WHEREAS by section fourteen of the Native Land Amendment Act, 1914, it is provided, inter alia, that on being satisfied that the purchase of any Native land has been duly completed by or on behalf of the Crown under the authority of the Native Land Act, 1909, the Governor-General may issue a Proclamation that such land has become Crown land:

And whereas the purchase of the Native land set out in the Schedule hereto has been duly completed by or on behalf of the Crown under the authority of the Native Land Act, 1909, and its amendments:

Now, therefore, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority so conferred upon me by section fourteen of the Native Land Amendment Act, 1914, I, General Sir Charles Fergusson, Baronet, Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim that the Native land set out in the Schedule hereto has become Crown land.

Education Act, 1914.—Examinations in Technology.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

In pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Education Act, 1914, and the amendments of that Act, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth make the regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto relating to examinations in technology; and, with the like advice and consent, doth prescribe that this Order shall come into force on the date of publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette.

# SCHEDULE.

1. The Director of Education (hereinafter referred to as the Director) is hereby authorized to conduct annual examinations in technology in such subjects as may be from time to time considered necessary by the Director.

2. The examinations may comprise three grades—namely, preliminary, intermediate, and final—and shall be conducted along the lines of the various syllabuses set out in Schedule I herewith.

3. A candidate may enter for the preliminary grade at any time.

4. A candidate for the intermediate grade must have previously passed in the preliminary grade, and must be certified by an Apprenticeship Committee, or by his employer in a trade or district in which an Apprenticeship Committee has not been constituted, to have the standing of at least a third-year apprentice in the trade or occupation relating to the subject for which he has entered. He must also be certified by the said Apprenticeship Committee or employer to have made satisfactory progress in such trade or occupation.

5. A candidate for the final examination must have previously passed in the intermediate grade, and must be certified by an Apprenticeship Committee or employer, as aforesaid, to have the standing of at least a fourth-year apprentice in the trade or occupation relating to the subject for which he has entered. He must also be certified by the said Apprentice-

ship Committee or employer to be an efficient workman.

6. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Director may at any time accept for the intermediate or final examination the application of any candidate who, in the opinion of the Director, has reached a standard of education equivalent to the preliminary or intermediate examination (as the case may be), and who otherwise, in the opinion of the Director, should be accepted for examination in either of these grades. In no case, however, shall a candidate be accepted for the intermediate examination unless he has a standing of at least a third-year apprentice in the trade or occupation concerned, nor for the final examination unless he has at least the standing of a fourth-year apprentice in such trade or occupation.

7. The examination in each grade may consist of a written paper (or papers) and (or) a practical test (or tests). Candidates may also be required to submit specimens of work executed under such conditions as the Director

may determine.

- 8. Candidates may be exempted from the preliminary or intermediate examination in any course on production of such certificate from the City and Guilds of London Institute as may be recognized for this purpose by the Director.
- 9. A candidate who passes the final examination shall receive a certificate to this effect.

to this effect.

10. The Director may from time to time appoint suitable persons to be examiners or moderators.

- 11. (i) The Director shall make arrangements for the conduct of the examination, and shall employ such supervisors as may be deemed necessary. He shall have power to do all such things as may be deemed necessary for the efficient conduct of the examination.
- (ii) Examiners, moderators, and supervisors shall be entitled to receive
- such remuneration as may be approved by the Minister.

  12. The Director may decline to hold an examination in any subject (or subjects) at any centre (or centres) where the total number of candidates

is less than ten, and may decline to hold a practical examination at any centre on the sole ground that reasonable facilities for holding such examination do not exist at such centre. The decision of the Director in regard to the holding of an examination at any centre shall be final.

13. The Director may, at his discretion, accept or decline to accept

the application of any candidate or candidates.

14. The rooms and equipment of any technical school or manualtraining centre shall be available for the purpose of the conduct of the examinations without charge to the Education Department. The Department may, however, pay such charges for heating, lighting, cleaning, material, or other service as may be deemed to be reasonable.

15. The material for the practical tests, and also such writing-books, stationery, &c., as may be necessary, shall be supplied by the Education Department, but candidates may be required to provide their own tools, drawing-instruments, or other equipment. The Education Department may, however, supply such tools and equipment where undue hardship would be inflicted if the candidates themselves were required to do so.

16. The Director may make arrangements with any Technical School Board or any other body for the conduct of the examination, and of all

matters incidental thereto, on behalf of the Department.

17. No information of the result of an examination or any matter connected therewith shall be given by any person except with the consent or authority of the Director. Any candidate, however, who is not satisfied with the result of his examination may, within three months of the examination, make application for a re-examination of his work, provided that any such application must be accompanied by a bank receipt for a fee of 10s. paid to the Public Account at some branch of the Bank of New Zealand. If, as a result of any re-examination of the candidate's work, an alteration in his favour of the marks awarded is necessary, the amount of 10s. shall be refunded.

## SCHEDULE I.—SYLLABUSES OF EXAMINATION.

#### PLUMBING.

# 1. PRELIMINARY COURSE.

This course will normally occupy two years.

The written examination will include questions founded on the following subjects in their relation to plumbing:

Workshop Arithmetic, Geometry, and Drawing.—Rules of decimals, duodecimals, and fractions.

The calculation of areas of plane and curved surfaces, and of the volumes and capacities of vessels of various shapes.

Plans, sections, and elevations of plumbing-work, and fittings and develop-

ment of shaped surfaces.

Simple Applications of Elementary Science to Plumbers' Work.—Expansion and contraction due to changes of temperature. Flow of metals, such as lead and copper under great pressure, or in bossing. Atmospheric pressure, the barometer, gaseous laws and the elasticity of gases; thermometers and their use. Composition of water; the principle of the siphon and its application in plumbers' work. Workshop appliances, such as the lever, windlass, pulley-block, &c.; effects of heat and temperature on solids, liquids, and gases; definitions of force and work; simple problems in

Alloys, Solders, &c.—Properties, composition, and preparation of different kinds of solders and other alloys used in plumbers' work; fusing-points;

means of purification; fluxes and their use.

Trade Knowledge and Trade History, including a general knowledge of the items included under plumbers' work as applied to dwellinghouses. Manufacture of sheet lead, lead and copper pipes, solders, &c., and their use.

Tools.—The tools and workshop appliances used by plumbers, their form and use, the materials of which they should be made, and their maintenance.

Note.—There will be no practical test in this grade, but the following

syllabus may be followed by students in their second year:-

Use of soldering iron; soldering straight; patches; tinning-union. Lead and galvanized-iron work, including step-flashings; single step; herringbone; aprons; chimney-gutter; forming box; forming drips; roll and roll-ends; single and double welts; clips; making solder; cutting soakers.

#### 2. Intermediate Course.

This course is intended to occupy two years.

# (a) Theory.

The mensuration of irregular and curved surfaces and volumes: setting

out angles and making detailed drawings of leadwork for roofs.

Physical and chemical properties of lead and other metals and alloys used in plumbers' work. Effects of heat on metals used in roof-work: methods of laying to counteract effect of sun, wind, rain, and capillary action. Electrolysis from metals in contact.

The use of sheet metals, including lead and copper.

Weights of lead and copper sheets of specified thickness.

Cutting out sheet metals for flats, valleys, box and other gutters, dormers, skylights, cesspools, drips, falls, hips, and ridges; apron, step, and other

Methods of joining sheet metals with rolls, single and double welts. Precautions to avoid capillary action and to ensure generally that sheet work

shall be waterproof. Rain-water heads and pipes.

Cold-water Supply.—Temporary and permanent hardness. mineral, and peat water, and their effects upon pipes, cisterns, Contamination of water. Head of water and pressure on fittings. connection of pipes to mains; methods of fixing pipes; house-cisterns, their construction and fittings, valves, taps, water-waste preventors, flushing-tanks, warning and overflow pipes; water-hammer; causes of noise in pipes; air-traps; practical means of protecting water fittings against frost; methods of tracing leakage.

Simple water-raising appliances. Action and principle of syphons. Pumps, hand- and machinery-driven: sizes and performances.

Gasfitting.—Installation of pipes and fittings, sizes of pipes, testing for soundness. Fixing of gas cookers, gas fires and radiators, and gas- and oil-heated boilers and circulators for domestic hot-water supplies. tion of gas-heated appliances. Effects of radiant and convected heat on air in rooms heated by gas or oil.

# (b) Practice.

Forming gutter with drip; undercloak and turnover; intersection roll; flats and rolls; breaks; cesspools; wiping in downpipes; wiping in birdsmouth outlets; wiping in cesspools; Preparation of small joints; and wiping  $\frac{1}{2}$  in and  $\frac{3}{4}$  in underhand upright and branch joints; forming slates; wiping solder dots; wiping angles for tanks; pipe-bending; forming safe wastes, pipe wastes, vent-pipes, and flush-pipes; preparation of upright, horizontal, and branch joints; erection of sectional cast-iron boilers; repairing pumps and rams; stop-valves, ball traps; making up of various jointing-materials.

# 3. FINAL EXAMINATION COURSE.

This course is intended to occupy two years.

# (a) Theory.

Workshop Arithmetic.—Taking out quantities from plans for all descriptions of plumbers' work; calculating weights and sizes of pipes for any specified duty; sizes of cisterns or tanks for storing water or acids; relative capacities and discharging-power of pipes. Effects of bends, orifices, and obstructions.

Workshop Geometry and Drawing.—The setting-out to scale of coverings for domes, turrets, and finials for buildings, embodying the development of cones, frustra of cones, pyramids, cylinders, &c., including their plans and

Water.—Sources of water-supply; qualities and properties of water from deep and shallow wells, springs, and other sources; storage, filtration, and distribution. Causes and prevention of pollution. Water-softening apparatus. Quantities per head required for private supply purposes. Rainfall, flow of water, and calculation of velocities in channels and pipes.

Hydraulic rams, pumps, and compressors for raising water.

Hot-water Supply.—Systems of supply, and arrangement for best results; safety arrangements, the cause and prevention of collapse of cylinders and boiler-explosions; cause of incrustation in pipes, boilers, cylinders, &c.; the different forms of safety-valves; the relation between temperature and pressure. The expansion of water by heat; general principles of conduction, convection, and radiation; circulation of water in pipes and boilers; cylinder and tank systems of domestic hot-water supply; range and independent boilers; materials for cocks and valves; packing for manholes, and coatings to prevent loss of heat by radiation; simple hot-water systems of heating.

Sanitary Appliances and Drainage Fittings.—Forms and materials for baths, lavatories, sinks, urinals, water-closets, and their fittings and methods of fixing. Forms and principles of the various traps used in plumbers' work and their relative advantages; causes and prevention of waving out and siphonage of traps. The fitting-up, arrangement, and ventilation of soil and waste pipes, and their connection with drains. Drainage fittings of cast iron and stoneware, their respective forms and uses, and methods of jointing them. Preservative coatings for iron pipes and fittings, and

their methods of application.

