WHEREAS it is provided by section three of the Electric-power Boards Act, 1918, that any area or areas of land may be constituted an electric-power district or outer area of such district under the said Act, and in the manner therein provided:

And whereas a petition praying that the area described in the First Schedule hereto be constituted an electric-power district under the said Act, and that the area described in the Second Schedule hereto be constituted an outer area of such electric-power district, was presented to the Governor-General on the thirtieth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-three:

And whereas such petition was publicly notified in the *Otorohanga Times* dated the fourth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-three, being a newspaper circulating in the proposed electric-power district:

And whereas, after due inquiry, the Governor-General is of opinion that the petition should be granted subject to the proposed boundaries of the district and outer area being altered as hereinafter appears:

Now, therefore, I, John Rushworth, Viscount Jellicoe, Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon me by section three of the Electric-power Boards Act, 1918, do hereby alter the proposed boundaries, and proclaim the district with the altered boundaries as described in the Third Schedule hereto to be an electric-power district, and I hereby assign to such district the name of the "Waitomo Electric-power District"; and I do further proclaim that the area with the altered boundaries as described in the Fourth Schedule hereto shall be an outer area of such electric-power district.

Regulations under the Stamp Duties Act, 1923.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the Stamp Duties Act, 1923 (hereinafter referred to as the said Act), and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby make the regulations hereinafter set forth, and doth hereby declare that the said regulations shall come into force on the day of the publication thereof in the Gazette.

REGULATIONS.

PART I. GENERAL.

1. THE Head Office of the Stamp Duties Office, being the office of the Commissioner, is and shall be at Wellington. Offices of the Stamp Duties Office being offices of Assistant Commissioners are and shall be situated at Auckland, Gisborne, Napier, New Plymouth, Wellington, Nelson, Blenheim, Hokitika, Christchurch, Dunedin, and Invercargill.

2. The Stamp Duties Office shall be open to the public for transaction of business on days other than holidays, as follows: 10 a.m. to 12.30 p.m., 1.30 p.m. to 3 p.m., except on Saturdays, when the hours shall be 9.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m.

3. Adhesive stamps shall be created for the Commissioner by the Government Printer, under the direction of the Commissioner.

4. Impressed stamps shall be created by the Commissioner at the Head Office, or by the Government Printer at the direction and on behalf of the Commissioner.

5. Adhesive and impressed stamps shall be issued by the Commissioner to Postmasters and to the Assistant Commissioners on requisitions signed by authorized officers.

6. Licensed dealers are required to sell to the public for cash any stamps in their possession on demand during the hours when their premises are open for the transaction of business.

7. Licensed dealers may purchase supplies of stamps from post-offices or from the Stamp Duties Office. In the case of purchases from the Stamp Duties Office applications for a supply less in value than £2 shall not be received.

8. A discount of £2 10s. per centum shall be allowed by Postmasters and by the Stamp Duties Office on all purchases by licensed dealers of £2 worth or more of stamps of a denomination not exceeding 1s.

9. Application to the Stamp Duties Office for adhesive and impressed stamps shall be made on the forms A and B respectively.

10. The duty on instruments required to be stamped on or before execution may be denoted by an impressed stamp impressed upon the paper or material upon which such instrument is to be written. Such impressed stamp may be created by the Commissioner at the Head Office or by the Government Printer for the Commissioner at his discretion.

11. Persons may purchase from the Stamp Duties Office forms impressed as aforesaid out of stock supplied by the Commissioner. The Stamp Duties Office shall not be required to stock such forms as cheques, bills of lading, and other similar forms.

12. Persons requiring the Commissioner to impress paper as provided by regulation 4 shall make application to the Commissioner on the form C. Such application shall be for a minimum value of £2, and shall be accompanied by a remittance for the amount of duty and return postage on the paper forwarded to be impressed if such is to be returned by the Commissioner through the post.

13. Neither the Commissioner nor his officers shall be held responsible for any loss by reason of any stamped paper being obtained by a person not legally entitled thereto.

14. Paper shall not be impressed as aforesaid unless and until the duty and return postage are paid to the Commissioner at the Head Office, Wellington.

