Education Act, 1914.—Amended Regulations.

I N pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Education Act, 1914, and the amendments of that Act, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf. His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby amend, in the manner set forth in the Schedule hereto, the regulations at present in force relating to the organization, examination, and inspection of public schools and the syllabus of instruction, and, with the like advice and consent, doth prescribe that this Order shall come into force on the first day of February, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine.

SCHEDULE.

THE regulations relating to the organization, examination, and inspection of public schools, and the syllabus of instruction made by Order in Council dated 15th September, 1919, and amended by Orders in Council dated 13th June, 1921; 25th March, 1922; 10th September, 1923; 3rd December, 1923; and 12th December, 1924, are hereby further amended by deleting clauses 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, and 25, and substituting the following therefor :---

SYLLABUS OF INSTRUCTION.

The courses of instruction in the various subjects shall be as follows :--

GENERAL INTRODUCTION.

The last complete revision of the syllabus for primary schools was made in 1919, but since then very marked changes have taken place in educational thought with respect to school organization and curricula. The present revision has been undertaken with the view of modernizing both the prescriptions of work in each subject and the methods of instruction.

The Department particularly desires that the present syllabus shall be regarded both by Inspectors and teachers as mainly suggestive. Teachers are to consider themselves free to make any alteration or rearrangement of work they think desirable, and the Inspectors will approve any reasonable scheme that appears to meet the needs of children of a particular type or of a particular locality. It is not necessary that the teacher should follow the order of instruction adopted in the syllabus. As a matter of fact the topics set down under each subject have not been arranged according to any hard-and-fast rule, and part of the duty of the teacher will be to select and rearrange the material in accordance with his own ideas as to the best method of treating the subject. He is also at liberty to transfer parts of a subject from one class to another, always provided that the requirements for the primary-school leaving-certificate, awarded at the end of the Standard VI or Form II course are complied with. Further, the teacher may with the approval of the Inspector base his instruction mainly on one subject to which all or most of the other subjects are related. It is recognized also that the pupil as well as his teacher has a right to a certain measure of freedom, and that the most carefully planned schemes of work may not satisfy the pupil's desire to pursue a course of study that appeals to him. The Inspector will recognize that it is not always possible for a teacher to adhere closely to his daily plan of work. At the same time nothing can excuse neglect on the teacher's part of adequate preparation of his scheme of instruction. It is most important that the teacher shall use his freedom wisely and that he shall not allow the instruction of the pupil to degenerate into an unsystematic dabbling with only the more interesting subjects or parts of subjects.

An attempt has been made to make the syllabus much more definite than its predecessor, so that the young teacher will receive more real help from a perusal of its contents. This effort to avoid vagueness may give the syllabus an appearance of being overloaded, but a careful examination of the various prescriptions will show how much the amount of work expected from the teacher and the pupils has been reduced or simplified. This is particularly the case with arithmetic.

The syllabus has been enriched by the introduction at an earlier stage of the study of examples of good literature, and also by the earlier commencement of subjects that have heretofore been considered as belonging to the secondary-school course. The prescriptions in music and drawing have also been written with the same purpose in view. The making of a truly cultural course depends, however, more on the teacher's conception of the way the various subjects should be treated than on any prescription that can be devised. The prescription can at best be only suggestive of the richer and more fully cultural type of education it is hoped will become more and more prominent in all schools.

It is intended that the teacher should provide for the rapid promotion of children of quick and bright intelligence, so that these may reach the secondary schools at an earlier age than at present. The plan of providing an extended course of study for the brighter pupils has been indicated in the syllabus in arithmetic and elementary mathematics, and this plan might be followed in other subjects. A more modest scheme of work might be provided for the pupil of moderate ability, and promotion should not be denied a pupil on the ground that he has not mastered every detail of the class prescription. Rather should his promotion depend upon his ability to cope with and benefit from the studies set down for the next higher class. A certain amount of repetition in the prescriptions for the various classes permits action to be taken on these lines without prejudice to the pupil.

Brief introductory notes are furnished on each subject in order that the main purpose of the prescriptions may be understood.

CHARACTER TRAINING.

INTRODUCTION.

The whole of school life should centre in character-training. Every subject of instruction, and indeed every lesson, provides the teacher with opportunities for teaching right conduct and implanting such moral habits as honesty, modesty. perseverance. Games if rightly supervised enable the teacher to train his pupils to be self-reliant but at the same time to seek the general good rather than selfish ends, to be patient, self - controlled, honourable and fair to friend and foe. Incidental training of this kind is probably much more effective than set moral lessons, which tend to be uninteresting and tedious to children. The most potent factor is undoubtedly the personal attitude of the teacher towards character-training. If his attitude is one of half-veiled cynicism his influence is likely to be negative if not definitely harmful. The teacher should show in his scheme of work that he is following a well-defined plan even though he provides no set moral lessons. The programme in one class will differ very little in subjectmatter from that of another; but the treatment should be adapted to the capacities and outlook of the pupils.

PREPARATORY DIVISION.

The following topics indicate lines which instruction may follow :-

1. Establishment of personal habits leading to self-control-e.g., daily acts of cleanliness, quietness in movement and speech, neatness and orderliness, industry, punctuality.

2. Social habits such as consideration for others, non-interference with occupations of others, politeness, kindness, helpfulness, obedience, cheerfulness, truthfulness, honesty, care of public property.

3. Development of a sense of responsibility through the assignment of

special duties—e.g., care of plants, pets, distribution of materials, &c.
4. Incidental inculcation of moral ideas through stories as occasion demands during school-work.

STANDARD CLASSES.

1. Continuation and extension of work outlined for preparatory classes. 2. Discipline through further development of the powers of self-control. Temperance.

3. Behaviour in class, in the playground, in public places and conveyances. 4. Kindness to animals.

5. Truthfulness-in word and deed; avoidance of boasting.

6. Courage and perseverance in the face of difficulties and discomforts; tale-bearing; bullying.

7. Industry-at home, in school; dignity of labour.

8. Consideration for others-playmates, those in authority, the aged, invalids. Duty to parents, teachers, State. Social services. Personal service to others involving sacrifice of self-interest.

9. International relationships.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

INTRODUCTION.

The syllabus aims to give greater prominence than heretofore to the teaching of English in primary schools. It urges attention to the manner in which the child speaks as well as to the manner in which he writes. It also recognizes that facility and accuracy in expression are not to be gained by memorizing grammatical rules, but rather by the intelligent study of good models. At the same time it gives grammar a place, if only a subordinate one, in the school curriculum. Such grammar as is included is of the type that may be termed "general grammar," or the grammar common to most modern languages. It is to be studied mainly through synthetic exercises. Grammar of this limited and general kind is likely to be of service to the pupil when he subsequently begins the study of a foreign language, and of service also when he finds instant decision necessary as to the accuracy of alternative forms of expression. The syllabus emphasizes at every stage the importance of accurate speech, correct spelling, correct arrangement of ideas, and the extension of the child's vocabulary. The teacher's aims should be to develop in his pupils facility in expressing their thoughts clearly, fluently, and correctly in speech or in writing, to train the pupils in the proper use of books and thus to foster an appreciation of English literature.

Regular training in correct speech or utterance should be given in all classes, to secure, through the correct use of the vocal organs, distinct articulation, clear enunciation of consonants, and purity of vowel sound. Particular attention should be paid to children whose speech is in any way defective. The method by which this training is to be effected is to be clearly indicated in the teacher's scheme of work. Every teacher should make a survey of the speech errors in his class, record them, and adapt his exercises accordingly. The value of the singing lesson in affording training in articulation must not be overlooked.

Since children acquire language by imitation it is clear that the teacher's speech should be as pure as possible, distinct in enunication, well modulated, and free from affectation and vulgarism.

In the case of reading, emphasis is laid in the lower classes on the importance of the pupil's becoming word perfect—that is, mastering the initial mechanical difficulties in the subject. Hence more prominence is given to oral reading in the lower than in the higher classes, where fuller attention must necessarily be given to difficulties in the subject-matter. In all classes pupils should keep in a convenient place—e.g., the School Journal—a record of the books read. In judging reading, consideration should be given to (i) the ability of the child to read aloud with clearness of utterance, correct pronunciation, audibility, fluency, and natural expression books of reasonable difficulty; (ii) his ability to give the content and meaning of the matter read either orally or silently; (iii) the range of books covered.

No particular system of teaching writing will be made compulsory, but the pupil must be so taught that by the time he is ready to enter Standard V (Form I) he shall have acquired mastery of the cursive style of handwriting, in which speed and legibility are to be regarded as the essential characteristics. It will be noted that in the syllabus teachers are advised to use print-script in the Preparatory Division and a free style of cursive writing in the standard classes. The slope of the cursive writing should not be less than 70° from the horizontal.

Spelling should be taught systematically, and the teacher should not rely on the mere setting of lists of words to be learned by the pupils. It is most important that each teacher should set out in his scheme of work for the year a definite method of teaching the subject. Good use may be made of minimal lists that the pupils have compiled under the teacher's guidance, but care should be taken not to restrict the pupil's vocabulary. Any spelling authorized by the Oxford Dictionary is to be accepted in the schools.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

PREPARATORY DIVISION.

LANGUAGE :--

(a) Speaking or Talking.—" Training the child to talk freely and distinctly may not unfairly be described as the primary task for any infant school or class." (Handbook of Suggestions; English Board of Education.) "It is ampletically the teacher's duty to teach all his applies."

"It is emphatically the teacher's duty to teach all his pupils standard English and to speak it clearly and with expression." (Teaching of English in England.) Conversations upon pictures, topics familiar to the child, plants, birds, animals, insects, simple natural phenomena, and generally topics introduced through the spontaneous interests of the day, at home and at school. Stories, fairy-tales and folk-tales, nursery rhymes, and simple poems to be told to the class by the teacher and retold by the children. Dramatization and reproduction in drawing and handwork. Throughout the lessons the aim should be to train the children to talk individually, and the more reticent children should receive special encouragement. Systematic speech training should be given.

(b) Written Expression. — While written expression at this stage is not mandatory, children should not be discouraged from occasionally expressing themselves in writing. Free written composition in the higher Preparatory Classes is by no means beyond the capacity of the pupils.

READING.—No particular method of teaching reading is prescribed, but it is suggested that the reading-material should consist at first of words as names of things or actions, then of simple sentences arising from the conversation lessons. The next stage should consist of the analysis of suitable words into their component phonic sounds, and the synthesis of these sounds to form whole words, both being associated with the interpretation at sight of words and sentences on the blackboard, on individual reading-sheets, or in reading-books, of which each child should read as many as possible. Reading aloud must form an essential part of the reading practice.

Teachers are required to set out in their scheme of work the various stages in the method adopted to secure clearness of utterance, fluency, and expression.

RECITATION.—Recitation and dramatization of selected nursery-rhymes, simple poems, and songs where suitable.

ŜPELLING.—Word-building of a simple character, such as by the use of carded letters and phonograms. Word-matching, such as matching names and things, or names and pictures, or words and words. Phonic exercises in forming words of regular construction.

WRITING.—Print-script in chalk, crayon, or pencil; printing letters, figures, words, phrases, and short sentences. It is suggested that the higher classes in this division might commence free-arm drill on blackboard to secure rhythm of movement and co-ordination of hand and eye, with a view to the transition to a cursive form of handwriting in the standard classes.

STANDARD I.

LANGUAGE :---

(a) Speech Training.—Definite instruction to be continued in order to secure the correct use of the vocal organs, purity of speech, clear articulation, and purity of vowel sounds. Exercises to be planned by the teacher to meet the needs of her own pupils and to be clearly indicated in the scheme of work. Breathing and voice exercises as prescribed in the Music Syllabus.

(b) Oral Expression.—The oral lessons are to be continued, children being expected to show advance upon the stage set for the Preparatory Division. Reproduction and discussion of the subject-matter of reading lessons, and of poetry. Talks on peoples and modes of life in other lands, on natural history, on interesting persons in New Zealand, British, and European history. Free and uninterrupted expression should be aimed at, and children should be encouraged to ask questions. Correction of errors to be made unobtrusively, or reserved till the end of the lesson.

(c) Written Composition.—Oral composition as indicated above to form the main portion of the work, but children to be encouraged to write upon familiar and interesting topics. While some attempt should be made towards securing a reasonable degree of formal accuracy, freedom of expression should be the first consideration. Original efforts to be encouraged.

sion should be the first consideration. Original efforts to be encouraged. (d) Formal Language.—Use of capital letters and full stops. Correct use, solely by example, of *is* and *are*, was and were, *did* and *done*, saw and seen, their and there. Easy synthetic exercises in using nouns, adjectives, and verbs. Repetition exercises to eradicate common errors in children's oral and written speech. Examination and imitation of good models in a very simple way.

READING.—Oral and silent reading of the following: (a) The School Journal; (b) other books to be read in class either silently or aloud. Reading of suitable poems should be included, and dramatization encouraged to assist comprehension and appreciation.

RECITATION.—Poems for recitation should be selected for their literary value and their power to appeal to the child at this stage. Children to be encouraged to select and to memorize pieces for themselves. A record of poems read and studied should be kept. The work should be correlated with drawing and singing where this can be done in a natural and spontaneous manner. SPELLING.—Systematic instruction based generally on word-building, but including other words in common use by pupils. Children are not to be required to spell all the words found in their reading-books. Practice in writing from memory short phrases previously read by the pupils. A list of words compiled by the teacher from the mistakes in the pupil's written exercises should be kept, and the plan of instruction must be set forth in the scheme of work.

WRITING.—Systematic training in ease of movement to be continued; attention to be given to the position of the body, to the manner of holding the pen or pencil, and to the position of the paper.

the pen or pencil, and to the position of the paper. Cursive writing to be now developed. At first writing small letters joined in groups, then words composed of these letters. Capital letters of a simple form. Transcription of short easy sentences. Small letters to be about a quarter of an inch in height.

The pen should not be used unless the pupils are quite proficient in the use of the lead-pencil.

STANDARD II.

LANGUAGE :-

LANGUAGE :-

(a) Speech Training.—Regular practice to secure correct pronunciation and clear utterance to be given. Exercises to correct detected faults in speech.

(b) Oral Expression.—The oral work as prescribed for Standard I to be extended. Pupils will be required to give a more connected account of an event, story, or lesson, and to discuss the subject-matter of the reading lessons and poetry, nature topics, historical and geographical subjects. Practice should also be given in the oral reproduction of stories from literature or history. The asking of questions is to be encouraged.

(c) Written Composition.—Oral composition as prescribed above still to form main portion of the work: written exercises based upon oral lessons and other themes. Imaginative stories. Use of common connectives e.g., and, but, when, who—to be encouraged. Fullness and freedom of expression to be looked for rather than formal accuracy. Practice in writing from memory short passages previously read by the pupils.

(d) Formal Language.—Formal language exercises as prescribed for Standard I with the addition of the following: Use of apostrophe, as in "John's book." Completion of sentences given in incomplete form. Changing easy sentences from singular to plural form. The correct use, solely by example, of the parts of the verbs to be, see, do, come, sing, fly, swim, and of where, were, &c. Common homonyms. Very easy examples of tombining two sentences by means of and, but, when, who, &c. Correction of commonest errors in oral and written work. As in Standard I, exercises based on the examination (e.g., by question and answer) of good models of English literature.

READING.—Oral and silent reading of the following: (a) The School Journal; (b) other books to be read in class either silently or aloud. The pupils will be expected to read with fluency and suitable expression. Free oral reproduction of the subject-matter of suitable passages and whole stories read should be further developed.

RECITATION.—Recitation and dramatization of suitable poems as for Standard I.

APPRECIATION OF LITERATURE.—In all the exercises on reading and recitation training should be afforded in the appreciation of good literature.

SPELLING.—Systematic instruction to be continued in the spelling of words commonly used by pupils and collected from errors in their written work; word-building to be included. A list of words taught should be kept, and the method of instruction should be set forth clearly in the scheme of work.

WRITING.—Exercises to secure muscular control with consequent freedom of movement should be devised. Position of body, arms, fingers, and book to be carefully supervised. Cursive writing with pencil and pen to be further developed; size of small letters to be about $\frac{1}{4}$ in. Capital letters to be included.

STANDARD III.

(a) Speech Training.—Exercises to secure correct speech, and to eradicate defects peculiar to the class or to the locality still to be continued on a definite plan.

(b) Oral Expression. — Oral reproduction of subject - matter of reading lessons. The telling of stories. Discussions. Pupils should be trained to speak at greater length than in preceding classes. Dramatization to be included. Individual effort to be encouraged : questioning to follow. Free and connected speech to be aimed at.

(c) Written Composition.—Written composition to be further developed so that the pupils can write a simple narrative—e.g., the retelling of stories from literature, or history, from the points of view of the various characters; accounts of excursions, autobiographies; original themes and stories. Natural sequence of events to receive attention. The writing of simple letters from one pupil to another should be included. The exercises should show advance in sentence - structure, and pupils should begin paragraphing. Correct use of capital letters, question mark, full stop, and apostrophe should be more firmly established, and the use of comma and quotation marks introduced. Practice in writing from memory short passages previously read by the pupils. Exercises in the imitation of good models of English.

(d) Formal Language.—Completion and expansion of sentences. Subject and predicate treated synthetically and recognition of these in easy sentences. Combining sentences by means of and, but, if, when, whenever, while, as, as soon as, after, before, since, till, until, where, wherever, because, for, who, which, that. Recognition of nouns and verbs; attaching appropriate nouns to verbs and verbs to nouns. Changing of sentences from singular to plural with an understanding of the changes made in the noun and the verb. Recognition of the functions of adjectives and adverbs by adding appropriate words to nouns, and verbs. The use in sentences of may and can; correct forms of the personal pronouns I, him, me, she, her; and the parts of the verbs pay, begin, tie, die, bring. Correction of errors in the oral or written composition, reasons not being required.

READING.—Oral and silent reading of the following: (a) The School Journal; (b) supplementary continuous readers. Carefully selected passages and complete works to be read for information or for enjoyment, the subject-matter being treated accordingly. Excessive attention to detailed explanations shall not be required, but the pupil should be able to show in a general but quite definite manner that he comprehends the subjectmatter of the reading lessons. Reading aloud by teacher and pupils of carefully selected passages in prose and verse. Magazine clubs should be encouraged.

RECITATION.—Recitation of suitable poems and prose passages. Special attention should be paid to enunciation, modulation, and natural expression. Individual selection by pupils to be encouraged. Simple dramatic work should be attempted.

APPRECIATION OF LITERATURE.--During the lessons in reading and recitation training is to be afforded in the appreciation of good literature.

SPELLING.—Systematic instruction in the spelling of common words used by the pupils in discussions, oral lessons, and composition exercises. Class and individual lists of words to be kept, and the plan of instruction to be clearly defined. Dictation of easy passages.

WRITING.—Exercises to secure freedom and fluency should be maintained. Cursive writing of sentences and short passages of prose and poetry. A good standard of writing and figuring in all written work. Print-sc ipt may be kept up for suitable purposes—*e.g.*, in drawing, arithmetic, and diagrams.

STANDARD IV.

LANGUAGE :---

(a) Speech Training.—Systematic instruction in correct speech to be continued, with attention to the correct pronunciation of Maori words and place-names. The practice of acquiring, through the key-words of a pronouncing dictionary, the correct pronunciation of unfamiliar words might be begun here.

(b) Oral Expression.—Oral practice still to form a prominent feature of the work in composition. Pupils should be trained to talk at greater length on the content of reading, nature-study, geography, and history lessons, and to express with reasonable fluency their ideas on familiar topics and current events. Lecturettes and debates.

(c) Written Composition.—The reproduction of subject-matter of poetry or prose; description of events, current and past; simple narratives, naturestudy subjects, and other topics familiar to the children in their daily life. Imaginative stories. The writing of personal letters and correspondence with other schools, both in New Zealand and abroad. Correct use of the apostrophe, and quotation marks, should be fully established. The indenting of the paragraph should now be expected. Further exercises in the imitation of good models of English, also practice in writing from memory short passages previously read by the pupils.

