A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS the Scenery Preservation Board constituted pursuant to the Scenery Preservation Act, 1908 (hereinafter referred to as "the said Act"), has recommended that the land described in the Schedule hereto should be permanently reserved for scenic purposes, and it is expedient to give effect to such recommendation:

Now, therefore, I, Charles, Baron Bledisloe, Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the land described in the Schedule hereto shall be a scenic reserve under the said Act, and subject to the provisions thereof.

SCHEDULE.

ARATIATIA RAPIDS SCENIC RESERVE.

ALL that area in the Auckland Land District containing by admeasurement 67 acres, more or less, being Section 4, Block XI, Tatua Survey District, bounded towards the north by Section 3, Block XI, Tatua Survey District, 5351.2 links; towards the east by Tahorakuri No. 2 Block, 697.8 links; towards the south generally by the Waikato River (Aratiatia Rapids) and a public road: be all the aforesaid linkages a little more or less. land shall, as from a date to be specified in the Proclamation, cease to be national-endowment land :

And whereas the fee-simple of the land described in the Schedule hereto (being land heretofore held under the tenures specified in the said Schedule) has been acquired, and it is expedient that the said land should cease to be national-endowment land :

2. The Commissioner of Crown Lands shall be the Chairman of the Board. He may join in the discussion, and shall have an original as well as a casting-vote.

3. Special meetings may be convened by the Chairman, provided that two days' notice of such meeting be given to each member, specifying the business to be transacted at such special meeting; and no other business than that so specified shall be transacted at such meeting.

4. Any four members of the Board shall form a quorum. Any meeting may be adjourned from time to time.

5. All questions shall be determined by the majority of votes of the members of the Board present at a meeting.

6. If at any meeting the Chairman is not present at the time appointed for holding the same, the members present shall choose one of their number to be chairman of such meeting.

7. If by resignation, death, incapacity, or otherwise the seat of any member shall be or become vacant, or if any member absents himself, without reasonable cause, from three consecutive meetings of the Board, the Governor-General shall have power to appoint any other person to be a member of the Board in his stead.

8. The Board shall prepare and submit at an annual meeting to be held in the month of April in each year a report of the proceedings of the Board for the previous year ending on the thirty-first day of March, together with a statement of the receipts and expenditure of the Board for such year. A copy of every such report and statement, certified by the Chairman to be correct, shall be sent to the Minister charged with the administration of the said Act as soon as possible after each annual meeting.

9. The Board shall control the said reserve in accordance with the provisions of the said Act and of the regulations made thereunder.

NOTE.—An unseasonable month. Temperature and sunshine were both considerably below the average, while cloudiness was much above normal. Total bright sunshine, 194.3 hours, 42 per cent. of the possible, and one sunless day. The rainfall at Karori Reservoir, near Kelburn, was 94 per cent. above the mean of previous years. Hail fell on the 5th and 9th; lightning was seen on the 15th, 22nd, and 28th, and thunder was heard on the 13th, 15th, 28th, and 30th. Mean dew-point, 52.9°; and mean vapour pressure 0.400 in.

SUMMARY FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY, 1930.

January was a most unseasonable month. Unsettled weather prevailed with only a few short breaks. Cloudiness and the number of wet days were much above the average, while sunshine was considerably below it. Temperatures fell below the normal for January by an unusually large amount. Rainfall was almost everywhere in large excess. The only exceptions to this rule were in parts of North Auckland, the Bay of Plenty, and Southland. The month was, in fact, the wettest January since that of 1923, which was the wettest so far recorded. At Auckland, Timaru, Geraldine, and a few other places record falls for January were experienced.

The abundant rainfall has ensured prolific growth of grass and vegetation generally. Crops are in good state, the damage done by the rain being less severe than might have been expected. There has been some tendency in Canterbury for wheat stalks to break off near the roots, the effect chiefly of an earlier dry spell. Some crops, too, will be difficult to harvest through having been beaten down. Grass, though plentiful, is rather soft. Dairy cattle are doing well, but lambs are not fattening properly. Haymaking has been everywhere retarded or prevented. Farmers converting fodder into ensilage have been more fortunate. Fruit crops are good for the most part, but with stone fruit this is not the case. A dry spell in February will be of much benefit.