The arrangement and fixing of sanitary and water fittings in dwelling-houses, hospitals, and public buildings; ventilation of apartments in which sanitary applicances are fitted; setting-out, construction, and principles of town and country house drainage; storm overflows; sewage gases and ventilation of drains. Methods of sewage-disposal for isolated country houses; access to and cleansing of drains; the testing of soil-pipes, drains, &c., by smoke, water, chemicals, or air-pressure. Health Department's and local authorities' by-laws and regulations.

Plans and Specifications.—The preparation of specifications and quantities,

and making working drawings to scale; measuring up work.

#### (b) Practice.

Breaks; lead-burning; 2 in. to 4 in. pipe bending; 2 in. to 4 in. pipe preparation and wiping of upright, horizontal, and branch joints; fixing of soil and waste pipes and connecting up with sanitary fittings; erection of sectional cast-iron boilers; repairs to W.C. cisterns, flushing-valves, automatic cisterns; testing of soil-pipes and drains; taking of levels and setting out for drains, &c.; bending of iron and copper pipes; fitting-up of sanitary appliances, also special fittings; testing of water fittings; inspection of heating installations; preparation and wiping of joints; lead-burning.

The examination will be of an advanced character, and will be such as to show that the candidate can properly bend lead pipes of all sizes, and join them by wiped soldered joints, without the use of lamp or gas-jet, or by lead-burning, in such positions as would occur in practice; and boss lead, to a given form, or execute in a satisfactory manner any other piece of plumbing-work in other metals referred to in the above syllabus.

Before being admitted to the examination the candidate must produce, where possible, a certificate signed by the local Apprenticeship Committee in the plumbing trade to the effect that the candidate has reached a satisfactory standard in the range of work specified in the syllabus in a workshop approved by the committee as efficiently conducted.

# ENGINEERING TRADES.

# PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION.

Candidates must produce evidence of having reached a satisfactory standard in English and elementary calculations. No special examination will be set in these subjects, but candidates' papers which do not reach a satisfactory standard in these subjects will fail him on this ground alone. It is strongly recommended that the English course followed by apprentices shall include wide practice in the lucid and accurate description of common objects and the study of technical terms used in engineering.

The following candidates will be exempted from the preliminary

examination :-

(a) Those candidates who have passed the examination for a senior free place in the subjects of trade drawing, freehand and instrumental drawing, mathematics, or alternative mathematics, general experimental science, and metalwork.

(b) Those who have obtained a senior free place by recommendation, having reached the pass standard in the subjects trade drawing, freehand and instrumental drawing, mathematics or alternative mathematics, general experimental science, and metalwork.

# Syllabus of Preliminary Examination.

#### 1. Drawing.

(a) Geometry.—The substance of Drawing II, Instrumental, as prescribed for the intermediate examination, to a slightly lower standard. care of drawing-instruments, including scales, pencils, pens, compasses, dividers, protractors, set-squares, and T square. How to test the accuracy of drawing-instruments, and how to correct errors. Hand sketching in plan, elevation, and section.

(b) Freehand Sketching.—Making approximately accurate hand-sketches of simple geometrical solids and of objects such as tools and simple machine-

parts; conventional representation of screw threads.

(c) Mechanical Drawing.—Drawing to scale in pencil from dimensioned sketches of parts specified in (b) above. Skill in mechanical drawing will be regarded as of secondary importance compared to skill in free-hand sketching, and questions will not be set in the written examination which involve accurate scale drawings of machine parts. Each candidate will be required to forward his portfolio of drawings to the Director for inspection.

# 2. Calculations and Graphs.

(a) Advantages and disadvantages of fractional and decimal methods of calculation. Idea of accuracy of calculated results. The metric system.

(b) Mensuration of areas and volumes as prescribed for the intermediate examination. Mid-ordinate method for finding area of plane curvilinear

- figures. Methods of finding weights of typical sections of iron and steel.

  (c) Ideas of variable and variability; formulæ. Use of algebraic symbols and logarithms, where advisable, in evaluating simple formulæ. A knowledge of algebraical operations sufficient to change the dependent variable in formulæ.
- (d) The straight-line graph and its uses. Use of curvilinear graphs to obtain continuous values of one variable in terms of the other.
- (e) In all calculations economy of labour and neatness of setting-out are to be emphasized. Particularly will it be insisted on that "rough checks" of calculations must be made, and that no calculations may be carried past the point where the data cease to be reliable.

## 3. Mechanics and Physics.

Units of force and work.

Principle of work, leading to elementary treatment of parallel forces, levers, moments, compound and Weston's pulley-blocks, inclined plane, screw and worm wheel. Triangle of forces.

Elements of physics and chemistry.

# Syllabus of Intermediate Examination.

#### 1. Design.

(a) Elements of Design.—Including mechanical drawing, elementary strength of materials, and mechanism as applied to the design of details of machines, &c.

Machine drawing to scale, plans, elevations, sections, dimensioning, &c. Descriptive work, sketches showing construction and sections of elementary parts of machinery. Fastenings (keys, taper pins, rivets, &c.); shaft-couplings, bearings, hangers, brackets; pulleys (including split pulleys); belts and belt-fastenings; screw threads, single and multiple, of various sections; Whitworth and British fine standard threads; nuts and lock-nuts.

(b) Statics, Dynamics, &c.—Simple statics and dynamics, including the simple machines, acceleration and angular acceleration, speeds of machines controlled by belts and gearing, work, energy, power-transmission. Friction and lubrication. Moment of inertia and radius of gyration, energy of rotating bodies. Elementary strength of materials.

(c) Mechanism.—Cone pulleys. Cams, gearing (trains, epicyclics, tooth shapes, worms and worm wheels), the slider-crank chain, and an elementary treatment of the transmission of motion, including simple calculations of velocity ratios.

2. Applied Mechanics.

The application of the principles of statics, &c., learned in the preliminary course to an elementary treatment of the mechanics of machinery.

#### 3. Workshop Knowledge.

Hand tools used in engineering workshops, in the forge, pattern-shop, and foundry, their construction, production, and use. Measurement, scales, calipers, micrometers, surface-gauges. Taps, dies, &c. Elementary account of workshop practice in fitting, turning, machining, patternmaking, founding, riveting and boilermaking, forging, coppersmithing, &c.

#### 4. Materials.

Properties of various timbers used in patternmaking (hardness, ease of working, durability, warping, cost, &c.); of cast iron, wrought iron, mild steel, tool steel, aluminium alloys, brass, and bronze. Hardening and tempering of steel.

# SYLLABUS OF FINAL EXAMINATION.

# 1. Design.

Including drawing, mechanism, dynamics of machinery, and strength of materials as applies to the design of machinery.

# 2. Trade Practice and Theory.

(A) Fitters, Turners, and Machinists:-

(a) Measurement.—Standards of length, subdivision, gauging-systems, limits, measuring-machines and methods. Screw-gauging, &c. Production

of straight edges and surface plates.
(b) The Simple Machine Tools.—Centre lathes, facing and boring lathes, boring-machines, drilling-machines, planers, shapers, slotters, plain millers, plain grinders, power saws, and presses. The small tools and fittings (e.g., chucks, vices, drills) used with these machines. The mechanism and detailed construction of these machines, including clutches.

(c) Tool-room.—Universal miller. Universal grinder, &c. Jigs, design and making. Sub-presses and press tools. Checking accuracies of machine tools. Refitting and adjusting machine tools. Lapping. The making of

small tools and gauges. Templates.
(d) Quantity Machines.—Capstans. Automatic machines. Continuous-process machines. Gear-cutters (including generating-machines). Broaching. The mechanism of such machines, their

small tools and equipments.

(e) Details of Workshop Practice.—Lubricants, "coolants,"

Speeds and feeds and their calculation. Screw-cutting. Tapers and their calculation. Tapers and taperturning. Methods of holding work; milling, grinding, lapping; brazing, soldering, "acetone" cutting and welding. Adjustments for wear; working-limits. Considerations governing running, push, and forced fits.

(f) Treatment of Materials.—Heat treatment. Case-hardening of pro-

ducts; colouring.

(g) Erection and Assembly. Methods of obtaining correct alignments; testing and adjustment of machines; use of testing-instruments; painting and finishing and repairs to worn machinery.

(h) Design for Easy Manufacture.—Shop systems.

(i) Factory Lay-out.—Lighting, heating, power production.

(B) Patternmakers and Moulders:

(a) Patterns and Moulding.—Timber, seasoning, defects. Contraction allowances, drafts, machining allowances. Types of patterns, prints, core-boxes, loose pieces, drawbacks, patterns requiring more than one parting; patternmaking accessories. Green sand, dry sand, and loam moulding; materials and accessories used in foundries. Core-making. Moulding-boxes. Methods of moulding. Arrangement of gates, ventilation, pouring. Metal patterns. Use of plaster-of-paris.

Pig irons, mixtures, use of scrap. Nature of castings produced. Chilled,

malleable, semi-steel, steel, aluminium alloy, brass, bronze, and white-

metal castings, die castings.

- (b) Pattern work and methods of quantity casting.—Moulding machines, their equipment and methods of securing accurate work. Pattern-making machines and tools used in them. Defects in castings, their causes and methods of avoiding them. Modern methods of ventilating and core-Centrifugal casting. Effects of temperature making for intricate work. control and hot moulds. Die castings. Mixtures for various purposes; analyses; quality of the resulting material. Cupolas and equipments. methods of melting metal. Power production, lighting, heating, and ventilation to meet pattern shop and foundry requirements. (C) Boilermakers :-
- (a) Methods and tools required for bending plates, for straightening plates, for taking the buckle out of a plate. Punching and drilling plates.

(b) General description of and the process of putting together a locomotive boiler, a Lancashire or Cornish boiler, single- and double-ended marine boilers. A general knowledge of water-tube boilers.

(c) Methods of inserting, expanding, and removing the tubes of a

locomotive-boiler. Caulking.

(d) Methods and machines for making, inserting, and removing boiler-Roof-stays. Methods of making, inserting, and removing the different kinds of roof-stays. Girder stays. Sling stays. Direct stays. Longitudinal stays.

(e) A knowledge of the arrangements fitted to give access to a boiler for cleaning out. A knowledge of the boiler fittings necessary for the safe working of a boiler. Method of making repairs, such as the renewal of a tube plate, the fixing of a patch. A knowledge of the kinds of deterioration which go on in the different types of boilers.

(f) Methods of welding angle-irons, and of bending them to given shapes.

Annealing.

(g) A knowledge of the machine tools used in a boiler-shop, such as punching and planing machines, edge-planing machines, multiple-drilling machines, vertical-boring machines, machines for tapping fireboxes for stays.

Reheating and annealing furnaces. Hydraulic flanging-presses.

- (h) Construction and jointing of steam-pipes for moderate and high pressures. Expansion-joints. Methods of testing boilers. Inspection of boilers. Steam-pipe connections for boilers worked in groups. Mechanical Feed-water heaters. Superheaters. Recording-instruments on boilers—e.g., CO<sub>2</sub> recorders and temperature-indicators. Boiler fittings, including automatic feed water regulators, feed check valves, safetyvalves, &c.
- (i) General knowledge of the thermal efficiencies of different types of boilers; the consumption of coal per square foot of grate for boilers with chimney draught and forced draught.

