"(a.) The said explosive shall in all respects be manufactured in strict conformity with the schedules to the British Home Office Order dated the 15th February, 1923.

"(b.) The greatest weight of explosive which may be used in any one shot-hole shall not exceed 22 oz., and each cartridge shall be marked with words to that effect."

Notice to make Returns of Income under the Land and Income Tax Act, 1916.

Act and the regulations made thereunder, every person and company, whether a taxpayer of not, having derived income within the meaning of the said Act during the year, ending 31st March, 1923, from any source of by any means which is made the subject of taxation under the said Act, is hereby required to make and furnish to me, in the prescribed form, returns of such income on or before the 1st day of June, 1923.

Returns of income are required to be furnished by all companies and persons in business (including farmers), whether for the whole or part of the income year. They are also required from all persons in receipt of income from salary,

REGULATIONS.

(Under the Gaming Act, 1908.)

P OR Deaf Children of sound intellect. The pupils are taught to understand and use ordinary speech. The full charge for board and education is £40 a year, but less is accepted from parents who cannot afford to pay this amount. In case of necessity admission is free.

By the Education Act it is compulsory for deaf children to come under instruction at the age of six, and to continue until the age of twenty-one unless the Education Department previously grants exemption. Though a child is, as a rule, best fitted to begin the school course at the age of six, advice should be obtained as soon as any sign of deafness is observed.

The following classes of deaf children are admitted to the School for the Deaf (sound intellect being always a necessity) :-

Children born deaf, or who have lost their hearing before learning to speak.
 Children who can hear a little, but are too deaf to be taught in a public school.
 Children who have lost their hearing after having learned to speak.

The Act imposes upon every parent, teacher of a school (either public or private), constable, or officer of a charitable or kindred institution who is aware of the place of residence (either temporary or permanent) of a deaf child, and the householder in whose house any such child resides, an obligation to send notification of the fact to the Minister of Education, giving the name, age, and address of the child; and any neglect or failure to comply with this provision involves liability to a fine.