(d) Formal Language.—Exercises to give pupils command over good types of sentences for use in their composition, and to give them such know-

ledge of sentence-structure and word-function as will enable them to criticize their own or another's composition. Further synthetic treatment of sentencestructure, including the recognition of subject and predicate in easy direct sentences. Attention to be paid to the normal order of the various parts of the sentence. Constructive exercises leading to a recognition of nouns, pronouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs, and conjunctions. Sentences involving comparison of adjectives and simple cases of gender. Using the following interrogatives to introduce questions : how, when, where, why, who, whose, whom, which, what. Constructing sentences involving the use of the possessive forms of nouns and pronouns. Practice in writing paragraphs in the present, past, and future tenses, with attention to unity of time. Synthetic exercises in enriching written composition (a) by adding to verbs words that tell when, where, how, why; (b) by phrases introduced by at, by, on, over, under, below, beside, near, in; (c) by adding to verbs phrases telling when, where, how, and noting the effect of placement; (d) by adding to nouns appropriate descriptive phrases. Combining two simple sentences by the participial construction and by using the following conjunctions and relative pronouns : either . . . or, neither . . . nor, both . . . and, not only . . . but also, as, as if, if, unless, though, although, who, whose, whom, which, that. Correct placing of qualifying phrases and clauses to be taught. Correct use in sentences of the parts of the verbs forget, shear, ring, rise, break, flow, lie, lay. Correction of written and spoken errors, reasons not being required.

lay. Correction of written and spoken errors, reasons not being required. READING.—Oral and silent reading of the following: (a) The School Journal; (b) supplementary continuous readers. Reading-matter should be selected and treated in much the same way as indicated for Standard III. Increased time should now be given to silent reading; the use of library books under the teacher's direction to be encouraged, and a record kept by the pupils of books so read. The reading aloud of selected poems and prose passages by teacher and pupils, followed by discussion thereon, to be regularly practised. Magazine clubs and reading at home to be encouraged.

RECITATION.—Recitation of suitable passages of poetry and prose, with attention to enunciation, emphasis, and natural expression. Individual selection should be encouraged, and a record of pieces learned should be kept. Dramatic work to be continued.

APPRECIATION OF LITERATURE.—Wherever the subject-matter and treatment of the lessons in reading and recitation suit the purpose, training in the appreciation of good literature should be given.

SPELLING.—Systematic instruction in the spelling of common words used by the pupils in discussions, oral lessons, and composition. Class and individual lists to be compiled by the teacher and by the pupils, the plan of teaching being clearly set out in the scheme of work. Dictation of passages of suitable difficulty. Use of dictionary for pronunciation and spelling to be encouraged.

WRITING.—Former exercises to be continued. Position of body and of writing instrument to be carefully supervised. Systematic instruction in writing should be completed in this class. A good standard of writing and figuring to be insisted on in all written work. Writing to be somewhat smaller than in previous classes. Print-script may be practised in connection with arithmetic, drawing, &c.

STANDARD V (FORM I).

LANGUAGE :-

(a) Speech Training.—Exercises to secure correct speech should be continued, attention to correct pronunciation of Maori words to be included.

(b) Oral Expression.—Oral expression of a more advanced character. Continuous oral description or narrative to be expected. Training in the orderly arrangement of ideas. Oral exercises in summarizing the thought content of successive paragraphs and in enlarging the pupil's vocabulary. Class debates and dramatization should be included, and short prepared lecturettes should be given by individual pupils; careful attention to correct speech and manner of delivery. Free discussion should form part of all branches of classwork.

(c) Written Composition.—Definite teaching in composition to be given. Subjects to be taken with which pupils are familiar, and to include imaginative stories, reproduction of narrative and description from literature read. The conversational type of written composition should receive attention. Pupils should be encouraged to make notes during silent-reading periods or in individual research, and to produce from these a continuous composition. Definite study of selections of literature with the object of encouraging the pupil to imitate good models. Opportunity for pupils to criticize and correct their own or one another's written compositions should be given. The writing of original poems to be encouraged. Business and social letters in correct form and language. The writing of contributions to school or class magazines where possible. Practice in reproducing from memory specially selected passages.

(d) Formal Language.-Revision of the work of the previous class. Recognition of the preposition to facilitate the discussion of constructions in which it occurs. The study of a sentence to include the recognition of in which it occurs. the object and the different positions in which it can be placed. Correct use of pronouns used as objects and after prepositions. Further constructive exercises in using adjectival and adverbial phrases, with special attention to their effective placement in the sentence. The use of (a) and, but, yet, or, nor; (b) and and but in the same sentence; (c) and in series with correct punctuation; (d) both \ldots and, not only \ldots but; (e) either \ldots or, neither . . nor; with special attention to correct position of these words. Formation of sentences involving the use of a more extended list of conjunctions than in previous standard : e.g., (a) when, whenever, while, as, as soon as, after, before, since, till, until; (b) where, wherever; (c) because, for since, as; (d) as, as if; (e) if, unless; (f) though, although. Further practice in combining sentences by means of relative pronouns; recognition of such clauses as adjectival in function; practice in correct placement. Synthetic exercises on noun and on adverbial clauses. Formal or tabulated analysis of sentences is not required. Further practice in combining two simple sentences into a single simple sentence by means of the participial construction. Recognition of active and passive construction, and use of passive form in impersonal constructions to avoid employing the indefinite one, you, we, they, people. Study of selected passages of good English in connection with the above. Application of the foregoing principles in free composition exercises. Correction of common errors in spoken and written language, with oral discussions of reasons.

READING.—Oral and silent reading as follows: (a) The School Journal; (b) supplementary continuous readers; (c) books from the school library. Silent reading should now predominate, and should include training in the use of text-books and books of reference. Oral reading of prose and poetry should still receive attention with a view to securing appreciation of works of literary excellence, and a thorough study should be made of short selected passages in prose or poetry. A record of books, &c., read should be kept by each pupil. The use of the library to be encouraged.

RECITATION.—Recitation of suitable pieces of poetry and prose, with much attention to enunciation and expression. Dramatic work to be kept up. Encouragement to be given pupils to select their own pieces and to compile anthologies.

APPRECIATION OF LITERATURE.—Opportunity should be taken in the reading and recitation lessons to give training in the appreciation of good literature.

SPELLING.—Systematic teaching of the spelling of words commonly used by the pupils; spelling - list to include words relating to familiar topics. Dictation appropriate to this class, passages of literary merit being selected for this purpose. Spelling of familiar proper names from history and geography, including the better-known Maori place-names. Use of common prefixes and suffixes and some of the more common roots as part of a course in word-building and vocabulary extension. WRITING.—Regular systematic lessons should be no longer needed,

WRITING.—Regular systematic lessons should be no longer needed, but occasional formal lessons to correct errors may be found necessary. All written work and figuring should be of good standard of legibility, neatness, correct form, and fluency. Practice in commercial and business forms. Exercises to develop speed combined with legibility and quality to be regularly though not too frequently given. The pupils may now be allowed to develop some individuality in style, but eccentricities in the holding of the pen or in shaping or sloping the letters should not be permitted.

LANGUAGE :----

STANDARD VI (FORM II).

(a) Speech Training.—Exercises to secure correct speech to be continued, with attention to Maori names.

(b) Oral Expression.—Practice and training in oral expression on the lines prescribed for the preceding standards to be further developed, the pupils to speak with fluency and accuracy. Practice to be given in reasoning and answering more fully and consecutively. Free discussions debates, and lecturettes by pupils.

(c) Written Composition.—Definite teaching in composition to be continued. Subjects for composition should be based upon oral lessons, geography, history, and familiar topics, and should be carefully planned beforehand. Exercises in description and in imaginative composition to be included. Accuracy, orderly arrangement, sense of proportion, and right choice of words should be the aim. Letter-writing to be continued; the writing of articles for school magazines, and also correspondence with other schools, to be encouraged. The writing of original poems and stories to be further encouraged. Study of selections from literature for the purposes of composition. Practice in verbal reproduction of passages read by the teacher or by the pupil.

(d) Formal Language.—Revision of the work of the preceding standards. Case of nouns and pronouns only for the convenience of designating the possessive form and the subject and the object. Further exercises in formation of complex sentences involving use of clauses of different kinds and a more extensive use of conjunctive words than for the preceding class-e.g., in order that, so that, that, lest, than, as (in comparisons) so . . that, introducing clause of result. Position of adverbial adjunct, and advantages of placing it at the opening of the sentence. The placing of adjective phrases, including participial phrases and of adjective clauses, near the word they qualify. Formal or tabulated analysis of sentences shall not be required. Further study of the sentence; occasional variation of the usual order of subject, predicate, and object (1) to secure emphasis, (2) to another adjustic clause of participial phrases to be attached to the (2) to enable adjective clause or participial phrase to be attached to the subject, (3) to avoid monotony of structure; use of *there* or *it* to throw the subject to the end. Use of *shall* and *will*, *should*, *would*, *may*, *can*, *each* other, one another, &c. Practice in turning longer passages from direct into indirect form and vice versa, with correct punctuation. Correction of written and spoken errors, with discussion of the principles involved. Study of good models of English writing, and practice in improving sentences in children's own composition exercises. Study of the paragraph in a prose passage, finding suitable headings for paragraphs in a reading lesson, dividing subject-matter for a composition exercise into suitable paragraphs under appropriate headings. Criticizing and correcting faulty paragraphs. Study of easy examples of figurative language : metaphor, simile, personification. Simple appreciation of metre and rhyme.

READING.—Oral and silent reading as follows: (a) The School Journal; (b) supplementary continuous readers; (c) books from school library. Silent reading to receive greater attention, to include reading for enjoyment, reading for information, and reading for language-study. The pupil should be able to show in a general but quite definite manner that he comprehends what he has read, and in the case of specially selected passages appreciates the skill of the author, his command of language, and his ability to awaken the emotions of the reader. Oral reading to be practised at regular intervals.

RECITATION.—Recitation of verse and prose, with freedom of selection. Examination of typical stanzas of poetry to discover metre, rhyme, rhythm, and alliteration. Dialogues and scenes from plays should form part of the programme. A record of pieces learned to be kept; encouragement to be given to pupils to compile their own anthologies.

APPRECIATION OF LITERATURE. -- In the exercises in reading and recitation training must be afforded in the appreciation of good literature.

SPELLING.—Systematic teaching of the spelling of words commonly used by the pupils, as for Standard V. Dictation of passages of literary merit. Use of common prefixes and suffixes and some of the more common roots as part of a course in word-building and vocabulary extension.

WRITING.—Regular systematic lessons should be no longer needed, but occasional formal lessons to correct errors may be found necessary. All written work and figuring should be of good standard of legibility, neatness, correct form, and fluency. Practice in commercial and business forms. Exercises to develop speed combined with legibility and quality to be regularly but not too frequently given. The pupils should now be allowed to develop individuality in style provided that eccentricities are avoided and legibility and speed are maintained.

STANDARD VII (FORM III).

LANGUAGE :---

(a) Oral.—Prepared lecturettes to be given by pupils to their own and other classes. Reproduction of information gathered in private study. Debates and discussions on current topics on books read, and on matters of class instruction.

(b) Written.—Work of more advanced character with regard to correctness in form, originality of thought and expression and logical arrangement. The writing of verse and original stories still to be encouraged. Letterwriting: correct style and form of address for different correspondents. Precis - writing and formal business correspondence. Advertisements and replies thereto. Applications for appointments. 17

(c) Formal Language.—The study of grammar extended only so far as it applies to language generally. Analysis of sentences into clauses and phrases. Synthesis to correspondence. Study of normal order of words and of inversion. Principle of suspense. The unity of the paragraph. Study and imitation of good models. Figures of speech : simile, metaphor, personification, alliteration. Rules of syntax. Further study of metre and rhyme.

LITERATURE.—The reading and appreciation of at least two English classics, one prose and one verse. In addition, a book of selected literary extracts may be studied. Characteristics of good prose and poetry to be further studied, with recitation of selected passages. General reading of good books to be encouraged. Oral reading should be expected to show a higher stage of elocutionary skill.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE (OPTIONAL).

LATIN (alternative with French).—Reading of easy continuous passages of prose—e.g., Cæsar's Invasion of Britain. Elementary exercises in Latin grammar.

FRENCH (alternative with Latin).—Elementary exercises taught by the direct method. Simple conversational French. Attention to be given to correct pronunciation. Reading of easy continuous passages. Pupils at the end of the first year should have a knowledge of the formation of plural forms of nouns and the feminine forms of nouns and adjectives, the pronouns, the indicative and imperative of the four conjugations, and some of the irregular verbs.

ARITHMETIC.

INTRODUCTION.

The principal aims of the teacher of this subject should be— (1) To secure mechanical accuracy in every class.

- (2) To make the teaching practical, so that school arithmetic may be related as closely as possible to the arithmetic required in
 - everyday life.

(3) To provide an introduction to elementary mathematics.

Throughout the course the teacher should frequently diagnose the difficulties of individual pupils and adopt special methods to enable the pupil to overcome them. The mere tedious repetition of tables is a most unintelligent way of securing mechanical accuracy. Repetition is necessary, but it should be intelligent repetition that will lead the child to concentrate upon those special difficulties he has in memorizing the fundamental facts of arithmetic.

Practical work should form an essential part of the teaching, and should include the handling of coins and the use of familiar measuring-apparatus —e.g., the foot rule, kitchen balance, pint and quart measures — and the teacher should devise problems arising out of the practical exercises. The mere use of the measures without the application to practical problems is not of very much service. The child must be led to feel that arithmetic is a real thing—that it belongs to everyday life. No doubt some of the instruction will anticipate life situations that do not come within the experience of the schoolboy, but it is not thought desirable or reasonable to restrict the operations to such as are confined to the school and home life of the pupil. In many instances, although he has no direct association with such financial matters as "payment of taxes" and the "profit and loss" transactions of a storekeeper, yet such matters are frequently common talk in the home, and it is desirable that the pupil should in some measure anticipate the experiences of later life.

The syllabus is set down in considerable detail. There is much repetition from class to class, a repetition which is intentional in order that pupils shall become acquainted by easy stages with important principles in arithmetic, and proficient in their application.

It is not considered that in any class more than four hours per week should be devoted to the subject. In order to keep within this limit the head teacher may with the approval of the Inspector distribute the work differently or omit certain portions. At the same time, pupils who show marked ability in the subject may undertake part of the work set down for the next higher class.

At the discretion of the head teacher, girls of Standards V and VI who take needlework may be exempted from elementary mathematics.

ARITHMETIC.

PREPARATORY DIVISION:

In this division all the instruction should be as concrete as possible, and closely associated with the play interests of the pupils. Formality in the earlier stages is to be avoided, and while memorization is to be accurate the amount required should not be excessive. The following syllabus of work is set out as for four divisions, but the teacher is at liberty to rearrange the work in any way that suits his particular school, provided that such rearrangement meets with the approval of the Inspector. With like approval the teacher may omit all formal lessons in number in this division, but this course is not advised.

Class P.1.—In this class no formal instruction in number should be given. Pupils should, however, be afforded opportunity to develop some conception of number through stories and play activities in which there is free access to varied and suitable materials—*e.g.*, blocks, beads, sticks, &c. To assist this development the teacher should take advantage of such opportunities as arise in rhythmic exercises, kindergarten games, naturestudy, and other lessons.

Class P.2.—At this stage there should be no excessive formality in the lessons, and the teacher need not restrict the teaching of number to a special period on the time-table, but should continue to use such opportunities as arise in the rhythmic exercises, kindergarten games, nature-study lessons. The pupils should have free access to suitable material—e.g., playing-bricks, marbles, beads, shells, balls, sticks. The pupils should learn to count actual objects to 10—first by ones, and then by twos. Addition of small groups e.g., 3 plus 4—with the corresponding subtraction of one of the groups. Practice in the addition of equal groups, leading to the counting of the equal groups, and thus to first ideas of multiplication and division. The instruction should be mainly oral, but figures may be taught, and, at the discretion of the teacher, simple practical problems may be solved through play activities or by means of pictures. If number facts are expressed by means of figures, only the plus sign should be used. Class P.3.—Counting actual objects by ones, twos, threes, fours, &c.,

Class P.3.—Counting actual objects by ones, twos, threes, fours, &c., to 15. Further progress in the written expression of number facts. Simple problems as prescribed for P.2, but suited to the stage now reached. All instruction must be concrete in character. Memorization of simple number facts suitably arranged.

Class P.4.—Counting actual objects by ones, twos, threes, fours, &c., to 20. Further training of a concrete character in the four rules applied to numbers not exceeding 20. Simple problems along with the memorizing of number facts.

STANDARD I.

In this class the work should be mainly oral, but some written exercises should be given, provided these are kept strictly within the scope of the syllabus. Concrete methods of instruction should be made use of in much the same way as in the Preparatory Division. Where the organization permits, about three-quarters of the total time allotted to arithmetic should be devoted to practical and mental exercises.

1. Numeration and notation to 100.

2. Addition.—

- (a) Two-figure combinations to 9 + 9 = 18 to be thoroughly memorized.
 - (b) Extensions of above to 100: e.g., 5 + 4 = 9, 25 + 4 = 29, 5 + 24 = 29.
 - (c) Addition of a single column of not more than eight figures, or a double column of not more than four lines.

3. Subtraction.—To be taught in association with addition—that is, by the method of complementary addition. Combination to 18 - 9 = 9 to be made automatic. No numbers in written exercises to exceed 100.

4. Multiplication.—The portions of the tables (twos to twelves) with products less than 100 to be thoroughly memorized. Oral and written exercises of the type $7 \times 8 + 4$ (eight sevens plus four) to be included.

5. Division.—To be taught in association with multiplication; separate tables not to be used. Division with remainders not to exceed the limits of the multiplication table.

6. Fractions.—Practical and applied knowledge of the following fractional parts: one-half, one-third, one-quarter, one-fifth, one-sixth, one-eighth, one-tenth, and one-twelfth. Very simple examples of equivalence of fractions —e.g., one-half equals two-quarters or four-eighths, illustrated by concrete work only. 7. Money.—Practical knowledge of the following coins--penny, "threepence, sixpence, shilling, florin, half-crown--and their relations to one another.

8. Mensuration.—Relation of the inch to the foot, introduced by the use of the foot rule. Pupils should be required to estimate by the eye short distances expressed in feet, yards, or inches, such as (a) the length in inches of a lead-pencil or other object not more than a foot in length; (b) the length of the desk in feet; (c) the length of the room in yards or in feet. Conversion of yards to feet, feet to inches, in separate operations, and vice versa, the limits of the multiplication table being observed.

9. Written Exercises.—Written work to correspond with the above, but to be of a simple and straightforward character. Oral work should predominate. Problems solved orally should be simple and connected with the pupils' interests at home or at school.

STANDARD II.

Much time should still be given to oral arithmetic, and particularly to the memorizing of addition and multiplication tables. As in previous classes, concrete methods of instruction should predominate, and both the practical exercises and the problems set should lead the pupil to understand the application of number to such life situations as he meets with in his games and in his home duties. Where the organization permits, practical and mental arithmetic should occupy about two-thirds of the total time devoted to the subject.

1. Numeration and notation to 1,000. Roman notation to XII for clock-reading.

2. Addition :---

(a) Extension of addition combinations to be taken orally to 100: e.g., 6+9=15; and to include such as the following: 26+24, 19+37.

(b) One column of twelve figures; two and three columns of five figures. Totals not to exceed 1,000.

3. Subtraction.—Written subtraction in all its forms within the limits of 1,000 to be taught by the method of complementary addition.

4. Multiplication.—Tables to 12 times 12. Short multiplication by numbers not greater than 12; products not to exceed 1,000.