Though weather of the westerly type has again been less predominant than in ordinary years, the two spells experienced were quite sufficiently vigorous samples. The first occurred during the first week of the month. The principal depression of this series was a deep V-depression which crossed New Zealand on the 4th. On that day there were widespread northerly gales. Very heavy and general rain fell on the 3rd and 4th. In the Thames Valley there was some flooding, and the Mangamahoe Dam in Taranaki was damaged by a cloud-burst. On the 5th, though there was less rain, there were some severe hailstorms in Canterbury, Marlborough, and Wellington.

The second westerly spell lasted from the 19th to the 22nd. Northerly or north-westerly gales were particularly severe. At Wellington the twenty-four hours ending at 9 a.m. on the 21st was one of the windiest ever experienced. In Canterbury, also, the high winds caused some damage. Very heavy rain fell on the ranges of the South Island during this

period, and there were considerable snowfalls on the high levels. Thunderstorms were recorded at many places. A combination of rain and snow in a thunderstorm and a north-westerly gale was responsible for the loss of five lives in the Tasman Glacier on the 19th. At Auckland on the 21st a torrential downpour caused flooding in some of the city streets. The steamship "Awarua" was struck by a thunderbolt while at Half-moon Bay, Stewart Island, on the 20th.

During the remainder of the month the storm systems were mainly of cyclonic form. On the 8th a shallow cyclone developed in the Bay of Plenty and deepened rapidly through the night. At the same time, a rather intense anticyclone crossed the southern portion of the South Island. The result was that strong southerly or south-easterly winds suddenly set in and rose to gale force in places, especially in Cook Strait. Temperatures fell sharply, bringing on an unusually cold spell for the season of the year. Rain was almost general, with many heavy falls between the 8th and the 11th—especially on the 8th and 9th—eastern districts receiving the highest totals. On the night of the 8th snow fell on the mountain tops of the South Island, and hail was recorded at places.

Another cyclone approached New Zealand on the 14th and passed through Cook Strait on the 15th. Except in the far North and south-west, there was again general and heavy rain. Falls were particularly heavy in Canterbury, where there was much flooding. In the Ashburton county the floods were the heaviest known.

Almost general rains with many heavy falls, especially in the South Island, were again experienced on the 27th and 28th, when a cyclone moved across Canterbury.

Thunderstorms were rather numerous during the month.

*Regulations made by the Public Service Commissioner affecting Employees
in the Printing and Stationery Department.*

IN pursuance and exercise of the authority conferred on him by the Public Service Act, 1912 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), the Commissioner, with the approval of the Governor-General in Council, doth hereby revoke the regulations (affecting every officer or other person employed in the Printing and Stationery Department) made under the said Act on the seventeenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and all additions thereto and amendments thereof; and doth hereby make the regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto; and doth order and declare that such revocation and the regulations hereby made shall have effect from the date of publication of this Order in Council in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS.

PART I.—INTRODUCTORY.

Interpretation.

1. These regulations shall be construed with reference to the terms and interpretations of the said Act and any amendments thereof.

In addition to the interpretations there given,—

"Government Printer" means the permanent head of the Department:

"Superintendent" means the person responsible for the general supervision of the various mechanical branches of the Department:

"Head of a branch" means the person responsible for the proper management of his particular branch:

"Employee" means any person employed in any capacity, whether temporarily or as an officer:

"The Act" means the Public Service Act, 1912; and if at any time that Act is amended, means that Act as so amended.

Application of the Regulations.

2. These regulations, except where otherwise provided, shall apply to all employees of the General Division of the Printing and Stationery Department.

General Regulations.

3. Subject to the provisions of these regulations, Parts I, II, V, VII, and VIII of the General Regulations made by the Public Service Commissioner shall apply to all employees of the General Division of the Printing and Stationery Department.

Employees required to have Knowledge of Act and Regulations.

4. Every employee is required to make himself acquainted with the provisions of the Act and these regulations. Ignorance of any such provision or regulation will not be accepted as an excuse for breaches thereof.

5. A copy of the Act and these regulations shall be kept in each branch of the Department for the use of the employees therein.

PART II.—ATTENDANCE OF EMPLOYEES.

Hours of Work.

6. (1) The hours of attendance to be observed by employees of the General Division, except where otherwise provided, shall be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., with an interval of one hour for luncheon, except on Saturdays, when the hours shall be from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

(2) The hours of attendance for typesetting-machine operators shall be from 8 a.m. to 4.30 p.m., with an interval of one hour for luncheon, except on Saturdays, when the hours shall be from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

(3) The number of working-hours in the case of the staff engaged on night duty shall be four hours less per week than for the day staff, and the additional rate of pay shall be not less than 10s. per week.

Attendance of Employees.