(j) General principles and methods of rolling boiler plates, angle-irons,

and rivet iron. Pneumatic tools.

(k) The effects of corrosion on different types of boilers. Water-softening

apparatus.

(1) A knowledge of the general equipment of a boiler-shop, such as the cranes required, and the hydraulic installation necessary for working the flanging-presses.

(m) The use of oxy-acetylene blow-pipe flame for welding and cutting

in boiler repairs. Electric welding.

(n) Geometrical methods of setting out patterns for metal-plate work.

# MOTOR MECHANICS' WORK.

Apprentices should receive for the first two years at the technical school instruction in general subjects cognate to the trade, including freehand and mechanical drawing, mechanics, mathematics, and physics to the standard approximately of the Senior Free Place Examination.

The following candidates will be exempted from the preliminary ex-

amination :-

(a) Those candidates who have passed the examination for a senior free place in the subjects trade drawing, freehand and instrumental drawing, mathematics or alternative mathematics, and general experimental science.

(b) Those candidates who have obtained a senior free place by recommendation, having reached the pass standard in the subjects trade drawing, freehand and instrumental drawing, mathematics or alternative mathematics, and general experimental science.

Syllabus of Course for the Preliminary Examination for Motor MECHANICS.

#### 1. Drawing.

(a) Geometry.—The substance of Drawing II, Instrumental, as prescribed for the intermediate examination, but treated less fully, only geometrical constructions necessary for practice in mechanical drawing being included.

Use and care of drawing-instruments, including scales, pencils, pens, compasses, dividers, protractors, set-squares, and T square. How to test

the accuracy of drawing-instruments, and how to correct errors. Hand sketching in plan, elevation, and section.

(b) Freehand Sketching.—Making approximately accurate hand sketches of simple geometrical solids and of objects such as tools and simple machine parts, conventional representation of screw threads; description of functions of parts drawn.

(c) Mechanical Drawing.—Drawing to scale in pencil from dimensioned sketches of parts specified in (b) above. Skill in mechanical drawing will be regarded as of secondary importance compared with skill in freehand sketching, and questions will not be set in the written examination which involve accurate scale drawings of machine parts. Every candidate will be required to forward to the examiner his portfolio of drawings for inspection.

2. Calculations and Graphs.

Advantages and disadvantages of fractional and decimal methods of calculation; idea of accuracy of calculated results; significant figures; degree of accuracy of data obtained by various methods of measurement, with emphasis on the importance of the percentage error; meaning of 2", 2.0", 2.00"; metric fractional and decimal notations.

(a) Mensuration—areas and volumes as prescribed for the Intermediate Examination. Mid-ordinate method for finding area of curvilinear figures.

Methods of finding weights of typical sections of iron and steel.

(b) Ideas of variable and variability; formulæ, indices. Use of algebraic symbols and logarithms, where advisable, in evaluating simple formulæ. A knowledge of algebraical operations sufficient to change the dependent variable in formulæ.

(c) The straight-line graph and its uses. Use of curvilinear graphs to

obtain continuous values of one variable in terms of the other.

(d) In all calculations economy of labour and neatness of setting-out are to be emphasized. Particularly will it be insisted on that "rough checks" of calculations must be made, and that no calculations may be carried past the point where the data cease to be reliable.

# 3. Elementary Mechanics and Physics.

Mass; weight; force; work; relative density and specific gravity; measurement of volumes by displacement; principle of Archimedes; vectors; vector composition; vector triangle and parallelogram, principal of work, leading to an elementary treatment of parallel forces; moments; elementary mechanical devices such as levers, wedge, simple pulley-blocks.

SYLLABUS OF COURSE FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION FOR MOTOR MECHANICS.

#### 1. Drawing.

The main objects of the course will be to enable the student (i) to produce a dimensioned sketch from which the part could be constructed, and (ii) to read mechanical drawings correctly. The course will include measuring and sketching machine parts and electrical parts and appliances, with explanations of their functions; conventional methods of representation of details in electrical and mechanical work; lists of material and part numbers.

# 2. Mechanics, Applied Mechanics, and Practical Mathematics.

A fuller treatment of the syllabus for the preliminary examination, with the following additions: polygon of forces; equilibrium of bodies; further applications of the principle of work to simple machines such as Weston and other geared pulley-blocks, inclined plane, screw, and screw gearing; displacement, velocity and acceleration; mass, force, momentum, inertia; relations of force, mass, and motion; energy and work; moment of inertia; rotation and rotational energy; mechanical, thermal, and electrical units of energy and their ratios for conversion; friction and lubrication; efficiency; power of engines, brakes, motors, and their mechanical efficiency; transmission of power; properties of belts; slip of belts; effective diameters of pulleys; care of belts; speeds; fastenings; gearing; velocity-ratios of wheel trains; screw-cutting; pitch; diametral pitch; module; rules for pitch and outside diameter; distance between centres.

Mechanical properties of materials commonly used in motor engineering.

## 3. Theoretical and Practical Course.

For the intermediate examination a candidate will be required to have a practical knowledge of-

(1) The principles governing the mechanical construction throughout the car.

(2) The more general construction and adjustments necessary to expeditiously dismantle, repair, and replace parts for the efficient upkeep of the car.

(3) The localization and correction of common faults in the electrical system.

Heat.—Nature of heat; effects produced; temperature; quantity; specific heat; latent heat; vaporization; mechanical equivalent; combustion; calorific value of a fuel.

Transmission of Heat.—Radiation; conduction; convection; practical

examples.

Behaviour of Gases.—Elementary consideration of relative changes in such properties as volume, pressure, temperature; internal energy; common values of compression ratios in engines.

Principles of Operation of Two- and Four-cycle Engines.—Reasons for the positions of opening and closing of valves; principles underlying the construction and function of each detail of a typical engine.

Balancing of Engines.—Consideration of arrangements of cylinders and cranks, and firing-order in two- four- and six-cylinder engines, with reference to torque and balance.

Valve Mechanism.—Types of cams and tappets; lift of valves; effective opening; valve timing diagrams for high- and slow-speed engines; effect of steam-leakage; weak springs; jammed valves; setting valves.

\*\*Carburation.\*\*—General principle of action of a carburettor, and description

of forms in common use; methods employed to supply a constant-quality mixture; importance of supplying heat to the mixture; methods of supplying heat; common faults and their correction.

Fuel-supply Systems.—The location and correction of faults; gravity

and vacuum systems.

Cooling-systems.—Air, thermo-siphon, and pump systems; types of radiators; fans; arrangement of passages for liquid; causes of overheating.

\*Lubricating - systems.\* — Splash, force-feed, and dry-sump systems;

accessories; indicators; pumps, &c.; location of faults and their correction.

Clutches.—Construction of various types; methods of operating and

adjustment. Change-speed Systems.—Necessity for construction and operation of selective three- and four-speed gear-boxes. Epicyclic systems.

Transmission of Power to Back Axle.—Shafts and universal joints.

Back-axle Assembly.—Principles of various types of constructions;

differentials; final drives; live and floating axles; adjustments.

\*Brake-construction.—Linkages; equalizers, internal and external types; transmission and back-wheel brakes; front-wheel brakes; adjustments and repairs.

Principle of Chassis-construction.—Systems of springing; methods of drive, and torque reactions; variation of torque and braking effect; engine suspension.

Front-axle Assembly.—Setting of front axle and wheels; Ackerman

principle; practical adjustments.

Steering-gear.—Adjustment and principle of worm and sector; split

nut; screw, variable ratio; Marles and Ross systems.

Electrical.—Sufficient idea of principles to locate common faults in battery and magneto ignition systems; setting and adjustment of H.T. inductor and rotary armature magnetos; care and adjustment of points and symptoms of common faults in battery and magneto systems; changing from magneto to battery and vice versa; timing ignition; Ford system.

Batteries.—Testing condition, and maintenance of batteries.

Wiring-circuits.—Diagrams of simple lighting, starting, and ignition circuits; location and remedy of simple faults in wiring-systems.

#### 4. Workshop Practice.

Filing to a reasonable degree of accuracy and a certain amount of chipping; marking out, drilling, and reaming; use and care of dies and taps; brazing, riveting, and soldering; making and tempering of hand-cutting tools; sharpening drills; lathe-work, turning, boring, setting up, &c., elementary blacksmithing, also bending and annealing of copper pipes.

SYLLABUS OF COURSE FOR THE FINAL EXAMINATION FOR MOTOR MECHANICS. 1. Theoretical and Practical Course.

For the final examination a candidate will require a more thorough knowledge of the subject-matter outlined for the intermediate examination, and in addition a knowledge of the following:

Liquid Fuels.—Properties of heavy oils, petrol, paraffin, alcohol, benzol,

and conditions under which they may be employed.

Carburation.—Effect of petrol-air ratios on running, efficiency, and exhaust products; importance of manifold constructions; turbulescence and causes of detonation.

Carburettors.—Adjustment of standard types for best performance; details of construction; principle of compensation, and constant mixture.

Fuel-supply Systems.—Details of construction of vacuum, and pressure Rectifying defects.

Valve Mechanism.—Details of valve-operating mechanism; overhead cam-shaft drives; single and double sleeve valves.

Engines.—Eight-cylinder; V-type; sleeve-valve.

Engine Details.—Piston assembly; crank-shafts; harmonic balancers;

limit of wear in cylinders and parts.

Cooling.—Thermostats; reasons for most efficient working-temperature.

Lubrication.—Details of pumps, &c.; oil-purifiers; distribution of oil to various parts; oil coolers and rectifiers; details of oil grooves in various systems; adjustment of bearings; prevention of oil leakages; single-unit chassis lubrication; characteristic properties of oils, and definitions of usual terms.

Clutches.—Details of construction and adjustment; power transmitted

by clutches.

Change-speed Systems.—Details of operating mechanism of three- and four-speed selective types; epicyclic gears, including Ford system; measurement of gear ratios; lubrication and prevention of oil-leakage.

Back-axle Assembly.—Further details of construction and adjustments; pinion and crown-wheel adjustments; detachable wheels; road-wheel

adjustments.

Front-axle Assembly.—Geometrical consideration of turning radius; testing of axle and methods of straightening and aligning; causes of bad steering and wheel "shimmy."

Steering-gear.—Details of construction and adjustment of worm and sector, split nut, screw; variable ratio; Marles and Ross systems, and correc-

tion of faults peculiar to each.

Brake Systems.—Mechanical, hydraulic, pneumatic, and servo systems;

self-energizing shoes; faults in operation.

Chassis-construction.—Details of engine and gear-box suspension; rubber and pin shackles; systems of individual wheel-springing (Lancia), &c. method of re-alignment after accident; construction of haulage chassis and

Magneto Ignition.—Principles of construction, testing, locating faults; adjusting and replacement of defective parts in H.T. and L.T., inductor and rotary armature magnetos, including Ford types; remagnetizing; impulse starters; automatic advance; magnetos using battery current at starting; timing ignition.

