on the east by the county boundary, on the south by the Tahuna Riding hereinbefore described, and on the west by the centre of the Piako River.

## TURUA RIDING.

All that area in the Hauraki Plains County, in the Land District of Auckland, bounded on the north by the sea, on the east by the county boundary, on the south by the Netherton Riding hereinbefore described, and on the west by the centre of the Piako River.

## PATETONGA RIDING.

All that area in the Hauraki Plains County, in the Land District of Auckland, bounded on the north by a line commencing at the north-western corner of Section 28, Block VII, Piako Survey District, and proceeding thence along the southern side of the Waitakaruru-Morrinsville Road to the south-eastern boundary of the Waitakaruru No. 18 2 Block;

thence northerly along that boundary and the south-eastern boundary of the Waitakaruru No. 1c 3 Block; thence along the southern boundary of Waitakaruru No. 5c to its easternmost corner; thence along a right line to the north-eastern corner of Section 13, Block I, Waihou Survey District, and along the north-western boundaries of that section and Section 14; thence along the north-eastern boundary of the porthern boundary of Section 14; thence along the northern boundary of the last-named section to and along the northern boundary of Section 17, across a road, and along the northern boundary of Section 25 and its production to the centre of the Piako River. Bounded towards the east by the Turua, Netherton, and Tahuna Ridings hereinbefore described; bounded towards the south by the Tahuna Riding, and towards the west by the county houndary. by the county boundary.

#### WAITAKARURU RIDING.

All that area in the Hauraki Plains County, in the Land District of Auckland, bounded towards the north by the sea, towards the east by the Turua Riding hereinbefore described, towards the south by the Patetonga Riding hereinbefore described, and towards the west by the County boundary.

lines for lighting, power, and heating purposes within the area of supply hereinafter described, such electric lines at present proposed to be erected being indicated by means of red lines shown on the plan marked P.W.D. 47820, and deposited in the office of the Minister of Public Works at Wellington, in the Wellington Land District.

#### SCHEDULE.

#### I. AREA OF SUPPLY.

The area of supply comprises the Borough of Palmerston North as at present constituted, as indicated by a distinctive border coloured brown on the plan marked P.W.D. 47820, hereinbefore referred to.

WHEREAS by sections three and one hundred and six of the Land Act, 1908, and section eighty-four of the Land for Settlements Act, 1908 (hereinafter termed "the said Acts"), it is enacted that the Governor-General may make regulations as to the mode in which ballots are to be conducted and for preference being given to certain

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred by the said Acts, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby revoke the regulations for a system of ballot made under the Land Act, 1908, and the Land for Settlements Act, 1908, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the eleventh day of March, one thousand nine hundred and nine, and doth hereby make the following regulations in lieu thereof; and doth also declare that such revocation shall take effect and these regulations shall come into force on the day of the publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette Zealand Gazette.

## REGULATIONS.

1. On the day appointed for receiving applications for land, each application as it is received shall be numbered in consecutive order.

## PREFERENCE AT BALLOT.

Examination of Applicants.

2. Before taking a ballot or otherwise disposing of applications for land the Board may, in such manner as it thinks fit, inquire into all matters affecting an applicant's suitability or his right of preference under the said Acts, or the Discharged Soldiers Settlement Act, 1915, and may reject any applicant who refuses or fails to answer any inquiries as to such matters to the satisfaction of the Board, or who fails to satisfy the Board on any material point.

#### Board's Decision to be Final.

3. The decision of the Board as to the rejection or preference of any applicant shall be final and conclusive.

#### Preference to Landless Applicants.

4. (1.) In cases where a ballot is required, those applicants 4. (1.) In cases where a ballot is required, those applicants who are landless shall have preference over those who are not, and the decision of the Board as to which of the applicants are landless shall be final and conclusive.

(2.) An applicant is landless within the meaning of this regulation if he does not hold under any tenure such area of land, whether Crown land or not, as is, in the opinion of

the Board, sufficient for the maintenance of himself and his

family:

family:

Provided that the Board may, as a condition precedent to approving an application for land, require any such applicant to divest himself, within six months from the date of the approval of the application, of any interest which he may have in any other land. Until the applicant has so divested himself of such interest he shall not be deemed to have any interest in the land to which his application relates, and if he fails so to divest himself his deposit shall be forfeited.