5. Division.—Short division with divisors not greater than 12; dividends not to exceed 1,000.

6. Fractions. — Practical knowledge of fractional parts extended to include $\frac{3}{4}$, $\frac{3}{8}$, $\frac{5}{8}$, $\frac{7}{8}$. Easy examples of equivalence of fractions : e.g., $\frac{3}{4} = \frac{6}{8}$.

7. Mensuration.—Practical exercises in measuring in inches, feet, and yards, and with pint and quart measures, and the pound weight. Judging distances, weight, and capacity within the scope of the practical exercises. Exercises in converting yards to feet, feet to inches, and vice versa, similar to those prescribed for Standard I.

8. Problems.-Still to be confined to one process.

9. Money.—The four operations involving no sum greater than £10 (halfpence and farthings excluded). All common coins, as well as the pound note and the ten-shilling note, to be recognized. Practical shopping problems, including the giving of change out of sums not exceeding £1 (farthings and halfpence to be excluded).

STANDARD III.

By the time the pupils have completed the work set down for this class they should have thoroughly mastered all the fundamental operations in other words, the operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division within the scope of the syllabus should have become automatic. At the same time, the work should be predominantly practical in character. Practical and mental arithmetic should occupy approximately half the total time given to the subject.

1. Numeration and notation to 100,000.

2. Simple rules.—

- (a) Tables: All tables of Standard I and Standard II to be thoroughly revised, with special attention to the eradication of individual weaknesses.
- (b) Addition : Limited to three columns of seven figures; four columns of five figures.
- (c) Subtraction: Numbers not to exceed 100,000.
- (d) Multiplication : Long multiplication by numbers not exceeding 100, and by factors not greater than 12.
- (e) Division : Long division by numbers of not more than two figures. In the earlier examples no digit is to be greater than 5. Division by factors not required.

3. Compound Rules .- The four rules applied to calculations involving sums of money not exceeding £100 (farthings excluded in all examples and halfpence excluded when the sum of money contains pounds). Multipliers and divisors not to exceed 12. Reduction of pounds to shillings and pence, and vice versa. Extension of practical exercises in handling money as in shopping transactions, no sum greater than £1 being used. Short methods of calculation applied to simple household accounts -e.g., easy examples of the dozen and the score rules, easy aliquot parts, half-crowns table.

4. Fractions.-Halves, thirds, quarters, eighths, tenths, twelfths, and twentieths to be known concretely, and applied to examples involving not more than one denomination, as well as to single objects—e.g., $\frac{2}{3}$ of £16, but not $\frac{3}{3}$ of £17 or $\frac{3}{3}$ of £16 10s. Very easy practical exercises in addition and subtraction: e.g., $\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{4}$, $1 - \frac{3}{4}$, $\frac{7}{8} - \frac{1}{2}$.

5. Measures.-

- (a) Length : Relative values of mile and chain ; chain and yard. (b) Weight: Relative values of ton and hundredweight; pound
- and ounce.
- (c) Time: Relative values of year and calendar months; week and day; day and hour; hour and minute.
- (d) Capacity: Relative values of gallon, quart, pint.

All the above to be learnt as far as possible from actual measurement. Not more than two denominations to be used in any example. Easy exercises in judging distance, weight, and capacity.

6. Mensuration.-Construction of squares and rectangles from definite measurements. Graphical method of measuring areas of these; only whole numbers to be used.

7. Problems .--- To be confined to two processes in simple rules, and one process in compound rules, weights, and measures.

STANDARD IV,

Exercises to secure the maximum degree of mechanical accuracy should still be given, but it should be possible in this class to give greater attention to practical and applied arithmetic. At least one-third of the time should be devoted to practical and mental arithmetic. Pupils should be taught to set out their written work neatly and methodically. They should also be able to make an oral statement of processes employed in mental and written arithmetic.

1. Numeration and notation to 1,000,000.

2. Simple rules.-

- (a) Continued revision of all tables and practice in exercises designed to secure mechanical accuracy in straightforward calculations.
- (b) Addition : Limited to three columns of eight figures, four columns of six figures, and five columns of five figures.
- (c) Subtraction: Numbers not to exceed 1,000,000.
- (d) Multiplication: Multipliers not to exceed three figures and product not to exceed 1,000,000.
- (e) Division: Divisors not to exceed three figures, except in the case of the three numbers 1760, 2240, 4840: Dividend not to exceed 1,000,000.

3. Compound Rules.—The four rules to be extended, the largest sum in any example not to exceed $\pounds 1,000$ (farthings excluded in all examples, halfpence excluded when the sum of money contains pounds). Long multiplication and division by numbers not greater than 99. Only examples likely to be found in common use to be given. Easy household accounts; short methods to be used where applicable. Simple practice to be taught only as a quick substitute for multiplication : involved and unpractical examples to be excluded.

4. Fractions.---Meaning of proper fractions with denominators---

- (a) 2, 4, 8, 16. (b) 3, 6, 12.
- (c) 5, 10, 20.

The relationships in the several groups $(e.g., \frac{2}{4} = \frac{8}{16})$ to be learned by practical work. Addition and subtraction are to be confined to two fractions in any one of the groups (a), (b), (c) above : $e.g., \frac{3}{4} + \frac{5}{8}$ or $\frac{2}{5} + \frac{3}{10}$, not $\frac{5}{8} + \frac{3}{10}$. Multiplication of a whole number by a proper fraction, and vice versa. Division to be excluded.

5. Decimals.—The decimals 0.1 to 0.9 to be taught practically by the measurement and the setting-out of lines in inches and tenths, and to be known as equivalents of vulgar fractions with denominator 10. Practice

in measuring lines in inches and tenths, and in adding the measurements together. Subtraction of decimals within the limits prescribed.

6. *Measures.*—The following weights and measures to be known from actual use as far as possible, and applied to easy exercises :—

- (a) Weight : Ton, hundredweight, quarter, stone, pound, ounce.
- (b) Length : Mile, furlong, chain, link, yard, foot, inch.
 (c) Area : Acre, square chain, square yard, square foot, square inch.
- (d) Capacity: Gallon, quart, pint, bushel, as dry measure with approximate weight.
- (e) Time: Year, calendar month, week, day, hour, minute, second.

Reduction of weights and measures, as well as exercises in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division as applied to weights to be restricted to three denominations, calculations and combinations that are not commonly used in real transactions being excluded.

(NOTE.—The application of the four rules to measures of length, area, capacity, and time are not included, except in practical exercises.)

7. Mensuration.—

- (a) Construction to measurement of the following geometrical figures: square, oblong, right-angled triangle, equilateral and isosceles triangle, circle.
- (b) Measurement of area of square, rectangle, and right-angled triangle, the length of each side being expressed in one denomination only, the area occasionally in two. The pupils must be able to demonstrate practically the method of calculating area.
- (c) Measurement of the perimeter of the straight-lined figures given in (a) above, and of the circumference of circular objects such as a penny.

STANDARD V (FORM I).

Prominence should be given to practical and mental arithmetic, the former to include individual practice in weighing and measuring and in the solving of problems based on the practical work. In no part of the subject should operations be introduced that have no counterpart in the actual affairs of life. Cumbersome computations and involved problems are not to be given. Short methods of calculations to be used wherever possible. All girls who are taught needlework may be exempted from the prescription in symbolical expression and practical geometry. An optional additional section on elementary mathematics has been added for the benefit of the more advanced pupils.

1. Mechanical Operations.—Further drill in tables and further oral exercises to secure quickness and accuracy in computation. Numeration and notation to millions. Tests of divisibility by 2 and 4, 3 and 9, 5 and 25, 10 and 100. Factorization involving only prime numbers to 11.

2. Decimals.—Practical illustrations of tenths and hundredths. Four operations in decimals to hundredths only. Multipliers and divisors to be integers only. Conversion of vulgar fractions (with denominators 2, 4, 5, 10, 20, 25, 50, 100) to decimals, and of decimals of one or two figures to vulgar fractions. Simple applications to concrete examples—e.g., expression of shillings as decimals of £1, and vice versa.

3. Fractions.—The four operations, excluding complex fractional expressions in which more than one sign is used : e.g., $7\frac{4}{5}$ of $\frac{10}{18} - 1\frac{7}{11}$. Cancelling to be freely used; denominators in general to be confined to numbers commonly occurring—e.g., from 2 to 12, also 16, 20. The expression of one quantity as the fraction of another quantity. L.C.M. only so far as needed in the addition and subtraction of fractions. Prime factors of numbers to 30.

4. Business Arithmetic.—Finding the percentage values $2\frac{1}{2}$, 5, 10, $12\frac{1}{2}$, 25 per cent. of a certain quantity, and also within the same limits, finding the percentage one quantity is of another. Calculation of the value of quantities of a certain commodity; farthings to be included, but not along with shillings or pounds. The method of "practice" to be limited to money, and to not more than three easy aliquot parts. Calculation of wages at rates per hour. Method of making out and receipting tradesmen's bills and calculating discounts thereon, the rate of discount to be only $2\frac{1}{2}$, or 5, or 10 per cent., calculated on the pounds only.

5. Simple Proportion.—The solving of easy practical problems by the unitary or fractional method.

6. Mensuration.—The mensuration of a simple rectangular area as far as possible from actual measurements. The rood, the square chain, and the square pole to be known as fractional parts of the acre. Areas of land to be expressed in acres, roods, and square poles. The relative values of the cubic foot and the cubic inch, and of the cubic yard and cubic foot to be demonstrated by models.

(NOTE.—Problems in carpeting and papering rooms are excluded.)

7. Practical Geometry.—To be taught in association with practical mensuration, instrumental drawing, and other subjects—e.g., geography.

- (a) Measurement of angles, such as the altitude of the sun and the angle travelled by the hand of a clock. Right angle. Circle.
- (b) Drawing a post and its shadow to scale of 1 in. = 1 ft. or $\frac{1}{2}$ in. = 1 ft.
- (c) Simple exercises in construction and measurement of lines to tenths of an inch, and angles to degrees, including obtuse and acute angles.
- (d) Areas of squares, rectangles, right-angled triangles, and the square-measure table demonstrated from drawings either to scale or actual size.
- (e) Geometrical method of bisecting a line and an angle, of drawing a perpendicular to a given straight line, and of constructing an angle equal to a given angle, and of drawing a straight line parallel to another.

8. Symbolical Expression.—Such elementary notions of the equational forms and their application and of the correct use of signs as may be necessary to or developed from the arithmetic already done, especially the ability to set out correctly in equation form data and inferences derived therefrom — e.g., in the statement of equivalents as in tables $7 \times 5 = 35$, and exercises in fractions $1\frac{3}{4} + 2\frac{7}{8} = 4\frac{5}{8}$, in stating the area or perimeter of a rectangle, A = lb; P = 2(l + b); where l = length and b = breadth, and in the unitary method.

OPTIONAL ADDITIONAL MATHEMATICS FOR ADVANCED STANDARD V PUPILS.

1. Algebra.—

(a) The compulsory prescription for Standard VI under the heading of "Symbolical Expression,"—viz., meaning of equations, use of algebraic signs, substitutions.

(b) Very easy exercises in the four rules.

2. Practical Geometry.—The compulsory prescription for Standard VI in practical geometry.

STANDARD VI (FORM II).

Prominence should be given to practical and mental arithmetic, the former to include individual practice in weighing and measuring and in the solving of problems based on the practical work. In no part of the subject should operations be introduced that have no counterpart in the actual affairs of life. Cumbersome computations and involved problems are not to be given. Short methods of calculations to be used wherever possible. All girls who are taught needlework may be exempted from the prescription in symbolical expression and practical geometry. An optional additional section on elementary mathematics has been added for the benefit of the more advanced pupils.

1. Decimals.—The four operations to three places of decimals. Extension beyond three places is permissible only when some practical situation demands it—e.g., finding the area of a field the measurements of which are given in chains and links. The reduction of one quantity to the decimal of another quantity, as well as the conversion of a decimalized quantity into the ordinary denominations or measures. The use of decimals should be encouraged, and the pupils trained, in making his calculations, to decimalize quantities rather than to use cumbrous vulgar fractions.

2. Vulgar Fractions.—Somewhat harder operations of the same type as for Standard V, excluding cumbrous fractions and complex expressions, but including those of the form $\frac{1\frac{1}{2}}{1\frac{1}{3}}$. The fraction one quantity is of another to be freely used in solving problems, particularly as a short substitute for the unitary method. 3. Commercial Transactions.-

- (a) Percentages applied to problems in simple interest where the principal is a whole number of pounds, tradesmen's discount, commission charges, insurance, direct cases of profit and loss. The use of percentages in rural arithmetic-e.g., percentage of lambs in a flock, of butterfat, of germinated seed.
- (b) Simple cash account showing receipts and payments, as, for example, in the case of a school cricket or football club.
- (c) Simple direct calculations in connection with bankruptcies, rates, taxes.
- (d) Simple exercises in sharing of profits; method of proportional parts.
- (e) Short methods of calculation in common use in commercial houses.
- (f) Easy and direct calculations in converting American dollars to sterling, and vice versa.
- 4. Mensuration.
 - (a) Area of rectangles and triangles (length of base and height of apex from base always given). Problems based thereon. Carpeting floors and papering walls and ceilings to be excluded, but painting the walls of a house to be included. All work to be of a practical nature and to be illustrated by diagrams.
 - (b) Square root and its application to simple problems in mensuration.
 - (c) Volumes of rectangular objects only.
 - (d) The circle : relation of circumference to diameter ; area.

5. Symbolical Expression.

(a) The meaning of an algebraical equation introduced as a method of stating easy sums used in the lower classes:

6 + x = 15. What is x equal to ? $5 \times y = 20.$ What is y equal to ?

(b) Construction and interpretation of formulae as leading up to easy substitutions—e.g., in mensuration. (i) In a square P = 4x, $A = x^2$ (where P is the

- perimeter, A the area, and x the length of side).
- (ii) In a rectangle P = 2x + 2y or 2 (x + y), A = xy(where x is the length and y the breadth).
- (iii) In a cube $A = 6x^2$ and $V = x^3$ (where V is the volume).

In the exercises in substitution the ordinary algebraic signs to be used as far as they can be illustrated in the arithmetic of this standard.

6. Practical Geometry,-

- (a) Drawing of easy diagrams related to the work in mensuration.
- (b) Drawing of lineal and block graphs for illustrative purposes in connection with such matters as temperature, barometric
 - pressure, rainfall, value or amount of products of a country.
- (c) The use of the 3-4-5 device in plotting a right angle.
- (d) Demonstration of the following by measurement :
 - (i) If one straight line stands on another straight line, the sum of the adjacent angles equals two right angles.
 - (ii) If two straight lines intersect, the vertically opposite angles are equal.
 - (iii) Any two sides of a triangle are together greater than the third side.
 - (iv) The angles at the base of an isosceles triangle are equal and all the angles of an equilateral triangle are equal.
 - (v) The greatest side of every triangle has the greatest angle opposite to it, and conversely.
 - (vi) If a straight line intersects two parallel straight lines the alternate angles are equal, the corresponding angles are equal, and the two interior angles on the same side of the intersecting line are together equal to two right angles.

- (vii) The sum of the interior angles of a parallelogram is equal to four right angles.
- (viii) The opposite angles of a parallelogram are equal and the opposite sides are equal.
- (ix) Of all straight lines that can be drawn to a given straight line from an external point, the perpendicular is the shortest.
- (x) In any right-angled triangle the square on the side opposite the right angle is equal in area to the sum of the squares on the sides containing the right angle (Pythagoras' theorem).

OPTIONAL ADDITIONAL ELEMENTARY MATHEMATICS FOR STANDARD VI ADVANCED PUPILS.

1. Algebra.-

(a) Compulsory prescription for S. VII-viz., equations, symbolic formulæ, substitutions, the four rules.

(b) More difficult simple equations.

(c) Easy fractions.

(d) Easiest binomial factors.

Practical Geometry.-The compulsory prescription in practical geometry for S. VII.

STANDARD VII (FORM III).

The aims in this class should be (a) to enable the pupils to perform readily and accurately all the arithmetical calculations commonly needed in farm and commercial occupations; (b) to make the pupils acquainted with the manner in which arithmetic is used in the ordinary affairs of life; and (c) to give the pupils some knowledge of algebra as generalized arithmetic and of the practical uses of geometry. 1. General Arithmetic.—Extended long tots and calculations involving

the use of larger numbers than in previous standards. H.C.F. and L.C.M. more fully treated. Vulgar fractions, but no involved calculations or complicated fractions. Decimals completed. The meaning of a recurring decimal.

2. Business Arithmetic.-Including that prescribed for previous classes-(a) Simple stocks and shares.

- (b) Compound interest, to find only interest and amount over short periods.
- (c) More difficult example of rates and taxes, of profit and loss, and of trade discount.
- (d) Simple cash accounts and balance-sheets.
- (e) Conversion of pounds shillings and pence to dollars, and to francs, and vice versa. (f) Simple methods of "costing."

(g) The meaning of the following terms and forms should be understood : Invoice, promissory note, bills of exchange, banker's discount, cheque, bank-note.

3. Farm and Industrial Arithmetic.-Simple problems relating to value of wool-clip, comparison of value of dairy cows, cost of fencing, strength of dipping and spraying mixtures, measurement and cost of timber for various operations.

4. Mensuration.--As prescribed for previous classes, but with more difficult examples. Mensuration of the circle, cylinder, and of trapezium and triangle, as used in the calculation of areas of paddocks from surveyor's field-book entries, and in calculating the capacities of, say, a tank or a sheep-Measurement and cost of timber. dip.

5. Metric Measurements .- Common metric measures of length, weight, volume, capacity, simply treated in relation to the practical problems met with in the science lessons.

6. Graphical Arithmetic.-Extension of the work of Standard VI, including thermographs, barographs, simple statistical graphs of different kinds.

7. Algebra.—Simple equations and symbolic formulæ connected with arithmetic continued. Further work in substitutions already touched on in Standard VI. Graphical representation of positive and negative quantities. Easy exercises in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

8. Practical Geometry.-

(a) Graphical solution of practical problems in geometry, such as finding height of tree, width of stream, setting out tenniscourt or ornamental garden-plots.

- (b) Construct and cut out two triangles which have the two sides and the included angle equal. By measurement and calculation, and also by superimposing, prove equality in all respects-viz., area, other side, and other angles.
- (c) Any two sides of a triangle are together greater than the third side.
- (d) (i) If one side of a triangle is produced, the exterior angle is greater than either of the interior opposite angles.
 - (ii) The exterior angle is equal to the sum of the two interior opposite angles.
 - (iii) The sum of the three angles of any triangle is equal to two right angles.
 - (iv) Any two angles of a triangle are together less than two right angles.
 - (v) A triangle cannot have more than one right angle.
- (e) Construction of pentagon, hexagon, and octagon, and measure-ment of the interior angles of each. The geometrical figures that lend themselves to the formation of a pavement.
- (f) The diagonals of a parallelogram bisect each other.
- (g) The straight line joining the middle points of two sides of a triangle is parallel to the base and equal to half the base.
- (h) If in a triangle a straight line is drawn parallel to the base through the middle point of one side it bisects the other side, hence lead to the method of dividing a given straight line into any given number of equal parts.
- (i) The area of a parallelogram is-
 - (i) Equal to the area of a rectangle on the same base and between the same parallels. (ii) Double the area of a triangle on the same base and
 - between the same parallels.

ADDITIONAL MATHEMATICS (OPTIONAL).

1. Algebra.-The following course constitutes about half the programme outlined in the Department's syllabus for the Intermediate and P.S.E. Examinations :

- (a) Fundamental operations.
- (b) Easy fractions.
- (c) Factors of expressions that are the product of two binomial factors. Factors of such expressions as $a^3 + b^3$.
- (d) Common multiples and divisors to correspond.
- (e) Simple equations involving one or two unknown quantities.

