

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Exhibitions Act, 1910 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, dath hereby anthorize the helding of a public exhibition of and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby authorize the holding of a public exhibition of works of industry and art to be conducted by the Canterbury Agricultural and Pastoral Association (Incorporated) and the Canterbury Manufacturers Association (Incorporated) in the King Edward Barracks at Christchurch, from the ninth day of August, one thousand nine hundred and thirty, to the twenty-third day of August, one thousand nine hundred and thirty (both dates inclusive), and to be known as the Canter-bury Winter Show and Exhibition of Industries, and doth herebu dealow the said arbibition to he an exhibition within thirty (both dates inclusive), and to be known as the canter-bury Winter Show and Exhibition of Industries, and doth hereby declare the said exhibition to be an exhibition within the meaning of the said Act, and doth hereby suspend, subject, however, to the conditions set out in the Schedule hereto, all the provisions of the Shops and Offices Act, 1921–22, the Factories Act, 1921–22, and the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act, 1925, and of all awards and industrial agreements in force under the last-named Act in so far as such provisions relate to the hours of commencing or ceasing work, or to the issue of permits for overtime or extended hours, or to holidays or half-holidays, or to the closing of shops to any person, and so far as such provisions relate to hours of work done or business conducted or service carried out in or upon the premises aforesaid during the period afore-said by or on behalf of the bodies conducting the said exhibition, or by or on behalf of any exhibitor of works of industry or art at the said exhibition, or by any person employed in or about the said exhibition.

SCHEDULE.

1. EIGHT hours shall constitute a day's work in or about the exhibition and, with the exception set out in clause 2 hereof, such hours shall be worked consecutively.

2. No person shall be employed in or about the exhibition for more than four hours without an interval of at least three-quarters of an hour for a meal.

3. Any person employed during any day in or about the exhibition who is employed on such day in excess of eight hours or before the hour of 8 a.m. or after the hour of 10.30 p.m. (whether such excess employment is in or about the exhibition or otherwise) shall be paid for such excess employment at not less than one-half as much again as the ordinary rate for the first two hours and at not less than twice the ordinary rate thereafter, and any person employed in or about the exhibition on any day that would, but for the twice the ordinary rate thereafter, and any person employed in or about the exhibition on any day that would, but for the provisions of this Order in Council, have been a whole holiday for such person by virtue of any Act or of any award or industrial agreement shall be paid for all work done on such day at not less than twice the ordinary rate, whether such work is performed wholly in or about the exhibition or otherwise otherwise.

4. No female shall be employed in or about the exhibition after the hour of 10.30 p.m.

5. For the purposes of the enforcement of an award or industrial agreement, any provision of which has been sus-pended by this Order in Council, any officer of the industrial union or association concerned, who is authorized in writing in that behalf by such union or association, shall be entitled In that behalf by such union or association, shall be entitled to interview at his place of employment any person employed in or about the exhibition under that award or industrial agreement at such time or times as may be agreed upon by and between such officer and the employer of such person, and for this purpose any such officer shall be entitled at any reasonable time to have access to the register of passes issued by the Canterbury Winter Show and Exhibition Executive.

6. Nothing in this Order in Council shall be deemed to affect any provisions in an award or industrial agreement relating to preference of employment.

The Samoa Immigration Order, 1930.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

IIS Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of that Dominion, and in pursuance of the authority to make regulations for the peace, order, and good government of Samoa conferred upon him by the Samoa Act, 1921, and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, doth hereby make the following regulations.

REGULATIONS.

1. THIS Order may be cited as "The Samoa Immigration Order, 1930," and shall come into force on the 11th day of August, 1930.

PART I.-REGULATION OF IMMIGRANTS.

RESTRICTIONS ON LANDING IN SAMOA.