(3.) At every ballot preference shall be given to landless applicants who have children dependent on them, or who have within the two years immediately preceding the ballot, being duly qualified, applied for land at least twice unsuccessfully under any of the said Acts.

(4.) In the case of a husband and wife (except when they are judicially appearated), if either of them is not landless.

are judicially separated), if either of them is not landless, neither of them shall be deemed to be landless.

neither of them shall be deemed to be landless.

(5.) Applicants who have at any time been members of any Expeditionary Force raised for military service beyond New Zealand, or who come within the provisions of section 11 of the War Legislation Amendment Act, 1916, shall, at any ballot for land offered under the Land Act, 1908, or the Land for Settlements Act, 1908, be entitled to an equal preference with applicants of the classes referred to in this regulation. regulation.

## Successful Applicants debarred for Ten Years.

5. Every person who, subsequent to the 11th day of November, 1913, is or has been successful in any land-ballot under the said Acts, or the Discharged Soldiers Settlement Act, 1915, and who makes any disposition of his allotment or any part thereof, whether by way of assignment or sublease, shall, unless the Board, taking into consideration the circumstances of the case, otherwise determines, be disqualified for the period of ten years after the date of such disposition from taking part in any other land-ballot under any of the said Acts.

## METHOD OF CONDUCTING BALLOT.

## Ballot-list to be prepared.

6. A list shall be prepared for each ballot in the following form, on which shall be entered the name of each applicant, followed by the entry of the figure 1 in the column under each section for which he has applied. After the scrutiny of applications by the Land Board, and prior to the drawing of the ballot, rotation numbers shall be affixed in numerical order in the columns set apart therefor, against the names of those whom it has been decided to include in the ballot. ## Ballot-balls.

The Commissioner shall provide sufficient balls, all of one size and colour, equal to the total number of applications for the section applied for, and on each of such balls there shall be legibly printed or written one of the rotation numbers aforesaid, but so that no two balls shall bear the same rotation number. Should such applicant or his representative not make the said payments as required by law, then a fresh ballot in the manner before provided shall be taken between the other applicants for that section without delay, unless a second number has already been drawn as provided in Regulation Linearity and the applicant when retaining numbers lation 11, in which case the applicant whose rotation number it is shall be declared the successful applicant and called upon to pay the necessary deposit, &c. Or, should there be only one remaining applicant, he shall be declared successful, subject to the said payments being made as aforesaid.

WHEREAS by Order in Council dated the fourth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and fifteen, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the seventh day of October, one thousand nine hundred and fifteen, regulations were made under the Stock Act, 1908, for the prevention of the introduction into New Zealand of diseases affecting

And whereas by the said regulations the importation into the Dominion of animal manures is permitted only from certain countries in the manner prescribed by such regulations:

And whereas it is deemed expedient to modify the said regulations by permitting under certain conditions the introduction of bones into New Zealand from Fiji:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise the powers and authorities conferred upon him by the said Act, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby make the following regulations permitting the introduction of bones from Fiji; and doth hereby declare that these regulations shall come into force on the date of publication the Gazette, and that they shall form part of and be read with the above-mentioned regulations.

#### REGULATIONS.

1. (1.) Subject to the provisions of these regulations, the introduction into New Zealand of bones from Fiji is per-

introduction into New Zealand of dones from Fig. 18 pointited.

(2.) Every person desiring to introduce bones as aforesaid must first obtain a permit to do so from the Minister.

(3.) Every shipment of such bones must be accompanied by a certificate in the form in the First Schedule hereto, signed by the shipper, and certifying that such bones are entirely of Fiji origin, and that they are packed in clean new bags that have not come in contact with any stock.

(4.) On every such certificate there shall be inscribed a certificate signed by a responsible officer of the Live-stock Branch of the Department of Agriculture of Fiji, certifying that he has no reason to doubt the correctness of such

shipper's certificate.

