IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred on me by the Town Boards Act, 1908, and of all other powers and authorities enabling me in that behalf, I, Charles, Baron Bledisloe, the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby proclaim and declare that the boundaries of the Town District of Te Kauwhata shall be altered by including therein the area described in the First Schedule hereto, such area being now portion of the County of Waikato; and that the boundaries of the said town district, with such alteration as herein provided for, shall be those described in the Second Schedule hereto.

The Sharebrokers Act, 1908.—Rules of the Stock Exchange Corporation of New Zealand.

THE following rules of the Stock Exchange Corporation of New Zealand have, as required by the provisions of section 11 of the Sharebrokers Act, 1908, been approved by the Governor-General in Council.

RULES.

1. THE Stock Exchange Corporation of New Zealand (hereinafter called "the Exchange") shall consist of members engaged in the purchase and sale of shares, stocks, debentures, debenture stocks, bonds, obligations, securities, mortgages, and monetary transactions.

OBJECTS.

2. The objects and purposes of the Exchange are to provide, regulate, and maintain a suitable building, room, or rooms in the City of Auckland and such other place or places as the committee shall determine for the promotion and facilitation of dealings in stocks, shares, and monetary transactions; to establish just and equitable principles in the transaction of business; to adjust controversies between its members; and to maintain uniformity in its rules and usages.

MEMBERS.

3. Any person who shall hold a license under the Sharebrokers Act, 1908, shall be entitled to be a member of the Exchange upon the terms and conditions hereinafter appearing.

MANAGEMENT.

4. (a) The management of the Exchange shall be vested in a committee consisting of Victor Benbow McInnes, Stanley Grange, Richard Glover-Clark, and such committee shall have (subject to these rules) the direction and control of the affairs of the Exchange until the general meeting of members in the month of May next.

(b) At such general meeting and at every succeeding annual general meeting one-third of the committee, or if their number is not a multiple of three, then the number nearest to but not exceeding one-third, shall retire from office. A retiring member of committee shall retain office until the dissolution or adjournment of the meeting at which his successor is appointed.

(c) The one-third or other nearest number first to retire shall, unless the members of committee agree among themselves, be determined by lot; in every subsequent year the one-third or other nearest number who have been longest in office shall retire. As between two or more who have been in office an equal length of time, the member of committee to retire shall, in default of agreement between them, be determined by lot. The length of time a member of committee has been in office shall be computed from his last election or appointment where he has previously vacated office.

(d) A retiring member of committee shall be eligible for re-election.

(e) The Exchange at any general meeting at which any members of committee retire in manner aforesaid shall fill up the vacated offices by electing a like number of qualified persons to be members of committee, and without notice in that behalf may fill up any other vacancies.

(f) If at any general meeting at which an election of members of committee ought to take place the places of the retiring members of committee are not filled up, the retiring members of committee or such of them as have not had their places filled up shall, if willing, continue in office until the ordinary meeting in the next year, and so on from year to year until their places are filled up, unless it shall be determined at such meeting to reduce the number of members of committee.

(g) The Exchange in general meeting may from time to time increase or reduce the number of members of committee, and may also determine in what rotation such increased or reduced number is to go out of office.

(h) The Exchange may by extraordinary resolution remove any member of committee before the expiration of his period of office and appoint another person in his stead. The person so appointed shall hold office during such time only as the member of committee in whose place he is appointed would have held the same if he had not been removed. Any casual vacancy occurring among the members of committee may be filled up by the members of committee, but any person so chosen shall retain his office so long only as the vacating member of committee would have retained the same if no vacancy had occurred.

(i) No person not being a retiring member of committee shall, unless recommended by the members of committee for election, be eligible for election to the office of member of committee at any general meeting unless he or some other member intending to propose or nominate him has at least seven clear days before the meeting left at the office a notice in writing under his hand signifying his candidature for the office, or the intention of such member to propose or nominate him.

(j) Meetings of the committee shall be held at such place and at such times and such notice thereof shall be given as the committee shall from time to time determine. Unless the committee otherwise determines, the secretary shall give to the members of the committee notice of each meeting not later than the day before the date on which such meeting is to be held.