7. Punctual attendance shall be strictly observed, and each employee shall continue to work diligently until the signal to cease is given.

Recording of Time worked.

8. Time-clocks are provided in the several branches to record the time of arrival and departure of all employees. Each employee shall strike the clock for himself. A breach of this rule will be severely dealt with.

Absentees to be reported.

9. Absentees shall be reported by the heads of branches to the Superintendent each morning before 10 o'clock.

Absence from Duty.

10. Except in cases of sudden illness or other emergency, which shall be immediately reported to the Government Printer, no employee shall be absent without leave from duty. Where for the above reason an employee cannot attend at the time appointed, he shall use his best endeavour to send intimation of his absence and the reason therefor to the head of his branch at such a time as will enable it to be received before noon of the day he is due to attend. If the absence is likely to extend for more than one day the intimation, if not in writing, shall be followed by a letter of explanation from such employee to the head of his branch.

Penalty for Unauthorized Absence.

11. In cases where an employee's absence is not sanctioned, there shall be deducted from his salary his pay for the period of such absence, in addition to any further penalty which may be deemed necessary.

Overtime.

12. If attendance should be required earlier in the morning or later at night than usual, such attendance will be paid for as overtime at not less than Arbitration Court award rates relating to the printing trade.

PART III.—RESPONSIBILITIES AND DUTIES OF EMPLOYEES.

Responsibility of Controlling Officers.

13. (1) The Superintendent shall be responsible to the Government Printer for the discipline, efficiency, and economical administration of the various branches of the Department under his control.

(2) The head of a branch shall be responsible to the Superintendent for the proper management of such branch.

(3) In furtherance of this regulation special attention is drawn to the necessity for—

- (a) Promoting efficiency and economy in the methods of working, in the number of employees engaged, and in dealing with and in the use of all Government property. Extravagance or waste of any description whatever shall not be allowed.
- (b) Watching closely the volume of work performed, and reporting to the Government Printer any falling-off therein, whether temporary or otherwise, or when it is possible to effect a reduction in the staff through rearrangement of duties or improved methods of working.
- (c) Encouraging employees to submit suggestions for increasing the efficiency of the Department, or for diminishing the work and its cost.

Breaches of Regulations.

14. Heads of branches shall report to the Superintendent any breaches of the Act or regulations which may come to their knowledge.

Opportunity to be afforded Junior Employees to gain General Knowledge.

15. Junior employees are to be afforded every possible opportunity of gaining a complete knowledge of the work of the branch in which they are employed. The progress of every junior employee shall be carefully watched.

Resignation or Death of Employees.

16. On the resignation or death of any employee the head of the branch (through the Superintendent) shall immediately report the fact to the Government Printer, who shall forward the report to the Commissioner.

Annual Report by Heads of Branches.

17. A yearly report shall be supplied to the Government Printer by the head of each branch (through the Superintendent) on the efficiency, regularity, and punctuality of each employee under his control.

Employees shall be notified at once of the nature of any adverse report.

Performance of Duties.

18. (1) Heads of branches shall see that each employee is competent for the work he is set to do, and that the work is performed in a proper manner. Any remissness of duty, want of punctuality, or wastefulness on the part of any employee shall be at once reported to the Superintendent.

(2) Whenever it is found that an employee, whilst not guilty of a direct breach of any regulation, is yet not giving satisfaction in the performance of his duty or otherwise he shall be informed in writing of the fact by the Superintendent, and of the direction in which he is failing.

(3) In submitting the annual reports under Regulation 17 the Superintendent shall mention the instances in which such notification has been given, and state what the effect has been.

Employee charged with Offence before Court.

19. If any employee is convicted by any Court of any offence arising from improper conduct of such employee, the head of his branch (through the Superintendent) shall immediately report the circumstances to the Government Printer, who shall forward such report to the Commissioner.

Insobriety.

20. If the Superintendent or head of a branch observes at any time that any employee under his supervision is unfit to perform his duties properly by reason of overindulgence in intoxicating liquor or drugs, he shall immediately report the matter to the Government Printer.

Intoxicating Liquor.

21. Any employee found introducing or causing to be introduced intoxicating liquors into the premises shall be deemed to be guilty of improper conduct.

Unsatisfactory Work.

22. If any employee is negligent, careless, or indolent in the discharge of his duty, the head of the branch shall, in the case of a minor offence, reprimand or caution the employee; but in the case of offences of a more serious nature, or if a further offence is committed, it shall be the duty of the head of the branch (through the Superintendent) to report the circumstances to the Government Printer, who shall deal with the matter in terms of section 52 of the Act.