2. Every person intending to introduce bones from Fiji into New Zealand shall give to the Inspector at the port of landing not less than forty-eight hours' notice thereof, in the form in the Second Schedule hereto, or to the effect thereof.

3. (1.) Upon receipt of the certificate required by these regulations to accompany a shipment of bones, the Inspector at the port of landing shall, if such certificate is in order and all other requirements of these regulations have been complied with, issue a permit in the form in the Third Schedule hereto for such bones to be landed.

(2.) No bones shall be landed without such permit being issued by the Inspector, and any bones landed without such permit may be seized by any Inspector, officer of the Customs, or member of the Police Force, and shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with as the Minister directs.

4. (1.) The Inspector at the port of landing may submit samples of the bones to any bacteriologist for report, and may detain the bones for a reasonable time pending inquiry or the report of the bacteriologist.

(2.) If, in the opinion of the bacteriologist, the bones are diseased or infected they shall be treated, dealt with, or disposed of as the Minister directs.

5. All expenses of every description incurred in connection with the examination, treatment, or disposal of bones under the last preceding regulation shall be paid by the importer to the Inspector at the port of landing within twenty four hours effer depend. hours after demand.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred on him by the Orchard and Garden Diseases Act, 1908, and by the Orchard and Garden Diseases Amendment Act, 1914, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby make the following regulations governing the sale of New-Zealand-grown fruit of the kinds indicated herein for consumption within the Dominion; and doth hereby declare that the said regulations shall come into force on the date of publication thereof in the Gazette.

## REGULATIONS.

 In these regulations, if not inconsistent with the context,—
 "Blemish" includes branch-rubs, scratches, insect bites, unnatural russeting, bruises, excrescences, sun-scalds, hail-marks, or any other injury detrimental to the appearance of fruit, but does not include spray injury or damage by leaf-roller caterpillar.
"Brand" means to stencil or imprint clearly and legibly.
"Clean" means free from dirt, insect-stains, and spray-

Director" means the Director of the Horticulture Division of the Department of Agriculture.

Mature " means having the degree of ripeness suitable

for marketing.

Owner" means any owner, shipper, or consignor of fruit, and includes the agent or servant of any such owner, shipper, or consignor, and also includes, in the case of a company, the managing director, manager, director, secretary, or other principal officer of the company in New Zealand.

"Pack" means to regularly and compactly arrange fruit in a paleage.

in a package. Package" me Package" means any form of container having a capacity of not less than 555½ cubic inches or one-fourth of an Imperial bushel, and includes a container together by some means to form one.

Sell " means to exchange for money or barter, and

includes offering or exposing for sale, or sending or delivering for sale, or allowing to be sold or offered or exposed for sale.

Size" when used as a noun means the diameter of fruit

measured from cheek to cheek at the widest part, and when used as a verb means to sort according to size. Solid red varieties" means any of the varieties of apples included in section 1 of the Schedule hereto, and any other varieties having similar colouring. Spray injury" means the russeting of, or other injury to first on a rought of surveying.

Striped or partial red varieties" means any of the varieties of apples included in Section 2 of the Schedule hereto, and any other varieties having similar colour"Yellow or green varieties" means any of the varieties of apples included in Section 3 of the Schedule hereto, and any other varieties having similar colouring.

#### PACKAGES FOR FRUIT.

2. This part of these regulations shall apply only to apples pears, quinces, lemons, oranges, peaches, nectarines, and plums.

3. No fruit of any of the kinds enumerated in Regulation 2 above shall be sold in packages except such packages conform to one or other of the types of packages hereinafter prescribed for the several kinds of fruit:

prescribed for the several kinds of fruit:

Provided that nothing in this part of these regulations shall apply to fruit of the above-mentioned kinds which is sold direct to a factory or works for the purpose of being utilized in the manufacture of any product, or is sold direct to a packing establishment to be there packed.

4. (1.) The packages in which apples, pears, quinces, lemons, or oranges may be sold shall be of one or other of the following types:—

(a.) A wooden case having an inside measurement of 10 in. by 114 in. by 194 in.