15. Instruments required to be stamped after the same have been executed shall be presented for stamping at the Stamp Duties Office. The application for stamping shall be made out in the form D. An instrument shall not be deemed to be presented for stamping within the meaning of Part II of the said Act unless and until the duty payable thereon is capable of assessment and unless and until the duty assessed thereon is paid.

PART II. ALLOWANCE OF SPOILED STAMPS.

16. All applications for the allowance of spoiled stamps must be lodged at the Head Office, or with an Assistant Commissioner, accompanied by a declaration according to the form E.

17. If, after examination of such stamps, the application for allowance is granted, either impressed or adhesive stamps, but not portion of each, will be issued in exchange to the person entitled thereto to the amount so allowed, after deducting therefrom commission at the rate of 2½ per cent.

18. All spoiled stamps (if not allowed) will be marked with the word "Disallowed" and the date when so disallowed, and, together with the paper on which the same are affixed or impressed, will be returned to the person leaving the same for allowance.

19. Subject to the production of such evidence, by declaration or otherwise, as the Commissioner may require, and to such further regulations as may from time to time be issued in that behalf, allowance for spoiled stamps will be made in the manner and in the cases hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

- (1.) The stamp on any paper inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled, obliterated, or by any means rendered unfit for the purpose intended, before any instrument written thereon is executed by any party and for which stamp no money or other consideration has been paid or given to the solicitor or other person employed to transact the business intended to have been carried into execution thereby, or to the person by whom the same was written.
- (2.) Any adhesive stamp which has never been used or affixed to any material, but which has been inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled or rendered unfit for use.
- (3.) The stamp used or intended to be used for any bill of exchange or promissory note signed by or on behalf of the drawer or intended drawer, but not delivered out of his hands to or deposited with any person as a security for the payment of money, or in any way negotiated, issued, or put in circulation, or made use of in any other manner whatsoever, and which,

being a bill of exchange, has not been accepted by the drawee; and provided that the material on which any such stamp is affixed or impressed does not bear any signature intended as or for the acceptance of any bill of exchange to be afterwards written thereon, except as and in manner provided in the next following subsection.

- (4.) The stamp used or intended to be used for any bill of exchange or promissory note signed by or on behalf of the drawer thereof, but which from any omission or error therein, or any accidental defacement thereof, has been spoiled or rendered useless, although the same being a bill of exchange may have been accepted or endorsed, or being a promissory note may have been delivered to the payee: Provided that another completed and duly stamped bill of exchange or promissory note is produced, identical in every particular, except in the correction of such error or omission as aforesaid, with the spoiled bill or note: Provided as follows:—

(a.) That in all cases the stamp, stamped material, or stamped form, be given up to the Commissioner.

(b.) That in the case of a signed instrument the application for allowance be made within six calendar months from the date of the stamp being spoiled; and in the case of an unsigned instrument within twelve calendar months from that date.

- (5.) The stamp used for any of the following instruments, that is to say,—

(a.) An instrument executed by any party thereto, but afterwards found to be absolutely void from the beginning.

(b.) An instrument executed by any party thereto, but afterwards found unfit, by reason of any error or mistake therein, for the purpose originally intended.

(c.) An instrument executed by any party thereto, but which, by reason of the death of any person by whom it is necessary that it should be executed without having executed the same, or of the refusal of any such person to execute the same, or to advance any money intended to be thereby secured, cannot be completed so as to effect the intended transaction in the form proposed.

(d.) An instrument executed by any party thereto which, for want of the execution thereof by some material and necessary party, and his inability or refusal to sign the same, is in fact incomplete and insufficient for the purpose for which it was intended.

(e.) An instrument executed by any party thereto, which by reason of the refusal of any person to act under the same, or by the refusal or non-acceptance of any office thereby granted, totally fails of the intended purpose.

(f.) An instrument executed by any party thereto which, for want of enrolment or registration within the time required by law, has become null and void.

(g.) An instrument, executed by any party thereto, which has become useless in consequence of the transaction intended to be thereby effected being affected by some other instrument, duly stamped.