(k) A member of the committee shall not at any meeting take any part in any proceedings relating to any complaint concerning such member, or otherwise having reference to the conduct of such member, or relating to any other matter in which such member has a special interest, and such member shall not be entitled to vote at any subsequent meeting of members dealing with any such subject or matter.

(l) A member of the committee shall not take part in any of its meetings pending the investigation of a charge affecting himself.

(m) The surviving or continuing members on the committee, notwithstanding any vacancy in their number, may act until the vacancy be filled up.

(n) At meetings of the committee all questions shall be decided by a majority of the members present.

(o) The quorum for meeting of the committee shall be four (4).

(p) The secretary shall have the custody of all books and papers. He shall present at each annual general meeting a statement of the finances of the Exchange to the end of the previous year, duly audited by the auditor.

(q) In the absence of the secretary from any meeting, or in case of his suspension, the chairman shall carry out his duties or may appoint another member to do so.

(r) The chairman shall preside at all meetings of the Exchange and of the committee, but in the event of his absence the members present shall elect a chairman for that occasion.

(s) The chairman of any meeting shall have entire control thereof, and shall regulate the order and manner in which the business shall be conducted. The decision of the chairman shall be final in all cases submitted to him.

(t) In all cases at any meeting when on a division the votes are equal, the chairman shall have a second or casting-vote.

(u) In the event of any member or members obstructing the business of the meeting or being guilty of any breach of etiquette, of which the chairman shall be the sole judge, the chairman shall have power to inflict such fine, not exceeding £5, as he may deem advisable.

(v) The financial year of the Exchange shall close on the 31st day of March. A general meeting of members shall be held annually in the month of May, at which the business shall be to receive from the treasurer a balance-sheet showing the financial position of the Exchange and also generally to conduct any business provided for in these rules.

(w) At any annual general meeting, after all business herein provided for shall have been disposed of, it shall be competent for any member to bring under the notice of the meeting any business or matter within the object or purposes of the Exchange, and to give notice of any proposition to be considered at a future meeting.

(x) A special general meeting may be called by the committee at any time.

(y) No other business shall be transacted at a special general meeting except that stated in the notice convening the meeting, and no resolution shall be passed, or other business transacted, which is not included within the objects and purposes for which the meeting is convened. No amendment shall be allowed upon any resolution contained in the notice convening any meeting not directly pertinent thereto.

(z) Any general meeting shall have power *inter se* to adjourn from time to time as may be found necessary. Whenever an adjournment to a future day has been decided on, notice thereof shall be given in such manner as may be determined by the chairman of the meeting. No business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting so adjourned.

(aa) Every member shall have one vote, and all questions shall be decided by a majority of the members present and voting, except in cases otherwise provided for in these rules. Voting by proxy shall not be permitted.

(bb) The quorum for general and special meetings shall be not less than one-third of the total members of the Exchange for the time being entitled to vote.

FUNDS.

5. (a) The committee shall have full control over the funds of the Exchange, and shall pay therefrom all current expenses and outgoings, and any other payments for which they have the authority of the members. All moneys received shall be paid into a bank account, and all accounts, salaries, &c., shall be paid by cheques drawn on such account.

(b) The committee shall invest the funds as they may in their absolute discretion think advisable, and shall have power to sell and vary investments.

(c) Cheques drawn on or against any funds of the Exchange shall bear the signatures of the secretary and of the chairman.

ENTRANCE FEE.

6. An entrance fee of such sum as the Exchange may from time to time determine shall be paid by candidates for membership at the time of application for admission. In the event of a candidate being rejected his entrance fee shall be returned to him.

SUBSCRIPTION.

7. An annual subscription of such sum as the Exchange may from time to time determine shall be made payable at such time and in such manner as the committee may consider necessary. New members shall pay on election the subscription which shall have been levied for the current year. Any member not paying his subscription within two calendar months after the same shall have been levied shall be charged an additional sum equal to the amount of the subscription levied, and if such additional sum together with the subscription is not paid within four calendar months from the time which such subscription was levied, he shall be deemed to be suspended from the privileges of his membership and shall continue so suspended until such time as he has paid the subscription and the additional sum charged through non-payment of the subscription during the first two months. Failing payment within twelve months of the date on which the subscription first became payable of such subscription and any additional sum payable as aforesaid, he shall immediately, upon the expiration of such twelve months, *ipso facto*, cease to be a member, and his seat shall be forfeited and become the property of the Exchange.