#### MARKING OF PACKAGES WITH REGISTERED NUMBER.

7. This part of these regulations shall apply only to apples, pears, quinces, peaches, nectarines, plums, apricots, cherries, oranges, and lemons.

8. Every package of fruit of any of the kinds mentioned in the preceding regulation sold or offered for sale shall be branded with the registered number of the owner of such fruit, allotted as hereinafter prescribed.

9. Every owner of fruit of the kinds set out in this part of these regulations who sells such fruit in packages shall apply

to the Director for registration:

Provided that every occupier of an orchard from which fruit is sold or intended to be sold, to whom, at the coming into operation of these regulations, a certificate of registra-tion of such orchard has been issued in terms of the regula-tions dated the 3rd September, 1917, and published in the Gazette of 6th idem, shall be deemed to have applied for registration under these regulations, and a certificate of registration and a registered number shall be issued to him as hereinafter prescribed.

10. The Director on receipt of such application shall without fee register such owner of fruit, allotting to him a registered number, and shall issue to such owner a certificate of regis-

tration accordingly.

11. Such registered number may consist of any combination of letters and numerals.

12. No registered number shall be transferred without the consent in writing of the Director.

13. If a registered number has not been used for a period of two years the Director may, after giving one month's notice in writing, cancel the registration of the owner of such registered number, which will then be available for reallotment.

14. The owner of fruit for sale shall brand his registered number in characters of lin. block type on one end of each package of such fruit if such package is a fruit-case, or, if not, in some prominent position thereon.

15. No auctioneer or other selling agent shall sell or offer for sale any fruit of the kinds set out in this part of these

regulations contained in packages which are not branded with a registered number

16. No owner shall sell fruit of any of the kind set out in

16. No owner shall sell fruit of any of the kind set out in this part of these regulations in packages which bear any other than his own registered number, and he shall erase or obliterate any other registered number on such packages:

Provided that in the event of the purchaser of any fruit selling the same without removing such fruit or any portion of it from the packages for any purpose, including the repacking of it in the same packages, he shall sell such fruit under the registered number already branded on the packages, without alteration thereof or addition thereto. without alteration thereof or addition thereto.

17. Nothing in these regulations shall prevent the holder of a registered number using any other design or mark in combination with such registered number for the purpose of marking his packages of fruit, provided the requirements of these regulations in regard to the use of such registered numbers

are complied with.

## SALE OF FRUIT UNDER OFFICIAL GRADE-MARKS.

18. The following are the official grades in which apples or pears may be classed:

Extra Fancy,

and the words "Extra Fancy," "Fancy," and "C Grade" shall be deemed to be and shall be known as official grade-

19 (1.) No apples or pears shall be sold in packages bearing thereon any of the above official grade-marks unless such apples or pears conform to the standards hereinafter set out for the corresponding grades, and unless all the requirements of this part of these regulations are complied

(2.) The official grade-marks shall not be applied to fruit other than apples and pears unless and until such fruit is brought within the scope of this part of these regulations.

## Apples.

20. The following are the standards by which the grade of

apples shall be determined :-

(a.) Extra Fancy Grade.—Apples of this grade shall be of not less size than 2½ in., sound, smooth, and clean. They shall be mature, well formed, hand-picked, true to name, and free from disease, spray injury, visible bitter-pit, skin-puncture or skin broken at stem, and other defects. Very

The individual apples of yellow or green varieties shall be of good characteristic colour.

(b.) Fancy Grade.—Apples of this grade shall be of not less size than  $2\frac{1}{4}$  in., sound, smooth, and clean. They shall be

They shall be mature, well formed, hand-picked, true to name, and free from disease, visible bitter-pit, skin-puncture or skin broken at stem, and other defects. (c.) C Grade.—Apples of this grade shall be of not less size than 2½ in., moderately clean, sound, mature, true to name, free from disease and visible bitter-pit. Blemished apples may be included in this grade, provided that no individual apple shall have more than 10 per cent. of its surface affected by blemish. Apples affected by spray injury may also be included in this grade, but no individual apple shall be distorted thereby. Apples damaged by leaf-roller caterpillar to the extent of 10 per cent. of their surface may be included, provided that the keeping-qualities of the may be included, provided that the keeping-qualities of the apples so damaged are not impaired.