Employees seeking Redress.

23. Any employee who has cause to complain of the conduct of another employee shall make his complaint to the head of his branch within seven days of the date on which such conduct is alleged to have occurred. Such complaint shall be immediately forwarded to the Government Printer (through the Superintendent), who shall forthwith call upon the person complained of to furnish an explanation. If the Government Printer considers the matter sufficiently serious he shall refer the matter to the Commissioner. This regulation shall not apply in cases where the redress of such complaints is provided for in the duly approved rules or regulations of a Chapel.

Confidential Work.

24. To ensure due secrecy, Ministerial statements and memoranda, Customs-tariff alterations, policy measures, and all work of a strictly confidential character shall, when practicable, be entrusted only to employees of the permanent staff. Should the extent or urgency of the work, however, require a wider distribution, it shall be the duty

of the Superintendent and overseers to confine it to as few hands as possible.

Suggestions for Improvements invited.

25. Suggestions that tend towards economy and efficient working of the different branches are invited from employees. Such suggestions should be forwarded by heads of branches (through the Superintendent) to the Government Printer, and if adopted will be duly recognized.

Applications of Employees: How to be made.

26. The application of any employee for promotion, leave of absence, or in respect to any other matter affecting his position in the Department shall be made by the applicant himself, through the head of his branch, to the Superintendent, who shall forward same to the Government Printer. If an application is made by or through any other person it will be treated as irregular.

Right of Appeal.

27. In addition to the right of appeal conferred by the provisions of section 17 of the Public Service Amendment Act, 1927, in the event of any employee feeling aggrieved with any decision of the Government Printer affecting himself personally or the branch in which he serves, permission will be given such employee to state the grounds of his dissatisfaction, in writing, to the Commissioner. Such statement shall be handed to the Government Printer, who shall forward it to the Commissioner within four days, together with such remarks or explanation as he feels called upon to make. The decision of the Government Printer shall remain in force until such time as the decision of the Commissioner is given. The employee shall have the right to appear before the Commissioner and state his case either personally or by a representative from the staff, and call evidence in support of his case.

Remaining in or returning to the Premises after Hours. Visitors.

28. An employee shall not remain in or return to departmental premises after working-hours without the permission of the head of his branch.

Strangers are not allowed in the workrooms except by authority of the Government Printer or the Superintendent.

Notice to Employees.

29. Whenever notice is by the Act required to be given to an employee of any decision or of any other matter, it shall be sufficient if notice of such decision or matter is sent to such employee by a post letter, addressed to him at the branch in which he is employed, or if notice of such decision or matter is published in the *Public Service Official Circular*.

Registering Addresses of Employees.

30. The place of residence of each employee, and any change of residence, shall be at once notified to the head of his branch, who will be responsible for seeing that the names and addresses are registered.

Notice when leaving Service.

31. Any permanent employee wishing to leave the service of the Department may be required to give three months' notice of his intention so to do: Provided that in special cases the Commissioner may reduce the period of notice upon such terms as he considers reasonable.

Employees not to visit other Branches.

32. Each employee shall confine himself to that part of the branch in which he is engaged, and shall not visit or work in any other part unless authorized by his controlling officer.

Accidents.

33. Every accident on duty shall be immediately reported to the head of the branch, who will make a report on the prescribed form and forward same (through the Superintendent) to the Government Printer. Every accident shall be reported as soon as possible, care being taken to preserve all important facts in connection with the

accident for embodiment in the report. A stock of first-aid appliances and material shall be provided and kept in accessible positions, and such stock shall be regularly examined at intervals of not more than three months to see that it is in a proper and serviceable condition. This shall be the special duty of the head of the branch, and a record shall be kept of the result of each examination.

Smoking.

34. Smoking in the workroom is prohibited during working-hours.

Fire.

35. Any employee using artificial light or fire shall extinguish it before leaving the premises. Combustible materials shall not be permitted to accumulate. Heads of branches will be responsible for seeing that this regulation is complied with.

Testing Fire Appliances.

36. All fire appliances shall be tested regularly, and a record kept by the officer in charge showing the date of testing and state of the appliances.

Stores Regulations.

37. Heads of branches will be responsible for the observance of all regulations and instructions in force from time to time affecting the purchase, custody, receipt, and disposal of stores and materials.

Requisitions.

38. Requisitions for the purchase of stores and materials are to be made in strict accordance with the regulations in that behalf.