ELECTION.

8. Every candidate for admission to membership must be proposed by a member and seconded by another member and such nomination shall then be submitted to the committee, whose decision thereon shall be final. No rejected candidate shall be again proposed for election within the space of one year after his rejection. Every member shall sign the rules and no member shall be entitled to the privileges of membership until he has done so.

9. The rights and privileges of every member shall be personal to himself and shall not be transferable by operation of law or by his own act or otherwise howsoever, nor shall members who resign or cease to be members from any cause whatever or the executors or administrators of any deceased member have any claim whatsoever on the assets of the Exchange.

DEFAULTERS.

10. (a) The committee shall suspend for such period as it shall think fit and may also fine or recommend for expulsion any member who shall fail to pay when due any debt incurred by him to another member. Should the committee decide to recommend the member's expulsion, they shall report accordingly to the members at a special general meeting called for that purpose. It shall be competent for the said special general meeting to confirm the committee's recommendation and expel the member so brought before them, or deal with him by fine or suspension from membership. A member who becomes insolvent or assigns his estate for the benefit of, or compounds with his creditors, shall, *ipso facto*, cease to be a member, and shall forfeit to the Exchange all interest in his membership and in the funds and property of the Exchange, notwithstanding that he may not be at the same time a defaulter on the Exchange; but such member may be reinstated by the committee without payment of fee after he has obtained his discharge from his insolvency or a release from his creditors.

(b) The committee shall have power to order that all open transactions, including time bargains, between any member unable to meet his engagements and other members, shall be closed within a time to be named by the committee. Such transactions be closed accordingly, by the chairman buying or selling in the market on account of the member in default, such stocks or shares as he may have contracted to sell or purchase. The chairman shall charge current rate of brokerage to the defaulter, and such brokerage shall be the property of the chairman. Members shall, without delay, render full statements of account to the committee.

(c) In case any member shall make default in payment of any amount payable to any other member, the last-mentioned member shall give notice in writing of such default to the chairman within twenty-four hours after such default.

B

(d) The committee shall have power to investigate the accounts of members with a member in default, and to reject or require the correction of any items which they may deem unsatisfactory.

(e) Members, creditors of a member in default, shall have a preferential claim on all surpluses in the hands of other members, resulting on the closing of transactions open at the time of default, and also on all moneys which may become payable to a member in default out of funds in the hands of the committee from the estate of another member in default. All surpluses in the hands of members resulting on the closing of open transactions with a member in default shall be paid to the committee.

(f) The committee shall distribute as soon as possible amongst members, creditors of the members in default, the surpluses received from other members on his account, and all moneys due to him out of funds in the hands of the committee from the estate of another member in default.

COMMISSION.

11. The rates of brokerage shall be those fixed or adopted from time to time by the London Stock Exchange.

OFFICIAL MEETINGS.

12. (a) The official meetings of the Exchange shall be the meetings of members held at such place and times as the committee shall appoint, at which the business shall be to make prices, effect sales, and receive and record quotations of sales; also to do any general business in accordance with these rules. The quorum for an official meeting shall be not less than one-sixth of the total members of the Exchange for the time being entitled to vote.

(b) A member shall not leave an official meeting without the permission of the chairman under penalty of a fine of £5, which shall be paid within seven days.

QUOTATIONS.

13. (a) At the official meetings the prices made shall be binding on members making them to the extent of the minimum quotation. No sale shall be made while the record of business done is being called over, or during any time of suspense ordered by the chairman.

(b) The highest declared buyers shall have priority over all other members in purchasing the stock in question at the price named. But having made a purchase, he must, to retain his priority, immediately declare himself as still a buyer.

(c) The lowest declared seller shall have priority over all other members in supplying the stock in question at the price named. But having made a sale, he must, to maintain his priority, immediately declare himself as still a seller.

(d) After any stock has been called and passed, business in that particular stock can only be reopened at the buying or selling quotation.