2. (1) Save with the authority of the Administrator and as hereinafter provided, no person shall land in Samoa from any place outside Samoa unless and until---

- (a) He shall have made and delivered to an officer of Customs or of Police a declaration in the form set out in the First Schedule hereto (but this paragraph shall not apply to persons under the age of fourteen years).
- (b) He shall have deposited with the Collector of Customs such sum (but not exceeding £50) as the Collector may deem necessary to defray the cost of transporting such person to a place outside Samoa where he will be permitted to land. But this paragraph shall not apply to—

(i) Any permanent resident of Samoa returning thereto after a temporary absence therefrom :

(ii) Any person who shall deposit with the Collector of Customs a ticket or other document which in the opinion of the Collector will entitle such person to obtain a passage away from Samoa at any time within five years from the date of the deposit without any further payment:

(iii) Any person who shall deposit with the Collector of Customs good and sufficient security (to the satisfaction of the Collector) to indemnify the Administration of Samoa against any cost (but not exceeding £50) which it might be put to in transporting such person from Samoa and in maintaining him pending transportation.

(2) Any person who lands in Samoa in breach of the provisions of this clause (apart from his liability to prosecution in accordance with the provisions hereinafter appearing) may be arrested and deported therefrom in the same manner as if he were a prohibited immigrant: Provided, however, that the said power of arrest and deportation shall be exercised only upon and in accordance with an authority in writing duly signed by the Administrator. Application of Moneys deposited under Clause 2 hereof.

3. (1) The Collector of Customs in his official name shall lodge in the Post Office Savings-bank at Apia the moneys deposited with him under clause 2 hereof.

(2) The said moneys, together with all accretions of interest thereto, shall be repaid to the person depositing the same with the Collector of Customs at the end of five years from the date of the deposit or upon the departure of that person from Samoa, whichever shall be the earlier. But the Collector of Customs shall deduct from the said moneys and shall pay to the Samoan Treasury any cost incurred by the Administration in connection with the maintenance of such person in Samoa or his deportation therefrom.

(3) Should the person who deposited the moneys with the Collector of Customs die before the said moneys have been refunded, the Collector shall pay the same, together with any accretions of interest thereto, to the legal representatives of such person, but less any of the costs aforesaid and the costs (if any) of burial paid by the Administration.

PROHIBITED IMMIGRANTS.

4. (1) It shall not be lawful for any person of any of the following classes (hereinafter called "prohibited immigrants") to land in Samoa, that is to say,-

- (a) Any person other than a person of British birth and parentage unless he is in possession of a permit to enter in the form and to the effect set out in the Second Schedule hereto.
- (b) Any idiot or insane person.
- (c) Any person suffering from a contagious disease which, in the opinion of the Chief Medical Officer, is loathsome or dangerous.
- (d) Any person who is notified in writing under the hand of the Administrator (with the previous approval of the Minister) that such person's presence in Samoa may be injurious to the peace, order, or good government of the Territory.
- (e) Any person who at any time within five years of the date of his arrival in Samoa has been convicted of, or has been released from, imprisonment after conviction in any place in respect of any criminal offence there punishable by imprisonment for more than one year.

(2) A person shall not be deemed to be of British birth and parentage by reason that he or his parents, or either of them, is a naturalized British subject, or by reason that he is an aboriginal Native or the descendant of an aboriginal Native of any dominion or of any colony or other possession or of any protectorate of His Majesty, or of any territory subject to mandates conferred on His Majesty by the League of Nations.

(3) An application for a permit under paragraph (a) of subclause (1) hereof shall be in the form set out in the Second Schedule hereto.

(4) The granting of the permit shall be in the discretion of the Administrator, and shall be subject to the condition that the immigrant shall produce a certificate of character from a police or other public officer or responsible person, of whom the Administrator approves, of the country whence he came, and to such other conditions as the Administrator may impose.

(5) A permit may in the Administrator's discretion include the

wife of the immigrant and any one or more members of his family.(6) No permit under this clause shall be of any force or effect unless and until the immigrant shall have complied with the provisions of paragraph (b) of subclause (1) of clause 2 of this Order.

(7) Nothing in this clause shall apply to a Samoan, to a permanent resident of Samoa, or to a person born in Samoa.