Battery Ignition.—Principle of construction, testing, locating faults, adjusting and replacing defective parts, timing of trembler and block coils. Automatic spark advance; changing from magneto to battery ignition.

Dual ignition.

Wiring.—Series and parallel circuits and distribution of current and voltage in such. Connecting up from complete wiring diagrams, rewiring, adjusting accessories. Locating and repairing faults.

Batteries.—Rating, testing, charging; polarity, connecting up; pre-

cautions when removing; replacing defective plates.

Generators.—Principle of construction; voltage-regulation; brushsetting; regulation of output; defects in commutator; testing, and locating faults in generator circuit; replacements and adjusting; minor repairs; causes of burning out.

Starters.—Mechanical starters; methods of engaging starter motor; principle of construction and characteristics of motors; torque and speed; testing, and locating faults; minor repairs and replacements; brush gear

and brushes; switches.

Vehicles.—Outlines of principles; Magnetic clutches and selectors; Electricaladvantages and disadvantages. advantages and disadvantages. Petrol electric vehicles; advantages and disadvantages.

# 2. Workshop Practice.

The syllabus of the intermediate course, with the following additions: Brazing; elementary practice in oxy-acetylene welding; case-hardening; treatment of valves with reference to proper methods of truing, refacing, grinding, &c.; "normalizing" valves; remetalling, fitting and refitting bearings; assembling and aligning pistons, rings, connecting-rods, and crank-shafts.

# CARPENTRY AND JOINERY AND BUILDING-CONSTRUCTION.

The following candidates will be exempted from the preliminary examination :-

(a) Those who have passed the examination for a senior free place in the subjects of freehand and instrumental drawing, trade drawing, woodwork, and mathematics or alternative mathematics.

(b) Those who have obtained a senior free place by recommendation, having reached the pass standard in freehand and instrumental drawing, trade drawing, woodwork, and mathematics or alternative mathematics.

The syllabus is intended to occupy, for the average student, six years for the first three examination courses, and two years for the final course in building-construction.

The examination in building-construction will be open to all students whether apprentices or not.

#### SYLLABUS OF COURSES.

#### PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION.

The first examination will include questions founded on the following subjects, divided into three sections, and candidates will be required to show some knowledge of the subjects under each section; the subjects of Section I and II should be taught, as far as possible, in connection with the subject of Section III :-

#### Section 1.

1. Calculation of areas of rectilineal plane figures.

- 2. The triangle, its construction and simple practical properties; division of straight line into parts, and the construction and use of scales; construction of regular rectilineal plane figures, and of irregular rectilineal figures from given data.
  - 3. The geometry and mensuration of the circle and parts of the circle.
- 4. The construction of the ellipse with its tangents, parallels, and normals. 5. Calculation of the cubic contents of simple solids, such as cube, prism, pyramid, cone, and sphere.
- 6. The setting-out of mouldings, using the straight line, the circle, and the ellipse; tangential arcs.

#### Section II.

1. The parallelogram and triangle of forces and their application to the forces acting at single joints in simple framed structures.

2. Simple mechanical contrivances, such as lever, pulley, and wedge,

and their applications.

3. Methods of finding the pressures on walls produced by supported beams carrying concentrated or uniformly distributed loads.

#### Section III.

- 1. The principal hand-tools used in carpentry and joinery, their names and uses.
- 2. The names and brief descriptions of the more common woods used in carpentry and joinery.
  - 3. The names and shapes of the commoner forms of mouldings.
    4. Projections of plans, elevations, and sections of simple solids.
- 5. The drawing to a large scale of the principal joints used in carpentry and joinery. Freehand sketching, and the representation in isometric and oblique projections of the above.

6. The preparation and use of glue and other adhesives.

7. The uses of various kinds of woods; methods of seasoning and preserving wood. Market forms of timber. The conversion of timber into boards so as to obtain minimum shrinkage and warping. Measurement of timber.

#### INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION.

#### Section 1.

Development and measurement of surfaces of simple solids such as arise

in carpentry and joinery

Intersection of mouldings at different angles, also of straight and circular mouldings lying in one plane, enlarging and diminishing mouldings and stair brackets, determining the true section of vertical angle-bars and raking mouldings over square plans.

The graphical determination of the forces in framed girders and roof-

trusses up to and including the king-post roof-truss.

The mechanical principles involved in roof-constructions up to and including the queen-post roof, trussed partitions, and framed girders. Design of roof-joints.

# Section II.

How to take levels on irregular ground, to plot sections, obtain contour lines, show accurately length of piles, and dimensions of dwarf or basement walls. Concrete boxing for foundations.

Methods of spacing, handling, and fixing timbers, faults to be avoided, and desirable qualities to be attained in framed buildings; methods of

working in laying plates, sleepers, and joists, and in studding, bracing, boarding up, &c.

Methods of obtaining lengths and bevels from plans and cutting-in in

position, or cutting and fixing. Use of steel square.

Weatherboards, throatings, condensation grooves, weather-bars, and general treatment of woodwork exposed to weather.

Construction of parts of roof in preparation for plumber, slater, tiler.

#### Section III.

1. Making working drawings and isometric projections of details; preparing setting-out rods, and their use in setting off doors, windows, skylights, chimney-pieces, cupboards, arches, dado panelling.

2. The names and uses of the machines used in the execution of a simple

piece of joinery.

3. Straight, dog-legged, and open newelled stairs; proportion of tread

and riser; details of construction and methods of support.

4. Hinges: Centre pins, back-flap, butt, butterfly, and various spring hinges, including their use and fixing. Pivot-hung sashes. fastenings.

5. Cutting-lists. How to order timber.

6. Elementary estimating of quantities for framing, weatherboarding,

lining and floors, and joinery work generally.

Candidates for this examination must satisfy the examiners or their

deputies in (a) drawing, (b) practical work.

In the drawing they must submit to the examiners specimens certified to be their own unaided work, such specimens to include (a) full details of some portion of a building, (b) a complete set of drawings for such a structure as one of the following: A schoolroom, a stable, a motor-garage, a workshop, a lychgate.

The scale of the drawings is to be not less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  in. to the foot. drawings should not cover more than two imperial sheets, one of details and one of the general arrangement, and should be accompanied by a statement of timbers used, and their quantities and value. An estimate of

the cost of the labour will not be required.

FINAL EXAMINATION.—ADVANCED CARPENTRY AND STAIR-BUILDING.

Α.

Setting out the parabola and hyperbola, and obtaining their parallels, normals, and tangents.

The various methods of constructing large centres for circular, segmental, elliptical, and other arches, and the methods employed to fix and ease them.

Moulds, bevels, and developments required for soffits in straight and circular walls, also for ribs in groins, domes, niches, pendentives, and work of double curvature.

The intersection of raking mouldings over oblique and curved plans, and the methods of determining varying sections. Moulded members for open roofs and lantern lights.

Handrailing; the theory and use of tangent planes and falling lines; preparing face moulds and bevels, and the method of applying them; method of setting out handrail scrolls, &c.; the development of strings for geometrical stairs.

Planning stairs; taking dimensions from buildings and measurements work. Working from scale drawings, and preparing details suggesting

how various parts may be fitted together.

Circular work: Method of constructing strings for geometrical stairs, ribs, and mouldings in circular work by bending, building up, laminating, grooving.

Construction of fittings for churches, museums, public buildings, shops, and domestic work, such as pews, airtight show-cases, shop-fronts.

Timbering in trenches for various soils of depth to 10 ft.

Forms for shuttering for walls and floors in reinforced concrete. Half-

Raking and flying shores. Scaffolding.

Various methods of taking off quantities from plans and specifications to determine the quantities of materials required to construct a framed building or piece of joinery, including recognized quantity surveyor's methods.

Selection of timber; defects in timber and their detection before conversion; dry rot and wet rot, their cause and prevention. Conversion of timber for strength or figure. Boring-insects.

Woodworking machinery: Circular, frame, and band saws; planing, mortising, tenoning, and moulding machines, &c.; knowledge of their management and control, and the systematic handling of work. Safety guards. Bearings-lubrication and adjustment. Pulleys and shafting.

PRACTICAL WORK.—ADVANCED CARPENTRY AND STAIR-BUILDING.

Candidates for this examination must satisfy the examiners or their deputies in (a) drawing, (b) practical work.

In drawing they must submit to the examiners—

(a) A complete set of drawings for a framed building;

(b) Drawings of a geometrical staircase, or similar problem illustrating

the application of compound curves. Each set of drawings is to be accompanied by specifications of materials, quantities, and costs.

# SPECIAL EXAMINATION IN BUILDING-CONSTRUCTION.

The examination in building-construction will include-

1. Materials: A general knowledge of the properties and strengths of stone, brick, cement, mortar, concrete, cast iron, wrought iron, and steel.

2. Foundations of concrete, stone, and brick; damp-courses; proportions and mixing of limes, cements, and mortars; bonds of brickwork; construction of solid and hollow walls, chimney-flues, arches, and bricklayers' work generally.

3. Masonry structures: Different kinds of masonry; nomenclature; qualities of building-stone. Retaining-walls and small-span arches. Safe pressures on foundations in different classes of earth. Damp-prevention. Întensity of pressure on foundations of retaining-walls. Line of resistance or resultant pressure in retaining-walls and masonry dams.

4. Different forms of timbering for foundations and reinforced-concrete work, scaffolding, staging and gantries, shoring, derrick, towers, &c., with a clear knowledge of their requirements to ensure safety. Temporary buildings.

5. Loads on structures: Weights of various materials of construction.

Dead and live loads. Wind-pressure in ordinary cases.

- 6. The determination of the forces in framed structures, treated theoretically and practically. The effect of the joints on the stresses in structures.
- 7. Roof-trusses: The various types of timber and steel trusses, and spans for which they are suitable. Calculation of stresses due to dead load by method of sections, and the obtaining of stresses by means of stress grams. Wind-pressures; wind-stress diagrams.

  8. Detailed arrangement of joints in simple trusses. diagrams.

- 9. The calculation of the loads that given timber or steel beams and cantilevers will carry; the calculation of the sizes of beams and cantilevers to carry given loads; in each case regard to be paid to necessary stiffness (or resistance to deflection). Structural details of joints and connections to pillars, stanchions, &c.
- 10. Bending-moment: The calculation and graphical illustration by scale diagrams of bending-moment due to simple cases of loading, as, for example, systems of concentrated loads, uniformly distributed load, and uniform load over a portion of the span, in the case of simply supported Bending-moments in fixed beams and in beams continuous over girders. intermediate supports.

11. Shearing-force: Diagrams of shearing-force corresponding with the

above cases of bending-moment.

12. Principles underlying the methods of strengthening beams and girders by flitching and trussing. Cambering; the use of bolts, fishplates, straps, and keys.

13. Girders: The general method of designing a plate girder for a given span and load. Structural details, rivets, gusset-plates, stiffeners, &c.