(h.) An instrument, executed by any party thereto, which is inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled, and in lieu thereof another instrument made between the same parties and for the same purpose is executed and duly stamped.

Provided as follows:—

- (a.) That in the case of an executed instrument—

(i.) The instrument is given up to be cancelled:

(ii.) The application for allowance is made within six calendar months after the date of the instrument: or, if it is not dated, within six calendar months after the execution thereof by the person by whom it was first or alone executed; except when, from unavoidable circumstances, any instrument for which another instrument has been substituted cannot be given up to be cancelled within the aforesaid period, and in that case within six calendar months after the date of execution of the substituted instrument; and except where the spoiled instrument has become void for want of filing or registration, and in that case, within six calendar months next after it has become so void; and except also where the spoiled instrument has been sent abroad, and in that case within six calendar months after it has been received back in any part of New Zealand:

(iii.) No action has been brought or suit commenced in which the instrument could or would have been given or offered in evidence.

- (b.) That in the case of stamped material not having any executed instrument written thereon, and of any adhesive stamp not affixed to any material the application for allowance is made within twelve calendar months after the stamp has been spoiled

as aforesaid, and that the stamped material or stamp be given up to be cancelled.

- (6.) Any stamp inadvertently used for an instrument liable to duty when such stamp is of greater value than was necessary, or any stamp inadvertently used for an instrument not liable to any duty, provided the application is made within six calendar months after the date of the instrument; or, if it is not dated, within six calendar months after the execution thereof by the person by whom it was first or alone executed; and provided that the instrument, if liable to any duty, is restamped with the proper duty.

PART III. STEAMSHIP PASSENGER-TICKETS.

20. In this Part of these regulations, if not inconsistent with the context, "Steamship-owner" includes a steamship company, association, or owner of any steamship.

21. Subject as hereinafter mentioned, the stamp duty payable in respect of every passenger-ticket given or issued in New Zealand by any steamship-owner shall be denoted by an adhesive stamp affixed to such ticket; and every such stamp shall be cancelled in the same manner as the stamp upon a receipt is for the time being required to be cancelled by law.

22. In any case where the amount of stamp duty annually payable by any steamship owner in respect of passenger-tickets issued in New Zealand exceeds by estimation the sum of £25, such steamship owner may apply to the Commissioner for permission to pay such stamp duty annually by way of composition.

23. (1.) Every such application shall be accompanied by a statement in detail showing the number of passenger-tickets (for amounts over £2) issued by such steamship-owner during the twelve months ending on the preceding 31st December.

(2.) Such statement shall be verified by the secretary, manager, or other chief executive officer of the steamship-owner on behalf of whom such statement is lodged: Provided that in any case the Commissioner may require the owner of a steamship to verify such statement personally.

24. Upon receipt of such application, and upon receiving such security as he may require for the due payment of all stamp duty, the Commissioner may, in his discretion, grant to any steamship-owner a license or permission in writing to pay in one sum the amount of stamp duty exigible in respect of all passenger-tickets to be issued during a period of twelve calendar months to be specified in such license or permission.

25. The form of license granted and of security required shall be such as the Commissioner may from time to time prescribe.

26. The Commissioner, or any person on his behalf authorized by him so to do, shall at any time during the currency of the license or permission granted as aforesaid have the right to inspect the account kept of the number of tickets issued and the books and documents from which the same is made up.

27. Within three months after the expiry of the period for which such license or permission as aforesaid has been granted the steamship-owner shall forward to the Commissioner a statement in detail showing the number of passenger-tickets (for amounts over £2) issued by such steamship-owner during the period covered by the license or permission issued to him. On receipt of such statement the Commissioner shall proceed to assess the duty payable, and shall notify the steamship-owner accordingly. Payment of the amount so assessed shall be made to the Commissioner forthwith.

28. If any steamship-owner to whom a license or permission as aforesaid has been issued by the Commissioner fails to render the statement required to enable the Commissioner to assess the amount of duty due, or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this Part of these regulations, he shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £50.