PROHIBITED IMMIGRANT MAY BE DEPORTED.

5. Any prohibited immigrant who is found in Samoa may be arrested by any constable (without warrant) and placed and detained on board the ship by which he arrived in Samoa or on board any other ship about to leave Samoa, and may, pending his removal to such ship, be detained in such custody and in such place as the Administrator may direct.

TEMPORARY PERMITS TO FOREIGNERS.

6. (1) Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph (a) of subclause (1) of clause 4 of this Order the Administrator may grant a temporary permit in the form and to the effect set out in the Third Schedule hereto to any person of the class defined in the said paragraph who proves to the satisfaction of an officer of Customs or Police that he desires to enter Samoa as a visitor only for the purposes of business, pleasure, or health, and that he intends to leave Samoa within six months from the date of his arrival.

(2) A temporary permit granted under this clause may, in the Administrator's discretion, include such person's wife and any one or more members of his family.

PROVISIONS RELATING TO TEMPORARY PERMITS.

7. (1) A temporary permit granted under the last preceding clause hereof shall be for such period, not exceeding six months, as the Administrator shall determine (subject always to his right to revoke the same at any time), and subject to such conditions as he may impose.

(2) If any person to whom such temporary permit is granted desires to remain in Samoa beyond the period for which the permit was granted, he may make application to the Administrator, who may in his discretion grant an extension or extensions from time to time of the temporary permit.

OFFENCES AND LIABILITIES.

8. (1) Every person shall be liable to a fine not exceeding $\pounds 100$ or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months who—

- (a) Lands in Samoa in breach of any of the foregoing provisions of this Order; or
- (b) Wilfully assists any person to evade or contravene any of the foregoing provisions of this Order; or
- (c) Obstructs or hinders any officer in the discharge of his functions or duties under this Order; or
- (d) Wilfully assists a prohibited immigrant unlawfully to land or to remain in Samoa; or
- (e) Makes any declaration under clause 2 hereof which is wilfully false or misleading.

(2) In every case where a prohibited immigrant unlawfully lands in Samoa the master, charterer; and owner of the ship by which such prohibited immigrant was brought to Samoa shall be jointly and severally liable to a fine not exceeding $\pounds 100$ in respect of each such immigrant, and also to defray the expenses incurred by the Administration of Samoa in removing any such immigrant from Samoa, and in detaining and maintaining him in Samoa pending such removal.

OFFENCES RELATING TO PERMITS.

9. (1) Every person to whom a permit has been granted shall be liable to a fine of $\pounds 100$ or to imprisonment for six months who—

(a) Fails to comply with the conditions, or any of them, subject to which the permit was granted; or

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- (b) Remains in Samoa beyond the time or any extended time for which a temporary permit was granted, or in case of a temporary permit revoked by the Administrator if he does not leave Samoa within such time after the revocation of his permit as the Administrator may prescribe in that behalf; or
- (c) Fails to comply with the conditions or any of them subject to which a temporary permit was granted.

(2) Every person who wilfully makes any false statement or representation for the purpose of obtaining a permit or a temporary permit to enter Samoa, and who obtains such permit or temporary permit and enters Samoa in accordance therewith, shall be liable to a fine of $\pounds 100$ or to imprisonment for a period of six months.

(3) Upon the conviction of any person of an offence under the last preceding subclause hereof the permit or temporary permit which was obtained by the false representation or statement shall become of no effect and shall be deemed never to have been granted.

(4) If the master, owner, or charterer of any vessel about to leave Samoa refuses without lawful excuse to receive and retain on board any person to be deported from or otherwise lawfully ordered under this Order to leave Samoa, whether temporarily or permanently, together with the escort (if any) accompanying such person, he shall be liable to a fine of $\pounds 100$ or to imprisonment for a period of six months.

ENFORCEMENT OF LIABILITIES.