- 14. General knowledge of reinforced-concrete construction. Proportions and grading of aggregates; determination of voids; testing of cement. Waterproofing materials; allowances for temperature changes. Specifications for foundations, retaining-walls, beams, columns, walls, floors, &c. Elementary theory of beams, slabs, and columns, treated as far as possible graphically; methods of fabrication and placing of reinforcement forms; shuttering; mixing and mixing-machines; lifting and placing concrete; removal of forms.
- 15. General knowledge of plastering, external and internal slaters' and tilers' work. Plumbing-work, internal and external, including a general knowledge of the properties of lead, copper, brass, tin, zinc, and alloys; electrolysis. Hot-water installations, heating of buildings; ventilation and other hygienic and sanitary requirements of buildings.

16. Electric wiring for light and power.

17. General knowledge of building by-laws as fixed by Government. local authorities, and fire underwriters.

18. Standard conditions governing building contracts.

19. Specifications for bricklayer, stonemason, structural engineer, carpenter and joiner, plumber, drainlayer, electrician, painter, glazier, and paperhanger; plasterer.

20. Estimating; quantities.

#### CABINETMAKING.

(i) No special preliminary examination will be conducted, but candidates will be regarded as passing the preliminary examination when they have fulfilled the requirements for a senior free place in the subjects of trade drawing, freehand and instrumental drawing and design, and woodwork.

(ii) Any candidate who presents a certificate from the Principal of a technical school or the local Apprenticeship Committee concerned with his trade, to the effect that he has made satisfactory progress for two years, either in an approved course at the school or in an approved workshop, may also be regarded as having passed the preliminary examination, provided that such candidate submits specimens and drawings certified to be his own unaided work and submits evidence of satisfactory progress in the study of industrial design. The decision of the Director, in such cases, shall be final.

Note.—Any application submitted under (ii) above must be accompanied by all the necessary particulars and must be forwarded so as to reach the Director not later than 30th June immediately preceding the candidate's entry for the intermediate grade examination.

# 1. Intermediate.

(a) Drawing and design for furniture and cabinetmaking.

(b) The working-out of scale drawings and setting-out of full-size working drawings, showing details and methods of construction. The preparation of plans, elevations, and sections from small-scale drawings.

(c) Plane and solid geometry as applied to cabinetmaking. Freehand

lines for brackets and mouldings.

(d) Drawing and the study of natural forms suitable for embellishment: wood-carving; surface decoration—e.g., inlay parquet, marqueterie, intarsia, treated in an elementary way; application of each of these methods to floral and geometrical pattern. Harmony of decoration with the type of construction employed and the use for which the object is planned.

(e) A knowledge of New Zealand timbers and their properties—e.g.,

rimu, kauri, beech, taraire.

An elementary knowledge of Australian timbers—e.g., Tasmanian blackwood, jarrah, Queensland maple, cedar, silky oak; and of foreign

timbers such as oak, walnut, mahogany, sycamore, teak.

(f) The most suitable woods for construction. Groundwork and veneers: the best methods of seasoning and preparing for their various uses. Veneering on plane and curved surfaces. Various appliances for veneering. Preparation of veneers, and the best methods of making work stand after veneering.

(g) Cabinetmaking tools, their care and use. The economy and ad-

(g) Cabinetmaking tools, their care and use. The economy and advantages of woodworking machinery. Setting-out of work for hand-tools

and machines.

(h) Plain jointing, cooper joints, dowelling, tongueing, dovetailing.

(i) The descriptions and names of different parts of pieces of furniture, such as pilaster, capital, frieze, plinth, base, surbase, &c.; also of mouldings. approximate sizes of furniture. Modes of building circular rims: curved panels, and shaped work generally.

(j) Cabinet brasswork and furnishings: Hinges, joint-stays, bolts, and

locks; the best methods of fixing, and their different advantages.

# 2. FINAL.

Candidates for the final examination will be required to pass a written examination, and also to produce specimens of drawing and practical work.

# (1) Written Examination.

The examination will include advanced questions on some of the preceding subjects, and in addition a knowledge will be required of-

(i) Principles and proportions in designing furniture with regard to its use and the material employed. The making of cutting-lists.

(ii) Mechanical actions such as are used in cylinder fall desks, writingtables, dumb-waiters, &c.; the different methods of expanding dining-tables.

(iii) Inlaying and veneering with tortoise-shell, ivory, mother-of-pearl, and metals. The preparation and best methods of applying veneers to flat and sweep work.

(iv) The different styles of furniture, and the periods to which they

belong.

(v) The principles of estimating the cost of labour and materials.

#### (2) Specimen Work.

Each candidate will be required, during the year preceding the examination, to design and execute a piece of work. The work must be accompanied by a working drawing showing the construction, and must not exceed 18 in. by 12 in. by 12 in. The specimen may be an example of construction, veneering, or inlaying, or it may comprise all three.

Each candidate will also be required to forward at the same time a working drawing of a piece of cabinet-work in which the details are original, and the work specially designed for its use. No ornaments or mouldings to be introduced except such as are absolutely necessary for the construction or

are the outcome of the materials used.

A certificate signed by the candidate's employer or by the class-teacher and a member of the Technical School Board, stating that the work has been executed by the candidate himself, without assistance, must be forwarded with both the drawing and the specimen work. In cases where the work has been executed at the candidate's own residence a statutory declaration will be required. Forms for either the certificate or the declaration may be obtained on application.

High merit in workmanship, simplicity of conception in design, and fitness for use of the article made will be the qualities valued most highly by the examiners. In addition, preference in any award will be given to work

carried out in New Zealand timbers.

# ELECTRICAL WIRING AND ELECTRICAL FITTING.

#### GENERAL.

In the written examinations candidates will be expected to show practical knowledge and experience of all the apparatus and appliances referred to in the course; and questions may be set on any part of the whole syllabus up to and including the stage for which he is sitting.

The following classes of candidates will be exempted from the

preliminary examination:-

(a) Those who have passed the examination for a senior free place, passing in the subjects mathematics or alternative mathematics, trade drawing, and technical electricity:

(b) Those who have obtained a senior free place by recommendation, having reached the pass standard in the subjects mathematics or alternative mathematics, trade drawing, and technical electricity.

A candidate who has failed in the final examination for electrical fitters may be accepted as a candidate for the final examination for electrical wiremen.

SYLLABUS OF COURSE FOR ELECTRICAL WIREMEN.

# INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION FOR ELECTRICAL WIREMEN.

# Α.

- (1) General.—General ideas regarding the electric current and its effects; a clear understanding of the cases in which the effects are different for A.C. and D.C.
- (2) Terms and Units.—Meaning and definition of amp., volt, ohm, megohm, conductance, resistance, electro-motive force, impedance, frequency, phase.
- (3) Heating Properties of Current.—Fuses; bad connections; heating of cables; mechanical and electrical properties of special resistance-wires for heaters; incandescent lamps.
- (4) Electrolytic Properties of Current.—Pole-testing; electrolytic meters; accumulators; electroplating; electrolysis of pipes; heating of water by A.C.
- (5) Magnetic Properties of Current.—Measuring-instruments; blow-out coils; bells; lifting and control magnets; generators; transformers; no detailed knowledge of each individual process or appliance required.
- (6) Conductors.—Mechanical and electrical properties of commonly used metallic conductors; the relative resistance of conductors in common use; variation of resistance with dimensions and temperature; non-mathematical treatment of inductive and non-inductive resistances.

(7) Ohm's Law.—Simple calculations relating to non-inductive circuits; variation of total resistance by connecting similar resistances in series or parallel; distribution of current and voltage in series or parallel circuits on D.C. or A.C. with unity power-factor; fall of potential, and very elementary treatment of potential gradient in electric circuits.

(8) Measurements and Instruments.—Resistance of voltmeters and ammeters, and the recognition of meters suitable for A.C. or D.C.

Polarized and moving iron instruments with reference to external appearance and scale; connecting up instruments from diagrams of connections. Wattmeters and watt-hour meters; watts; kilowatts; kilowatt-hour; Board of Trade unit; kilovolt-ampere; reading watt-hour meter; simple calculations (D.C. or single-phase A.C. with unity power-factor) of cost of operating apparatus for definite periods of time. (Note: Roughly approximate methods of calculation may be used.)

(9) Insulators.—Properties of insulating-materials in common use, and their suitability for particular conditions; rubber- and paper-insulated

cables; protective covering; causes of deterioration.

(10) Bell Circuits.—Connecting up call and reply bells; indicators; bells in series or parallel; bell transformers; care of Leclanche and dry cells.

(11) Wiring Circuits and Systems.—Diagrams of connections for house circuits; looping in; minimum number of wires required; two-way switch circuits; service panels; casing; conduit; insulators; sheathed single wire; temporary wiring.

(12) Supply Systems.—Two- and three-wire D.C.; two- and three-wire A.C.; three-phase four-wire A.C.; voltage relation between phases, and

between phase and neutral; earthing.

(13) Building-construction.—A general idea of the construction of a building and the precautions to be taken to ensure the installation of conductors with the least damage to premises or weakening of joists, beams, walls, &c.; cutting floors; concealed work on finished buildings; attachment of electrical accessories to walls and ceilings to various materials.

- (14) Wiring Rules and Regulations.-Knowledge of the Electric Wiring Regulations, and a general understanding of the underlying reasons for their adoption, with special reference to earthing of conduit and apparatus, size of conductor, outlets per circuit, bunching of wires, metallic continuity, protection from shock and fire risk. Minimum-resistance testing, &c. (NOTE: The carrying capacities of the common conductors should be known.)
  - (15) Treatment in case of electric shock.

#### В.

Practical Test in Actual Wiring.—Wiring and testing out circuits; wiring supply-boards; sweating thimbles; screwing and bending conduit; fixing fittings; making and insulating joints.

#### FINAL EXAMINATION FOR ELECTRICAL WIREMEN.

The syllabus will cover more completely the subjects of the intermediate examination, together with the following.

- (1) Units.—Electrical and mechanical units of work and power and their relations to one another; a more precise knowledge of terms and units as prescribed for the intermediate examination.
- (2) Electrical Measurements and Calculations. Voltage-drop in conductors carrying current; current taken by apparatus, and cost of energy for definite periods of time; measurement and calculation of power and energy supplied to three-phase circuits; the relation between kilovolt-amperes and kilowatts; a knowledge of the approximate power-factors and efficiencies of motors.
- (3) Electrical Machines and Appliances.—Their general construction, installation, switching and control, care and maintenance, including-
  - (a) Secondary batteries: Rating, installation; charging and testing; care and maintenance.
  - (b) D.C. motors: Connecting up and reversing series, shunt, and compound-wound motors, including interpole motors, three- and four-wire starters; speed-control; effect of voltage-variation; faults in running, such as heating, sparking, incorrect speed, &c.; testing for faults; suitable types of motors for various conditions.
  - (c) D.C. generators: Connecting up; voltage-regulation; reversing rotation; reasons for not generating; running compound generator as motor.