PART IV. DUTIES PAYABLE BY RACING CLUBS.

29. Every statement required to be forwarded to the Commissioner in pursuance of section 196 of the said Act shall be in the form F.

30. Such statement shall contain the particulars therein indicated as being required, and shall be verified by a statutory declaration in the form prefixed to such statement made by the secretary or other chief executive officer of the racing club by or on behalf of which such statement is forwarded.

31. Where the duties payable under Part XI of the said Act are deposited by any racing club at any branch of the bank at which the Public Account is kept the statement sent to the Commissioner shall be accompanied by a bank receipt for the amount so deposited.

PART V. CHEQUES ON A BANK.

32. For the purpose of this Part of these regulations "bank" shall be deemed to mean any bank for the time being authorized under the provisions of the Banking Act, 1908, to issue and circulate bank-notes, and "license or permission"

shall be taken to mean license or permission granted as provided in the next succeeding regulation.

"Cheques" shall not be deemed to include cheques issued for use by friendly societies or other cheques not liable to stamp duty.

"Quarter" shall be taken to mean any one of the periods of three months which end on the thirty-first day of March, the thirtieth day of June, the thirtieth day of September, and the thirty-first day of December in any year.

33. Subject as hereinafter provided, the Commissioner may, upon receiving such security as he may require for the due payment of stamp duty, grant to any bank, on application made on its behalf by its chief officer for New Zealand, a license or permission to supply to its customers unstamped cheques and to pay or negotiate unstamped cheques so supplied by it or any other bank to which a similar license or permission has been granted, and also to issue on its own behalf unstamped cheques.

34. The exemption from stamping shall not apply to special cheques—that is, cheques which are specially printed for customers, and are not on the bank's usual form.

35. Within twenty-one days after the expiration of each quarter any bank to which a license or permission has been granted shall forward to the Commissioner a statement in the form G, verified by the general manager, inspector, or accountant in its head office for New Zealand, showing the dutiable value of unstamped cheques (other than special cheques as hereinbefore defined) supplied by it to its customers during such quarter, the dutiable value of unstamped cheques (other than special cheques as hereinbefore defined) received by it from its printer or printers during such quarter, and the dutiable value of unstamped cheques (other than special cheques as hereinbefore defined) remaining in its possession at the end of each quarter to be supplied to its customers. Such statement shall also include the dutiable value of unstamped cheques issued by it on its own behalf or procured by it for issue on its own behalf.

36. The said statement shall be accompanied by a bank receipt showing that the amount of stamp duty payable in respect of the unstamped cheques supplied by the bank furnishing such statement to its customers during the quarter to which it refers, and also the stamp duty payable by such bank in respect of unstamped cheques issued by it on its own behalf during the same period, have been paid to the credit of the Public Account at the Bank of New Zealand, or such other bank at which the Public Account is for the time being kept.

37. Any bank to which a license or permission has been granted shall at all reasonable times permit the Commissioner or any person on his behalf authorized by him so to do to inspect its books, records, and documents which have reference to unstamped cheques.

38. Whenever the Commissioner grants a license or permission to any bank he shall by registered letter communicate the fact of his so doing and the date of his so doing to every other bank to which a subsisting license or permission has been granted as aforesaid.

39. The Commissioner may, by notice in writing under his hand, cancel the license or permission granted to any bank. Such notice shall be forwarded by registered letter to the Chief Officer for New Zealand of such bank, and on the expiration of three months from the posting of such notice the license or permission granted to such bank shall cease to have any force or effect.

40. Immediately any license or permission granted to any bank has been cancelled, or ceases from any other cause to have any force or effect, the fact that it has been cancelled, or has ceased from any other cause to have any force or effect, shall be communicated by the Commissioner to every other bank to which a subsisting license or permission has been granted, together with the date upon which such cancellation is to take effect.

41. The provisions of any regulations for the time being in force relating to allowance of spoiled stamps shall apply to unstamped cheques the stamp duty on which has been paid by a bank, but no allowance shall be made in respect of the duty paid on any such cheques unless the application therefor is made by the bank which paid the stamp duty sought to be recovered or is accompanied by a certificate by a responsible officer of such bank setting forth that the stamp duty sought to be recovered has been duly paid to the credit of the Public Account.