39. No supplies shall be issued without an order signed by the Government Printer or duly authorized officer. In all cases a receipt is to be given by the officer to whom the articles are issued.

Custody of Stores and Materials.

40. A record in the prescribed form shall be kept by the head of each branch of all supplies or other requisites which may be in his charge. He shall be held responsible for the proper custody and preservation of such stores.

41. Special attention shall be paid to the preservation of all stores and material so as to prevent loss, depreciation, or deterioration.

42. Strict economy is to be exercised in the use of all supplies, and heads of branches shall not permit any wasteful, improper, or extravagant practice.

43. Employees to whom supplies or other materials are entrusted for use shall be responsible for their proper application to the purpose for which they have been issued.

44. No old or surplus material shall be dealt with or disposed of except as directed by the Government Printer.

45. An employee is, except with the permission of the Government Printer, forbidden to bring into the workrooms material or goods of any description, other than tools required for his work which are not provided by the Department.

Work in Employee's own Time.

46. Under no circumstances shall an employee make for private purposes articles of any description upon the premises.

Departmental Property not to be taken from the Premises.

47. An employee is forbidden to take any departmental property away from the premises (other than for departmental purposes). Any employee having occasion to take tools or material from the workrooms to any place where he may be temporarily employed shall obtain a permit from the head of the branch. Such tools and any surplus materials shall be returned to the workrooms.

48. An employee shall not convert to his own use any material or article the property of the Department, however small its value may be.

Branding Tools.

49. Every tool the property of the Department shall bear the departmental brand, and each employee shall see that the brand is made and maintained on each tool. Such tools shall not be used

until they are properly branded. An employee on leaving the Department shall account for all departmental tools entrusted to his care.

Responsibility for Tools.

50. The head of each branch will be held responsible for the safety, accuracy, branding, and condition of all portable and special tools, and shall report any case of injury to such tools by any employee, provided such injury is not due to fair wear-and-tear.

51. No tools, appliances, or material of any description belonging to the Department shall be lent, borrowed, or exchanged except upon the written authority of the Government Printer.

Damage to Property.

52. An employee shall not damage, destroy, or otherwise make away with any tool or other article, or deface, mutilate, or destroy any notice or article the property of the Department.

53. An employee in the course of his work breaking or otherwise damaging machinery or other property of the Department shall at once report the matter to the head of his branch, who will make a report on the prescribed form, and forward same (through the Superintendent) to the Government Printer.

PART IV.—LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

(A) RECREATION LEAVE.

Period of Leave allowable.

54. The permanent staff and temporary employees of twelve months' continuous service may be granted leave of absence for recreation on the following scale: Two weeks at Christmas time (all public holidays occurring during that period to be included therein), and six working-days at such other period during the year as shall be arranged by the Government Printer.

Conditions governing granting of Annual Leave.

55. The granting of any such leave of absence shall be subject to the express conditions—

- (a) That the behaviour of the employee has been in every way satisfactory;
- (b) That the total sick-leave during the previous twelve months has not exceeded twelve working-days; and
- (c) That his duties have been satisfactorily performed.

All the days of absence in excess of the number of days allowed for sick-leave shall be deducted from the annual leave of absence granted for recreation: Provided that where such excess leave has been on half-pay the number of days to be deducted from the annual leave shall be reduced by one-half, and, further, that where such excess leave has been without pay no deduction shall be made from the annual leave.

Special Consideration in Exceptional Circumstances.

56. In special cases the Commissioner may, on the recommendation of the Government Printer, grant further leave.

Withholding of Annual Leave.

57. If for any cause the Government Printer thinks leave of absence ought not to be granted he may refuse the same, subject to the right of appeal to the Commissioner.

Accumulated Annual Leave.

58. An employee failing to avail himself of the annual leave provided for will not on that account be entitled to a more lengthened leave in any subsequent year, unless under special circumstances approved by the Commissioner: Provided that if an employee desires to accumulate leave he may be allowed to do so for two years only, subject, however, to his giving notice to the Government Printer when the annual-leave schedule for the first year is being prepared that he does not desire leave during that year.

(B) SICK-LEAVE.

Period allowable by Permanent Head.

59. (1) Sick-leave up to one month may be granted by the Government Printer, and a report of all leave granted under this regulation shall be submitted every two months for the approval of the Commissioner.

(2) Where sick-leave for more than one month is applied for, the application shall be referred by the Government Printer to the Commissioner.

Commissioner may grant further Leave.