(e) All sales of stocks and shares made at official meetings shall be quoted, except sales not amounting to a quotation. Due date must accompany quotation of debentures. Members shall not publish in the newspapers quotations of shares. Time bargains shall not be made at an official meeting, except in the following manner—viz., at the conclusion of the ordinary business. Any member may name any stock or shares in which he wishes to make a time quotation, and such stock or shares shall then be called for time transactions only. Sales effected by members as intermediate brokers shall not be quoted.

(f) If any quotation of sale be challenged, the chairman of the day shall immediately accompany the member whose quotation is doubted to his office, and there satisfy himself by examination of the books or papers of such member as to the bona fides of the quotation; and shall report the result either to the committee in the first instance or direct to the members in official meeting assembled, as to him shall seem fit. Any member refusing to the chairman an inspection of his books shall be treated by the committee as guilty of making a false quotation. An offender shall be considered as guilty of conduct unworthy of a member, and be dealt with accordingly.

OFFICIAL LIST.

14. (a) The list of quotations of prices and of purchases and sales effected and reported at the daily meetings of the Exchange shall be the official list of the Exchange. The committee may, if it so thinks fit, issue a monthly list. No member shall issue a private list or general report.

(b) Admission of companies to quotation on the official list shall be upon such terms and conditions as the committee shall from time to time determine. The Exchange shall have power to suspend for any period, or withdraw altogether, the name of any company or association from the official list.

REGISTER OF SALES.

15. All sales made at official meetings shall be recorded in a register kept for that purpose, which record shall be called over before the close of such meeting, and members

shall be bound thereby. Stamped contract notes for all transactions in mining shares shall be passed between members, and in the event of a dispute, unless the contract note shall have been returned within a reasonable time, it shall be *prima facie* evidence of a sale having been effected, and at the price stated therein.

INVIOLENTIABILITY OF CONTRACT.

16. In contracts between members for the sale and purchase of shares and stocks they shall be held to be principals to each other unless a written arrangement to the contrary be made between buying and selling broker at the time of the contract being made.

DELIVERY AND SETTLEMENT.

17. (a) Three clear days shall be allowed for delivery of documents by the seller, and failing delivery thereof during that period, the buyer may after 1 p.m. on the third day give twenty-four hours' written notice to the seller to deliver such documents, and failing such delivery the buyer may either cancel the purchase or buy at the risk of the seller through the chairman of the Stock Exchange. Any deficiency or surpluses shall be adjusted between the parties by the chairman. The defaulter shall settle the amount of any resulting deficiency within twenty-four hours. If, however, at the time of the sale the seller shall inform the buyer that the transfer has to come from a distance requiring a longer period than three days to deliver, it shall be at the option of the purchaser to refuse to complete the transaction.

(b) Purchasers shall not be required to take delivery of and pay for documents until the day following the sale. All documents must be delivered before 11 o'clock on Saturdays and 1 o'clock on other days, otherwise it shall not be incumbent on purchasers to pay for same until the following day.

(c) Sellers shall have the right to require the purchase-money to be paid in cash or by marked cheque at the time and place of delivery of documents. In case of failure of payment by the buyer, the vendor may, within one day of default of settlement or on any future day, either cancel the transaction or sell at the buyer's risk through the chairman of the Exchange the securities involved, and the defaulting member shall forthwith pay to the vendor any difference between the original purchase-money and the net proceeds of the securities resold.

(d) If delivery of document has not been made within the time specified above, and the buyer has not cancelled the purchase or bought at the risk of the seller as therein provided and the seller shall tender delivery of documents after the expiration of six weeks from the date of the sale, the buyer shall not be bound or compellable to accept delivery of such documents unless some special agreement in writing has been entered into between the buyer and the seller in respect of such delivery.

(e) When a buyer shall claim delivery of documents after the expiration of six weeks from the date of purchase, and the seller shall not have cancelled the sale or sold at the buyer's risk, it shall not be incumbent upon the seller to deliver unless some special agreement in writing has been previously made between the buyer and the seller in respect of such delay.

(f) The refusal of the board of directors of any company to register a transfer shall not invalidate a sale.