42. If any bank to which a license or permission has been granted by the Commissioner fails to render the statement required by, or fails to comply with any of the provisions of, this Part of these regulations, it shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £50.

PART VI. MISCELLANEOUS.

43. The forms referred to in these regulations are the forms set out in the First Schedule hereto.

44. The regulations described in the Second Schedule hereto are hereby revoked.

WHEREAS, there being no Harbour Board empowered to grant the license hereinafter mentioned, Andrew Phillips (hereinafter called "the licensee") has applied to the Governor-General in Council for a license under the Harbours Act, 1923 (hereinafter called "the said Act") to occupy a part of the foreshore, and land below low-water mark adjacent thereto, at Taieri Mouth, on the Taieri River, as shown on plan marked M.D. 4470, and deposited in the office of the Marine Department at Wellington, in order to erect and maintain thereon a jetty:

And whereas it has been made to appear to the Governor-General in Council that the said work will not be or tend to the injury of navigation, and the said plan has, prior to the making of this Order in Council, been approved by the Governor-General in Council:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him by the said Act and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby approve of the purpose or object for which the said license is required by the licensee as aforesaid; and in further pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, and with the like advice and consent as aforesaid, doth hereby license and permit the licensee to use and occupy that part of the foreshore, and land below low-water mark immediately contiguous thereto, which are particularly shown and delineated on the plans marked M.D. 4470 so deposited as aforesaid, for the purpose of erecting and maintaining such jetty thereon, such license to be held and enjoyed by the licensee upon and subject to the terms and conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.

1. IN these conditions the term "Minister" means the Minister of Marine, as defined by the Shipping and Seamen Act, 1908, and includes any officer, person, or authority acting by or under the direction of such Minister.
2. The concessions and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall extend and apply only to that part of the foreshore and land below low-water mark necessary for the erection of such jetty, which are shown on the plans marked M.D. 4470 and deposited in the office of the Marine Department at Wellington.
3. In consideration of the concessions and privileges granted by this Order in Council, the licensee shall pay to the Minister the sum of £2 10s., and thereafter an annual sum of £1 in advance, payable on the 1st day of April in each year, the proportionate part of such rental in respect of the period from the date hereof until the 31st March following to be paid on the license being supplied with a copy of this Order in Council.
4. His Majesty or the Governor-General, and all officers in the Government Service acting in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress into, through, over, and out of the said jetty without payment.
5. All persons shall, at all reasonable times, and upon payment of the proper dues, have free and full liberty to use the said jetty, and all rights of ingress and egress thereon and therefrom.

6. The licensee shall maintain the above-mentioned jetty in good order and repair, and shall at all times exhibit and maintain at the licensee's own cost suitable and necessary lights for the guidance of vessels; provided that no light shall be exhibited until after it has been approved of by the Minister.

7. Any person authorized by the Minister may at all reasonable times enter upon the said jetty and view the state of repair thereof; and upon such Minister leaving at or posting to the last known address of the licensee in New Zealand a notice in writing of any defect or want of repair in such jetty, requiring the licensee, within a reasonable time, to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, the licensee shall with all convenient speed cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made, as the case may be.

8. Nothing herein contained shall authorize the licensee to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to, or inconsistent with, any law relating to the Customs, or with any regulation of the Minister of Customs, or with any provisions of the Harbours Act, 1923, or its amendments, or any regulation made thereunder, and that are now or may hereafter be in force.

9. The rights, powers, and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall continue in force for fourteen years from the date hereof, unless in the meantime such rights, powers, and privileges shall be altered, modified, or revoked by competent authority; and the licensee shall not assign, charge, or part with any such rights, powers, or privileges without the previous written consent of the Minister first obtained.

10. The said rights, powers, and privileges may be at any time resumed by the Governor-General, without payment of any compensation whatever, on giving to the licensee three calendar months previous notice in writing. Any such notice shall be sufficient if given by the Minister, and delivered at or posted to the last known address of the licensee in New Zealand.