10. (1) Where the Administrator is of opinion that the master, charterer, or owner of any ship has committed any offence, or made any default, or is liable for the payment of any fine or other moneys under this Order, he may, by writing under his hand, authorize any person, being an officer of Customs or of Police, to detain such ship at such place as the Administrator may direct.

(2) For the purposes of such detention the person authorized to effect the same shall be entitled to obtain in the customary manner such writ of assistance or other aid and assistance in and about the detention of or other lawful dealing with the ship as would be available in the case of ships or goods seized under any Act applicable to New Zealand or to Samoa, or to both, and relating to the Customs.

(3) Such detention shall be for safe custody only, and shall be discontinued if a bond with two sufficient sureties to the satisfaction of the Administrator is given by the master, charterer, or owner for the full payment of all fines and other moneys then payable, or that may thereafter be adjudged to be payable under this Order in respect of any such offence, default, or liability, including the costs incurred in and about the detention of the ship.

(4) Where default is made by the master, charterer, or owner of any ship in paying or in securing by bond as aforesaid the full payment of any fine or other moneys payable under this Order by such master, charterer, or owner, such ship may be seized and sold under the provisions for seizure and sale of ships or goods contained in any Order, regulation, or Act applicable to New Zealand or to Samoa, or to both, and relating to the Customs, and for that purpose the provisions of subclause 2 of this clause shall, *mutatis mutandis*, apply.

(5) The proceeds of such sale shall be applied: First, in payment of the costs incurred in and about the detention, seizure, and sale of the ship; secondly, in payment of all fines and other moneys payable under this Order as aforesaid by the master, charterer, or owner; and the surplus (if any) shall be paid to the owner or other person lawfully entitled thereto. HOLDER OF TEMPORARY PERMIT OR PASSENGER BY ANY VESSEL WHO COMMITS AN OFFENCE TO BE TREATED AS A PROHIBITED IMMI-GRANT.

11. Every person to whom a temporary permit has been granted who commits an offence under paragraphs (b) or (c) of subclause (1)of clause 9 hereof, and every person who lands in Samoa under the provisions of subclause (d) of clause 12 hereof, but who fails to leave Samoa as provided in the said subclause (d) of clause 12 hereof, shall be deemed to be a prohibited immigrant, and the provisions of clauses 4, 5, and 8 hereof shall apply, mutatis mutandis, to such person and to the ship in which he travelled to Samoa, and the owner, charterer, and master thereof.

EXEMPTION FROM PROVISIONS OF ORDER.

12. The foregoing provisions of this Order shall not apply to-

- (a) His Majesty's land and sea forces.
- (b) The officers and crew of any ship of war of any Government.
- (c) Any person, being one of the officers or crew of any mercantile vessel, provided— (i) That he is not discharged in Samoa:

(ii) That he is on board the vessel when she is cleared outwards and leaves Samoa with her:

(iii) That the Collector of Customs may, by notice under his hand delivered to the master of any such vessel, prohibit the landing in Samoa of its crew unless and until the master shall have executed a bond with two sureties, to be approved by the Collector, in such sum as the Collector shall determine, conditioned for the due departure of the said crew when the vessel resumes its voyage from Samoa.

- (d) Any person arriving in Samoa as a passenger in the course of his journey by any vessel to any place beyond Samoa if he leaves Samoa with that vessel on her first departure from the Territory.
- (e) Any person duly accredited to the Administration of Samoa by or under the authority of the Imperial or any other Government.

13. (1) Notwithstanding the last preceding clause of this Order, if an officer of Customs or of Police has reason to believe or suspect that any person arriving in Samoa from beyond the seas is a person whose landing in Samoa is prohibited by this Order, or whose intention to land in Samoa should be communicated to the Administrator for the purposes of this Order, such officer may, by order signed by him, temporarily prohibit that person from landing in Samoa.

(2) Every such order shall, unless sooner revoked, expire in fortyeight hours after the day on which it was signed.

(3) Every person who, with knowledge that such an order has been made against him, lands in Samoa while the order remains in force, shall be liable to a fine of £100 or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

14. (1) For the purpose of ensuring compliance with the foregoing provisions of this Order an officer of Customs and of Police shall board every vessel arriving from places beyond Samoa forthwith after its arrival at any port or harbour in Samoa.