#### Pears.

21. The following are the standards by which the grade of pears shall be determined :-

pears shall be determined:—

(a.) Extra Fancy Grade.—Pears of this grade shall be of not less size than 2 in. if pyriform in shape and 2½ in. if round in shape. They shall be clean, sound, clear-skinned, and of bright appearance. They shall be mature, well formed, hand-picked, true to name, and free from disease, spray injury, skin-puncture or skin broken at stem, and other defects. Very slightly blemished pears may be included in this grade, provided that not more than 8 per cent. of the total number in any one package are so blemished.

(b.) Fancy Grade.—Pears of this grade shall be of not less

total number in any one package are so blemished.

(b.) Fancy Grade.—Pears of this grade shall be of not less size than 2 in. if pyriform in shape and 2\(\frac{1}{4}\) in. if round in shape. They shall be clean, sound, mature, well formed, hand-picked, true to name, and free from disease, skin puncture or skin broken at stem, and other defects. Slightly blemished pears may be included in this grade, provided that no individual pear shall have more than 5 per cent. of its surface affected thereby. Pears affected by spray injury may be included in this grade, provided that no individual pear shall have more than 20 per cent. of its surface affected thereby. Pears having characteristic russeting shall not be deemed to be unfit for inclusion in this grade.

(c.) C Grade.—Pears of this grade shall be sound, moderately clean, true to name, and free from disease. No individual pear shall be included in this grade which has more than 15 per cent. of its surface affected by blemish.

## Packing of Graded Fruit.

22. Prior to being placed in packages the graded apples or pears shall be sized, and only fruit of as nearly as possible

or pears shall be sized, and only trut or as nearly as possible the same size shall be packed together in a package.

23. In sizing apples or pears in any particular size for the purposes of packing a variation of not more than \(\frac{1}{4}\) in. above the size in question will be allowed, but no apple or pear shall be included in a package which is of less size than that hereinafter required to be branded on such package.

24. Apples and pears of one grade only shall be packed in each package:

Provided that apples and pears of different grades may be contained in the same package if the official grade-mark to be placed on the package as hereinafter prescribed is that of the lowest grade of apples or pears contained in such package.

Provided further that nothing in this regulation shall be construed to authorize the packing of apples and pears or of different varieties of apples or of pears together in the one package.

package.

25. Apples and pears of Extra Fancy, Fancy, and C Grades may be wrapped, but, if wrapped, new paper having one or both surfaces glazed or some other paper approved by the Director shall be used.

## Branding Packages of Graded Fruit.

26. The following particulars shall be branded in characters of not less than ½ in. and not more than ½ in. block type on

each package of apples or pears sold under any of the official grade-marks :-

(a.) The grade of the fruit as determined by the standards

hereinbefore set out.

(b.) The name of the variety contained in the package.

In the event of the variety not being known by the owner the words "Variety unknown" shall be branded on the package.

(c.) The size of the fruit contained in the package, determined as hereinbefore provided.

(d.) The number of fruit contained in the package.

(d.) The number of fruit contained in the package.
(e.) If the fruit has been picked from trees that have not been planted out in the orchard for at least seven years, the letters "N.K.," signifying that the keeping-quality of such fruit is not reliable.
27. The particulars set out in the preceding regulation shall be branded on the same end of the package as the owner's registered number hereinbefore required by these regulations to be placed on one end of packages of fruit, and no other particulars shall be placed on that end except a design or mark used in conjunction with the registered number as hereinbefore authorized.
28. (1.) The particulars required by the last two preceding regulations to be branded on packages of fruit shall accurately describe the contents of such packages, provided that a variation of not more than five per package shall be allowed in the number of fruit stated to be in such package.
(2.) If the contents of such packages are noticeably and to the detriment of a purchaser at variance with the particulars

the detriment of a purchaser at variance with the particulars branded on such packages, the owner of such fruit shall be deemed to have committed a breach of these regulations.

