IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in me by the Public Works Act, 1908, and of every other power and authority in anywise enabling me in this behalf, I, General Sir Charles Fergusson, Baronet, Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim and declare that the land described in the Schedule hereto is hereby taken for the purposes of workers' dwellings and shall vest in the Chairman, Councillors, and inhabitants of the County of Waipara as from the date hereinafter mentioned; and I do also declare that this Proclamation shall take effect on and after the third day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five.

W HEREAS the parcels of land described in the Schedule W hereto were, by an order of the Native Land Court made on the fifth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five, duly laid off as road-lines, in pursuance of sections forty-nine and fifty of the Native Land Amendment Act 1012 Act, 1913 :

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

W^{HEREAS} by section three of the Land Act, 1924 (here-inafter called "the said Act"), it is enacted that the Governor-General may from time to time, by Order in Council, make regulations for the purposes of the said Act providing, among other things, for the care, management, and protection of commonages :

of commonages: And whereas regulations (herein referred to as "the said regulations") were made on the tenth day of June, one thou-sand eight hundred and ninety-seven, by the Administrator of the Government under the powers conferred by section four of the Land Act, 1892, for the management of Switzers Commonage, and the said regulations were published in the New Zealand Gazette on the seventeenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven at page 1191. thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, at page 1191 : And whereas the said regulations still enure and are in

force under the said Act : And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said regulations, and to make in lieu thereof the regulations hereinafter contained :

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred upon him by the said Act and of and authorities conferred upon him by the said Act and of every other power and authority in anywise enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby revoke the said regulations, and doth hereby make the following regulations for the care, management, and protection of the Switzers Commonage described in the First Schedule to the following regulations, and doth hereby order that such revocation shall take effect on the coming into force of the following regulations, and that the following regulations shall come into force on the day of the gazetting regulations shall come into force on the day of the gazetting hereof.

REGULATIONS.

1. For the purpose of carrying out these regulations the following persons are appointed a committee for the care, management, and protection of the said commonage :--

John Milne, James Allen, James Mutch Michael Moffitt, Fred Cavanagh, Walter Thompson, and William Varley,

William Varley, who shall be known as the "Switzers Commonage Committee" (hereinafter referred to as "the Committee"). The members of such Committee shall be eligible for reappointment. 2. On the first Wednesday in January, 1928, and at a similar date every three years thereafter an election shall take place from among the holders of licenses to depasture cattle or stock upon the said commonage (hereinafter termed "licensed holders") for the purpose of electing seven persons to be mem-bers of the Committee. Such election shall be conducted in such manner as the Committee may decide. The names of the persons so elected shall be submitted to His Excellency the Governor-General for approval, and, if so approved, they shall take the place of the Committee hereby or theretofore appointed. The members of the Committee herein appointed shall hold office until such approval.

shall hold office until such approval. 3. The Committee shall meet for the transaction of business on the first Wednesday in each month, at 7 o'clock p.m., at Waikaia, or at such other time or place as may from time to

time be fixed by the Committee. The first meeting shall be held on Wednesday, the 7th day of October, 1925. 4. Special meetings may be convened by the Chairman or

by any two members of the Committee : Provided that two days' notice of such meeting be given to each member, specify-ing the business to be transacted at such special meeting, and no other business than that so specified shall be transacted at such meeting.

5. Any three of the said Committee shall form a quorum.

5. Any three of the said committee shall form a quorum.
Any meeting may be adjourned from time to time.
6. The members of the Committee shall, at their first meeting and thereafter at the first Committee meeting to be held after the approval of any new Committee under clause 2 hereof, elect one of themselves to be Chairman, who may join in the discussion and shall have an original as well as a casting. in the discussion, and shall have an original as well as a castingvote. The Chairman shall hold office until the election of his

Vote. The chairman shall hold omce until the election of his successor. At such meeting a Secretary shall also be ap-pointed by the Committee. 7. If at any meeting the Chairman is not present at the time appointed for holding the same, the members present shall choose some one of their number to be chairman of such

meeting. 8. If, by retirement, resignation, death, or incapacity, or otherwise, the office of the Chairman shall be or become vacant, the members may at any monthly or special meeting appoint a Chairman.

9. All questions shall be determined by the majority of

votes of the members of the Committee present at a meeting. 10. Any member may resign by writing under his hand delivered to the Chairman or Secretary; and in such case, 10. Any member may resign by writing under his hand delivered to the Chairman or Secretary; and in such case, or in the case of his death, incapacity, or absence without the leave of the Committee from three consecutive ordinary meetings, his office shall become vacant. The Committee may, by writing under the hands of the Chairman and Secretary, notify His Excellency the Governor-General of any vacancy, and submit the name of a person to fill the vacancy; and, if approved by the Governor-General, such person shall there-upon become a member of the Committee. 11. License-holders may run cattle upon the lands described in the First Schedule upon the conditions mentioned in the depasturing license to be obtained as hereinafter provided. 12. Persons desirous of obtaining a depasturing license must lodge with the Secretary to the Committee at Waikaia an application in writing in the form or to the effect contained in the Second Schedule hereto, and deposit therewith the license fee payable hereunder. If such application be refused the fee shall be refunded to the applicant. 13. The Committee shall have power to refuse to grant any license, also to limit the number of cattle which may be depastured under any license. They shall also have power to specify the kind of cattle which may be depastured under any license.

any license.