(g) Sellers shall deliver separate transfers and scrip representing a sufficient number of shares sold in each sale if required to do so. Buyers requiring scrip must have transfers delivered with scrip attached, or a memorandum equivalent to such scrip certified to by the company. A seller of shares in London companies, having a colonial register, shall deliver scrip on the colonial register, unless otherwise arranged at time of sale. The selling broker shall be responsible for a period of seven clear days from date of delivery for the validity of all documents delivered and for the shares being free from all liability due or payable at the time of sale.

(h) Sellers shall have the right to demand from the buyer, prior to delivery, a name for insertion in the transfer of investment shares. Failing the buyer complying with such demand within three clear days from date of sale, the seller may insert the name of the buying broker. A member shall not be bound to accept delivery of a transfer signed by a transferee and his signature cancelled or filled in with a transferee's name and the name cancelled.

(i) Buyers shall have the option of refusing all transfers or scrip signed under the power of attorney or per procurator, unless the signature thereto be certified as correct by the secretary of the company, or the documents be accompanied by a valid power of attorney.

(j) No member shall print or affix his name stamp on any transfer or scrip delivered to another broker.

(k) In all forward contracts for shares or stocks except where it is otherwise specifically agreed in writing between parties at the time of sale, there shall be implied the following conditions: The seller may at any time and from time to time whenever the market price of the shares or stock is

less than the amount for the time being owing under the contract, and the buyer may at any time and from time to time whenever the market price of the shares or stock exceeds the amount for the time being owing under the contract, by application or notice to the other in writing require that the contract be kept to the market price by payment to the secretary of the Exchange of the difference between the contract price and the market price. Notification of such application or notice shall be forthwith lodged with the secretary. Any written notice may be served or application made by delivering the same to the other party personally, or by leaving the same at his registered address, and shall be deemed to be duly served or made when so delivered or left as aforesaid. No such application shall be made, or notice served, on Saturdays or Exchange holidays, or after 1 o'clock in the afternoon of any week day. Whenever any such application shall have been made, or any such notice shall have been duly served as aforesaid, the person to whom such application shall have been made, or upon whom such notice shall have been duly served as aforesaid, shall, before 2.30 p.m. on the same day, pay to the secretary of the Exchange a sum equal to the difference between the market price of the shares or stock at the time of such application or service, and the amount then owing under the contract; such payments to be made in cash or marked cheque if so demanded. The amount so paid in shall be held by the secretary upon and subject to the following trusts and conditions, viz.—

- (1) If the amount has been paid by the seller and before the date fixed for completion of the contract the market price of the shares or stock falls to the contract price, then such amount shall be repaid to the seller if demanded.
- (2) If the amount has been paid by the buyer, and before the date fixed for completion the market price of the shares or stock rises to the contract price, then such amount shall be repaid to the buyer if demanded.
- (3) The said amount shall in any case be repaid to the party paying same, at the written request of the other party.
- (4) The said amount shall be repaid to the party paying same on the secretary being satisfied that the contract has been completed.
- (5) If the party who has paid such amount shall fail to complete the contract, then the said amount shall be applied in the first place in paying to the other party the amount which the defaulting party is liable to pay to him, as hereinafter provided, and the balance, if any, shall be applied firstly in paying the brokerage payable to the chairman, as hereinafter mentioned, and secondly, towards the payment of any fine or fines inflicted upon the defaulter:

Provided always that the seller may, in lieu of paying to the secretary of the Exchange the difference between the market price and the amount owing under the contract, deposit the shares or stock in manner hereinafter mentioned. When any shares or stock are deposited under the provisions of this rule, such shares or stock shall be deposited with the secretary of the Stock Exchange, or with such other person or persons as may be mutually agreed upon by the parties to be held by the secretary, or other person or persons, pending the due completion of the contract. On payment of the amount payable under the contract, the shares or stock shall be delivered to the buyer, but if the buyer shall make default in such payment, such shares or stock shall be returned to the seller.

In this rule, unless otherwise expressed, the "market price" shall mean the market price of the shares or stock at the time when application is made, or the notice is served as aforesaid, as the case may be. All dispute as to the market price shall be decided by reference to the chairman of the Exchange, or in his absence, to any member of the committee who may be available and mutually agreed upon, whose decision shall be final, conclusive, and binding on all parties.