60. Where in case of illness any employee who has received leave of absence for one month is not so far recovered as to be able to resume his duties, further extensions of leave may be granted by the Commissioner: Provided that on each extension of leave the employee may be subjected to an examination by a medical practitioner approved by the Commissioner.

Pay during Period of Sick-leave.

61. (1) Permanent employees shall be entitled to pay during sick-leave in accordance with the following schedule:—

Length of Service.	Period for which Leave may be granted.	
	On Full Pay.	On Half-pay.
Under three months	1 week
Over three months and under six months	2 weeks
Over six months and under nine months	1 month
Over nine months and under five years	1 month ..	1 month.
Over five years and under ten years	2 months ..	2 months.
Over ten years and under twenty years	4 months ..	4 months.
Over twenty years and under thirty years	5 months ..	8 months.
Over thirty years	6 months ..	12 months.

(2) No exception will be made in the foregoing schedule, except in the case of illness resulting from causes that can be directly traced to the conditions under which an employee is working, or where an employee in the discharge of his duties and through no fault of his own sustains injuries of such a nature as to incapacitate him from duty.

(3) Pay during sick-leave shall not be granted where an employee receives compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

Medical Examination before Resumption of Work.

62. If any employee is absent from duty on account of illness, and such absence has extended beyond three months, he shall not be permitted to return to duty until some medical practitioner, approved by the Commissioner, has certified that he is fit to resume work.

Payment for Sundays and Holidays during Leave on Reduced Pay.

63. When extended leave is granted other than on full pay the rate paid for Sundays and holidays shall be the same as that allowed for the period of leave.

Calculation of Sick-leave.

64. Sick-leave allowed, whether by the Government Printer or by the Commissioner, under these regulations may be granted in one or more periods, but the aggregate amount of leave provided for in Regulation 61 is intended to cover the whole of the period of an employee's service.

Medical Certificate to be furnished.

65. Whenever an employee is absent from duty on account of illness or accident for any period extending beyond three days, a medical certificate stating the nature of the illness or accident and the probable period of absence shall be furnished to the Government Printer. The Government Printer may, however, in his discretion require that the medical certificate shall be furnished forthwith.

Penalty for Imposition.

66. Any employee practising imposition under the plea of sickness shall be subject to instant dismissal, disratment in rank, or reduction in salary, as the Commissioner may determine.

Ill Health resulting from Misconduct.

67. No leave on account of illness shall be granted with pay if the sickness or ill health has been caused by the misconduct of the employee. In order to satisfy himself on that point the Government Printer may send a medical practitioner to attend on and examine such employee at his residence. A fee not exceeding £1 1s. shall be paid to the medical practitioner for his attendance and report; and if such report is, in the opinion of the Government Printer, not favourable to the employee concerned the amount of the fee so paid shall be deducted from any money which is or becomes payable to the said employee by the Government. The same practice may be followed where an employee is suspected of absenting himself from duty without sufficient cause.

Inefficiency through Illness.

68. If in the opinion of the Government Printer any employee is inefficient through repeated illness, such inefficiency shall be reported to the Commissioner, who, in the case of a permanent employee, may take steps to have such employee examined under the provisions of the Public Service Superannuation Act, with a view to his retirement from the Public Service as being medically unfit for further duty.

Sick-leave for Temporary Employees.

69. (1) A temporary employee of less than twelve months' continuous service when absent from duty on account of sickness or ill health, other than as the result of an injury sustained in the discharge of his duty, shall not be entitled to pay during the period of absence: Provided that in exceptional cases the Commissioner may take any special circumstances into consideration and authorize payment at such rate as he may think fit.

(2) After twelve months' continuous service temporary employees may receive the same sick-leave privileges as permanent employees.

(3) Pay during sick-leave shall not be granted where an employee receives compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act.

(C) SPECIAL LEAVE.

Short Leave of Absence.

70. The Government Printer may at any time grant an employee leave of absence without pay for any period not exceeding one week if in his opinion there are special circumstances justifying such a course. The granting of such leave shall be reported to the Commissioner. Where more than one week's leave is desired application shall be made in the usual way, through the Government Printer, to the Commissioner.

Special Leave.

71. In special cases leave may be granted to employees of the permanent staff (on written application on the prescribed form to the Government Printer) on such terms and conditions as the Commissioner may approve.

Employees not to be Absent without Leave.

72. Any employee absent from his work without application for leave having been made and granted shall, except in cases of sudden illness or other emergency, as mentioned in Regulation 10, be deemed to be absent without leave.