(2) The master of the vessel shall forthwith deliver to the officer of Customs the passenger-list and crew-list, or a true copy thereof, and shall truly answer any questions relating to the passengers and crew which may be put to him by the officer of Customs or the officer of Police for the purposes of this Order,

(3) The master of the vessel shall make suitable arrangements to the satisfaction of the officer of Customs and the officer of Police to enable them to inspect and examine each passenger and each member of the crew, and shall also provide such writing-materials and accommodation as may be required by those officers for the purposes of the said Order.

(4) The Medical Officer of Health shall inform the officer of Customs and the officer of Police as to any person on board the vessel who comes within the restrictions of paragraph (b) or paragraph (c) of subclause (1) of clause 4 of this Order.

(5) The officers of Customs and of Police may put such questions as they deem necessary for the purposes of this Order to any passenger or member of the crew.

(6) If the master or any passenger or any member of the crew shall fail or refuse to answer any question put by an officer of Customs or of Police under the provisions of this clause, or answers any such question in a manner which is false or misleading in any material particular, he shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a fine of $\pounds 50$.

(7) If any passenger or member of the crew of a vessel arriving in Samoa from places beyond Samoa shall leave the vessel before the Collector of Customs has notified the master that all examinations, inspections, and inquiries required to be made under this Order have been completed, such person and the master shall each be liable to a fine of $\pounds 50$.

(8) If any person other than the Pilot or Medical Officer of Health at Apia shall board any ship arriving from beyond Samoa without the permission of the Collector of Customs before the officers of Customs and Police have completed their duties under this clause he shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a fine of $\pounds 50$.

15. The master of a ship or any officer or member of the crew of a ship if so directed by the master shall have full power and authority to prevent any person on board that ship from landing in Samoa in breach of the provisions of this Order, and for that purpose to use such force and means of restraint as may be reasonably necessary.

EXEMPTION OF OVERSEAS LABOURERS.

16. (1) The provisions of clauses 4 and 15 hereof shall not apply to any person brought to Samoa as a labourer in accordance with any scheme approved by the Minister of External Affairs for the importation of such labourers or their service in Samoa for terms of years.

(2) The word "labourer" when used in this or the next succeeding clause shall include a domestic labourer and a skilled or unskilled labourer or workman of every description.

DEPORTATION OF LABOURERS.

17. (1) When any person has arrived in Samoa (whether before or after the commencement of this Order) as a labourer in pursuance of any scheme established or consented to by the Administrator for the importation of such labourers and their service in Samoa for terms of years, or in pursuance of any contract to serve as a labourer for any period, it shall be lawful for the Administrator to do such acts, matters, and things as he thinks requisite to secure the compulsory repatriation from Samoa of any such labourer to the country from which he came, and for this purpose to terminate any contract of service to which such labourer may be a party.

(2) The powers given to the Administrator in the last preceding subclause shall be deemed to include the power to arrest a labourer at any time after the expiration or determination of his contract of service, and thereafter to detain him in custody pending his departure from Samoa.

PART II.-SPECIAL POWERS IN RESPECT OF IMMIGRANTS.

IMMIGRANT DEFINED.

18. In this Part of this Order "immigrant" means a person now or hereafter lawfully in Samoa who is not—

(a) A Samoan;

(b) A permanent resident of Samoa;

(c) A person born in Samoa;

and includes the persons specified in the last preceding clause hereof. 19. No immigrant shall be deemed to have become a permanent resident in Samoa unless and until he shall be so declared by the Administrator in writing under his hand, or until he shall have resided in Samoa for at least two years.

20. The status of persons in Samoa or temporarily away therefrom at the commencement of this Order shall be a question of fact.