(f) Easy problems.

2. Geometry.-The following has been selected from the programme in Geometry as prescribed for the Intermediate and Public Service Examinations. No theoretical proofs required in Part I but only in Part II. The truth of the theorems in Part I should be established by intuition and experiment, and the teaching of formal geometry should be based on the acceptance of these theorems. Part I--

- (a) If a straight line stands on another straight line, the sum of the adjacent angles so formed is equal to two right angles, and the converse.
- (b) When a straight line cuts two other straight lines, if a pair of corresponding angles are equal, the two straight lines are parallel; and the converse.
- (c) When a straight line cuts two other straight lines, if (i) a pair of alternate angles are equal, or (ii) a pair of interior angles on the same side of the cutting lines are supplementary, then
- the two straight lines are parallel; and the converse. (d) Straight lines which are parallel to the same straight line are parallel to one another.
- (e) If two triangles have two sides of the one equal to two sides of the other, each to each, and also the angles included by those sides equal, the triangles are congruent.
- (f) If two triangles have three sides of the one equal to three sides of the other, each to each, the triangles are congruent.

Part II. section 1-

- (a) The sum of the angles of a triangle is equal to two right angles. (b) If two sides of a triangle are equal, the angles opposite those sides
- are equal; and the converse.
- (c) If two sides of a triangle are unequal, the greater side has the greater angle opposite to it; and the converse.

- (d) Of all straight lines that can be drawn to a given straight line from a given point outside it, the perpendicular is the shortest.
- (e) To bisect a given angle.
- (f) To bisect a given straight line.
- (g) To construct a perpendicular to a given straight line (i) from a given point in the line, and (ii) from a given point outside the line.
- (h) To construct an angle equal to a given angle.

3. How to fold for various-sized envelopes.

4. Addressing envelopes.

5. Letters: (a) Business or commercial. (b) Formal or official. (c) Informal. (d) Examples of orders, requests, thanks, explanations, inquiries, replies to advertisements with the object of teaching (1) brevity, (2) clearness, and (3) force. Good and poor opening and closing paragraphs compared. Words to be avoided. Official and business letters compared.

6. Memoranda. Telegrams.

7. Postal and telegraphic charges. Postage-books.

8. Remittances: (a) Acknowledgment of delivery form and its use. (b) Registered letters. (c) Stamps; postal orders; money-orders (ordinary, domestic, and telegraphic); cheques, bank-notes, and bank drafts. (d) Cost and occasions on which to use each method.

9. Banks: (a) Savings and commercial compared. (b) Current and deposit accounts. (c) Bank pass-book and deposit-slips. (d) Cheque-books, cheques (bearer, order, and crossed); different kinds of crossings. Over-drafts.

10. Elementary Book-keeping: The nature and form of accounts; the explanation of simple commercial terms, such as debit, credit, balance, profit (gross and net), interest, discount, commission, insurance, assets, liabilities, capital, bad debts, balance-sheet, invoices, receipt, voucher, cheque, bill of exchange, taught as practically as possible.

HISTORY.

INTRODUCTION.

The programme of work for the various standard classes is intended to be suggestive, and is not to be regarded as compulsory. In Standard II the stories are closely related to the fairy-stories and myths which the youngest children find so attractive. In Standard III the stories are stories of real people and actual incidents in British history. In Standard IV the treatment is more systematic, and the pupil is led to see that the growth of the nation has followed definite lines and has been gradual and continuous. The topical method of treatment, with a certain amount of repetition and more intensive study of the growth of the nation, is continued in Standard V. In Standard VI the aim is to give the pupil a clear conception of the way the Empire has been built up and the British system of government developed. The fact that Britain has had contact with other countries and has been deeply influenced by foreign affairs has not been ignored, but has for the most part been left for fuller treatment in the post-primary schools. New Zealand history and stories connected with the life of the Maoris have been introduced into the syllabus for the first time. Every New Zealand child should know something of the history of his own town, district, and province, thus enriching his store of stirring detail and adding reality to the whole study of history. Most parts of the country are rich in historical incidents, and these both the teacher and pupil should take a pride in seeking out and recording.

Throughout the scheme the aims have been to make the pupils acquainted with the history of their own country, and to show that, while wars have undoubtedly played their part in the development of the nation, the story of the British people contains much that is of infinitely more importance than battles. Whatever ideas a teacher embodies in his scheme, whatever principles guide his selection of topics, he should aim to develop in his pupils love of country, and pride in the deeds of famous men and women. Patriotism has its roots in the love and respect the pupil has for his home and his school, and he must be so taught that it shall be his joy and pride to play his part, however humble it may be, in the advancement of New Zealand and the Empire, and in the promotion of peace, well-being, and happiness among the nations. Teachers of grouped classes should either take the prescription for each class in alternate years, or arrange a two-year course by selecting topics from both prescriptions.

STANDARD II.

The presentation of the stories required for Standard II should be simple, direct, and personal. The appeal to visualization should be assisted by pictures and by suitable correlation with drawing and handwork, or any means that will arouse the interest and curiosity of the pupil. The selection of topics should include—

1. Tales of the Maoris.

2. Myths and legends of any great nations.

3. Romantic stories of great men and women stimulating to such virtues as kindness and consideration for others, courage, industry, and respect for law.

The following list is only suggestive, and is not intended to restrict the teacher's choice: The story of Maui. The story of Kupe. Hinemoa and Tutanekai. Local or general Maori legends. Wanderings of Ulysses. King Midas. St. George and the Dragon. Tales of Hercules. The Golden Fleece. Hero and Leander. Romulus and Remus. The Trojan horse. The geese that saved Rome. Leonidas and his Spartans. Horatius at the bridge. King Arthur and the Round Table. King Arthur's sword. The English slave children. King Alfred and the cakes. The White Ship. Richard Lionheart and his page. Robin Hood. King Bruce and the spider. Joan of Arc. Henry V and the Judge. William Tell. The boyhood of Nelson. H.M.S. "Victory." The "Lady of the Lamp." Grace Darling. Our Prince of Wales.

STANDARD III.

The aim in this standard should be to arouse interest in great names and important events, thus providing a foundation of historical fact which can be built upon as the study of the subject proceeds. Suitable correlation should be effected, especially with geography and handwork; history dramatization should be utilized; and the use and construction of simple pictorial time-charts demonstrated. A selection to be made from each of the following:—

1. Stories from Local History.—Founding of the town or district.

3. Stories from World History.—The early Britons—comparison with the early Maoris. Julius Caesar and the Roman soldiers. The work of the Romans in Britain. Boadicea—the Druids. Introduction of Christianity. The Vikings. Alfred the Great. Canute. Battle of Hastings. A Norman castle. Richard Coeur de Lion. The first Prince of Wales. Robert Bruce. Bruce's heart. Joan of Arc. Caxton and the printing-press. Columbus and Vasco da Gama. Drake's voyages. The Armada. Sir Walter Raleigh. The "Mayflower." An English King beheaded. The Great Plague. The Great Fire of London. George Washington. Bonnie Prince Charlie. The story of Nelson. Abel Tasman and Captain Cook. George Stephenson. Abolition of slavery. Florence Nightingale. Charge of the Light Brigade. Abraham Lincoln. General Gordon. David Livingstone. Samuel Marsden. Captain Scott. Dr. Barnado. Westminster Abbey. Heroic incidents in the Great War. Our King. Anzac Day.

4. Citizenship.—Very elementary lessons based on the pupils' own experiences—e.g., School club. Subscriptions to club funds. Captain of club. Club rules. School rules. Laws we all obey. The postman. The policeman. The control of traffic—the rule of the road, "safety first" rules. Things that belong to us all—parks, &c. Care of public property. Respect for other people's property. Conduct in the street, train, tram, &c. The flag.

STANDARD IV.

In this class a more systematic treatment of the subject is expected. Disconnected lessons now give place to the selection of topics that show how the people and their manner of life change from period to period. The teacher should guard against treating the subjects in too much detail. A selection of lessons from the following :--

1. Local history continued.

2. New Zealand History.—Famous missionaries. Treaty of Waitangi. Famous Governors. An outline of the founding of each province. Some famous Maoris and stirring events connected therewith—Hongi, Te Rau paraha, Hone Heke, Te Kooti. 3. Stories from Australian History.—Early voyagers—Dampier, Tasman, Cook. Early settlements. Growth of settlement. Discovery of gold. Explorers.

4. Life in Early England.—The castles and the industries carried on round them. Why now no walled towns or strong castles. The monasteries —how the poor are helped nowadays. Games—e.g., archery, tournaments, the chase; comparison of modern games with those of early England. Houses and modes of travel. Farming.

5. Kings, Barons, and People.—William I and the feudal system. King John and Magna Charta. Crusades. Wars of the Roses. Queen Elizabeth. King Charles I. Queen Victoria. The King now no longer the warriorleader, but the object of respect instead of fear.

6. England and Scotland.—Edward I—Scotland conquered; Wallace and Bruce. Edward II—Scotland lost. Mary Queen of Scots. James I. Queen Anne—England and Scotland united under the name of Great Britain. The Jacobites and the Georges. Queen Victoria and Scotland.

7. Great Sailors and Adventurers.—Columbus; Vasco da Gama; Cabot; Drake; Raleigh; Frobisher; Hudson; Cook; Nelson; Stanley; Scott; Shackleton; Amunsden; Sir Keith Smith.

8. Citizenship.--(All topics to be treated in a very elementary way.) Duty of boys and girls to their school. School rules; town and country by-laws--why we should obey them. General ideas of what a Parliament is; comparison with one or more of the following: School Council, School Committee, Education Board, City or Borough Council, Road Board. The captain of a school club, the Mayor of a town, the Chairman of the School Committee, and the Prime Minister compared. Taxes likened to subscriptions or levies made to carry on the work of a sports club. How boys and girls can be good citizens.

STANDARD V (FORM I).

In this class the suggested scheme aims to give the pupils some insight into European history, and also to show how the power of the English kings was first curbed, and then entirely altered in character; how the power of the baronial class dwindled and the power of the middle industrial class grew; and, lastly, how England became a great colonizing nation. The following are the suggested topics from which a selection may be made :—

1. The History of New Zealand.—Early arrangements for governing New Zealand. The New Zealand Association. Treaty of Waitangi. Sir George Grey. The Maori War in broad outline, but with greater detail in localities near which the war was carried on. Progress of settlement in North and South Islands compared. The goldfields.

2. The Story in Broad Outline of some of the British Reigning Families.— How we came to have Norman Kings. How the Tudors came into power. The Union of the Crowns of England and Scotland. The foundation of the present line of Sovereigns.

3. England and France.—Friends and Allies to-day and in the Great War. England tries to conquer France—Edward III, Henry V. England loses her French possessions. England on the defensive. Napoleon and his attempt to secure world-power. England and France allies in the Crimean War.

4. Struggle for Liberty.—In England—the Civil War; the English Revolution. In France—the French Revolution. The English and French Revolutions compared.

5. Two Attempts to secure World-power. — The Napoleonic Wars. The Great War, with some account of the Franco-Prussian War. Treaty of Versailles, The League of Nations, and Kellog Peace Pact.

6. England a Colonizing Nation.—The voyagers of the Tudor period. The founding of the American colonies—Raleigh's settlement—the Pilgrim Fathers. The French in America—the conquest of Canada—the loss of the American colonies—the present-day friendliness towards America. The founding of our Indian Empire—the trading companies, rivalry with French— Clive, Hastings—Indian Mutiny—Indians in New Zealand, Fiji.

7. Colonization by other European Nations.—The Spanish in the Americas, the French in Canada and India, the Dutch in South and Central Africa, and the Portuguese in India and Africa.

8. Heroes of European History.-Alexander the Great, Charlemagne, Garibaldi.

9. Citizenship.—The meaning of government by the people. Outline of the functions of Parliament. The Prime Minister and Cabinet. Rates and taxes, treated in a very general way and based on information the pupil can gain in his own home. Town and country by-laws with which we should all be familiar.

STANDARD VI (FORM II).

In this class three main lines of study are suggested, apart from New Zealand history — namely, the building-up of the British Empire, the development of the British Constitution, and the growth of British industries. A selection from the following :—

1. The History of New Zealand.—Early Governors of New Zealand. The founding of the provinces. Causes of the Maori Wars. Provincial Governments—historic buildings remaining in provincial capitals. Abolition of provinces and transfer of the capital. Progress in public works and in education. Famous New Zealanders.

2. Development within the Empire .--

- (a) Canada after the Seven Years War: Treatment of the French. War with the United States. Rebellion in 1837. Establishment as Dominion, 1867.
- (b) India after the Mutiny : End of the East India Company. Queen Victoria, Empress of India. Buffer States. Development of education, medical services, &c. Presentday government.
- (c) South Africa: Early settlers. Dutch and English Natal. Orange Free State. Transvaal. Boer War. Botha; Cecil Rhodes. The Union.
- Cecil Rhodes. The Union. (d) Egypt and the Sudan : Suez Canal. Dual control by English and French. Gordon; Mahdi; Kitchener; Cromer. Present-day government.

3. Improvement in Social Welfare.—English and Norman serfs. Labourers in the Middle Ages. The Industrial Revolution. Child-workers in modern times. How the worker is safeguarded to-day. Humanitarian and social work of the League of Nations.

4. The History of Useful Inventions.—Printing; steam-engine; handlooms and the coming of machinery; hydro-electricity; telephone; electric telegraph; motor-car; wireless telegraphy; the conquest of the air; phonograph.

5. The Story of some Great Writers.—Chaucer; Shakespeare; Milton; Goldsmith; Dickens; Scott.

6. The Growth of the British Constitution.—The Great Council under the Saxon and Norman Kings. The first Parliament founded and improved under Plantagenets. Decay of Parliament under the Tudors. The Stuarts . and the final triumph of the people—establishment of constitutional government. The beginnings of party government—establishment of Cabinet. Reform Bill of 1832. The franchise to-day in New Zealand and in England.

7. Citizenship.—How Parliament is elected. The duties and rights of a citizen. Ministers of the Crown—Cabinet. Important Government Departments: Post Office, Railways, Education, Public Works. Where the money for public works comes from. The national debt. Elementary ideas regarding free trade and protection. Public Health. Guardians of law and order, Justices of the Peace, Stipendiary Magistrates, Judges of the Supreme Court. General procedure in the law-courts. The meaning of true citizenship.

STANDARD VII (FORM III).

The aim in this standard is generally to revise and systematize the work of the preceding standards, and to bring the pupil into touch with outstanding world movements or personages of the period from 1603 to the present date. A selection from the following :---

present date. A selection from the following :--1. Revision of the History of New Zealand previously taught. New Zealand's place in the Pacific. Her relations both within and without the Empire.

 $\hat{2}$. Citizenship.—General topics for Standards V and VI treated in greater detail.

3. British History.—Treated in greater detail than in Standards V and VI. The following list is suggested :—

- (a) Progress towards constitutional Monarchy: Causes of dissension between Stuart Kings and Parliament; Divine right; benevolences; monopolies; illegal courts; Church policy-Laud, Petition of Right; Hampden and Pym. Suspending and dispensing powers; Bill of Right. Act of Settlement. Cabinet. Enfranchisement of the people; education. Position of the King and of Governor to-day.
- (b) Consolidation of the British Kingdom; Union of English and Scottish Crowns. Irish policy of James I and Charles I---Plantation of Ulster; Wentworth. Civil War. Restoration. English Revolution, 1688. Union of English, Scottish, and Irish Parliaments. The present situation of Ireland.

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- (c) Growth and development of the Empire: Raleigh; Pilgrim Fathers; Navigation laws—Blake. Marlborough and the Treaty of Utrecht; Gibraltar. Seven Years' War; Pitt, Wolfe, Clive. American War of Independence. British Colonial policy in India, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa; relation of Britain, Egypt, and the Sudan; Suez Canal; Gordon; Kitchener; relation of Dominions and Colonies to the Crown. Imperial Conferences.
- (d) Economic and social progress: Economic Union of England and Scotland. New farming. Industrial revolution—roads, canals, railways, steamships. Abolition of slavery. Child labour; Shaftesbury; Factory Acts. Corn laws and free trade. Recent inventions facilitating transport and communication. Influence of the press. Scientific progress in arts, science, and medicine (more fully than Standard VI)—Pasteur, Lister, &c.
- (e) Foreign movements affecting the British Empire: The French Revolution; the Napoleonic struggle (without minute detail). The Crimean War—the nursing service. Unification of Italy —Cavour; Garibaldi. The American Civil War—Abraham Lincoln. Britain and Japan—changed political importance of the Pacific. Rise of the German Empire—Prussia, Bismarck, and militarism. The Great War. Russia, Tsarism, Revolution. The League of Nations. Mandated territories.
- (f) Projects: Studies in the lighter literature of the period. Biographies of important characters in world history—Edison, &c. Lives of leading statesmen—(a) In England: Walpole, Pitt the younger, Canning, Peel, Palmerston, Gladstone, Beaconsfield, Salisbury; (b) in New Zealand: Grey, Seddon, Massey. Local history as in Standard VI, &c.

GEOGRAPHY.

INTRODUCTION.

One of the main aims in the following syllabus is to broaden and deepen the child's knowledge of and interest in those forces of nature that determine not only man's industries, but also his racial characteristics. As far as possible, the pupil should secure his facts at first hand by a study of the geography in his own neighbourhood, and should learn to apply these facts and principles to the geography of distant lands. Throughout the course it is important that as much outdoor work as possible should be arranged by the teacher. The pupil should be impressed with the interrelation of the different parts of geography. It is important that he should clearly realize the influence of physical conditions on man and his work, that the character of every race depends very largely indeed on physical conditions connected with surface features and climate, and that industries or occupations are interrelated and often interdependent. Even mathematical geography can be shown to have a close relation to the life of the people. The instruction should be as vivid as possible, in order that the pupils may have as clear a conception of life in other lands as they have of life in their own land.

The syllabus is a suggestive one, and is not intended to restrict the teacher's choice. This will depend, firstly, on the nature of the district in which the school is situated, and, secondly, on the manner in which the classes are grouped, if grouped at all, for the instruction. Where classes are grouped, a two-year course of even difficulty should be devised. As in nature-study, so in geography—the pupils should derive their knowledge as far as possible from their own observations and from inferences derived from such observations. All the suggested topics are capable of such simple treatment as to be well within the comprehension of the pupils. However, any topic that appears to the teachers too difficult for the class should be omitted and treated later. Lastly, the order in which the topics are arranged in the syllabus is not necessarily the best order in which the lessons should be given.

STANDARD II.

1. The cardinal points of the compass, taught through the approximate positions of the sun and shadows at midday and at sunrise and sunset. The intermediate points, N.W., N.E., S.W., and S.E. should then be taught. Direction from the school of the pupil's home and of other well-known places; hence first ideas of the use of a map.

2. Direction and character of winds in the school district, and their effect on man and his work. The number of times the wind blows in the course of the month from each direction, its general nature, and whether or not it was accompanied by rain, should be noted. Suitable pictorial weather calendars should be kept.

3. The formation of the clouds and rain to be taught experimentally. The following clouds should be known to the pupils: "Heap" (cumulus), "feather" (cirrus), and "rain" (nimbus) clouds.

4. Phenomena connected with rain—namely, water seeking the lowest level, and hence gathering in gutters or channels; the power of water to suspend particles of soil; the power of running water to move stones; the effect of this on the land over which the water runs. Inconvenience and sometimes danger of land-slides to travellers by road and by rail.

5. Land and water shapes to be taught by showing actual examples or by making models in the playground or in the sand-tray. Mountain, hill, valley, plain, island, lake, ocean. Simple map (not to scale) of streams, of model or real lake and island, of schoolroom, of playground, to be drawn by pupils. Influence of land shapes on man and his work—for example, sheep-farming on hilly country, crop-growing on plains. Man's work on seas and lakes. The scenic beauty of lakes, rivers, and mountains, with special reference to places in New Zealand.