11. The licensee shall be liable for any injury which the said jetty may cause any vessel or boat to sustain through any default or neglect of the licensee's part.

12. In case the licensee shall—

- (1.) Commit or suffer a breach of the conditions hereinafter set forth, or any of them; or
- (2.) Cease to use or occupy the said jetty for a period of thirty days; or
- (3.) Fail to pay the sums specified in clause 3 of these conditions; or
- (4.) Become bankrupt or be brought under the operation of any law for the time being in force relating to bankruptcy,

then and in any of the said cases this Order in Council, and every license, right, power, or privilege thereby conferred, may be revoked and determined by the Governor-General in Council without any notice to the licensee or other proceeding whatsoever; and publication in the *New Zealand Gazette* of any Order in Council containing such revocation shall be sufficient notice to the licensee, and to all persons concerned or interested, that this Order in Council, and the license rights, and privileges thereby conferred, have been revoked and determined; and upon such revocation the Minister may cause the said jetty to be removed, and may recover the cost incurred by any such removal from the licensee.

13. The erection of the said jetty shall be sufficient evidence of the acceptance by the licensee of the terms and conditions of this Order in Council.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred on him by the Stock Act, 1908, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby make the following regulations for preventing the introduction of disease into New Zealand, and doth hereby declare that the said regulations shall come into force on the date of the publication hereof in the *Gazette*.

REGULATIONS.

1. In every case where goods of any kind are imported, either direct or by way of any other country, into New Zealand

land from Great Britain, Ireland, or any part of the Continent of Europe, or from the States of Queensland or Western Australia in the Commonwealth of Australia, or from the United States of America, and where any hay, straw, or chaff is received with such goods as packing or otherwise, the importer of such goods shall, with as little delay as may be, and in any case within three days of the commencement of the unpacking of such goods, thoroughly destroy all such hay, straw, or chaff by burning:

Provided that in the case of hay, straw, or chaff used for packing goods manufactured and packed in Great Britain, the destruction of such hay, straw, or chaff will not be required if the packages are accompanied by a sworn certificate or statutory declaration from the exporter or packer, countersigned as correct by a responsible officer appointed by the High Commissioner for New Zealand for the purpose, to the effect that the hay, straw, or chaff used for packing had been disinfected prior to use, by steam, at 185 degrees for ten minutes, or by some other effective method approved by the High Commissioner.

2. In no case shall any importer use or suffer to be used any such hay, straw, or chaff (unless accompanied by a sworn certificate or statutory declaration of disinfection, countersigned as correct as provided for in clause 1 of these regulations) for repacking the same goods or for packing any other goods.

3. Every person who commits a breach of these regulations shall be liable to a penalty of not less than £2, nor more than £20.

1. The Board shall meet for the transaction of business on the last Saturday in each month at 10.30 o'clock a.m. at the Raurimu Public Hall, or at such other time or place as may from time to time be fixed by the Board. The first meeting shall be held on Saturday, the 29th day of March, 1924.

2. The members of the Board shall at their first meeting, and thereafter at the annual meeting hereinafter mentioned, elect one of themselves to be Chairman, who may join in the discussion and shall have an original as well as a casting vote. The Chairman shall hold office until the election of his successor.

3. Special meetings may be convened by the Chairman, provided that two days' notice of any such meeting is given to each member, specifying the business to be transacted at such special meeting; and no other business than that so specified shall be transacted at such meeting.

7. All questions shall be determined by the majority of votes of the members of the Board present at a meeting.

8. The Board shall have prepared and submitted at an annual meeting to be held in the month of April in each year a report of the proceedings of the Board for the previous

year ending on the 31st day of March, together with a statement of the receipts and expenditure of the Board for such year. A copy of every such report and statement, certified by the Chairman to be correct, shall be sent to the Minister of Lands as soon as possible after each annual meeting.

9. The Board shall control the said reserve and the building erected thereon for the purposes of a public hall, and shall also afford settlers and residents of Raurimu and the surrounding district such facilities for meeting within the said hall as may from time to time be determined by the Board; provided that the Board shall have power to fix reasonable charges for the use of the said hall.