14. The number of cattle to be depastured shall be mentioned in the license, and the rent to be paid in respect of such license shall be at the rate of 5s. per annum for each head of cattle. Every such license shall be in the form or to the effect contained in the Second Schedule hereto, and shall expire on the 31st day of December in every year, when such license may be renewed in accordance with the foregoing provisions. Every license shall be granted subject to the conditions herein set forth and shall be signed by the Chairman of the Com-

mittee. 15. The revenue derived from license fees, or otherwise from the said commonage shall stand first charged with the cost of the destruction and prevention of the spreading of rabbits and gorse, broom, sweetbrier, and other nozious weeds, upon such commonage : such cost to be ascertained in such manner as may be fixed and determined by the Commissioner of Crown Lands.

16. All cattle depastured must be branded or earmarked, and the brand or earmark and a description of the cathle must be registered with a ranger to be appointed by the Committee from one of their members. The ranger shall issue a certificate of registration in such form as he thinks fit. There shall be shall be 2s. If the brand or earmark is registered with the application no further registration shall be necessary.

17. No cattle suffering from any disease shall be depastured upon, nor shall any pigs or goats be allowed to trespass or be at large upon or within the lands described in the First Schedule. No bull, ram, or stallion shall be depastured with-out the express permission in writing of the Chairman of the Committee. Any person or persons committing a breach of this provision shall be liable on the information of such Chairman, as for trespass of cattle on Crown lands; and the Chairman of the Committee for the time being is hereby empowered to lay any such information. 18. If any licensee shall at any time commit a breach of the

conditions or terms upon which the license is granted, as the same are herein set forth, the Chairman of the Committee may, on such evidence as he thinks fit, cancel and determine

described in the First Schedule any cattle other than those belonging to him, or for the removal of which he shall have authority from the Ranger, under a penalty not exceeding £5.

20. If any person shall depasture any cattle upon the lands described in the First Schedule without a license, or otherwise described in the First Schedule without a license, or otherwise (as to number or kind) than in accordance with a license granted to him, every such person shall be liable, on the in-formation of the Chairman of the Committee, as for trespass of cattle on Crown lands, and also to any penalty or disability imposed in respect of unlawful occupation of Crown land. 21. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to interfere with the powers or duties of the Commissioner of Crown Lands of the district in which the lands described in the First Schedule

of the district in which the lands described in the First Schedule are situated, whether under the Land Act, 1924, or any other law or statute for the time being in force, and the said lands described in the First Schedule shall, subject to the special provisions hereinbefore made, remain and be Crown lands for the purpose of the said Act, and subject thereto.

T is hereby notified for public information that His Majesty the King setting 1 if TT is hereby notified for public information that His Majesty the King, acting by the Governor-General of New Zealand, has been pleased to grant Letters Patent under the Seal of the Dominion to Colonel J. J. Esson, C.M.G., and Messrs. P. H. Cox and W. J. Polson, appointing them a Commission of Inquiry in the following terms :---Whereas it has been proposed that legislation should be passed for the purpose of affording further or other financial assistance to farmers than exists at present:

passed for the purpose of affording further or other financial assistance to farmers than exists at present: And whereas it is expedient that inquiry should be made regarding the necessity or expediency of such proposed legislation and the form thereof: Now know ye that We, reposing special trust and confi-dence in your knowledge, integrity, and ability, do hereby constitute and appoint you, the said—

James Jacob Esson, Percy Harper Cox, and

William John Polson,

to be a Commission to inquire into and report as to the following matters, namely :-

1. The financial assistance afforded to farmers in countries and states of Europe, Egypt, and America, by means of land mortgage bonds, or through land credit associations, or in any other manner howsoever.

2. The legislation in force and the methods adopted by the Governments of such countries and states to afford such financial assistance as aforesaid.

3. The means by which such financial assistance as aforesaid is afforded to farmers, and in particular-

- (a.) The nature of the security given by farmers, the periods for which loans are advanced, the rates of interest payable, and the provisions for amortiza-tion of debt.
- (b.) The provisions for realization of securities in cases of default.
- (c.) The margin of security required, its sufficiency or otherwise, and the means adopted for valuing securities
- (d_{\cdot}) The restriction or otherwise of loans to defined and limited purposes such as improvements to farms, additions, or purchases of stock, and the means by which any such restrictions are enforced.
- (e.) The extent to which members of any group of borrowers are liable for the default of any one of them.