6. Simple lessons on peoples of our own and other lands—e.g., Maoris and Europeans; Australian blacks; Negroes; Red Indians; Eskimos and Laplanders; Chinese and Japanese. Interesting animals of other countries. The lessons might include stories of a more or less historical character, showing, for example, the relation of negroes to slavery, Red Indians to the spread of American civilization, Maoris to other South-Sea-Island peoples. 7. Talks on some of the things brought into the home from far-off lands.

7. Talks on some of the things brought into the home from far-off lands. In country schools the pupils should note the occupations of the people of the district and the products that are sent away. In the case of town and city children some of the goods sent away by train or by ship should be noted.

8. The globe and the map of the world used in connection with 6 and 7 above, and also to show (a) the position of New Zealand relatively to the great land-masses, and (b) the oceans and continents and important places mentioned in the *School Journal* and other readers.

STANDARD III.

1. Weather study as prescribed for Standard II, but leading more definitely to the acquisition of such knowledge as is necessary for a proper understanding of climate. Low and high daily altitude of the sun to be connected with differences in heat in the course of the day and with seasonal differences; hence effect of the altitude of the sun on plant-growth —for example, in the tropics. Temperature, or "feel" of the wind from different points of the compass associated with altitude of sun in relation to originating direction of wind. Use of shadow-stick in fixing points of the compass.

2. The shapes of the new moon and the full moon; the part of the sky where they are first seen at night: both to be shown on a chart by the pupils themselves.

3. Knowledge of land-shapes, with the associated water-shapes, to be taught from actual examples or from models. How land and water shapes affect man and his work—*e.g.*, coast features and shipping, surface features and farming. Volcanoes, geysers.

4. Elementary knowledge of the constructive and destructive action of running water. Formation of plains and use of these to man. Formation of valleys and gullies. Formation of "rough" country; industry or industries possible in rough country. Actual observation of (a) the swing of the stream, (b) the sides on which excessive erosion or marked deposition takes place, (c) the relative order in which different kinds of detritus are deposited. Rough map of stream and elevation of cutting to be drawn by the pupils.

5. Map of school property to be drawn by the pupils themselves, but not to scale. Rough map of a suitable part of the district to be drawn from a convenient eminence. This work must be done outside the schoolroom, even if only a section of the class can be taken at one time.

room, even if only a section of the class can be taken at one time. 6. The geography of the home district, including prominent physical features, the occupations of the people, the exports and the imports; the towns, railways, and roads to be treated in such a way as to give the pupils first ideas of elementary geographical principles, which may afterwards be applied to New Zealand as a whole, and in the senior classes to other parts of the world.

7. The geography of the provincial district or of the natural regions in New Zealand that possess the same characteristics as the home region, studied with the object of associating in a very simple manner the products, occupations, and natural characteristics of the locality.

8. New Zealand as a whole in very broad outline, the study to include only a few of the more interesting and striking features, and places of industrial, historical, and scenic importance. Pictures should be freely used.

9. The geography associated with common things in the home. Hence elementary study of the map of the world; locating oceans and continents and a few of the more important countries. New Zealand shipping routes.

10. In the course of the lessons the pupils should be taught in a very simple way the effect of surface features and climate on the occupations of the people, the interdependence of different peoples with respect to the exchange of products, the condition affecting the growth of New Zealand crops, advantageous and disadvantageous positions for harbours.

STANDARD IV.

1. Weather study to be further systematized :-

(a) By keeping a chart of daily temperatures;

- (b) By making a graphical representation of the periodical (say, fortnightly or monthly) changes in the altitude of the sun as indicated by shadow lengths;

(c) By graphing the wind-directions from day to day and recording the weather associated with each.

In this class the pupils should learn from their weather charts the almost regular cyclonic series of changes in the direction of the wind in New Zealand, and the weather associated with and following each change. Effect of cyclonic changes on shipping, and especially local shipping. Elementary fore-casting of changes in the weather. The terms "cyclone" and "anti-cyclone" should not be used at this stage.

2. The moon in its various phases to be drawn by the pupils from actual be observation. Pupils living near the sea should at the same time record the specially high or low tides. Effect of tides on shipping.
Biver-action: delta and delta-fan, river-terraces, wide valleys, and

narrow valleys, studied from actual examples, models, or pictures. River-valleys suitable and unsuitable for farming, for townships, for roads and railways.

4. Evaporation, condensation, formation of clouds, mist, snow, ice, frost, dew. Wearing action of frost.

5. Fuller study of New Zealand : its natural regions ; its surface features ; its industries dependent on local surface features and climate; its towns dependent on industries and advantages of situation--whether, e.g., at the mouth of a navigable river, or at the opening to an important natural transit route, or at the junction of natural transit routes, or on a good harbour;

its main railways; its scenic attractions; and its history. 6. Australia in very broad outline, studied not merely in political divisions but in natural regions, the treatment being similar to that indicated in the preceding paragraph. Comparison with New Zealand.

7. Great Britain with reference to (a) localities to which our produce is sent, (b) places from which our most important imports come, and (c) places of outstanding historic interest. The advantages of position possessed by Great Britain; hence some of the great ports with which England trades in Europe and America.

8. Further geography associated with common things in the home, and the systematic use of the map of the world in connection with reading, history, and other lessons; a few of the most important countries or regions (e.g., Australia, Canada, United States of America, Great Britain, Russia, Germany, France, and Italy); places New Zealand tourists go abroad to visit. Route by which our wool, dairy-produce, &c., go to London. Continuation of elementary lessons on peoples of other lands, especially of the Pacific, with special reference to the South Sea islands.

9. Map-reading in connection with the above. In this class the pupil is expected to have gained sufficient knowledge of geography to enable him to gain information from an intelligent study of the map.

STANDARD V (FORM I).

1. The meaning of air-pressure, demonstrated by experiment. The The rain-gauge. Daily charts of temperature, baromercurial barometer. metric pressure and rainfall. Chart of sun's angular altitude taken at least monthly. Altitude of sun in different parts of the world, north and south of New Zealand, and effect on plant-growth and on man and his work. Association and comparison of chart-readings, leading to a better under-standing of seasonal and weather changes. Use of barometer to the sailor standing of seasonal and weather changes. and the farmer.

2. Rotation of the earth. Day and night. Graphical representation of the varying length of day and night during the year.

3. Latitude. Apparent path of sun during the year in relation to the surface of the earth. Solstices and equinoxes; length of day and night at these times. Effect of latitude of a place on the sun's altitude. The zones—their boundaries and their characteristics, including the broad differences between the peoples and the animals in different zones.

4. Further study of the influence of climate on the races of men and on products and industries.

5. Weathering action of sun, wind, frost, ice, and water. How plains, deltas, lakes, canyons, wide and narrow valleys, waterfalls, and rapids are formed. The effect of these formations on man and his work.

6. The causes of winds and ocean currents. Direction of these in the case of New Zealand and other countries under study. Effect of both on climate and on shipping.

7. Further study of New Zealand and Australia, with particular regard to the effect of surface features and climate on the industries of the people, the nature of the products, the positions of the towns, and the relation of these countries to each other and to other countries with which they trade. Excessively detailed information is not desired.

8. Europe broadly treated on a regional basis, and without detailed study of individual countries, but with particular attention to those that save important trade relations with New Zealand.

9. British Isles—to be treated as a whole and on broad lines, so as to give a clear idea of their main industrial activities, including mining, manufacturing, shipbuilding, and agriculture; rough division into farming and manufacturing areas; position of chief coalfields and localization of manufactures thereon; the main centres associated with them; and the sources of the raw materials used (e.g., cotton, wool, flax, rubber, iron, copper) and of Britain's food-supply (especially meat, wheat, butter, cheese, sugar, tea, coffee, cocoa, fruit), together with the great sea routes by which they are carried. Britain's dependence on trade and her favourable geographical position should be emphasized.

10. Canada and the United States of America to be studied only in broad outline and mainly in connection with trade relations with New Zealand.

11. Map-reading in association with the above will be required.

12. Geography in connection with the daily newspaper and with the history lesson. Books of travel.

STANDARD VI (FORM II).

1. The recording of observations relating to weather, altitude of sun, &c., to be continued as prescribed for Standard V. Comparison with school records in other parts of the Dominion. Graphical comparison of distribution of New Zealand rainfall taken in connection with the effect on forests, industries, &c. Cloud forms and formation. Fogs. Climate to be more fully studied.

2. The principal regional winds and ocean currents, and their causes. The effects of these on the peoples of different countries—e.g., the effect of the monsoons on the climate, industries, and general life of the people of India; the effect of trade winds and hurricanes on trade in the Pacific. Effects on trade and trade routes.

3. Rotation and revolution of the earth treated simply; day and night; length of year. Equator, poles, axis, tropics, zones.

4. The seasons — an elementary practical treatment; altitude of the sun connected with climate and seasonal changes; the variation in the height of the noonday sun and the consequent variation in the length of the day being taken as the causes of seasonal changes.

5. Agents of change further studied : glaciers, the sea, volcanic action. How these have affected conditions of life in different parts of the world.

6. Observation of the phases of the moon in conjunction with ocean tides. Tides as affecting shipping, particularly in New Zealand river ports. 7. Longitude and standard times—elementary notions. Practical

application in aviation.

8. The geography of the British Empire with special reference to inter-Empire trade relations. The islands of the Pacific that have trade relations with New Zealand must not be omitted. The principal trade routes in the world, and in particular those between New Zealand and other countries. British naval stations and their importance.

9. An elementary study of the most important countries bordering on the Pacific and of those islands that have relations with New Zealand. 10. A broad treatment on regional lines of the United States of America. 11. General knowledge of other countries New Zealand is particularly interested in -e.g., Argentine and Patagonia, Holland and Denmark, Palestine, Egypt.

12. Geography in connection with the daily newspaper, history lessons, and books of travel.

13. Map-reading and a knowledge of the conditions controlling industries, including the conditions of growth of the principal crops grown in different parts of the world.

STANDARD VII (FORM III).

1. The weather records, to lead to a study of isobars, isotherms, highpressure and low-pressure areas, theory of cyclones and anti-cyclones, distribution of the world's rainfall.

2. Map-making: the plane table. Hachures and contours. Defects in Mercator's projection.

3. Latitude and longitude. Value of degree of latitude measured on map; similarly with degrees of longitude in different latitudes. Variations in time in different countries and in different parts of a large country—*e.g.*, Australia, United States. Local and standard time. International dateline. Simple time problems. Explanation of varying length of day and night in different zones and at different seasons. Causes of the seasons more fully explained.

4. Agents in changing the surface of the earth : Weathering, denudation, building-up, young and old river-valleys, volcanic and thermal action, earthquakes, raising and lowering of the land surface, drowned valleys, glacial action more fully treated, icebergs.

5. Racial characteristics as affected by climate and surface features.

6. The world's forest areas, petroleum deposits, mineral wealth, best cropping-areas. Relation of industry to industry—e.g., coal-mining to ironmining; of climate and soil conditions to plant products—e.g., tea demands an even and warm temperature, plenty of humus, hence old forest ground suitable, plenty of moisture but not water round roots. The relative importance of different countries in regard to valuable products. Conditions affecting the location of industries—e.g., cotton-manufacture in Lancashire. 7. Hence trade relations within the Empire and between Great Britain

7. Hence trade relations within the Empire and between Great Britain and other countries. New Zealand's rivals in trade—e.g., Australia, Argentine, Denmark.

8. General geography of the world. Revision and extension of work prescribed for previous classes. Geography in connection with world happenings as recorded in the daily papers. Map-reading. Books of travel. 9. Projects based on the above programme.

10. Elementary statistical geography—*e.g.*, comparative rainfall, graphical representation of relative importance of exports.

NATURE-STUDY AND ELEMENTARY SCIENCE. INTRODUCTION.

Considered in its widest sense Nature-study should aim at giving the child an understanding of the facts and phenomena which confront and surround him and the environment of which he is himself, consciously or unconsciously, a part. It should also inculcate in him a love for Nature and an appreciation of its beauties. The material for this subject is practically inexhaustible in that it comprises the whole of the animate population of the world together with the physical setting into which the many organisms have been born and in which they have fought and are fighting their way upward to higher and yet higher stages of development. Ultimately Nature-study should aim at enabling Man to understand and appreciate to some extent the scale of the universe and his own place in it.

The material chosen by the teacher must necessarily vary with circumstances, but it should always be such as is readily accessible to the pupils and such as will enable the teacher to imbue the work with appreciative enthusiasm. In general, the teacher should assume the function of a director of studies; the pupils should make their own investigations and inductions, while the teacher supplies the thread of necessary information and guidance which corrects error, avoids the rough places and leads the pupils to gather a properly organized body of knowledge.

It should be considered a fundamental principle that nothing should be regarded as Nature-study in which the child is not observing or investigating Nature at first hand. From this it follows that the work will be done mainly outside the class-room and it will be necessary in all cases for teachers to have a full knowledge of the possibilities of the district. School walks or rambles should be frequently arranged. A Nature-study survey of the easily accessible parts of the school environment should be made as a piece of team work by teacher and pupils in co-operation, and the Scheme of Work should be based on the knowledge thus gained. The Scheme should provide for progressive treatment of the subject as the pupils advance in their school life, and in the higher classes the pupils should gain some definite ideas of the principle of evolution.

Stories should be used freely in the lower classes to supplement information gained at first hand, but care should be taken that these stories represent the facts. While it is desirable to encourage the idea of kindness to animals, the dangers of over-sentimentality should be avoided.

The treatment of Elementary Science should proceed on much the same lines as prescribed for Nature-study, but the lessons will possibly be more systematically arranged with the twofold object, first of enabling the pupils to gather some simple but definite and accurate knowledge logically arranged of the basic scientific facts related particularly to Elementary Agriculture and Dairy Science, and second of training the pupils to trace the connection of cause and effect in the natural phenomena they are studying and to form habit of seeking for and applying basic scientific principles. This theme will be found elaborated more fully in the Appendix on the subject; for the present what is emphasized is the importance of training the pupil to adopt the right attitude of mind towards the study of science so that he may readily apply scientific methods to the solving of many of the problems that will confront him in after life.

The course of study has been arranged as for grouped classes, but the teacher is required to arrange a progressive course of instruction for each year of school life so that even where classes are grouped there will be no needless repetition from year to year.

PREPARATORY CLASSES.

1. AIMS.—The aims in this division should be—

(a) To awaken and deepen the child's interest in nature, and to stimulate the curiosity which is characteristic of all children:

(b) To develop and strengthen the child's powers of observing nature :

(c) To encourage the child to express his thoughts freely about nature as manifested in his particular environment.

2. COURSE OF STUDY.—The material to be used by the teacher and the pupils should be such as is easily found in the school and home environment, and might include a selection from each of the following sections :—

(a) Plants.—Some of the more interesting plants (including shrubs and trees). Observation of leaves and seasonal changes in the colour of leaves, fall of leaf. Observation and comparison of common flowers, without the use of technical terms. The succession of life: seed, plant, flower, fruit. Common fruits and their structure. The growth and care of plants in the school and garden.

(b) Animals.—Household pets and animals interesting to children—cat, dog, horse, rabbit, frog, &c.—only where these can be studied at first hand. Studies of life-histories should not be formal, but the children should be led to acquire from personal observation a good deal of knowledge about life-changes. Birds and their ways: the children should learn to recognize the commonest birds in the locality; the structure of old nests may be examined. The spider, earthworm, snail, and insects such as the housefly, the bee, the butterfly, the moth—all provide a wealth of material

fly, the bee, the butterfly, the moth—all provide a wealth of material. (c) Weather.—A pictorial calendar of weather changes should be kept as a class record. From time to time there should be informal talks about the recorded changes in the weather.

STANDARDS I AND II.

1. AIMS.—The aims in this division should be similar to those set down in the preparatory classes, but the pupils should be trained to seek for explanations of natural phenomena, and even to try experiments that may lead them to acquire the knowledge they seek.

2. COURSE OF STUDY.—The course should include topics similar to those set down for the preparatory classes, but the treatment should be more systematic. Further, the pupils should be encouraged to bring specimens for general class discussion.

(a) **Plants.**—Seed-dispersal as observable in the locality. Germination. The study of a plant as a whole. The beginnings of plant-growth—*e.g.*, bean and wheat. Bark of trees. Seasonal changes. Study of roots, stems, leaf-buds, leaves, flowers, fruit (including some common weeds of the district). Parts of flower. Special attention should be given to native trees, shrubs, flowers, and fruit.

(b) Animals.—The general characteristics and habits of interesting birds, insects, &c., common in the locality. Life-histories more closely studied. At this stage the pupils might begin to rear insects from the caterpillar. Every effort should be made to enable the pupils to acquire a knowledge of the native birds and insects common to the locality. Pond and river life. In seaside schools a study of marine life should begin.

(c) General.—More systematic weather observation of clouds, fog, mist, rain, hail, snow, frost, wind. Rising and setting of the sun. Position of sun at mid-day. If the school is near the sea, observation of waves and tides.

STANDARDS III AND IV.

1. AIMS.—In this division the teacher should definitely aim to lead the pupils to recognize in an elementary manner the relation of cause and effect in nature. The method of investigation into causes by experiments, including interference with nature's processes, should be used. The pupil should be trained to seek on his own account explanations of the results of his investigations. The question "Why?" should be ever before both teacher and pupils. The training the pupil receives should lead to a love for and an appreciation of all that is beautiful and wonderful, though possibly perplexing, in nature. The practical work in the school-gardens must each year have a definite aim beyond that of merely presenting a fine display of well-grown vegetables.

2. COURSE OF STUDY.—A selection from the following :—

(a) Plants.—The phenomena of plant-life more closely studied. Simple experiments in pollination. Methods of propagating plants. Seed-protection. Seed-dispersal, with special reference to noxious weeds—*e.g.*, piripiri (bidibidi), thistle. Condition of effective growth such as warmth, moisture, a sufficiency of suitable plant-food, sufficient room. Identification of common native plants. Some of the commonest pests might be studied in connection with the rearing of insects.

The carrying-out of experiments and investigations in school-gardens. The growing of young trees. General principles of seed-sowing and tree-

planting.

Simple study of mushrooms and toadstools.

Some of the principal grasses.

(b) Animals.—Natīve and imported birds in the district, their songs and their habits. Various ways in which birds are of benefit to man. Preservation of birds. Sea and river birds. Birds of special interest: kea, kiwi, native cuckoos. The flight of different birds. Flocking and migration of birds. Insects of peculiar interest: *Hepialus virescens* (huge green moth), *Vanessa gonerilla* (red admiral butterfly), *Nyctemera* (black and slate coloured day-flying moth); mantis, *Acanthoderus horridus* (stick insect), *Deinacrida megacephala* (weta), *Oedipoda cinerascens* (New Zealand locust), *forficesila littorea* (earwig); dragon-flies, particularly Uropetala carovei and Cordulia Smithii; mosquito; ladybird; cicada. A lizard. A fish. Hedgehog. (NOTE: The above scientific names are not to be taught, but are given to assist the teacher who desires to consult scientific works on the subject.)

(c) General.—Clouds and the weather associated therewith. Observation and drawing of the moon in its various phases. The Southern Cross and one or two other constellations.

The sea, its waves, tides, and currents (without theory of causes), and hence danger to bathers.

Evaporation and condensation.

Mariner's compass and magnets. Dangers connected with electricity.

Recognition of benzine, kerosene, methylated spirit, and turpentine. Dangers in connection with inflammable gases : kerosene, benzine.

Flotation observed in, say, benzine, fresh water, salt water. Difference between solution and suspension.

In schools where in the opinion of the Inspector it is not possible to provide sufficient practical instruction in topics selected from paragraphs (a)and (b), section (c) may be extended to include further simple lessons in the science of common things—e.g., conduction of heat; expansion through heat; friction between different surfaces; heat generated in a bicyclepump through compression of air; water finds its own level; pressure of air; principle of the balance.