(d) A.C. motors: Connecting up and reversing; single-phase, split-phase, and repulsion-induction motors; three-phase squirrelcage and wound rotors; compensators, star-delta and resistance starters; alteration of starting-torque by compensator; effect of variation of frequency or voltage on performance of motor; power-factor; synchronous speed and slip; faults, such as heating, incorrect speed, bad starting, &c.; testing for faults: measurement of power taken by motor, and consumption and output of energy.

(e) Transformers: connecting up; choke-coils and auto-transformers; voltage ratio of a transformer; star-delta connections and

voltage ratios.

(1) Practical Work, including measuring power taken, altering direction of motor, increasing starting-torque, sorting out mixed up looped circuits, &c.

(2) Practical Test of Workmanship as prescribed for the Electrical Wiremen's Registration Examination. - Installation of (a) conduit, (b) capping and casing, (c) uncased wiring; making and insulating joints in cable; soldering cable sockets and terminals to the ends of cable; fixing of conductors to insulators; fixing of electrical accessories, fittings, and appliances; wiring and connecting up electrical accessories, fittings, and appliances; earthing of electrical apparatus; repairing of electrical accessories, fittings, and appliances; testing electrical apparatus and installations; reading electrical meters and instruments; method of resuscitation of persons in the case of electrical shock.

#### SYLLABUS OF COURSE FOR ELECTRICAL FITTERS.

#### PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION FOR ELECTRICAL FITTERS.

# 1. Drawing.

(a) Geometry.—The substance of Drawing II, Instrumental, as prescribed for the intermediate examination, but treated less fully, only geometrical constructions necessary for practice in mechanical drawing being included.

Use and care of drawing-instruments, including scales, pencils, pens, compasses, dividers, protractors, set-squares, and T squares. How to test the accuracy of drawing-instruments, and how to correct errors. Hand

sketching in plan, elevation, and section.

(b) Freehand Sketching.—Making approximately accurate hand sketches of simple geometrical solids and of objects such as tools and simple machine parts; conventional representation of screw threads; description and

functions of parts drawn; reasons for materials used.

(c) Mechanical Drawing.—Drawing to scale in pencil from dimensioned sketches of parts specified in (b) above. Skill in mechanical drawing will be regarded as of secondary importance compared with skill in freehand sketching, and questions will not be set in the written examination which involve accurate scale drawings of machine parts. Every candidate will be required to forward to the examiner his portfolio of drawings for inspection.

# 2. Calculations and Graphs.

Advantages and disadvantages of fractional and decimal methods of calculation; idea of accuracy of calculated results; significant figures; degree of accuracy of data obtained by various methods of measurement, with emphasis on the importance of the percentage error; meaning of 2", 2.0", 2.00"; metric fractional and decimal notations.

(a) Mensuration: Areas and volumes as prescribed for the intermediate examination; mid-ordinate method for finding area of curvilinear figures; methods of finding weights of typical sections of iron and steel; estimating

weights from drawings and sketches.

(b) Ideas of variable and variability; formulæ, indices. Use of algebraic symbols and logarithms where advisable, in evaluating simple formulæ. A knowledge of algebraical operations sufficient to change the dependent variable in formulae.

(c) The straight-line graph and its uses. Use of curvilinear graphs to obtain continuous values of one variable in terms of the other; plotting

graphs from given data.

(d) In all calculation economy of labour and neatness of setting-out are to be emphasized. Particularly will it be insisted on that "rough checks" of calculations must be made, and that no calculations may be carried past the point where the data cease to be reliable.

# 3. Elementary Mechanics and Physics.

Mass; weight; force; work; relative density and specific gravity; measurement of volumes by displacement; principle of Archimedes.

vectors; vector composition, vector triangle and parallelogram, principle of work, leading to an elementary treatment of parallel forces; moments; elementary mechanical devices such as levers, wedge, simple pulley-blocks.

# Intermediate Examination for Electrical Fitters.

#### 1. Drawing.

The main objects of the course will be to enable the students (i) to produce a dimensioned sketch from which the part could be constructed, and (ii) to read mechanical drawings correctly. The course will include measuring and sketching machine parts and electrical parts and appliances, with explanations of their functions; conventional methods of representation of details in electrical and mechanical work; lists of material and part numbers; methods of marking off and machining.

# 2. Mechanics, Applied Mechanics, and Practical Mathematics.

A fuller treatment of the syllabus for the preliminary examination, with the following additions: Polygon of forces, equilibrium of bodies; further applications of the principle of work to simple machines such as Weston and other geared pulley-blocks, inclined plane, screw, and screw gearing; displacement, velocity and acceleration; mass, force, momentum, inertia; relations of force, mass, and motion; energy and work; moment of inertia; rotation and rotational energy; mechanical, thermal, and electrical units of energy and their ratios for conversion; friction and lubrication; efficiency; power of engines, brakes, motors, and their mechanical efficiency; transmission of power; properties of belts; slip of belts; effective diameters of pulleys; care of belts; speeds; fastenings; gearing; velocity-ratios of wheel trains; teeth of wheels; pitch; diametral pitch; module; rules for the design of wheels for constant velocity ratio.

Mechanical properties of materials commonly used in mechanical and

electrical engineering.

# 3. Electrical Fitters' Practice and Theory.

Α.

(1) Fundamental Ideas, terms and units employed:—

(a) The electrical circuit: Electrical current, pressure, and resistance; Ohm's law; voltage-drop and potential gradient; distribution of current and voltage in series and parallel circuits; application of Ohm's law to parts of circuits; simple calculations of line-drop.

(b) The magnetic circuit: Generation, characteristics and effect of lines of magnetic force; magnetic and non-magnetic substances; elementary consideration of the magnetic properties of iron and steel; permanent magnets, and their uses in practice.

(c) Electro-magnetic induction: Elementary treatment of the electromagnet; induction of electrical currents by variation of magnetic flux

through an electric circuit.

(2) Materials.—Conductors and insulators; their electrical properties; resistance; specific resistance; simple calculations of resistance from dimensions, effect of heat on conductors and insulators; variation of resistance with temperature: thimbles and had joints

ance with temperature; thimbles and bad joints.

(3) Heating and Lighting Properties of the Electric Current.—Simple calculations of losses; effect of voltage on efficiency of heating and lighting and of power-transmission; consumption of energy by consuming-devices; resistance wires; incandescent lamps; hot-wire instruments; fuses; capacity of switch contacts; elementary principles of illumination, candle-power, foot-candle; photometry.

(4) Electrolytic Properties of the Electric Current.—Primary cells;

(4) Electrolytic Properties of the Electric Current.—Primary cells; Leclanche and dry cells; mode of operation; polarization; local action; maintenance of storage cells; lead-plate and Edison construction; rating; installation, testing, charging, maintenance; advantages; electrolysis

and electroplating.

(5) Measuring-instruments and Measurements.—Principles of galvanometers; moving iron and moving coil ammeters and voltmeters and their suitability for A.C. or D.C.; damping, shielding, &c.; approximate accuracy of commercial instruments; bearing of instrumental inaccuracy on errors of results calculated from instrumental readings; measurement of resistance, by substitution, by voltmeter and ammeter, by voltmeter and wattmeter, by voltmeter, watt-hour meter, and time; use of Wheatstone bridge; inductive and non-inductive resistances on A.C. or D.C.

(6) Generators.—Generation of electro-motive force; principle of A.C. generator and modification for D.C.; elementary principles underlying the construction of each part; characteristics of series, shunt, compound, and

interpole generators; starting and reversing; faults in operation.

(7) Motors.—Cause of rotation; torque; back electro-motive force; necessity for starter; speed-control; three- and four-wire starters; characteristics of series, shunt, compound, and interpole motors; brush-setting; connecting up and reversing; faults in operation; B.H.P. and efficiency.

Regenerative braking: its applications; connections; faults in

operation.

Boosters and balancers: Types; conditions requiring their use; con-

necting up; faults in operation.

(8) Wiring Circuits and Systems.—Diagrams of connections for house circuits; looping in; minimum number of wires required; two-way switch circuits; service panels; casing; conduit; insulators; sheathed single wire; temporary wiring.

Supply systems: Two- and three-wire D.C.; two- and three-wire A.C.; three-phase four-wire A.C.; voltage relation between phases, and between

phase and neutral; earthing.

Practical Work.—The examination will cover the syllabus in practical work for the wiremen's intermediate examination, and in addition the following: Chipping and filing to a reasonable degree of accuracy, marking out; drilling and reaming; use and care of taps and dies; soldering; sweating; brazing and riveting; making and tempering of hand and machine cutting-tools; sharpening drills; lathe-work, including setting up, turning and boring.

## Electrical Theory.

The course will cover more completely the syllabus for the intermediate

examination, together with the following:-

- (1) Elementary Theory of Alternating Currents.—Fundamental ideas of an alternating current; terms in common use; phase, frequency, impedance; representation of alternating current and electromotive force; vector diagrams; maximum, virtual, and average electromotive force; phase difference; addition of electromotive forces; inductance, capacity, reactance, impedance; circuits containing inductance and capacity, apparatus in series or parallel; relation between applied electromotive force and current, &c.; power-factor and power-factor correction; reactive component; polyphase circuits; single-phase, three-phase three-wire, three-phase four-wire, three-phase star and delta connections; combined resistance and reactance drop in feeders.
- (2) Measurements and Measuring-instruments.—Wattmeter; watt-hour meter, kilovolt-ammeter and kilovolt-ampere hour-meter, power-factor and frequency meters; current and potential transformers and their use with instruments.
- (3) Transformers.—Construction; ratio of transformation; no-load current; operation under load; insulation; ventilation; cooling; grounding; star and delta connections; voltage ratios; single-phase and three-phase transformers; intermittent and all-day efficiency; constant-current transformers; auto-transformers, general features, voltage ratios, connections, comparison with other transformers.

(4) Alternators.—Principle and construction of single-phase and three-phase alternators; stator windings; rotor windings; frequency and wave shape.

(5) Alternating-current Motors.—

(a) Three - phase induction motors: Principle and construction; characteristics; rotating fields; windings and connections of stators; wound rotors; speed, torque, and slip; star-delta v. compensator and resistance starters; speed-regulation; operating faults.

(b) Single-phase: Characteristics; types; split-phase; starting and starters; operating faults; repulsion and repulsion-induction motors; characteristics and suitability for certain purposes.

(c) Synchronous motors: Principle of construction; characteristics; starting; conditions for which they are suitable; use of static condensers.
(d) Synchronous converters: Connections and features of construction;

voltage ratio, starting; special uses; voltage regulators; three-wire machines.

#### Practical Work.

The examination will cover the syllabus in practical work for the wiremen's final examination, and in addition the following: Treatment of brush gear; fitting and aligning bearings; fitting keys and pulleys; erecting and aligning shafting and pulleys; setting out templates for foundations; erecting and lining up machines; repairing heating-units; cutting out armature-coils; testing for faults in machines; forming coils; connecting up windings and testing them.

New Zealand Education Department. — Standard Scheme of Control for Secondary Schools.