## General Provisions relating to Graded Fruit.

29. An Inspector may at any time examine any package of apples or pears bearing an official grade-mark for the purpose of checking the grading of the contents thereof as indicated by the grade-mark on the package, and the correctness of the other particulars branded on the packages in accordance with the requirements of Regulation 26 above.

30. If on examination the Inspector is of opinion that the contents of any package of apples or pears are of a lower grade than that indicated by the grade-mark thereon, he shall erase such grade-mark, and shall place on the package a grade-mark indicating the grade which he allots to the contents of the package.

contents of the package.

31. If such package is one of a line of apples or pears of the same variety and grade and belonging to the same owner, the grade allotted by the Inspector to the contents of such package shall be allotted to the whole line, and the grademark on the remaining packages of the line shall be altered accordingly. accordingly:

Provided that before altering the grade of a line of apples

or pears as aforesaid the Inspector shall examine the contents of at least 5 per cent. of the packages in the line.

32. If on examination the Inspector is of opinion that the contents of any package of apples or pears are of a lower standard than that prescribed for C grade, he shall erase the grade-mark branded on the package, and no grade-mark shall be allowed thereon. shall be allowed thereon.

33. If the grade is altered by an Inspector as aforesaid, all work in connection with the examination of the packages of apples and pears for the purpose of determining the grade, and with the re-marking of packages. shall be done at the expense in all things of the owner of such apples and pears.

Sale of Apples and Pears under Official Grade-marks other than in Packages.

34. It shall not be lawful for the official grade-marks to be

34. It shall not be lawful for the official grade-marks to be used to describe any apples or pears sold or offered for sale unless such apples or pears conform to the standards hereinbefore set out for the official grades.

35. Any apples or pears exposed in premises or places where fruit or produce is customarily sold which bear a label or other method of description in which any of the official grade-marks are employed shall be deemed to be offered for sale under the description of such official grade-marks. sale under the description of such official grade-mark.

36. Every person who commits a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding £20.

#### REGULATIONS

REGULATION 26 is amended by the deletion of the figures "2½" and substituting therefor the figure "5."

82A. ### SUMMARY FOR THE MONTH OF FEBRUARY, 1920.

February proved a fair and warm month, though dull and misty conditions were somewhat frequent. Heavy rains occurred in most parts on the 8th and 9th and between the 25th and 28th, and, except in the Gisborne and Napier districts and the West Coast and southernmost portions of the South Island, the total rainfall for the month was considerably above the average, at many places more than double.

The ruling disturbances were a sub-tropical low, the centre of which passed in the vicinity of Cook Strait on the evening of the 9th, and a similar low acting in conjunction with one southward of the Dominion from the 24th to the close of the

month.

ATTENTION is specially drawn to the following information

with regard to vessels accompanying submarines:—
British men-of-war, Auxiliary Patrol vessels, Royal fleet and Mercantile fleet auxiliaries, and all British merchant vessels, whenever proceeding in company with submarines are to fly "M" (International) at the masthead, accomare to fly "M" (International) at the masthead, accompanied by a group from the numeral table in the International Code of Signals, indicating the number of submarines in company. This signal is a warning to vessels that submarines are in the vicinity. When "M" flag is displayed vessels are cautioned to steer so as to give the escorting vessel a berth of at least one mile, and also to pass astern of her. When from any cause this cannot be done, the escorting vessel should be approached at slow speed until warning is given of the danger zone by flags, semaphore, or megaphone, as most convenient, a good look-out being kept meanwhile for the submarines, whose presence may be only indicated by the submarines, whose presence may be only indicated by their periscopes showing above water. The use of the large red flag has been discontinued for this purpose.

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The following classes of deaf children are admitted to the School for the Deaf (sound intellect being always a necessity) :-

- 1. Children born deaf, or who have lost their hearing before learning to speak.
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- Children who have lost their hearing after having learned to speak.