21. The Administrator, if so directed by the Governor-General in Council, may by order signed by him, order any immigrant to leave Samoa in any of the cases following, that is to say,—

- (a) If the Administrator is satisfied that such immigrant is disaffected, disloyal, or likely to be a source of danger to the peace, order, or good government of Samoa:
- (b) If the Administrator is satisfied that the immigrant is without sufficient lawful means of support:
- (c) If the immigrant is convicted in Samoa of an offence punishable by imprisonment for one year or upwards:
- (d) If the immigrant is convicted of an offence under paragraph (a) of subclause (1) of clause 9 hereof.

22. If any immigrant remains in Samoa for forty-two days after the day on which an order made under the last preceding clause hereof is served upon him he shall be liable to a fine of $\pounds 100$ or to imprisonment for six months.

23. An order made under clause 21 hereof duly signed by the Administrator shall be conclusive evidence that the order has been duly made, and that all steps have been taken, all directions given, and all conditions fulfilled which may be necessary for the validity thereof.

24. When an order has been made under clause 21 hereof the Administrator may at the same time or at any time thereafter, and either before or after the expiration of the period of forty-two days mentioned in clause 22 hereof, order any constable to arrest the immigrant and to detain him in custody until he can be placed on board a vessel about to leave for ports beyond Samoa.

25. (1) No person who has been ordered to leave Samoa as aforesaid shall at any time after compliance with the order, or after having been placed on board any vessel about to leave Samoa, return to or land in Samoa without the authority of the Administrator.

(2) Every person who returns to or lands in Samoa in breach of the last preceding clause shall be liable to a fine of $\pounds 100$ or to imprisonment for six months.

PART III.—(MISCELLANEOUS).

ARRESTED IMMIGRANT MAY BE RELEASED.

26. (1) When any person has been arrested and placed in custody pending deportation or other removal from Samoa under this Order, the Administrator may release such person from custody upon such conditions as the Administrator may impose.

(2) Any person released from custody under the last preceding subclause hereof who fails to comply with the conditions imposed by the Administrator, or any of them, shall be liable to a fine of £100 or to imprisonment for a period of six months.

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27. (1) The Administrator may in his discretion from time to time exempt from all or any of the requirements of this Order any person or class of person entering or desiring to enter Samoa or to remain in Samoa.

(2) Any exemption granted by the Administrator under this clause shall be subject to such conditions as the Administrator may impose.

(3) Every person who commits a breach of or fails to observe any such conditions shall be liable to a fine of £100 or to imprisonment for six months.

REPEAL.

28. All Orders in Council heretofore in force in Samoa relating to immigration are hereby repealed.

SAVINGS.

29. (a) All Proclamations, Orders, Warrants, certificates, bonds, instruments, and generally all acts of authority which originated under any of the regulations hereby repealed, and are subsisting or in force on the coming into operation of this Order, shall enure for the purposes of this Order as fully and effectually as if they had originated under the corresponding provisions of this Order, and accordingly shall where necessary be deemed to have so originated.

(b) All matters and proceedings commenced under any such regulation, and pending or in progress on the coming into operation of this Order, may be continued, completed, and enforced under this Order.

(b) He shall have deposited with the Collector of Customs such sum (but not exceeding £50) as the Collector may deem necessary to defray the cost of transporting such person to a place outside Samoa where he will be permitted to land. But this paragraph shall not apply to---

NOTE.—A cold but sunny month. Total bright sunshine, 148.8 hours, 54 per cent. of the possible, and no sunless days. Rainfall at Karori Reservoir, near Kelburn, was 29 per cent. below the mean of previous years. Frost was recorded on the grass on eight mornings, and fog was in evidence on six mornings. Hail fell on the 11th, 12th, 17th, 21st, and 25th; lightning was seen on the 10th, 23rd, and 25th; and thunder was heard on the 10th and 25th. Mean dew-point, 40.6°; and mean vapour pressure, 0.252 in.

SUMMARY FOR THE MONTH OF JUNE, 1930.