STANDARDS V AND VI (FORMS I AND II).

1. AIMS.—The work in these classes should result in the pupils' securing a good introduction to scientific method. The pupils should be accustomed to seek the reasons for success or failure in their experiments; they should be encouraged to formulate their own explanations and endeavour to test these in a scientific manner. The instruction should not be of too technical a character, and the teacher should remember that the filling of the pupil's mind with a store of scientific information is of less importance than accustoming him to adopt the right attitude of mind towards his subject.

The teacher should foster in his pupils the spirit of inquiry and encourage independent investigation. Some of the pupil's experiments and investigations might be carried out at home as well as at school.

Agricultural club and project work are to be encouraged. Notebooks should be carefully kept by the pupils. Class diagrams and summaries are also of importance.

2. COURSE OF STUDY.—A two-years programme to be arranged, including in all cases a sufficient number of topics selected from at least two of the following sections. The scheme of work should wherever possible include a selection of topics from either section (b) or section (c), or from both. In schools where in the opinion of the Inspector it is not possible to give practical instruction in elementary agriculture or dairy science, an extended course of general science, including topics closely connected with everyday life of the pupils, is recommended.

(a) Elementary General Science.—Study of air : its existence and pressure. The barometer. Common pump, the syphon. Composition of air—oxygen, nitrogen, carbon dioxide, and their properties, to be found by actual experi-ment. The formation of a chemical compound. The difference between a mixture and a chemical compound. General study of physical properties of water. Filtration. Hard and soft water, and means of softening. Principle of flotation.

Heat: its production by chemical activity. Meaning of combustion. Transmission of heat. Conduction, convection, radiation, expansion, and contraction. Study of fluid thermometers (F. and C. scales). The general contraction. Study of fluid thermometers (F. and C. scales). The general dangerous nature of inflammable gases, and of liquids readily convertible into inflammable vapours or gases, should be dealt with. Industrial applications of explosive mixtures—e.g., petrol-engine. Experimental study of levers (without reference to the three orders).

Methods of measuring the volume of irregular insoluble solids by immersion in water.

Experiments with magnets. Simple cell supplying electrical circuit. Electro-magnet. Lines of magnetic force. The earth as a magnet. Magnetic needle. Electric bell. Electricity as a source of light and heat. (b) Elementary Agriculture.—Study of soil. Mechanical analysis. Humus

content. Series of experiments to improve physical condition of soils. Preparation of good seed-bed, on a small scale, on large scale. Trenching. Best methods of sowing and planting. Conditions of plant-growth ; thinning. Pruning root and branch. Layering and other forms of propagation. Influence of light on plant-growth. Elementary forestry:

schoolElementary orchard work. Common nursery; planting and care of trees. garden pests and blights. Spraying. The experimental and investigational work in the school-garden should be correlated with the indoor work in general science. Elementary study of plant-food. Transpiration and respiration. Water and mineral ash in plant. Conditions of growth of wheat, oats, barley, potatoes, mangolds, turnips. Rotation of crops. Common fodder grasses to be recognized.

Further experiments in pollination of flowers. Testing percentage germination of seeds.

(c) Elementary Dairy Science.—Composition of milk to be ascertained as far as possible by actual experiments, sampling. The care of milk. Percentage of butterfat. Scientific principle of the milk-separating machine and of the centrifugal testing machine. Specific gravity of milk, the subject to be treated very simply. Principle and use of the lactometer. Elementary scientific principles in butter and cheese making.

STANDARD VII (FORM III).

1. AIMS.—This class should do a good deal of independent work in general nature-study as well as in elementary agriculture. Much of the necessary apparatus should be home-made. Lines along which their investigations might proceed may be suggested by the teacher after consultation with the pupils. The pupils should continue experiments started in previous classes, tabulating, and, where suitable, graphing their results. One of the principle aims should be to develop in the pupils a scientific attitude of mind. Scientific hobbies should be encouraged.

2. SYLLABUS.-A selection of such topics as the following :---

(a) Elementary General Science.-Solutions and emulsions. Crystallization. Humidity of air. Oxidation. Acids and gases related to agricultural and dairy science. Neutralization bleaching. Elementary knowledge of rocks in the neighbourhood. Simple chemical and mechanical examination of these. Gravitation. The pendulum. Water finds its own level. Town and house water-supplies. Water-pump. Hydraulic ram. Momentum. Application of momentum to life situations such as alighting from moving vehicle, standing up in row-boat, driving or running round corner. Friction. Principle of moments simply applied to ordinary weighing-machine and the see-saw. Simple calculations connected with the principle of moments. Levers and their commonest applications. Heat and its effects on solids, liquids, and gases. Boiling a form of molecular dispersal, hence elementary knowledge of heat as a form of motion. Application of expansive force of Boiling-point dependent on density of Use of thermometer. steam. liquid and pressure of surrounding atmosphere. Distillation. Effect of pressure on temperature of gases leading to elementary notions of principle of refrigeration. Relative density and specific gravity. Principle of Archi-medes. Centre of gravity.

Sound—what it really is and how it can be conveyed. Principle of the telephone and the gramophone.

Elementary experiments in electricity and magnetism, simple and homemade apparatus being used.

(b) Élementary Agriculture. — Classification and properties of soils. Examination of soil in the neighbourhood. Moisture in soil. Retentivity of moisture and plant-food in soil. Soil-temperatures. Improvement of soil-texture and soil-content. Drainage of soil. Bacteria in soil. Nitrification: the nitrogen cycle. Effects of liming, of using various artificial manures. Effect of different crops on soil-content. Rotation of crops. Restoration of fertility of soils. Fungoid and animal pests. Preventive and curative sprays. Study of the root, classification of roots, root-pressure, effect of root-pruning. Flowers of grasses, fruit-trees, native plants, weeds. Methods of fertilization. Plant - breeding. Study of the leaf. Carbon assimilation. Tree-planting. Selection of trees for different purposes: hedges, shelter, timber, ornament. Plantation-forming.
(c) Dairy Science.—As for Standard VI, with the addition of the follow-

(c) Dairy Science.—As for Standard VI, with the addition of the following: Coagulation of milk; causes of variation and of defects in composition of milk; composition of skimmed milk; separated milk; buttermilk and cream; acidity and the estimation of acidity; pasteurizing and sterilizing milk. Ripening of cream. Use of starters.

DRAWING.

INTRODUCTION.

The prescriptions of work in this subject have been arranged in four definite stages-that is, for the Preparatory Division, the Junior Division, the Middle Division, and the Senior Division. The work of the classes within any of these divisions will not vary materially in content, but will be expected to show a progressive advance in quality. Schemes of work should show clearly the scope of the work proposed, and the manner in which harmonious development of the subject is secured from group to group or from class to class. It is intended that the spontaneous efforts of the child to express himself graphically shall be supplemented by definite instruction in the craftsmanship of the subject, so that reasonable skill is attained. In other words, it is intended that definite instruction shall be given in the drawing of natural and fashioned objects, in design, and in instrumental drawing, in so far as it affects design or handwork, so that the pupil may gain sufficient mastery over the technique of the subject to enable him to use drawing as a means of expression whether in connection with literature, history, or the manual arts. Thus the child will acquire increasing ability to express ideas and feelings, to represent things seen, and to satisfy and cultivate his æsthetic sense. Throughout the syllabus the importance of the use of colour and tone is emphasized. It has not been thought necessary to point out all the ways in which drawing may be associated with other subjects in the curriculum; but no scheme or plan of work will be considered satisfactory that does not make full provision for close association of this kind.

PREPARATORY CLASSES.

Free representation in colour of events in the child's life and of scenes illustrating folk-tales, fairy-stories, and nursery rhymes. Free drawing in both mass and line with chalk, crayon, or pastel of common things in the home and school life of the child. Breadth of treatment and freedom of arm-movement should be aimed at, and, whether the work be done on the blackboard or on paper, the pupil must be encouraged to draw without cramping the fingers.

Whilst formal lessons are out of place, the pupils will learn a great deal by observing the teacher's methods.

The recognition of six colours—red, orange, yellow, green, blue, violet with the matching of objects in these colours. Some very simple exercises in free design in colour should be given, mainly in connection with handwork.

Elementary appreciation of beauty in form and colour in nature and art.

STANDARDS I AND II.

1. Free Drawing.—Free illustration and imaginative drawing to be continued. Definite training in the representation of form with chalk, crayon, or pastel of—

- (a) Simple spherical objects, such as ball, orange, apple, balloon, pear;
- (b) Flat objects in front view, such as book, flag, envelope, luggagelabel; and

(c) Nature-study drawing.

Elementary light and shade to be commenced. Memory drawing to correspond.

2. Design.—Simple arrangements of shapes, either abstract or based on simple natural forms, to produce designs in colour. No design should be made except for the purpose of immediate application in some practical way—e.g., a simple border decoration for, say, a handkerchief, checked pattern for a kettle-holder, simple corner treatment for a book-cover, &c. Very simple geometrical designs.

3. Instrumental Drawing.—Recognition of vertical, horizontal, and oblique lines, right angle, square, oblong, triangle. Use of ruler to draw lines of stated length, and to construct squares, oblongs, and triangles with the aid of the set square. All geometrical drawing to have a purpose in association with handwork and design.

4. Plain lettering in single line.

5. Elementary appreciation of beauty in form and colour in nature and art.

STANDARDS III AND IV.

1. Definite instruction in the representation of form with chalk, pastel, pencil, or brush of—

- (a) More difficult flat objects such as keys, varnish-brush, handmirror, hand-bag, knife, shells, certain flowers;
- (b) Study of the third dimension by means of the foreshortened circle. Single cylindrical and conical objects or shapes based thereon, for example, cylindrical tins, tumbler, tumbler partly filled, flowerpot, large ink-bottle, drum, cotton-reels, gloybottle. More attention to the representation of solidity or depth by means of light and shade. The drawing of simple groups of associated objects.
- (c) Nature-study Drawing : Memory drawing. Free illustrative and imaginative drawing to be continued. The design and arrangement of the pictorial composition should receive attention.

2. Design.—More systematic study of colour—e.g., gradation of several tones of the same colour; colour-mixing and experiments with colours in design; pastel or water colour. Design treated simply but definitely and applied to the arrangement of geometrical units and natural forms; simplicity rather than complexity to be aimed at. Pattern in nature to be studied—e.g., shell-spirals, leaf-arrangement, venation, coloration of insects, &c. Design applied to the decoration of suitable objects, such as a tablecentre, a vase-mat, the edge of a table-cover, a dog-collar, a book-cover, Christmas card. The arrangement of designs to be governed by their practical application. Designs should be original.

3. Instrumental Drawing. — The instrumental drawing to be taught mainly in conjunction with handwork, design, and such projects as may arise in connection with other school activities.

Use of set-squares in setting out rectangular figures of specified size. Use of compasses in drawing circles, bisecting lines and angles, and in constructing squares, oblongs, and the various kinds of triangles from simple data.

Drawing to scale of such rectangular objects as a page of the School Journal, the floor of the schoolroom, top of table, slate, picture-frame. Only simple scales to be used, such as 1 in. = 1 ft., 1 in. = 1 yard, $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. = 1 ft., or $\frac{1}{8}$ in. = 1 in., where the subdivisions into feet or inches can be readily obtained from the ruler.

4. Lettering.-Plain block lettering, and simple though less rudimentary print-script.

5. Appreciation.—Further development of appreciation of beauty of form and colour in nature and art.

STANDARDS V AND VI.

1. Free Drawing .- Free illustrative and imaginative drawing to be further developed. Elementary study of foreshortening and systematic training in the drawing of-

(a) Objects of the box type, such as chalk-box, matchbox, book, attache-case, brick, cupboard, loaf of bread; (b) More difficult curved forms, such as vases of various shapes,

kettle, teapot, pieces of drapery, &c.

(c) Parts of objects-e.g., large studies of handles, spouts, and rims.

(d) Groups of fashioned objects and of sprays of leaves and flowers. (e) Tree forms from nature.

Outdoor sketching to be encouraged. Memory drawing. Instruction to be continued in the proper use of colour and tone, flat-tinting, harmonizing colours, contrasting colours.

3. Instrumental Drawing .- To be taught in relation to design. Use of plain scales. Elementary work in drawing plan and elevation of simple geometrical objects. Isometric and oblique views of simple rectilinear objects.

4. Lettering .-- Roman capitals, print-script, and broad-pen lettering suitable to this stage.

5. Art Appreciation .- Further developments of appreciation through the study of all kinds of good works of art.

STANDARD VII (FORM III).

1. Free drawing to be continued as prescribed for Standards V and VI, but to be more advanced in character. Outdoor sketching should be encouraged. Further study in the elementary principles of perspective.

2. Further study of design applied to definite crafts so that the pupils may gain a fuller understanding of decorative art.

3. Further development of appreciation through the study of good pictures and of other good works of art to be continued.

4. Instrumental drawing to be mainly of a practical character, as, for example, in (a) drawing to scale the ground-plan of a cottage, or plans or maps derived from the use of the plane table; (b) drawings of cross-sections of simple objects; (c) drawings connected with elementary mathematics, and with woodwork, ironwork, and other manual-training occupations. In country schools the instrumental drawing should have some relation to farming pursuits-e.g., plan and sections of sheep-dip; layout of woolshed and pens, of sheep and cattle-yards, and the setting-out of such details of the construction of a wooden shed as piles, floor-plates, joists, studs, wall plates, and braces.

HANDWORK.

INTRODUCTION.

Handwork is to be regarded as serving a double purpose -- (1) as a means of satisfying the creative instinct; (2) as a means of reinforcing the instruction in the ordinary subjects of the curriculum.

Both continuity and progression are essential if the best results are to be secured. During the whole course there should be abundant occupational work providing for free expression, and affording full scope for the exercise of imagination, both reproductive and constructive. In all classes the pupils should be allowed a certain amount of freedom to make something they particularly desire either for themselves or others.

As the pupil develops, a gradual transition should be effected by grafting on to the free work more definite training in the construction of objects in accordance with his own designs or with more or less detailed direction. The latter class of work should receive increasing attention until, owing to experience in conceiving and planning, to the development of muscular control, and particularly to an increased pride in carrying out work with a good degree of exactitude, the pupil is ready to take up with confidence

those higher branches of handwork considered suitable for the senior division of the school and requiring a degree of skill which steadily approaches that of the adult.

At all stages the acquirement of skill is to be put to immediate use as an aid in strengthening the ordinary means of general education, and from this point of view handwork is to be regarded both as a subject and as a method. It is of importance that wherever there is need for handwork material it shall be freely used, whether in connection with arithmetic, or literature, or history, or geography, or science, or any other branch of school work or school interest.

Nor is the kind of work to be restricted by such considerations as the nature of the materials supplied as school requisites. For many schools there is readily available an abundance of other materials, such as clay, flax, raupo, lacebark, rushes, tussock-grass, and straw, and for all there is an almost unlimited supply of waste material (such as wooden and cardboard boxes, tin containers, wire, cotton-reels, scraps of wall-paper, cloth, and leather). By the use of such media a greater variety of projects will be brought within the scope of the scheme. At the same time interest will be sustained at a higher pitch than is possible where the materials are limited in kind.

The extent and nature of the interrelation between handwork and other aspects of school activity will depend upon skilful planning by the teacher. In the subjoined prescriptions the references in this aspect are merely suggestive.

HANDWORK AND MANUAL OCCUPATIONS.

PREPARATORY DIVISIONS.

The handwork occupations in these classes should be selected with the twofold object of—(a) providing the child with material by means of which he may express in concrete form his impressions of form, size, and beauty; and (b) enabling him to realize not only the joy of using the creative power, but also the satisfaction of doing something for others.

The occupations may include toy-making (waste material being largely used), raffia-work, and the like. Some form of plastic modelling should always be included, on account of its value in enabling the pupil to represent three-dimensioned objects. Without unduly forcing correlation, the teacher should arrange occupations that will enable the child to gain a clearer conception of the content of the general subjects of instruction—for example, the representation in the sand-tray or by means of plasticine models of scenes depicted in fairy or folk stories, the modelling of an object the shape of which can be only imperfectly represented by drawing the outline. Sticklaying, paper tearing, folding, and cutting will incidentally give the pupils first ideas in geometry and geometrical design, but no definite instruction is to be given. Such occupations can also be applied to picture-making—e.g., houses, gates, boats, &c.

Paperwork (paper folding, cutting, and modelling) can be used for (a) illustrative work for stories, &c., (b) frieze-making, (c) preparation of simple properties for dramatization, &c. (costumes, hats, crowns).

properties for dramatization, &c. (costumes, hats, crowns). Manual occupations in the preparatory classes are so varied in material and informal methods, so interwoven with the achievement of the teacher's educational aims and the satisfaction of the children's natural instincts, that it is not intended to lay down a definite syllabus in any of the branches of handwork.

STANDARDS I AND II.

The aims in this division should be similar to those already stated in the case of the preparatory classes. Systematic training in clay or plasticine modelling, which may include the making of simple pottery, should be given to enable the pupils to carry their study of form still further. Modelling should also be used in connection with the lessons in geography, history, English, and other subjects.

Paper folding and cutting in connection with instrumental drawing and geometrical design, and the making of posters and friezes illustrating historical, geographical, and other topics.

Toy-making from waste materials, raffia-weaving, basketry, and the like may be continued.

Where facilities exist some of the pupils might engage in light woodwork, or in the modelling of straight-sided objects in carton.

STANDARDS III AND IV.

Modelling in any suitable medium, such as carton, cardboard, clay, plasticine, or natural and waste material, in connection with history, reading, geography, and other subjects. Full opportunity should be taken for applying instrumental drawing in a practical way.

The older boys should, where facilities exist, be allowed to join the classes in woodwork.

Constructive work should include not only the modelling of single objects, but also the representation as on a stage of historical scenes and geographical phenomena.

Home projects in handwork might include raffia work, basketry, toymaking and general gift-making for children in the preparatory classes and for children in hospitals.

STANDARDS V, VI, VII (FORMS I, II, III).

All girls should receive instruction in needlework, and as far as possible in some other domestic subject—e.g., cookery or laundry-work—and all boys in woodwork or metal-work. Where such instruction is provided in manual-training centres the instructor should consult the head teacher regarding the scheme of work, and should, as far as possible and subject to the approval of the Inspector, provide a course of training suited to the needs of the pupils and in harmony with the aims of the school.

Where facilities do not exist for providing courses in cookery, laundrywork, woodwork, or metal-work, the boys and girls should take some form of constructive work in their own schools and the girls advanced needlework.

During the period in which the girls receive instruction in needlework the boys should take additional handwork—e.g., some form of art-craft. The possibility of taking light woodwork, light metal-work, basketry,

weaving, leather-work, or repousse should not be overlooked.

NEEDLEWORK.

INTRODUCTION.

Needlework teaching requires that due attention shall be given to considerations of colour and design, and to securing results of æsthetic value by means of sound constructional work, without neglecting the actual craftsmanship of sewing. The interests of the pupil may thus be stimulated so that better practical work ensues and the cultural value of the training is increased. Whilst the main objective is educational, the child should be so taught as to become proficient in commonly used stitches and to be able to cut and make ordinary garments and do mending and darning. Exercises on small pieces of material may well be used for learning different kinds of stitches, but the preparation of specimen pieces should be dis-continued. At all stages the periodical construction and completion of some articles by the pupils should be aimed at.

By appealing to the colour sense and to the creative instinct needlework can be made attractive and interesting, and at the same time a knowledge of sewing and cutting out and the making of ordinary garments can be gained.

Special care should be taken to avoid all conditions unfavourable to eyesight. In no case should materials and stitches be so fine as to strain the children's eyesight. Materials and threads of contrasting colour are a distinct aid in this connection. Children of weak eyesight should not be given any exercise that would be injurious to their eyes, and in serious cases they should not be expected to do sewing at all.