# PART I.—PRELIMINARY.

1. These presents may be referred to as "the Standard Scheme of Control for Secondary Schools.

2. In this scheme, where not inconsistent with the context,—
"The Education Acts" means the Education Act, 1914, and includes the amendments thereof and all regulations lawfully made thereunder and for the time being in force:

"The School Acts" includes the Education Acts and any special Acts constituting the school or affecting the constitution thereof and all regulations lawfully made thereunder respectively and for the time being in force:

"The Minister" means the Minister of Education:

"The Board" means the governing body however described of any secondary school:

"Member" means a member of any Board:
"A pupil of the school" means a pupil whose name is on the school roll, including a pupil of a junior high school forming an intermediate department of the school, but does not include a pupil

in any lower department:
"Parent of a pupil" includes a pupil's guardian and the householder in whose family the pupil resides, and includes both the father and

mother of a pupil:

"Secretary" includes the Registrar, Clerk, Acting-Secretary, and any other person appointed permanently or temporarily to discharge the duties of a secretary to the Board.

3. If more than one separate educational establishment is maintained

by the Board, all such establishments shall be deemed one "school" for the purposes of this scheme, but "Principal" means the respective rector, headmaster, headmistress, or other principal of each such establishment separately.

4. This scheme shall in all respects be read subject to the provisions of the School Acts, and in the event of conflict between the provisions of this scheme and the provisions of the School Acts the latter provisions

shall prevail.

### PART II.—APPOINTMENT AND ELECTION OF MEMBERS.

Appointment of Members by Education Boards.

5. In every case where a member is to be appointed by the Education Board of the district in which the school is situated every such member shall be appointed by a resolution of the Education Board passed in the case of a regular biennial appointment before the day on which the member so appointed is to assume office, but not more than three months before that day, and in the case of a casual vacancy within fifty days after the fact of the vacancy has been notified to the Education Board.

6. The name of every member so appointed shall forthwith be notified to the Board by writing under the hand of the Secretary of the Education

Board.

Appointment of Members by Borough Councils.

- 7. In every case where a member is to be appointed by the Council of the nearest borough within five miles of the school every such member shall be appointed by a resolution of such Council passed in the case of a regular biennial appointment before the day on which the member so appointed is to assume office, but not more than three months before that day, and in the case of a casual vacancy within fifty days after the fact of the vacancy has been notified to such Council.
- 8. The name of every member so appointed shall forthwith be notified to the Board by writing under the hand of any two Councillors or the Town Clerk of such Council.
- 9. If any question arises as to which is in fact the nearest borough within five miles of the school such question may be decided by the Minister on the application of the Board or of any Borough Council claiming to be interested.

Election of Members by Parents.

10. In every case where any member is to be elected by the parents of pupils every such member shall be elected by means of an election conducted in the manner set out in the schedule hereto, and for the purposes of every such election the Secretary of the Board shall be the Returning Officer.

- 11. Such election shall be held in the first week of the month of May in the year 1929 and every alternate year thereafter, or as soon thereafter as may be convenient on a date to be fixed by the Board.
- 12. Forthwith after the completion of every such election the Returning Officer shall notify to the Board the name of every person elected.
- 13. If at any election the number of candidates duly nominated is less than the number of vacancies to be filled, the Board shall at its next meeting select duly qualified persons to complete the number required.

### Failure to appoint or elect.

- 14. If any appointment of a member is not made within the time hereinbefore prescribed the Secretary shall give notice thereof to the Minister, and the vacancy for which no person has been appointed may be filled by appointment by the Minister, or the Minister may direct that the body charged with the duty of appointing a member may proceed to make such appointment.
- 15. Where anything connected with the appointment or election of members is omitted to be done or cannot be done at or by the time hereby prescribed, or is done after such time, or is otherwise irregularly done in matter of form, the Minister may at any time before or after the time at or by which such thing is required to be done extend the time for doing such thing to such further time as he thinks fit, or may validate anything so done after the time required or so irregularly done in matter of form as he thinks fit.

# Qualification of Members.

- 16. It shall not be necessary that the member appointed by an Education Board or Borough Council shall himself be a member of such body nor that a member elected by parents shall himself be the parent of a pupil.
- 17. Retiring members shall be eligible for membership of the Board on appointment or election by either the same or another appointing or electing body.
- 18. No person shall be eligible to become or remain a member of the Board if he is an alien or a mentally defective person, or a bankrupt who has not obtained his discharge or whose discharge is for the time being suspended or is subject to conditions not yet fulfilled, or if he has been convicted of any offence punishable by death or imprisonment with hard labour for three years or upwards unless he has received a free pardon or has served his sentence or otherwise suffered the penalty imposed on him, or if he receives any salary from the Board or holds any office or employment under the Board to which any fees, salary, or emoluments are attached, or if he is interested or concerned (except as a member of an incorporated company not being the manager thereof) in any contract under which any money is to be paid by or to the Board.

### Tenure of Office.

- 19. Except in the case of a casual vacancy, every member shall hold office until the 31st day of May in the year 1929, and every member appointed or elected in the year 1929 or later shall hold office until the 31st day of May in the second year after the year of his election or appointment, and if on such 31st day of May the appointment or election of his successor has not been notified to the Board, he shall continue to hold office until the date on which such appointment or election is so notified.
- 20. Every person appointed or elected to fill a casual vacancy shall hold office for the residue of the term of office of the member whom he replaces.
- 21. Every person appointed or elected to membership otherwise than upon a casual vacancy shall assume office on the 1st day of June in the year of his appointment or election, or so soon thereafter as his appointment or election has been notified to the Board.
- 22. Every person appointed or elected to fill a casual vacancy shall assume office on the date on which his appointment or election is notified to the Board.
- 23. If any member dies or resigns his office by writing under his hand addressed to the Board or the Chairman or the Secretary thereof, or is absent without leave from the meetings of the Board for three consecutive months, or while holding office becomes ineligible to remain a member under clause 18 hereof, his office shall be thereby vacated and a casual vacancy shall be deemed to exist.

# Casual Vacancies.

24. Subject to the provisions of clause 26 hereof, every casual vacancy shall be filled in the same manner and by the same appointing or electing authority as appointed or elected the member whose seat is to be filled.

25. Whenever a vacancy to be filled by appointment occurs it shall be the duty of the Board forthwith to notify the fact to the appointing person or body and to call upon him or it to make an appointment to fill the

26. Whenever a vacancy to be filled by election occurs it shall be the duty of the Board to hold an election to fill the vacancy, such election to be held on a day to be fixed by the Board, being not later than fifty days after the vacancy occurs:

Provided that the Board may in its discretion decide that an election to fill a casual vacancy be not held if such vacancy occurs after the month of February in a year in which an ordinary election is held and before the persons elected at such ordinary election assume office.

# PART III.—THE GOVERNING BODY.

#### Powers of the Board.

27. Subject to the provisions of this scheme and of the Education Acts, there shall be vested in the Board the whole control and management of the school, and also the entire superintendence over all the affairs, concerns, and property thereof, with full power to appoint and suspend or dismiss all masters, teachers, lecturers, examiners, and other necessary officers and servants; and in all cases unprovided for by the Education Act or by this scheme it shall be lawful for the Board to act in such manner as shall appear to it best calculated to further the purposes intended to be served by the establishment of the school; and the Board shall, subject to the Education Act and the regulations thereunder, and to this scheme, have full power from time to time to make, alter, and rescind by-laws and rules for defining the courses of study and education in the school, and also for regulating the discipline of the same, the conditions upon which the pupils shall be admitted, and, in general, touching all other matters, purposes, and things regarding the school.

28. The Board may establish or license hostels or boardinghouses for the accommodation of pupils, and may place such hostels or boardinghouses under the charge of teachers of the school or other suitable persons, and shall provide for the inspection of such hostels or boardinghouses.

29. No act or proceeding of the Board or of any committee of the Board or of any person acting as a member of the Board shall be invalid in consequence of there being a vacancy in the membership of the Board at the time of such act or proceeding, or by reason of there being a defect in the appointment or election of any person so acting, or by reason of his being incapable of being appointed or elected.

### Meetings.

30. The Board shall hold an annual meeting in the month of June in each year, at such time and place as the Board shall decide.

31. Except as provided by clause 38 of this scheme, at all meetings of the Board the Chairman, or in his absence such member of the Board as the majority of the members assembled shall choose, shall preside, and such Chairman or presiding member shall have a deliberative vote, and in all cases of equality of votes shall also have a casting-vote.

32. At all meetings of the Board a majority of all the members then in office shall constitute a quorum.

33. Subject to the provisions of this scheme, the Board may make, and may from time to time revoke, vary, or amend, by-laws for the conduct of business at its meetings, for determining how meetings shall be convened and where they shall be held, for the custody and use of the common seal, and for such other like matters as may be requisite for the conduct of the business of the Board.

34. Minutes of the proceedings of the Board shall be regularly entered in a proper book to be kept for that purpose, and at every regular meeting of the Board the minutes of the previous meeting and of any special meetings shall be read over and signed by the Chairman of the meeting at which the same are read, and the minutes when so signed shall be held to be a true statement and record of the proceedings of the Board for all purposes whatever.

35. All things required by the School Acts or by this scheme to be done by the Board shall be done in accordance with and in pursuance of a resolution passed at a meeting of the Board.

#### Chairman.

36. At the annual meeting the Board shall elect from its members a Chairman, who shall hold office until the commencement of the next annual meeting and who shall be eligible for re-election.

37. If the Chairman shall from any cause cease to be a member of the Board or resign the office of Chairman the Board shall as soon thereafter as conveniently may be elect another member of the Board to be Chairman in his stead, and the Chairman so elected shall hold office only until the commencement of the next annual meeting.

38. During any election of a Chairman the Secretary of the Board shall preside, but shall have no vote; and in the event of an equality of voting he shall determine the election by lot.

#### Committees.

39. The Board may from time to time appoint standing or special committees of one or more of its members, and may delegate to any such committee any of the duties and powers of the Board, either subject to confirmation or in such manner as not to require subsequent confirmation by the Board, except power to make a permanent appointment to any position, or to dismiss any person holding a permanent appointment, or to institute an action, or to commit the Board to any expenditure or iability in excess of fifty pounds.

40. The Board shall in all cases have and retain the right to revoke any appointment of a committee and to revoke the delegation to any

committee of any duty or power of the Board.

41. Unless otherwise provided by the Board, every such committee

may fix and act by a quorum of its members.

42. The provisions of clause 34 of this scheme (relating to minutes of proceedings) shall apply, mutatis mutandis, to any committee appointed by the Board.

# Secretary and Office.

43. From time to time as may be necessary the Board shall appoint a Secretary, and shall appoint him or some other person with authority to receive moneys on the Board's account. The Board shall forthwith inform the Minister of every such appointment. The Secretary shall be insured under a fidelity bond for a sum of not less than five hundred pounds.

44. Any notice or other such document given or made by or on behalf of the Board shall be sufficiently authenticated if it is signed by the Secretary, or any person acting as Secretary, of the Board.