If default shall be made by the buyer in complying in manner aforesaid with any such application or notice as aforesaid, or in completing the purchase at the time fixed by the contract, the seller may in either or any such case forthwith at his option either cancel the contract or sell out the shares or stock through the chairman, and the purchaser shall forthwith pay to the seller the difference between the contract price and the net proceeds from the sale.

If default shall be made by the seller in complying with any such application or notice as aforesaid, or in completing the purchase at the time fixed by the contract, the buyer may, in either or any such case, forthwith at his option, either cancel the contract or buy at the risk of the seller through the chairman, and the seller shall forthwith pay to the buyer the difference between the contract price and the gross amount paid by the buyer. The chairman shall charge the usual rates of brokerage on all such sales as aforesaid, the amount in each case to be paid by the defaulting party.

DIVIDENDS.

18. (a) Transactions in shares shall be with dividend, until the dividend is payable. When transfers are delivered subsequent to the declaration of a dividend, but prior to the closing of the books of the company and in sufficient time for the registration of the shares, the seller shall not be responsible for the dividend, and the buyer's claim shall be only upon the registered holder; but when no reasonable time is afforded to the buyer to register the shares in his own name, then the seller shall be responsible for the dividend.

(b) Dividends payable between the date of sale and the maturity of time bargains shall accrue to the buyer, and shall be accounted for at the time of settlement of the bargain.

(c) Interest on debentures shall be charged to the date of sale in addition to the price.

CALLS.

19. All calls made prior to time of sale shall be paid by the seller before delivery. Calls made between the date of sale and maturity of time bargains shall be paid by the buyer to the seller at the time of settlement of bargain.

TIME BARGAINS.

20. (a) Unless otherwise agreed neither party to a time bargain shall be entitled to call upon the other party to complete until the day fixed for completion.

(b) Time bargains, the day for completion of which shall fall on a Sunday or Exchange holiday, shall not be completed until the business day next following.

NEW SHARES.

21. In the event of new shares being created and offered to the shareholders in any company during the currency of a time bargain, or pending delivery of shares in time for the buyer to complete transfer to enable him to secure such new shares himself, the buyer, if desirous of receiving his proportion of such new shares shall request the seller in writing, accompanied by the necessary funds to secure them and the seller, on receipt of such request, shall secure them, but the seller may elect to deliver such documents as will enable the buyer to secure the new shares.

When a transaction is in shares on a London register, the responsibility of the seller shall cease if he shall have taken every practicable course to secure the new shares, and further, the seller shall be relieved of all responsibility if the circumstances place him in no better position than the buyer to secure the new shares, in which case the seller may, on receipt of a written request from the buyer to protect his rights, notify the buyer in writing of such circumstances, and the buyer on receipt of such notification, shall protect his own interests.

NON-MEMBERS.—FAILURE TO MEET ENGAGEMENTS.

22. (a) Non-members shall pay for all stocks or shares purchased on their account before 2 o'clock on the day following the purchase, unless an agreement be made in writing to the contrary.

(b) Should a purchaser, not a member, fail to pay the amount due on his purchase in accordance with the preceding rules either the seller or his broker, or the purchaser's broker, shall be at liberty, at any time thereafter, at his or their option, either to sue such purchaser for breach of contract, or to resell the securities in any manner and upon such terms and conditions as he or they may think proper, and to sue for the difference and all loss and expenses consequent upon such resale, whether the same shall be made immediately on such failure to pay as aforesaid, or at any time thereafter; and all damages which the seller or his broker or the purchaser's broker may sustain thereby shall be recoverable by him or them, from the purchasers as and for liquidated damages, and it shall not be necessary to give notice of any such resale.

(c) In the event of any person not a member failing to meet any engagement with a member of the Exchange, the member may apply to the committee to have such person posted as a defaulter. The committee shall inquire into the case, and if satisfied that such default has been made, shall post the said person and announce to the members that he is in default.

(d) A member shall not transact business for a non-member who has been announced to the members as a defaulter, unless such person shall have made an arrangement with his creditor or creditors satisfactory to the committee.