Throughout the classes pupils should be taught to plan and measure the quantities of material required for articles; the Senior Division should learn the price per yard, and calculate the cost of each article made. In the upper classes the instruction should be amplified by lessons given in the selection of materials, in which it should be pointed out that materials which would fade or shrink, or quickly wear out, might not be the most economical, even though costing the least. By this means habits of thrift may be inculcated.

The making of drafts of simple things should be included, and when senior girls are drafting to the figure it should be done on some principle of measurement. It is not necessary to devote time to making elaborate patterns

In general it is to be constantly borne in mind that no opportunity should be lost of correlating sewing with other subjects of the school course; that the sewing lessons should be such as to establish closer relations between the home and the school, the articles selected for making being such as have some relation to the child's need at home or at school; that the articles should be simple, and not such as to demand too long an application of the children's attention; and that in all cases the necessary planning, measuring, drafting, cutting and fixing, to secure a proper educational result, must be done by the children themselves. Free and individual design for decorative purposes should be encouraged.

The following is the programme in needlework to which the work of the school should, as far as circumstances permit, conform; but modification of the scheme, following similar lines of development, or any other scheme (presented in the form of a written programme), may be accepted by the Inspector if it covers substantially the same range of work.

All stitches taught are to be used for making articles for personal or school use. Articles should be chosen which can be made in half a term or a term. Children should be encouraged to practise needlework at other than class times.

JUNIOR AND MIDDLE DIVISIONS.

STANDARD I.—Weaving, measuring (foot-rule). Stitches through coarse material with wool-needle and wool, twine or raffia; tacking, overcasting, cross-stitch, blanket-stitch, knitting. (Some of this work may be done in the preparatory class if desired.)

STANDARD II.—Further use of the needle and thimble. Blanketstitch, cross-stitch, running, hemming, weaving, cutting and tearing material.

Materials.--Canvas, flannel, dowlas, unbleached calico, britway, wool, raffia, embroidery cotton.

Suggested Examples.—Mats, bags, bib, book-cover, needle-roll or housewife, sewing-bag, bedding for doll's bed, simple knitted articles, simple woven articles.

STANDARD III.—Oversewing, running and felling, back-stitching, buttonhole stitching as applied to scalloping. Study of beginning and finishing work of right and wrong side of materials. The correct way of attaching fasteners required, crochet.

STANDARD IV.—Study of selvedge and crossway of materials. Folding, joining, and use of cross-way strips, back-stitching. Fastenings such as buttons and button-holes, loops, &c. Patch-pockets and applique work to be used for decoration.

Materials.—Canvas, flannel, dowlas, unbleached calico, huckaback, fadeless casement cloth, britway. Avoid cheap shoddy materials. Use coarse coloured embroidery cotton as far as possible and so make the stitches decorative.

Suggested Examples.—Similar articles to those enumerated above, cookery apron and cap, cushion-covers, work-bags, wall-pocket, doll's clothes, babies' clothes, and small articles for their use.

Tools.—Thimbles, coarse needles, tape-measure, scissors, paper, card-board, knitting-needles, crochet-hook.

(N.B.—The order in which the different stitches are studied will depend on the articles chosen; as far as possible children leaving Standard IV should know all the everyday stitches and how they are made.)

SENIOR DIVISION

STANDARD V.—Herring-boning and feather-stitching; mending (including darning and patching). Children to be encouraged to mend actual garments. Lessons in cutting out from drafts or paper patterns. Making of simple garments for their own use.

STANDARD VI.—Review of all stitches, further practice in mending, pleating, gathering, putting on band. Study of placing and putting together of patterns. Making of garments by the pupils for their own use.

Materials.—Soft firmly-woven cotton materials, as fadeless casementcloth, britway, Italian cloth, print, madapolam are best. The better workers, if they desire, can use fuji or tussore silk and woollen materials. Finer cottons for purely constructive work as well as coarser threads for decorative construction.

Suggested Examples.—Babies', children's and girls' clothes. Articles for home or school use.

Tools.—The use and care of the sewing-machine. Needles of various kinds, &c.

For the purpose of reinforcing the children's interest in their work and widening their outlook it is recommended that, as opportunity offers, the instruction in needlework should be accompanied by and intimately associated with talks on kindred topics, such as the following, having in special a direct bearing on household economics, thus :---

JUNIOR AND MIDDLE DIVISIONS.—Care of materials and tools; source of materials; neatness in dress; colour, care of clothing; use and design of articles made; making of textiles; primitive weaving.

SENIOR DIVISION.—Use of sewing; colour with regard to dress; dress for different seasons, &c.; raw materials and their processes of manufacture; relative cost in general of fabrics in common use; good and bad materials; good taste and economy in dress; harmony in colour and texture; health and clothing; choice of materials, styles, and colours; folding and general care of clothing; shopping, &c.

HOUSECRAFT.

STANDARDS V, VI, VII, OR FORMS I, II, III.

A comprehensive scheme of instruction in Housecraft includes cookery, housewifery, and laundry-work, but it is not complete without a further course in home organization. The time allotted to the different parts of the course and the order in which they are taken must depend to some extent on the premises and equipment available, but as a general rule about twice or thrice as much time should be given to cookery as to laundry-work or housewifery, it being a more difficult subject and requiring much more practice.

1. Cookery should include a study of the processes of cooking, planning of meals, dietetic value of foodstuffs, economy of time, labour, and materials. It is very important that the girls should do a large amount of practical work, and this should invariably occupy the greater part of the lesson. Theoretical instruction in the dietetic value of foodstuffs and the mechanism of digestion should not exceed that necessary for the general understanding of the methods practised and of diets suitable for different persons.

2. Housewifery.—The character of the work will depend on the premises available, and where there is only a classroom the course has to be considerably curtailed. It should include the study of the source and action of dust, dirt, stains, and decay, with methods for their prevention and removal; the care of kitchen fittings, utensils, crockery, glass; the nature and cleaning of hard and soft metals and different wooden surfaces. In general this work can be most effectively dealt with concurrently with the instruction in cookery and laundry-work.

3. Laundry-work should include a study of the processes of washing, finishing, ironing; the origin and nature of the materials which are laundered; appropiate cleansing and stiffening agents, and the use of simple disinfectants. This work should provide opportunities for linking up on the one hand the hygiene of the class-rooms to the practical carrying-out of home duties to ensure proper cleanliness, and on the other hand the science work on solution, &c., with the use of various cleaningagents, to ensure proper correlation of the school courses.

4. Home Organization.—If suitable premises and a suitable teacher are available the preceding courses should be followed by one in home organization. Home organization is based upon the foundation work of cookery, housewifery, and laundry-work. At first the girls will have studied one subject at a time; now they will deal with the management of a home where many operations must be going on at once. The daily and weekly cleaning and occasional turning-out of the home will be carried out concurrently with the cooking, household washing and mending. In addition the furniture and furnishings, arrangement of these, household accounts, home nursing and mothercraft may be included under suitable conditions.

NOTE.—The appendix dealing with housecraft and manual training generally will be found in a separate pamphlet.

WOODWORK.

INTRODUCTION.

The following outline of the instruction in woodwork is inserted in order that teachers whose pupils are being taught at manual-training centres shall be acquainted with the general lines on which the instruction is expected to be given. The portions of the syllabus that are printed in italics are to be taught by the permanent school staff, the remainder by the special instructor. Each instructor is expected to draw up a definite scheme of work, one copy of which is to be sent for approval to the Senior Inspector of the district, and a second copy to the Superintendent of Technical Education, Education Department, Wellington. In the case of special classes—for example, a class of retarded children the instructor in woodwork and the teacher in charge of the class should collaborate very closely in the framing of a suitable course, and the scheme of work adopted should be developed and modified step by step with the development of the subjects taken by the class-teacher. While this close co-operation is most essential in the case of special classes, it is also necessary for all classes, if the full value of the manual training is to be obtained.

If the class-teacher attends at the manual-training centre with his boys as often as possible, and not only assists in the supervision of the work, say, in drawing, but also himself works at the bench so as to maintain by actual touch his understanding of the nature of the training which his boys are receiving, he will find it comparatively easy to correlate the manual training with the other subjects of the curriculum in a natural, logical, and interesting way, a task otherwise almost impossible.

STANDARDS V, VI, VII (FORMS I, II, III).

The course in woodwork shall include the following divisions :---

1. DRAWING.—Use of scales, set-squares, tee-square, drawing-board, compasses, and pencils; geometrical constructions required in woodwork (to be ascertained by consultation with the instructor); plan and elevation of simple rectangular models; oblique and isometric projection; hand sketching in orthogonal projection, or in oblique or isometric projection; dimensioning and lettering drawings. For each exercise in woodwork either a dimensioned hand sketch or a dimensioned instrumental drawing shall be made, either full size or to a convenient scale.

2. TOOLS.—Their use, development, construction, and maintenance. The instruction should include all the tools ordinarily used by the pupils, and the treatment should be as precise and practical as possible, the pupils making their own notes and sketches.

3. MATERIALS.—Growth of trees and their conversion into timber; characteristics and recognition of the commoner woods used by the pupils; derivation, manufacture, characteristics, and uses of other materials used by the pupils.

4. BENCH-WORK.—The exercises are to be so chosen and arranged as to provide for a regular and orderly development of the use of the various tools, and careful adjustment of the difficulties of manipulation to the stage of development of the technical skill of the pupil. On the other hand, a fixed range and order of exercises is not to be adopted, and the interest of the pupils must be maintained by the selection of objects which the pupils themselves regard as worthy of their best efforts. In the case of each tool the introductory exercise may belong to a fixed series chosen as being best adapted to the purpose of initiating the pupil into the use of the tools.

No rigid syllabus of the type of exercises to be chosen for the several years can be laid down, but as a general guide to teachers in preparing their schemes of work the following rough classification is suggested as being suitable, it being understood that in special exercises chosen by the pupils themselves and in team work the range of operations may be extended or restricted as required.

In Standard V (or Form I) the exercises should include planing to size, sawing to straight lines, paring to straight lines; use of bradawl and gimlet; the fitting of simple single joints and similar operations.

In Standard VI (or Form II) the exercises should include those of Standard V (or Form I) with the addition of the use of the gouge, bow-saw, and spokeshave, sawing to curved lines, shaping to curved lines, more difficult joints, including single mortise and tenon joint, dowelled joints, the construction of simple rectangular frames and simple inlays.

In Standard VII (or Form III) the exercises will include the work of the two previous years, with the addition of more difficult joints such as the double mortise and tenon joint and the dovetail joint, and of more difficult frames.

In all years simple metalwork fittings required in connection with the woodwork exercises should be made, as far as facilities permit, by the boys themselves.

In drawing up schemes of work it is to be noted that the bench-work is of first importance and must occupy the greater part of the time available; the drawing will necessarily absorb a considerable portion of the remainder, and the lessons on tools and materials will therefore be mainly incidental.

For further guidance the teacher should consult the special pamphlet on Manual Training issued by the Department.

LIGHT WOODWORK.

The equipment provided for doing light woodwork in the ordinary class-room will enable the teacher to extend very considerably the scope of the ordinary handwork, besides introducing new and fascinating projects. The material used will consist mainly of stripwood and plywood. For most purposes the stripwood should be dressed all over, and a variety of sections in commercial use may be obtained. For constructional work building models, &c.—sawn wood and waste wood from packing-cases will be found useful.

The operations to be performed by the pupils will be simple compared with those of the woodwork-room, and the mastery of the plane and saw will not be a direct object of the work. Design, construction, and decoration will be the important features of the course. Accuracy in setting out the work, and reasonable skill in edge-planing and sawing across grain, in the use of chisels, cutting-gauges, and scribers, and the employment of small nails, and screws, and in some cases cold-water glue, will easily be developed. Parts made of wire and thin sheet metal will be designed and constructed when required in connection with the woodwork.

Projects may range from simple objects, such as frames for small pictures, letter-racks, &c., to a complete range of farm-buildings or a doll's house worked out to scale, painted, papered, decorated, and furnished by the boys and girls in collaboration. The theory and practice of building framed structures can be illustrated very effectively by models built with stripwood, and boys in the Seventh Standard who have had one or two years in more elementary work, and have gained all the skill they are likely to acquire in the simple operations possible with the equipment, will thus be provided with projects suited to their greater maturity, and will be able to feel that the knowledge gained will be of definite practical value in their future work.

MUSIC.

INTRODUCTION.

The following is the programme recommended in music. It may, of course, be modified to suit the conditions of the school, but teachers should endeavour to make music a very important feature of their work. The aims of the teacher should be (1) to awaken the imagination of the children and widen their capacity for artistic self-expression; (2) to cultivate a musical ear and love of sweet sounds, and to train the pupils in the right use of their own voices; (3) to give some elementary knowledge of musical notation, and thus lay a foundation for further musical progress; (4) to develop musical taste.

The instruction should be based, as far as local conditions will admit, on the text-book, "Scheme of School Music related to Human Life" issued by the Education Department.

PREPARATORY DIVISION.

Nursery rhymes and simple songs learned by ear without effort or drilling. Free bodily movement to music. Ear-training in imitation of sounds patterned by the teacher, and discrimination between strongly contrasted sounds in quality, pitch, pace, and intensity. Breathing and voice exercises in a play-way. The scale and the common chord in preparation for sight singing. Listening without effort to music sung or played by teacher or gramophone, for frequent but very short periods. Singinggames. Percussion bands suggested.

JUNIOR DIVISION (STANDARDS I AND II).

Frequent singing of songs between lessons. Easy folk and national songs. More definite voice-training. Beginnings of expression. Keener recognition of quality, pitch, pace, and intensity in music, and discovery of accent. Orderly rhythmical movement to music. Singing from the sol-fa scale and chord applied to staff; *doh* varied, but not above second line. Two-, three-, and four-pulse times in sol-fa and staff. Time names for pulse, two-pulse, three-pulse, four-pulse, half-pulse, and rests. Gramophone music with pictorial value or pronounced rhythm, &c.

MIDDLE DIVISION (STANDARDS III AND IV).

More difficult unison songs; some sea-shanties; rounds and easy twopart songs. Extension of vocal compass and attention to detail in singing. Free interpretative movement to songs and music. Practice by pupils in conducting class or band. Ear-training in recognition of concordant intervals

and the lower of two simultaneous sounds. Fe and Ta in sol-fa. Letternames of notes on staff; the sharp, flat, and natural. Signs for treble and bass clefs. More advanced time and rhythm. Six-pulse, quarter-pulse, broken rhythms, dotted notes, and corresponding time names and rests. Sight-singing exercises to cover all the above. Building of simple tunes to be encouraged.

SENIOR DIVISIONS (STANDARDS V AND VI, OR FORMS I AND II).

Some classical songs. More difficult two-part songs and a few trios. Development of vocal flexibility, tone-colour, and expression. More advanced ear tests. Recognition of other intervals. Building key-signatures in staff. The *lah* mode, or minor scale. Chromatics. Timesignatures. The more common Italian terms and signs. Melody-making to be further encouraged.

HYGIENE AND FIRST AID.

INTRODUCTION.

Training in hygiene is of value only in so far as the principles taught become embodied in the daily life of the children. Therefore, health teaching must be practical. The school environment should illustrate, as far as possible, the requirements for health. Children should be encouraged to assist in beautifying their surroundings and in maintaining a high standard of order and cleanliness. There should be systematic supervision of outbuildings, wash-basins, &c. The schoolroom should be a model of tidiness and attractiveness. Ventilation should be carefully attended to, and care taken to see that pupils observe good posture. Nothing can excuse neglect by the teacher of the proper ventilation of the classrooms; as much of the teaching as possible should be carried on in the open air. With regard to posture it is the teacher's first duty to see that as far as possible children sit at desks or tables suited to their size. A high standard of personal cleanliness should be encouraged in pupils. Those suffering from verminous conditions or common skin-diseases should be recommended for immediate treatment, and excluded where necessary, in accordance with the provisions of the Education Act. School lunches should be organized and eaten under supervision, the opportunity thus afforded being utilized to impart information as to the requirements of a satisfactory lunch. In all classes "safety first" rules for crossing streets, &c., should be taught. In accordance with the age of pupils, emphasis should be laid upon the value of swimming and life-saving, and advice given how to deal with common emergencies—e.g.; a room full of coal-gas or benzine-fumes; danger from contact with electric wires; what to do if a child chokes or if his clothes catch fire.

As a basis for giving health lessons, teachers will find valuable the five Health letters for use in Health Week, distributed to schools by the School Hygiene Division, Department of Health, also the following Health leaflets :

H. 528-School Lunch.

H. 530-Care of Children's Teeth.

H. 531-The Hair and Scalp of the School-child.

H. 532-Common Skin-diseases in School-children.

H. 536--Suggestions to Parents.

H. 537-Defective Eyesight in Children.

- H. 634-Cleaning and Sanitation of Schools.

Copies of these may be obtained on application to the Director of School Hygiene, Health Department, Wellington.

It is the duty of every teacher to co-operate to the fullest extent with the officers of the Health Department who periodically visit the school to examine the pupils or who require the children's attendance at school dental clinics.

PREPARATORY CLASSES.

No set lesson need be given, but various devices can be used to interest children in the observance of health rules-for instance, a daily inspection as to cleanliness, inquiry as to health habits, use of the handkerchief, breathing through the nose, sleeping with the window open, washing hands before meals, cleaning teeth, &c. Health rules may be illustrated by simple stories, and may be impressed upon the minds of pupils by the manufacture of health posters during the handwork or drawing lessons.

STANDARDS I AND II.

Definite health talks dealing with the value of cleanliness of person and surroundings (care of the hair, nails, care of the teeth, &c.); sunlight and fresh air; ventilation of school and home; sleep and rest; food suitable for children; value of milk, green vegetables, fruit; harmfulness of excess of sweets, of pickles and condiments, &c.; danger of drinking water from ponds or using public vessels; value of exercise; correct posture, &c.

STANDARDS III AND IV.

Instruction should be on the same lines as indicated for Standards I and II, but somewhat more detailed and adapted to the understanding of older pupils. The function of the heart, lungs, and blood-vessels treated in a general way without detail.

Lessons to be given on the necessity for temperance in eating and drinking, with special reference to the harmful effects of alcohol. In this connection teachers are recommended to consult the special pamphlet and specimen lessons supplied with the approval of the Health Department.

The treatment of minor injuries, such as cuts, bruises, sprains, &c.

STANDARDS V AND VI.

Function of the heart, blood-vessels, lungs, &c. Somewhat more advanced knowledge of the requirements for healthy living with regard to cleanliness, clothing, fresh air, and sunlight, exercise, rest, food. How food should be handled and kept in the home, particularly meat, butter, and milk. The effect of alcohol and tobacco, and the dangers of intemperance. Importance of good posture. Elementary first aid for use in common accidents—e.g., in the treatment of wounds. What to do in case of broken limb or dislocated joint, &c. Restoration of the apparently drowned.

TEMPERANCE,

Instruction to be given in all standard classes. Meaning of temperance in its widest sense. Evils of intemperance in the use, for example, of food and games. Special dangers of intemperance as applied to the consumption of alcoholic liquors. Production of alcohol. The characteristics of pure alcohol. Proportion of alcohol in beer, wine, and spirits. Harmful effects of alcohol on the body, including the effect on the brain and nervous system, on the power of the body to resist disease, on the digestion of food, and body-temperature. Accidents in relation to the drinking of alcoholic liquors. Medicinal value of alcohol. Wastefulness of excessive drinking of alcoholic beverages; the nation's drink bill. Social evils resulting from alcoholic excess; methods of preventing such evils. The safest course for young people.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

INTRODUCTION.