4. The means by which moneys are raised for the purpose of affording such financial assistance as aforesaid, and in particular-

- (a.) The nature of the security upon which such moneys are raised, the periods for which such moneys are raised, the rates of interest payable, and the provisions made for repayment of capital.
 (b.) The denominations of bonds or other instruments of security, and the means of transformer and realisation.

- (c.) The extent to which such securities or the institutions issuing the same are subject to Government supervision.

(d.) The extent to which support is granted by the said countries and states to such securities, or the insti-tutions issuing the same, by way of guarantee, or provision of capital, or exemption from taxation,

(a.) The extent to which the assistance afforded is made use of.

 (d.) The relative success of the issue of securities by co-
- operative groups of farmers or landowners and by independent financial institutions.
- (e.) In the case of the issue of securities by independent financial institutions, whether it is essential or desirable that all persons borrowing should be shareholders of such institutions.
- (f.) How far it is advisable that members of any group of borrowers should be made liable for the default of

The advisability of the adoption in the Dominion of New Zealand of one or more of such methods as aforesiad, and the modifications therein (if any) which the conditions of the Dominion require or experience shows to be desirable. 7. Generally any matters that may appear to you to be relevant to or connected with the matters included in the scope of this inquiry or of importance in considering the adoption in New Zealand of any such method of affording financial assistance to farmers financial assistance to farmers.

And for the purposes aforesaid to visit, travel, and make inquiries in such countries in Europe, Egypt, and America in such manner and for such period as the Government of New

Zealand may from time to time direct. And We do further appoint you, the said James Jacob Esson, to be the Chairman of the said Commission.

And you are hereby authorized to conduct any inquries under these presents, at such times and places and as you deem expedient, both in the Dominion of New Zealand and in such countries in Europe, Egypt, and America as aforesaid, with power to adjourn from time to time and place to place as you think fit and (in the Dominion or in an encountries). With power to adjourn from time to time and place to place as you think fit, and (in the Dominion or in any country by whose laws you may be permitted so to do) to call before you and examine on oath or otherwise such persons as you think capable of affording you information as to the matters afore-said, and to call for and examine all such documents as you deem likely to afford you information on any such matters, but so that you need not take such evidence on oath unless in your obligion you go go

in your opinion you so desire. And, using all due diligence, you are required to report to His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, under your hands and seals, not later than the thirtieth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-six, your opinion on the aforesaid matters.

And you are hereby further authorized to take into con-sideration, for the purposes of your inquiry and report, any information which the Government of any country or state, or of any province or other subordinate jurisdiction, or any officers or persons acting under any such Government or subordinate jurisdiction, may of their good pleasure cause to be supplied to you relative to the inquiries aforesaid.

And you are hereby strictly charged and directed that you shall not at any time publish or otherwise disclose, save to His Excellency the Governor-General in pursuance of these

And it is hereby declared that the powers and authorities conferred on you by these presents may be exercised by any two or more of you.

And it is hereby further declared that these presents shall continue in force although the inquiry is not regularly con-tinued from time to time or from place to place.

The total births registered for the urban areas amounted to 987, as against 1,056 in July—a decrease of 69. The deaths in August were 579, a decrease of 24 as compared with the previous month. Of the total deaths males contributed 316, females 263. Seventy-four of the deaths were of children under five years of age, being 12.78 per cent. of the whole number. Fifty-four of these were under one year of age. The equivalent annual rates per 1,000 of mean population for August, 1925, and eight months ended August, 1925, were as follows. The infantile-mortality rate per 100 births for the same period is also given.

MEANS AND TOTALS FROM CHIEF STATIONS. July, 1925.

SUMMARY FOR THE MONTH OF JULY, 1925.

The stormy conditions which were prevalent during the last week of June continued in to July until the 10th, heavy rains and floods being experienced in the northern and East Coast districts. The Canterbury rivers also flooded, owing to the warm rains melting the recently fallen snow in the higher country. Unsettled and wet weather also ruled between the 13th and 16th and the 21st and 25th. During the latter period an extensive disturbance held sway, with very low pressure in the South, and beneficial rains fell in Otago, where extremely dry weather had been experienced for some time. Anticyclonic conditions and fair weather prevailed generally between the 10th and 13th, the 17th and 19th, and from the 26th to the close of the month

the 26th to the close of the month.

The total rainfall was above the mean in the Bay of Plenty, Hawke's Bay, and Taranaki districts in the North Island, and in Westland and Canterbury in the South Island. Auckland and Wellington districts, as well as parts of Otago and the Central portion of the South Island, recorded a deficiency.

On the whole, the weather proved dull, mild, and humid, and in most parts of the Dominion there was more than the usual growth of grass for the time of the year. D. C. BATES, Director.