DISPUTES.

23. (a) In disputes between members, with reference to stock and share transactions, brought under the consideration of the committee, the decision of the committee shall be final and binding and shall be carried out forthwith by the member or members concerned.

(b) Unless permission of the committee has first been obtained, members shall not appeal to any Court of law or equity in any dispute that may arise between them in transactions under these rules, and if such permission is not granted they shall accept the committee as the sole and final tribunal and arbitrator therein.

(c) It shall not be incumbent upon the committee to entertain any complaint submitted to them by any one not a member of the Exchange against a member of it, unless such member shall have been employed by the complainant in the capacity of broker; and in that or any other case in which a non-member desires the intervention of the committee, he shall previously to the case being heard, pay not less than £5 5s., or such other sum as the committee may determine, to the secretary, and shall undertake in writing to abide by and forthwith to carry out the decision of the committee in the same manner as if he were a member of the Exchange; the committee to have the power to repay the whole or part of the £5 5s. or such other sum to the complainant.

INVESTIGATIONS.

24. (a) Members and their clerks when required so to do by the committee shall attend any meeting of the committee, and then and there shall give such information as may be in their possession relative to any matter under investigation.

(b) The committee shall have full and absolute power, in the event of a complaint being made, which in their opinion justified such procedure to call upon any member to produce for their inspection all books, letters, telegrams, or copies thereof, and other documents in his possession relating thereto, and he shall without delay produce them for inspection accordingly.

PENALTIES.

25. (a) The committee shall take cognizance of all violations of these rules, whether in letter or spirit. Any member found by them to be guilty of such violation, or who may fail to comply with any decisions or ruling of the Exchange or of the committee, or who, in the opinion of the committee is or has been guilty of conduct unworthy of a member, shall be liable to be fined or suspended or fined and suspended from membership by resolution of the committee; or should the matter be of such moment as in their opinion to demand expulsion, the committee shall report accordingly to the members at a special general meeting called for that purpose. It shall be competent for the said special general meeting to confirm the committee's recommendation and expel the offending member, or to deal with him by fine or suspension.

(b) The fines mentioned herein shall not, except in cases where another amount is fixed, be less than £25 or more than £100, and in case of a continuous offence shall not be less than £5 or more than £10, for each day during which such offence continues.

(c) Any member of the Exchange who shall fail to observe or be bound by the terms of any decision or ruling of the committee or of the Exchange, or the spirit or intention thereof relative to the conduct by the members of the Exchange of their business as such members, or to their dealings with one another as such members, or relative to other matters arising out of the objects or purposes of the Exchange, shall be deemed guilty of conduct unworthy of a member, and be dealt with in manner provided by Rule No. 25 (a).

(d) If a fine imposed on any member at a special general meeting of members be unpaid at the end of one clear week, the member in default shall forfeit his membership, and the committee shall announce to the members that he has retired from the Exchange, and his name shall be erased from the list of members.

(e) A member, or his partner or clerk being a member, shall not vote at any meeting at which a charge affecting such member is under consideration.

(f) The committee for the time being may, in their absolute discretion, and in such manner as they think fit, notify, or cause to be notified, to the public that any member has been expelled, or has become a defaulter, or has been suspended, or has ceased to be a member. No action or other proceeding shall, under any circumstances, be maintainable by the person referred to in such notification against any member or official publishing or circulating the same, and this rule shall operate as leave and authority to any member or official to publish or circulate such notification and be pleadable accordingly.

(g) A member under suspension shall not attend any meeting of the Exchange unless by leave of the chairman, and then only for the purpose of speaking on a motion that he be fined or expelled, and having spoken he must withdraw. Such member shall not be entitled to vote.

ALTERATION OF RULES.

26. (a) These rules shall not be amended, repealed, or added to except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at a special general meeting called for the purpose.

(b) Notice shall be given in writing, addressed to the Secretary, of any proposed amendment, or repeal of, or addition to the rules.

A special general meeting be called to consider any proposed alteration, and at least seven days' notice of such meeting shall be given to the members by circular, sent to the last known business address of each member. The circular shall contain a copy of the proposed alteration, but the accidental omission to give any such notice to any member shall not invalidate any proceedings taken, or any resolution passed at such meeting.