45. The Board shall from time to time provide and maintain at some convenient place an office on the outside of which the name of the Board

hall be kept printed or affixed.

46. Any notice or other such document shall be deemed to be served on the Board if addressed to the Board or to the Chairman or Secretary thereof and delivered at the Board's office during usual business hours to some person having charge of the office, or if sent by post in a prepaid registered letter addressed as aforesaid.

### Financial Provisions.

47. The Board shall keep full and true accounts, in which shall be entered every sum received into and paid out of the Board fund in the order of date of each such receipt and payment, including all moneys received from rents or profits derived from lands or other property vested in the Board or under its control or management. All moneys received by or belonging to the Board shall be paid into such bank as the Board from time to time appoints to the credit of one or more accounts, and no money shall be drawn out of the bank except by authority of the Board and by cheque signed by the Secretary and by a member or members appointed by the Board for the purpose.

48. The Board shall not later than the 31st day of March in every year cause its accounts for the preceding calendar year to be balanced, and a true statement and account to be prepared, in the prescribed form, of the

receipts and payments of the Board and of its assets and liabilities.
49. The Board may, out of any capital fund accumulated by it, or out of moneys coming into its hands by virtue of any Act or otherwise for the benefit of the school, for the application of which no express provision exists, expend any sum or sums in purchasing land for the benefit of the school, and in erecting and maintaining suitable buildings and premises thereon for use as school buildings, and may, subject to the approval of the Minister, expend any sum or sums in purchasing land and erecting and maintaining suitable buildings thereon for use as boardinghouses for the pupils, or as residences for the masters, teachers, or other officers employed in connection with the school.

### PART IV .- MANAGEMENT OF THE SCHOOL.

50. There shall be provided at the school a general course of secondary

education and one or more vocational courses:

Provided that, without the previous written consent of the Minister, no vocational course other than a course in Commerce, Domestic Science, or Agriculture shall be provided if a similar course is provided at a technical high school situate in the same or an adjoining borough, town district, or road district, and, further, that if the equipment used in any vocational course (other than a course in Commerce, Domestic Science, or Agriculture) is provided in whole or in part with funds furnished by the Government (otherwise than by way of subsidy on voluntary contributions) such equipment shall be available for the purpose of instruction in evening classes under the regulations for manual and technical instruction.

51. The programme of each pupil shall be determined by the Principal after consultation with the parents or guardian of the pupil; but in all cases the programme of each girl shall include adequate instruction in elementary domestic science and hygiene, and in one or more of the domestic arts, extending in general over not less than two years of the secondary course provided. No pupils shall be compelled to take Latin

or to take more than one language besides English.

52. The school year shall consist of three terms of about thirteen weeks each.

53. The Principal shall cause the pupils to be examined at least twice in each year.

54. Subject to the general direction of the Board, the Principal shall have the following powers:-

(1) He shall have control of the buildings and premises of the establish-

ment, and of the apparatus and furniture thereof.

(2) He shall have the power to recommend the appointment or dismissal of assistant teachers or of other officers of the establishment, and to allot their several duties; and no such assistant teacher or other officer shall be appointed until the Principal has been consulted as to his suitability.

(3) He shall have the power in case of grave neglect of duty or of gross misbehaviour to suspend any assistant teacher or other officer, but shall forthwith report his action to the Chairman. action of the Principal shall hold good until the Board has

determined the matter.

- (4) He shall be supreme over the discipline, and may suspend from attendance any pupil, reporting his action to the Board at their next meeting, and the action of the Principal shall hold good until the Board has come to some determination in regard to the matter. He shall not expel any pupil without the sanction of the Board.
- (5) He shall regulate all text-books, methods, and organization in accordance with clause 51 hereof, and, subject to the same clause and to the regulations under the Education Act, shall determine the course of study for each pupil: Provided that the text-books be taken from the list selected by the Director and approved by the Minister.

### SCHEDULE.

RULES FOR THE CONDUCT OF ELECTION OF MEMBERS BY PARENTS.

(1) In this Schedule "elector" means a person whose name duly appears on the roll at the time when it is closed for the purposes of any election.

(2) For the purposes of each election the Returning Officer shall prepare a roll, and shall enter therein the name, occupation, and address of every person qualified to be enrolled as a parent of a pupil of the school. The roll shall be closed at 5 o'clock on the fourteenth day before the day on which any election is to be held, and shall continue to be closed until the election is completed.

(3) The roll shall at all reasonable times be open to inspection in the hands of the Returning Officer by any person whose name is entered therein, and by any person representing to the Returning Officer that he is entitled

to have his name entered therein.

(4) Any question that arises touching the right of any person to have his name entered in or retained on the roll shall be decided by the Return-

ing Officer, and his decision shall be final.

(5) The Returning Officer shall, by advertisement in a newspaper circulating in the locality of the school, publicly notify not less than twentyone days before each election-

- (a) The day and hour for the closing of nominations:
- (b) The total number of candidates to be elected:

(c) The day and hour for the closing of the poll.

Such advertisement shall indicate generally the nature of the election which is being held.

- (6) Every candidate shall be nominated in writing by one or more electors entitled to vote for his election.
- (7) Every nomination paper shall be in the form or to the effect follow-

(8) If the nomination-paper does not bear the written consent of the candidate nominated, such consent may be given by him to the Returning Officer before the nominations are closed, and every nomination-paper shall be void in so far as concerns any candidate whose written consent is not duly given as aforesaid.

(9) Nominations shall close at noon on the fourteenth day before the day of the closing of the poll; so that if a poll is to close on the fifteenth day of any month, nominations shall close on the first day of that month.

- (10) Any question that arises touching the validity of a nominationpaper, whether by reason of form, execution, time of receipt, or otherwise howsoever, shall be decided by the Returning Officer, and his decision shall
- (11) If the number of nominations received does not exceed the number of vacancies to be filled, the Returning Officer shall forthwith declare the candidate or candidates so nominated to be duly elected.
- (12) In all other cases the Returning Officer shall, as soon as the nominations are closed, prepare and post to each elector at his address as appearing on the roll a printed voting-paper containing in alphabetical order of surnames a list of all the duly nominated candidates for whom such elector is entitled to vote; and such voting-paper shall be in the form or to the effect following:

VOTING-PAPER FOR USE AT ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE DAY OF , 19 , OF MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE [Name of School].

CANDIDATES. [Set out in alphabetical order of surnames the full name of every duly nominated candidate.]

# DIRECTIONS.

The number of candidates to be elected is [Specify the number].

The voter must draw a line through the name of every candidate for whom he does not intend to vote.

The number of candidates whose names are left uncancelled must not

The voting-paper must be posted or delivered to the Returning Officer in a closed envelope bearing on the outside the word "Voting-paper," and on the inside of the flap of the envelope the signature of the voter. If posted to the Returning Officer it must be posted on or before the day of election, and, if delivered to him, must be delivered at his office, Street, before the day of election, or not later than 5 o'clock in the afternoon of that deep dav.

(13) When posting any voting-paper the Returning Officer shall enclose for the return of the voting-paper an envelope addressed to himself with a place inside the flap for the signature of the voter.

(14) The poll shall close at 5 o'clock on the afternoon of the day of election; but all voting-papers shall be included and counted which are not informal and are received by the Returning Officer in due course of post before the close of the seventh day after the day of the election.

(15) A voting-paper shall be informal in any of the following cases, that is to say.

(a) If the elector votes more than once at the same election;

- (b) If the candidates whose names are left uncancelled exceed in number the total number of candidates for whom the elector is entitled to vote;
- (c) If in any other way the paper fails to indicate for whom the vote is intended to be given;
- (d) If, being delivered to the Returning Officer, otherwise than by post, the sealed envelope containing the voting-paper is not delivered at his office before the close of the poll;

- (e) If, having been forwarded by post, the sealed envelope containing the voting-paper is not received at the office of the Returning Officer before the close of the seventh day after the day of election, or if, from the post-mark on the envelope or otherwise, the Returning Officer is satisfied that it was not posted until after the day of the election;
- (f) If there is reasonable cause to believe that it was not issued to the voter by the Returning Officer; or
- (g) If the voter fails to place his signature on the inside of the flap of the envelope.
- (16) The Returning Officer shall decide whether a voting-paper is invalid or informal whether by reason of the time of receipt or delivery or by reason of the fact that the voter's intention is not indicated, or for any other reason, and his decision shall be final.
- (17) On the eighth day after the closing of the poll the Returning Officer shall open and examine all voting-papers duly delivered to him or received by him through the post as aforesaid, and, after rejecting all informal voting-papers, shall ascertain the candidates (not exceeding the total number to be elected) who have received the greatest number of votes, and shall declare such candidates to be elected.
- (18) If by reason of an equality of votes given for two or more candidates the election is not complete, the Returning Officer shall decide by lot, in the presence of two members of the Board, which candidate or candidates shall be elected, and thereby complete the election.
- (19) (a) Each candidate may, by writing under his hand, appoint one scrutineer, who may be present at the examination of the voting-papers and the counting of the votes by the Returning Officer.
- (b) The Returning Officer shall, immediately after counting the votes, seal up all voting-papers, and transmit the whole to the Clerk of the nearest Magistrate's Court, who shall keep the same for six months thereafter, and shall not open or permit to be opened such packet except on the order of some Court of competent jurisdiction, and shall at the end of six months effectually destroy the same.
- (c) Forthwith after the completion of the election the Returning Officer hall, by notice exhibited on the outside of the office of the Board, and by advertisement in a newspaper circulating in the locality of the school, notify the names of the persons elected, the number of valid votes recorded for each candidate, and the total number of votes rejected as informal.
- (d) The Returning Officer and every clerk or other person employed by him and every scrutineer shall be required faithfully and impartially to perform the duties of their offices, and shall not directly or indirectly make known the state of the poll or give or pretend to give any information by which the state of the poll may be known before the final declaration thereof by the Returning Officer, or make known for which candidate any voter has voted, or communicate to any person any information likely to defeat the secrecy of the ballot.
- (20) If a candidate informs the Returning Officer in writing not later than three clear days before the closing of the poll that he retires from the election, the Returning Officer shall give public notice thereof; and if by such retirement the number of candidates is reduced to the number of vacancies to be filled, the Returning Officer shall publicly declare the remaining candidates to be duly elected; but if the said number of candidates is not so reduced the poll shall proceed, but the person so retiring shall not be capable of being elected.
- (21) The Returning Officer shall be the sole and absolute judge of the regularity and propriety of all matters connected with an election, and no election shall be called in question on the ground that a voting-paper or an addressed envelope was not posted to any elector, or that a voting-paper from any elector was not received by the Returning Officer, or that a voting-paper prepared by the Returning Officer was irregular in form, or that any vote was irregularly cast, or that any votes were wrongly computed, or that any other irregularity occurred in connection with the election, unless in the opinion of the Returning Officer (whose decision shall be final) such irregularity materially affected the result of the election or occurred otherwise than in good faith.