DESCRIPTION.

The sections in the Waimana and Urewera Survey Districts, are situated in the valley of the Waimana and Tauranga Rivers and adjacent thereto, the northernmost sections being distant about three to six miles from Waimana, while the southernmost is distant about twenty-nine miles from Waimana, which lies about eighteen miles southerly from Whakatane and about twenty miles south-westerly from Opotiki.

The main road up the valley of the Waimana has been constructed nearly as far as the southernmost section, and will ultimately form a main line of communication between the Bay of Plenty and Lake Waikaremoana and thence to Wairoa and the East Coast.

SUMMARY FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY, 1924.

Numerous westerly depressions passed in the South during the first half of January, and considerable rainfall was reported at this time in the West Coast districts, while hot and dry conditions were being experienced on the East Coast. Temperatures of over 90° were recorded at many places in the latter districts about the 12th and 13th, and at Masterton on the 12th the maximum was 95.4°.

There was a cold snap for a few days about the middle of the month, and, afterwards, until the 25th, an easterly type of weather prevailed when some good rains occurred on the east coast of the North Island, terminating the droughty conditions which had ruled since the middle of October.

The total rainfall was mostly above the average along the western coast and in the high country of the South Island. Isolated places in the northernmost and east-coast districts of the North Island also had an excess, but in most parts of the East Coast the fall was again deficient, but not to any serious extent.

Generally, the month was a typical summer one, with warm and dry conditions ruling.

IN pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by section twenty-six of the Board of Trade Act, 1919, and of every other power and authority enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby, on the recommendation of the Minister of Industries and Commerce, revoke the Orders in Council mentioned in the First Schedule hereto, and in lieu thereof doth hereby make the following Board of Trade Regulations fixing the maximum prices of flour, bran, and pollard respectively in accordance with the provisions of the Second, Third, Fourth, and Fifth Schedules hereto.

REGULATIONS.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

Orders in Council revoked.

ORDERS in Council of the 28th day of February, 1922, and the 21st day of October, 1922, published respectively at pages 555 and 2856 of the *Gazette* for that year.

Order in Council of the 24th day of October, 1923, published at page 2744 of the *Gazette* for that year.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

1. When the nearest port is Lyttelton, Timaru, or Oamaru, the maximum price of flour as sold by the manufacturer for delivery free on board at the nearest port in 200 lb. sacks on the terms of payment within seven days after delivery shall be £15 10s. per ton, less 2½ per cent.; and in the case of sale by the manufacturer otherwise than in manner aforesaid the maximum price shall be a price equivalent, as regards the seller, to the maximum price above mentioned.

2. In this Schedule the term "nearest port" means the port of entry under the Customs Act, 1913, which is nearest to or includes the place of manufacture of the flour sold.

3. When the nearest port is a port other than Lyttelton, Timaru, or Oamaru, the maximum price of flour as sold by the manufacturer for delivery free on board at the nearest port in 200 lb. sacks on the terms of payment within seven days after delivery shall be £15 10s. per ton, less 2½ per cent., with such addition only as is equal to the cost of the carriage by sea of a ton of flour from Lyttelton, Timaru, or Oamaru (whichever cost is the least) to the said nearest port; and, in the case of the sale by the manufacturer otherwise than

in manner aforesaid the maximum price shall be a price equivalent, as regards the seller, to the maximum price last above mentioned.

THIRD SCHEDULE.

1. When the nearest port is Lyttelton, Timaru, or Oamaru, the maximum price of bran or pollard as sold by the manufacturer for delivery free on board at the nearest port on the terms of payment within seven days after delivery shall be £5 10s. per ton in the case of bran and £6 10s. per ton in the case of pollard, less in each case 2½ per cent.; and in the case of sale by the manufacturer otherwise than in manner aforesaid the maximum price shall be a price equivalent, as regards the seller, to the maximum prices above mentioned.

2. In this Schedule the term "nearest port" means the port of entry under the Customs Act, 1913, which is nearest to or includes the place of manufacture of the bran or pollard sold.