The June just past was the coldest for a number of years. Though the weather was at times stormy, and showery conditions prevailed at many places, rainfall was generally much below normal, and there was a large amount of sunshine. Rainfalls in excess of the average were experienced in North Auckland and about Foveaux Strait. At Tauranga, also, largely owing to a fall of 6:45 in. on the 20th, there was an excess. In all other parts there was a considerable deficit. This was most accentuated in Nelson and Marlborough and the interior of the South Island, where much of the weather the drive the driver large to driver the driver large to driver the driver large to driver large to driver the driver driv This was most accentiated in Nelson and marborough and the interior of the South Island, where much of the weather was beautifully fine. At Nelson it was the driest June on record. The cold weather was accounted for by a marked prevalence of southerly winds during the month. Temperatures were from 1° F. to 2.5° F. below normal, and frosts were everywhere very numerous and often severe. Vegetation made little growth and winter feeding of stock has been resorted to in many cases. Owing to the abundance of rough autumn feed and good reserves of hay, ensilage, &c., stock are mostly in good condition. In parts of the Waikato some growth of grass was recorded and the prospects are very favourable. On the whole, however, winter growth has been poor and rainfall deficient, so that some warm spring rains will be badly recorded needed.

needed. The month began with a vigorous cyclone operating on the coast of New South Wales, where severe floods had been caused by continued heavy rains. This main cyclone lost its energy to a large extent before reaching New Zealand and, passing north of the Dominion on the night of the 3rd, affected our weather comparatively little. Easterly gales blew in North Auckland and short-lived south-easterlies in Cook Strait. This storm was followed by a series of similar ones which lasted until the 7th. They all took a northward track and, except to produce southerly winds and cold weather, continued to have little influence on the South Island. Heavy rains were recorded between the 3rd and 5th in North Auckland. Puhipuhi Plantation had 13.73 in. during this period, of which 6.35 in. fell on the 4th. On the 8th another depression of cyclonic form appeared in the Tasman Sea, and, deepening considerably during the next two days, crossed the North Island from Cape Egmont to Napier on the 10th. Rain was fairly general and there were some heavy falls, particularly in Taranaki and the northern and north-western portions of the South Island. There were widespread. Pressure became very high over the Tasman Sea following the passage of the cyclone, while it remained low to the east of New Zealand. Strong southerly winds continued, in consequence, until the 14th with bitterly cold weather.

The gale on the 11th was severe, and slight damage was done. The ferry steamers between Wellington and Lyttelton experienced delays. Snow fell on the high country as far north as East Cape, while in Canterbury and Otago it extended to parts of the lowlands. Mount Egmont had the heaviest snowfall for years. Hail and sleet were recorded at many

to parts of the lowlands. Mount Egmont had the neaviest showing for years. Then the source are severed for the places. A third period of stormy weather occurred from the 20th to the 25th. A depression which crossed the Dominion on the 20th again assumed cyclonic form. Rains were practically general over the North Island but more scattered in the South. Particularly heavy falls were recorded in the Auckland Province, the majority receiving over 2 in. The highest registration was 7.06 in. at Okere Falls, near Rotorua, but Tauranga, as already noted, received 6.45 in., and Waihi 5.14 in. There were boisterous westerly winds also in the Auckland, Thames, and East Cape districts on the 20th, slight damage being done. Another spell of strong southerly winds and cold temperatures followed. The 21st was a particularly bitter day, especially in Canterbury, Otago, and Southland. Heavy falls of snow occurred almost everywhere in these provinces, while there were frequent showers of hail or sleet. The occasion was memorable because of the rugby football test match played under these conditions at Dunedin. Snow and hail continued to be experienced in the South at intervals until the 25th. The conditions appear to have been most severe in the district round Gore. A severe thunderstorm occurred in Foveaux Strait during a west-south-westerly gale at 5 a.m. on the 25th, when the Dog Island Lighthouse was struck. It was not until the 26th that the southerlies died down in the Foveaux Strait region. Although there was an unusual frequency of hail and snow storms during the month, the accumulation of snow on the ranges does not appear to have been heavy except at a few places.