Furlough.

73. On application, after ten years' continuous service, leave of absence may be granted by the Commissioner (on the recommendation of the Government Printer)—

- (a) To overseers and readers, for a period not exceeding three months on full pay; and
- (b) To employees of the permanent staff, for a period not exceeding two months on full pay:

Provided that in each case the employee has not during the previous ten years had similar leave. ("Continuous service" means from original date of continuous employment.)

Application for Special Leave.

74. The Government Printer shall, in all cases of application for special leave of absence by any employee, consider (1) the general conduct of the employee during the previous year, and (2) the regularity of attendance by the employee for the same period during the hours of attendance prescribed by Regulation 6.

Military Leave.

75. (1) The Commissioner may, subject to departmental convenience, grant to employees who are required to perform military service under the Defence Act, 1909, and its amendments, leave of absence for the purpose of attending compulsory camps and compulsory courses of military instruction.

(2) Leave of absence granted in pursuance of this regulation shall not be deducted from the employee's annual leave.

Special Leave on Retirement.

76. With the approval of the Commissioner, special leave of absence may be granted to employees of the *permanent staff* retiring from the Public Service on the following condition, provided that the sick or other leave in the twelve months preceding retirement has not exceeded three months:—

- (a) Employees retiring on superannuation, or compensation in lieu of superannuation, three months.
- (b) Employees of under ten years' service retiring for their own purposes, other than medical unfitness, no leave.
- (c) Employees of ten years' service and under twenty years' service retiring for their own purposes, other than medical unfitness, one month.
- (d) Employees of at least twenty years' service retiring for their own purposes, other than medical unfitness, six weeks.
- (e) Employees retiring on medical certificate, three months.
- (f) Employees dispensed with through no fault of their own before reaching the retiring-age—
 - If under five years' continuous service, one month.
 - If five years and under ten years, two months.
 - If ten years or over, three months.
- (g) Women retiring to be married: Over five years' service, one month; over ten years' service, two months; over fifteen years' service, three months.

77. Where an employee is retiring on superannuation or compensation after completing forty years' service, he may, at the discretion of the Commissioner, be granted six months' leave on full pay, or an equivalent payment in lieu thereof by way of allowance: Provided that the sick-leave taken by him during his service has not exceeded six months, or that he has not at any time been granted furlough (extended leave of absence) on full or half-pay.

78. The Commissioner may, in his discretion, grant an equivalent payment by way of allowance in lieu of the special leave of absence which may be granted under Regulation 76 (a).

(D) PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

Days that may be granted.

79. Where possible, employees who have been continuously employed for more than two months shall receive the following holidays, or any days specially authorized by the Governor-General in Council instead thereof: 25th and 26th December, 1st January, Good Friday to Easter Monday (inclusive), Labour Day, King's Birthday.

Employees who cannot be granted Leave on Public Holidays.

80. Employees who have been continuously employed for more than two months and who cannot be granted the holidays mentioned in the foregoing regulation may be granted equivalent time, provided it is taken within one month of the holiday; or, if this is not possible, then overtime at the rate of time and a half may be allowed for the actual time worked. Double pay will be allowed for working on a Sunday, New Year's Day, Good Friday, or Christmas Day.

PART V.—APPOINTMENT AND PROMOTION.

Employees temporarily transferred.

81. No employee shall lose status or pay if temporarily removed to a lower class than that to which he belongs.

Appointments to Permanent Staff.

82. (1) Appointments to the permanent staff shall as far as practicable be made from the temporary staff.

(2) In order to give effect as fully as possible to this regulation, the appointments shall be recommended by the Government Printer on the yearly reports of the Superintendent and heads of the respective branches.

Apprentices, Appointment of.

83. (1) Applicants for employment as apprentices must not be under fourteen or over sixteen years of age, and be of sound bodily health and of good character, and must have passed an examination equal to that of a Sixth Standard Competency under the Education Act, 1912.

(2) All apprentices shall be indentured for a period of not less than six years, and shall be paid the rates of wages as may be prescribed from time to time.

(3) Apprentices will be placed in the branches for which they seem best adapted. Those selected for the composing branch shall serve at least one year in the reading-room prior to being transferred to the composing-room; but in no case shall more than one year passed in the reading-room be reckoned as part of the period of apprenticeship.

(4) Apprentices in all branches who have served their full term satisfactorily shall be entitled to one year's employment as journeymen.

Female Employees.