When the nearest port is a port other than Lyttelton, Timaru, or Oamaru, the maximum price of bran or pollard as sold by the manufacturer for delivery free on board at the nearest port on the terms of payment within seven days after delivery shall be £5 10s. per ton in the case of bran, and £6 10s. per ton in the case of pollard, less in each case 2½ per cent., with such addition only as is equal to the cost of the carriage by sea of a ton of bran or pollard, as the case may be, from Lyttelton, Timaru, or Oamaru (whichever cost is the least) to the said nearest port; and in the case of sale by the manufacturer otherwise than in manner aforesaid the maximum price shall be a price equivalent, as regards the seller, to the maximum price last above mentioned.

FOURTH SCHEDULE.

When bran or pollard manufactured in New Zealand is sold to a purchaser by any person other than the manufacturer thereof, the maximum price shall be the maximum price as set out in the Third Schedule hereto, with such addition only to that maximum price as is herein specified, namely:—

- (a.) When sold in a quantity of half a ton or more, an addition at the rate of 10s. per ton in the case of bran and 15s. per ton in the case of pollard.
- (b.) When sold in quantity less than half a ton, an addition at the rate of 12s. 6d. per ton in the case of bran and 17s. 6d. per ton in the case of pollard.

FIFTH SCHEDULE.

1. Notwithstanding anything in this Order in Council, the Minister of Industries and Commerce may, by order made by him, authorize the sale of flour, bran, or pollard in any specified locality, or by any specified seller, at a price exceeding the maximum price fixed by the Second, Third, and Fourth Schedules hereto by such amount as the Minister thinks fit; and nothing in this Order in Council shall apply to the sale of flour, bran, or pollard in accordance with the authority so granted by the Minister of Industries and Commerce.

2. Any such authority may be at any time withdrawn by the Minister of Industries and Commerce by order made by him.

REGULATIONS.

(Under the Gaming Act, 1908.)

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers in that behalf contained in section 33 of the Gaming Act, 1908, and of all other powers and authorities it enabling in that behalf, the Tokanui-Fortrose Hack Racing Club, a racing club within the meaning of the said Act (hereinafter referred to as "the said club"), doth hereby make the following regulations controlling the admission of persons to that part of Mr. H. M. McLeod's farm situated in the district of Tokanui, and known as the Tokanui Racecourse while the said racecourse is used or occupied by the said club for race meetings.

1. These regulations shall come into force on the date of the same being published in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

2. In these regulations the words "bookmaker," "racing club," and "race meeting" shall have the meanings ascribed to those terms respectively by section 2 of the Gaming Act, 1908.

3. The following persons shall be and are hereby excluded from the racecourse above described while the same is used or occupied by the said club for a race meeting, namely:—

(a.) Bookmakers.

(b.) Bookmakers' clerks, bookmakers' assistants, and bookmakers' agents.

(c.) All persons under disqualification inflicted by any racing or trotting club in the Dominion of New Zealand, the Commonwealth of Australia, or elsewhere if affiliated to the New Zealand Racing Conference, or the New Zealand Trotting Conference, or the New Zealand Trotting Association.

(d.) Common prostitutes and persons who habitually consort with thieves or persons who have no lawful visible means of support.

(e.) Professional tipsters, persons, convicted of house-breaking or pocket-picking, forgery, uttering or possessing counterfeit coin, theft, false pretences, receiving stolen goods, mischief, assault, or any offence or crime of any kind under the Crimes Act, 1908, and also idle and disorderly persons, rogues, and vagabonds, and incorrigible rogues convicted under the Police Offences Act, 1908, and persons convicted of an offence under the Gaming Act, 1908.

Provided always that the Stipendiary Stewards' Committee appointed by the New Zealand Racing Conference, upon being satisfied by evidence as to character and otherwise that any person who, by reason of any conviction, comes within the scope of this regulation, should have relief from the effect thereof, may grant exemption to any such person, and may at any time revoke any such exemption without notice to such person, and without assigning any reason for such revocation.