Physical education has for its aim the formation and fixation, through conscious efforts, of correct habits of posture in standing and sitting, of grace and ease of carriage, of quick, quiet, and graceful movement, and also the harmonious development of the nerves, muscles, and organs of the body. Good physical habits, once fixed, profoundly affect character and health, and, as these are the most important factors in complete living, this phase of education is considered to be of the highest importance. The Education Act requires that at least fifteen minutes instruction per day shall be given in every school.

PREPARATORY DIVISION.

In this division the natural love of play and movement should be exploited to begin the formation of habits of correct posture, correct breathing, and quiet movement. From natural unorganized play should be evolved a love of ordered movement, and the beginning of a sense of fair play and mutual forbearance. Games in which children can find an outlet for their high spirits will effect more than formal drills or tiresome formations. Bouyant spirits must not be repressed, but directed to effect not only physical but also moral and intellectual development.

An appreciation of rhythm and a readiness to respond to stimuli should be developed through such exercises as those of the Dalcroze Eurhythmics. Kindergarten games, folk-dances, and action plays in which the physical movements are expressive of thoughts and feelings within the comprehension of little children.

Suitable games, exercises, and dances are described in the Department's pamphlet, "Course of Physical Exercises and Games for Infants."

JUNIOR DIVISION.

As in the Preparatory Division, the same principles in the development of habits of correct posture, correct breathing, and quiet movement should apply, but a wider field should be covered. Pupils are to be trained to correct defects in posture. Formal exercises and organized games suitable for this stage are to be found in the Department's Manual. Children now begin to play independently, and should be encouraged to do so. Tactful supervision will, in general, be necessary in order to ensure that the right spirit is being developed. Shy, awkward children who do not join in games should be taken in hand and taught to play.

Where possible, instruction in swimming should be commenced. Folk dancing and rhythmic exercises suitable to this stage and directed to secure grace and ease of movement.

MIDDLE DIVISION.

A continuation and extension of training directed towards the fixation of habits of good posture, correct breathing, and controlled movement.

The pupils will play games independently to a greater extent, and should receive encouragement and assistance. Here again tactful and unobstrusive supervision will assist in making possible the development of a good spirit of play.

The pupils are now at the most difficult stage of their school lives, and brisk formal drills and well-controlled or organized games carried out without harmful repression will do much to tone down the boisterous spirits of boys at this stage.

Wherever facilities exist, definite instruction in swimming is to be given to girls and boys.

Organized games and athletic sports should receive encouragement, and teachers should give such instruction and supervision as are necessary for the proper conduct of games and the further development of the right spirit. Folk-dancing to be extended to secure habits of grace and ease in movement.

SENIOR DIVISION.

An extended programme in training directed towards formation and fixation of habits of good posture, correct breathing, &c., and controlled movement.

As national games—tennis, cricket, football, hockey, basketball—should now be enjoyed by pupils, opportunity for becoming proficient in these should be given as far as facilities permit. Care must be taken that all pupils are afforded an opportunity of taking part in these games, and that members of teams or representative players do not monopolize the equipment. Swimming and life-saving to be thoroughly taught wherever possible.

Organized games, athletics as in the Middle Division, but extended in order to meet the needs of the older children.

More formal drill than in the lower classes.

Folk-dancing suitable to this stage.

ORGANIZATION OF INSTRUCTION.

The text-books to be used are "Syllabus of Physical Training in Schools" (1920) ; "Course of Physical Exercises and Games for Infants."

In Grade I and II schools the teachers should use their discretion as to the amount and nature of the work to be undertaken, but a record must be entered in the scheme of work for the year along with the numbers of the tables (P.T 1920) which they propose to take.

In schools above Grade II the head teacher should arrange the children according to their physical development and physique in as many squads as there are teachers available, and to each squad should be assigned a definite programme of work in all branches, including a definite number of tables. JAN. 10.]

Owing to varying conditions, it is undesirable to lay down a hard-andfast programme of work for all schools, but the following may be taken as a rough guide to the use of the tables :-

In all schools teachers of Primer classes will use "Physical Exercises and Games for Infants."

Grades I and II: Standard I to Standard VI, Tables 1-12.

Grade IIIA: Standard I and Infants to do infant work; Standard II to Standard VI, Tables 1-36.

Where there are three teachers: Primers do infant work; Squad I, Tables 1-36; Squad II, Tables 36-60.

Where there are four teachers: Primers do infant work; Squad 1, Tables 1-24; Squad 2, Tables 25-48; Squad 3, Tables 49-72. Where there are five teachers: Primers do infant work;

Souad 1. Tables 1-18; Squad 2, Tables 19-38; Squad 3, Tables 34-56; Tables 50-72. And so on. Squad 4,

It should be noted that in order to obtain the best results systematic physical exercises should be taken daily and at a fixed time.

License authorizing the Manunui Town Board to erect electric lines in the Manunui Toun District and Portion of the Taumarunui County.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

I N pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the Public Works Amendment Act, 1911, and of all other powers in anywise enabling him in that behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby authorize the Manunui Town Board to lay, construct, put up, place, and use the electric-lines described in the Schedule hereto on the following conditions following conditions.

CONDITIONS.

1. PURPOSES OF LINES.

THE said lines may be used for lighting, power, and heating purposes.

2. AREA OF SUPPLY.

The area of supply comprises the Town District of Manunui as at present constituted and also portion of the County of Taumarunui; as the said area is more particularly delineated Particular in the part of the said area is more particularly demined to by a distinctive border coloured brown on the plan marked P.W.D. 73641 (hereinafter referred to as "the said plan"), deposited in the office of the Minister of Public Works at Wellington.

3. LICENSES TO BE SUBJECT TO REGULATIONS

The license hereby conferred is subject to compliance by the licensee with the regulations made under section 2 of the aforesaid Act on the 11th day of July, 1927, and published in the *Gazette* on the 12th day of the same month at page 2360 (hereinafter called "the said regulations"), and with all regulations hereafter made in amendment thereof or in substitution therefor.

4. SYSTEM OF SUPPLY.

The system of supply shall be the system described in paragraph (e) of clause 5 of the said regulations.

5. GENERATING VOLTAGE.

Electrical energy shall be received in bulk from the Tau-marunui Borough Council at a pressure of 3,300 volts between phases.

6. CHARGES FOR ELECTRICAL ENERGY.

The charge for electrical energy shall not exceed 9d. per unit for lighting purposes, and 4d. per unit for motor-power, heat-ing, or cooking purposes; provided that "lighting purposes" shall include the operation of motor-generators for lighting purposes.

7. DURATION OF LICENSE.

This license shall, unless sooner determined, whether by surrender by the licensee or by revocation under the pro-visions contained in the said regulations or in any amending or substituted regulations, continue in force for a period of forty-two years from the date hereof.

8. PURCHASE OF INSTALLATION BY ELECTRIC-POWER BOARD.

Any Electric-power Board duly constituted in terms of the Any Electric-power Board duly constituted in terms of the Electric-power Boards Act, 1925, or any Act passed in amend-ment thereof or in substitution therefor, shall, if its district includes the area of supply hereinbefore described, have the right, at any time during the currency of this license, to pur-chase and take over the licensee's installation in the said area of supply, at a valuation to be agreed upon between the said Board and the licensee, and, failing such agreement, at a valuation to be fixed by a single arbitrator to be appointed pursuant to the provisions of the Arbitration Act, 1908, and thereupon the Governor-General may by Order in Council revoke this license. revoke this license.

9. Effect of Determination of License.

The determination of this license, whether by expiration of time, by surrender, or by revocation as aforesaid, shall not relieve the licensee from any liability theretofore incurred under this license.

10. RAILWAY AND TELEGRAPH LINES.

The licensee shall, from time to time, rectify to the satis-faction of the Minister of Railways and Minister of Telegraphs respectively any interference or disturbance caused by the erection or operation of the licensee's system that affects the satisfactory working of any telegraph-line which is under the control of or in use by the Railway Department and the Post and Telegraph Department respectively, and which was erected before the erection of the lines hereby licensed.

11. REQUIREMENTS OF TAUMARUNUI COUNTY COUNCIL.

Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, the licensee shall not by virtue of these presents be entitled to lay, construct, put up, place, or use the electric lines hereby authorized except subject to such conditions, not inconsistent with the provisions of this license or of the said regulations or any regulations hereafter made in amendment thereof or in substitution therefor, as may from time to time lawfully be imposed by the Taumarunui County Council.

12. ROUTES RESERVED FOR GOVERNMENT LINES.

Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained the licensee shall not, without the consent in writing of the Minister of Public Works, erect any electric lines along the routes of the Government main trunk transmission-lines.

SCHEDULE.

LINES adapted for supply as prescribed in these presents for the distribution of electricity within the said area of supply, as delineated in the said plan and thereon indicated by yellow, orange, and green lines.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS, there being no Harbour Board empowered to grant the license hereinafter mentioned, the Christehurch Navigation and Trading Syndicate (who, with its successors and assigns, is hereinafter referred to as "the licensee"), has applied to the Governor-General in Council for a license under the Warbours Act 1923 (hereinafter called licensee "), has applied to the Governor-General in Council for a license under the Harbours Act, 1923 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), to occupy a part of the foreshore and land below low-water mark at Ferrymead, in the Heathcote River, as a site for a wharf, to be built in the position and in accord-ance with a plan marked M.D. 6351, and deposited in the office of the Marine Department at Wellington, and to prescribe the dues and rates to be taken and charged for the use of the said wharf. wharf :

And whereas it has been made to appear to the Governor-General in Council that the work will not be or tend to the injury of navigation, and the said plan has, prior to the making of this Order in Council, been approved by the Governor-General in Council :

And whereas it is desirable that a license should be granted and issued to the licensee under the said Act for the purpose aforesaid, on the terms and conditions hereinafter expressed :

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by the said Act, and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby approve Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby approve of the purpose or object for which the said license is required by the licensee as aforesaid; and, in further pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, and with the like advice and consent as aforesaid, doth hereby license and permit the licensee to use and occupy that part of the foreshore and land below low-water mark on which the said wharf is to be erected, as shown on plan marked M.D. 6351, deposited as aforesaid for the numbers of erecting and maintaining the said aforesaid, for the purpose of erecting and maintaining the said wharf thereon, such license to be held and enjoyed by the licensee upon and subject to the terms and conditions set forth in the First Schedule hereto, and doth prescribe that the dues and rates set forth in the Second Schedule shall be charged and taken by the licensee for the use of the said wharf.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

- 1. In these conditions the term "Foreshore" means such reshore" means such parts of the bed, shore, or banks of a tidal water as are covered and uncovered by the flow and ebb of the tide at ordinary spring tides :
 - "Low-water mark" means low-water mark at ordinary spring tides: "Minister" means the Minister of Marine as defined by
 - the Shipping and Seaman Act, 1908, and includes any officer, person, or authority acting by or under the direction of such Minister.

2. The concessions and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall extend and apply only to that part of the fore-shore and land below low-water mark necessary for the erection and maintenance of the said wharf, as shown on the Blan marked M.D. 6351, and deposited in the office of the Marine Department as aforesaid.
3. In consideration of the concessions and privileges granted

3. In consideration of the concessions and privileges granted by this Order in Council the licensee shall pay to the Minister the sum of £2 10s. and thereafter an annual sum of £5 (in advance), payable on the 1st day of April in each year, the proportionate part of such rental in respect of the period from the date hereof until the 31st March following to be paid on the licensee being supplied with a copy of this Order in Council. 4. All persons shall, at all reasonable times, upon payment of proper dues, have free and full liberty to use the said wharf and all rights of ingress and egress thereon and therefrom.

5. His Majesty or the Governor-General, and all officers in the Government service acting in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress into, through, and out of the said wharf without payment.

6. The licensee shall maintain the above-mentioned wharf in good order and repair; and shall at all times exhibit there-from and maintain at the licensee's own cost suitable and necessary lights for the guidance of vessels: Provided that no light shall be exhibited until after it has been approved of by

the Minister. 7. Any person authorized by the Minister may at all reason-able times enter upon the said wharf and view the state of able times enter upon the said wharf and view the state of repair thereof; and upon such Minister leaving at or posting to the last known registered office of the licensee in New Zealand a notice in writing of any defect or want of repair in such wharf, requiring the licensee within a reasonable time to be therein prescribed, to repair the same, the licensee shall with all convenient speed cause such defect to be removed or such remains to be mede repairs to be made.

8. Nothing herein contained shall authorize the licensee to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or inconsistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regulation of the Minister of Customs, or with any provisions of the Harbours Act, 1923, or its amendments, or any regulations made there-under, and that are now or may hereafter be in force.

9. The ballast of all vessels loading at the said wharf shall be taken away by the licensee and deposited above high-water mark, or at such place as may be approved of by the Minister or by any person appointed by the Minister for that purpose.

10. The rights, powers, and privileges conferred by or under this Order in Council shall continue to be in force for fourteen this Order in Council shall continue to be in force for fourteen years from the date hereof, unless in the meantime such rights, powers, and privileges shall be altered, modified, or revoked by competent authority; and the licensee shall not assign, charge, or part with any such right, power, or privilege, with-out the written consent of the Minister first obtained.

11. The said rights, powers, and privileges may be at any time resumed by the Governor-General, without payment of any compensation whatever, on giving to the licensee three calendar months' previous notice in writing. Any such notice shall be sufficient if given by the Minister and delivered at or posted to the last known registered office of the licensee in New Zealand.

12. The licensee shall be liable for any injury which the said wharf may cause any vessel or boat to sustain through any default or neglect on the licensee's part.

- 13. In case the licensee shall-
- Commit or suffer a breach of the conditions hereinbefore set forth, or any of them :
- (2) Cease to use or occupy the said wharf for a period of thirty days :
- Be in any manner wound up or dissolved : or
- (4) Fail to pay the sums specified in clause 3 of these conditions,—

then, and in any of the said cases, this Order in Council, and every license, right, power, or privilege may be revoked and determined by the Governor-General in Council without any notice to the licensee or any proceeding whatever; and publication in the *New Zealand Gazette* of an Order in Council containing such revocation shall be sufficient notice to the licensee and to all persons concerned or interested, that this Order in Council, and the license, rights, and privileges thereby granted and conferred have been revoked and determined.

14. In the event of this Order in Council being revoked for any reason whatsoever, or upon the expiry of the period for which the license is granted, the licensee shall, if required by the Minister so to do, remove the said wharf entirely from the site and restore the site to its original condition within three months from the date of revocation or expiry, as the case may be; and if the licensee fails so to do, the Minister may cause the said wharf to be removed and the site so restored, and may recover the costs incurred by the said removal and restoration from the company.

His Majesty or the Governor-General, and all officers in the Government service acting in the execution of their duty oball at all times have free ingress passage, and egress

duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress into, over, and out of the said wharf without payment. 5. The Council shall maintain and keep the above-mentioned

wharf, and all erections on or in connection with the wharf in good order and repair; and shall at all times exhibit therefrom, and maintain at the Council's own cost, suitable and necessary lights for the guidance of vessels: Provided that no new light shall be exhibited until after it has been approved by the Minister.

6. All dues and rates received on account of the said wharf by the Council shall be applied to keeping the said wharf and all erections on or in connection with such wharf in good order and repair.

7. Any person authorized by the Minister may at all reasonable times enter upon the said wharf and any buildings erected on the wharf, or in connection therewith, and view the state of repair thereof; and upon the Minister leaving at or posting to the last known address of the Council in New at or posting to the last known address of the Council in New Zealand a notice in writing of any defect or want of repair in such wharf or buildings, requiring the Council, within a reasonable time to be therein prescribed, to make good and repair the same, the Council shall, with all convenient speed, cause such defect to be removed or such repairs to be made. 8. The ballast of all vessels loading at the said wharf shall be taken away by the Council and deposited above high-water mark, or at such place as may be approved of by the Minister or by any person-appointed by the Minister for that purpose.

9. The Council shall not erect, or suffer to be erected, on the said wharf any building or structure whatever, except with the consent of the Minister.

10. The Council shall keep a separate account of the receipts and expenditure on account of such wharf and premises, and shall cause such account to be balanced to the 31st day of March in every year, and shall send a copy of such account when balanced to the Minister, and shall supply any parti-culars in reference thereto as may be required by the Minister.

11. The Council shall appoint all officers necessary for the working and management of the said wharf. 12. Nothing herein contained shall authorize the Council to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or incon-sistent with any law relating to the Customs, or any regulations of the Minister of Customs, or with any provisions of the Harbours Act, 1923, or its amendments, or any regulation thereunder, and that are now or may hereafter be in force. 13. The rights, powers, and privileges hereby conferred shall continue in force for fourteen years, computed from the

All vessels and boats plying within the harbour shall be placed by the masters or persons in charge thereof, at such places within the harbour as the wharfinger shall direct, and shall be removed from such places when required by the wharfinger so to do. 22. No vessel shall be berthed, or removed from any berth,

22. No vessel shar be berefed, of removed that all berefet, unless by direction or permission of the wharfinger. 23. For the general safety of vessels frequenting the said harbour the said wharfinger shall have control of the fires and lights which may be required on board thereof, and masters of such vessels shall take instructions given by him as final.

24. No ballast shall be taken from the harbour foreshore, or 24. IN balance small be taken from the harbour foreshore, or from any place under the control of the Council, without the sanction first obtained of the wharfinger. 25. All boatmen, stevedores, carters, or other persons engaged on the wharf shall be under the control and shall

obey the orders of the wharfinger, and any person disobeying such orders, or in any way obstructing the traffic on the wharf, or making use of any abusive or improper language thereon, or on board of any ship alongside thereof, shall be liable to a penalty.

26. Every master, owner, or agent of a vessel loading or un-loading in the harbour shall deliver to the wharfinger a true

loading in the harbour shall deliver to the wharfinger a true return of all goods so loaded or unloaded. 27. No master of any such vessel shall receive goods with-out the permission of the wharfinger first had and obtained. 28. No person shall remove any goods from the wharf or from the foreshore within a distance of 50 ft. on each side of it until all dues thereon have been paid, nor shall any per-son remove such goods before signing a receipt therefor, nor until the wharfinger has given authority for such removal. 29. The wharfinger shall give receipts for all dues and fees received by him.

received by him. 30. The master of any ship berthed at the wharf as afore-30. The master of any ship berthed at the wharf as afore-said shall cause the discharge or loading of any such ship to be commenced and continued until completed by working at such hours as the wharfinger shall direct, provided that such directions shall not be in contravention of any Customs or harbour enactment or regulation. 31. All goods landed on the wharf or brought thereon for shipment shall be placed as the wharfinger shall direct, and in such manner as to keep all mooring posts or rings free, and all rails or tranways clear

and all rails or tramways clear.

In such manner as to keep all mooring posts of rings free, and all rails or tramways clear. 32. No goods shall be left on the wharf for a longer period than twenty four hours without the permission of the wharfinger, and the wharfinger may, when in his opinion the public convenience requires it, during or after the expiration of any such period, cause any goods to be removed from the wharf, or approach thereto, to any place he may think proper, at the expense and risk of the owner or agent, or the person in charge of such goods. 33. Every master, owner, or agent of any vessel having on board any goods or cargo intended to be transhipped shall give notice in writing to the wharfinger before such tran-shipment, specifying and showing what goods or cargo are intended to be so transhipped so that wharfage dues may be levied and recovered in respect thereof. 34. Vessels using the wharf may discharge or load cargo over and across any other vessel or vessels lying alongside the wharf, and the master or masters of the inner vessel, must give every reasonable facility for carrying on such dis-charging or loading.

35. Every master of a vessel using the wharf shall be responsible for the proper slinging of all goods discharged from or laden on to such wharf, and for any damage that may occur either from the breakage of slings or from such goods being imperfectly slung.
36. The Council shall not be held responsible for the safety of any goods deposited in the shed upon the wharf.
37. Any person committing a breach of any of the foregoing regulations shall for each such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, which shall be recoverable under the provisions of the Harbours Act, 1923.