84. Applicants for employment should not be under fourteen years of age, and be of sound bodily health and of good character.

Temporary Staff.

85. Temporary hands of less than three months' service will be under engagement by the day, terminable without notice on either side; all others shall be subject to one week's notice on either side.

86. The rates of remuneration for temporary employees shall be not less than the award rate paid in Wellington City for a similar class of work.

Boy Messengers.

87. Boy messengers may be employed at the age of fourteen years, and while employed as messengers will receive the rate of pay prescribed from time to time. On or before arriving at the age of fifteen years they may, if suitable, be transferred to one of the several branches of the Department, should there be a vacancy: Provided that if they are not found suitable their services with the Department shall terminate; and in any case their services may be terminated as soon as they attain the age of sixteen years, unless employed, other than as messengers, in one of the other branches.

PART VI.—MISCELLANEOUS.

Canvassers to be excluded.

88. All canvassers are strictly excluded from departmental premises.

Workrooms to be kept Clean.

89. The workrooms and premises adjacent thereto shall be kept in a cleanly condition.

Repairs to Workrooms or Equipment.

90. Heads of branches should call attention to any repairs necessary to workrooms or equipment.

Machinery in Motion to be protected.

91. Heads of branches shall report to the Government Printer (through the Superintendent) if, in their opinion, any machine in their charge should be provided with a safety guard. Employees on

machines shall see that the safety guards provided are in position before machines are put in motion.

General.

92. In the event of any dispute or question arising as to the meaning of these regulations, or any portion thereof, or as to anything done or alleged to have been done thereunder or contrary thereto, it shall be referred to the Government Printer, and if necessary to the Public Service Commissioner.

IN pursuance of regulations under the Education Act, 1914, notice is hereby given that at the Teachers' Class C Certificate Examinations of August, 1930 and 1931, respectively, the special books of which a knowledge will be required will be as follows:—

(a) AUGUST, 1930.

ENGLISH.—Candidates will be required to give evidence of a competent knowledge of the principles of English composition, and display ability to write good English. They must also show satisfactory knowledge of English literature based upon a general survey from 1579 to the present day. This survey shall include (1) a study of the principal literary movements and their leaders; (2) a short treatment of the origin and development of the drama; (3) the evolution of the English novel; (4) the main streams of romantic and classical poetry; (5) acquaintance with modern poetry. Candidates are also required to know something of the broad principles on which children's literature should be selected and studied.

A reasonable knowledge showing only appreciation of the structure and characterization in the following works by the authors named will be required.

General Literature.—Chaucer, "Prologue to the Canterbury Tales"; Shakespeare, "Macbeth," "Twelfth Night"; Milton, "Paradise Lost, Book I"; Bunyan, "Pilgrim's Progress"; Goldsmith, Essays, Nos. 25, 26, and 97, in "Citizen of the World"; Wordsworth, "Ode on Immortality," "Lines above Tintern Abbey," "The Reaper," "To Milton"; Shelley, "Adonais," "To a Skylark," "To the West Wind," "To the Night," "A Dream of the Unknown"; Browning, "Abt. Vogler," "Rabbi Ben Ezra."

Drama.—Shakespeare, as above; Goldsmith, "She Stoops to Conquer"; Shaw, "You Never Can Tell."

Novels.—Jane Austen, "Pride and Prejudice"; George Eliot, "Adam Bede"; Sir Walter Scott, "Guy Mannering"; Conrad, "Lord Jim"; Walpole, "The Cathedral."

Modern Poetry.—A selection from the works of the following as contained in the "Golden Treasury of Modern Lyrics, Part II": Bridges, Davies, Flecker, Kipling, Meynell, Thompson.

LATIN.—Cicero, "pro Milone"; Virgil, "Georgic IV."
FRENCH.—Balzac, "Le Pere Goriot"; A. Daudet, "Le Petit Chose"; Racine, "Iphigénie."

(b) AUGUST, 1931.

ENGLISH.—Candidates will be required to give evidence of a competent knowledge of the principles of English composition, and display ability to write good English. They must also show satisfactory knowledge of English literature based upon a general survey from 1579 to the present day. This survey shall include (1) a study of the principal literary movements and their leaders; (2) a short treatment of the origin and development of the drama; (3) the evolution of the English novel; (4) the main streams of romantic and classical poetry; (5) acquaintance with modern poetry. Candidates are also required to know something of the broad principles on which children's literature should be selected and studied.

Reasonable knowledge showing only appreciation of the structure and characterization in the following works by the authors named will be required.