NEW HELM OR STEERING ORDERS.

ON 1st January, 1933, the change of helm orders from the present indirect system in use to the direct system as required by section 29 of Merchant Shipping (Safety and Load Line Conventions) Act, 1932, will be made on all British ships registered in the United Kingdom.

Section 29.—(1) No person on any British ship registered in the United Kingdom shall when the ship is going ahead give a helm or steering order containing the word "starboard" or "right" or any equivalent of "starboard" or "right," unless he intends that the head of the ship shall move to the right, or give a helm or steering order containing the word "port" or "left" or any equivalent of "port" or "left," unless he intends that the head of the ship shall move to the left.

(2) Any person who contravenes the provisions of this section shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds.

On the same date the same change in steering orders will be brought into force on all ships registered in New Zealand in accordance with the requirements of a section similar to the above which is embodied in the proposed New Zealand legislation ratifying the Safety and Load Line Conventions.

As the section leaves a choice of steering orders, the Imperial Board of Trade decided, in order to secure the greatest uniformity of practice on British ships, to hold a conference with interested parties to obtain their views on the form in which steering orders should be given.

At the conference it was agreed that the orders "starboard" and "port" were preferable to those of "right" and "left," and that it would be useful, in order to call the attention of officers and men that orders were being given in the new system, if, during a short transitional period, the warning word "wheel" was added to the order.

Therefore, on and after 1st January, 1933, the order "STARBOARD" must only be given when it is intended that the wheel, the rudder blade, and the head of the ship should go to starboard, and the order "PORT" must only be given when it is intended that the wheel, the rudder blade, and the head of the ship should go to port, and it is recommended that during a transitional period of about six months, the orders be given in the form:—

"Wheel to Starboard" and "Wheel to Port."

or

"Starboard the Wheel" and "Port the Wheel."

(The former alternative is considered preferable by the Imperial Board of Trade.)

Example: It is required to alter course when meeting a vessel end on or nearly end on.

The order during the transitional period will be "Wheel to Starboard," or "Starboard the Wheel."

The order after the transitional period will be "Starboard."

It will be helpful in bringing the new system into operation if all ships are provided with helm indicators or tell-tales, and arrangements made for existing helm indicators or tell-tales to be altered, so that in all cases on and after 1st January, 1933, they will give a direct indication of the direction in which the wheel is moved. If this arrangement is made, then, when an order is given, the wheel, tell-tale, or helm indicator, rudder blade, and ship's head shall all move in the same direction.

It might also be considered helpful if some simple indicator could be rigged up so that an officer, when giving a steering order, could at the same time operate a pointer showing the helmsman which way to put the wheel.

On ships steered by hand-tiller, the order "starboard" must only be given if the rudder blade and head of the ship are to move to starboard, and the order "port" must only be given if the rudder blade and head of the ship are to move to port.

Present :

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENCY MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by treaty, capitulation, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means, His Majesty the King has jurisdiction in Egypt :

And whereas provision is made by the Egypt Order in Council, 1930 (S.R. & O. 1930 (No. 744), p. 539) (in this Order referred to as "the Principal Order") for the exercise of such jurisdiction :

And whereas it is desirable to make provision for the levying of certain light dues on British ships on voyages through the Red Sea :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1890 and 1913 (53 & 54 Vict. c. 37 and 3 & 4 Geo. V. c. 16), or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as the Egypt (Red Sea Light Dues) Order in Council, 1932, and shall be read as one with the Principal Order and with any Order amending the latter.

2. On and after the coming into force of this Order light dues at the rate of one-sixteenth of one penny per Suez Canal net register ton shall be paid in respect of all British ships passing through the Suez Canal after or before a voyage through the Red Sea in which the vessel crosses the parallel of 16° north latitude, other than ships belonging to His Majesty not carrying cargo or passengers for freight or fares.

3. The said dues shall be collected by His Majesty's Consular Officers in Egypt.

4. The following persons shall be liable to pay the said dues for any ship in respect of which such dues are payable, namely :—

- (a) The owner or master ; or
- (b) Such agents thereof as have paid or made themselves liable to pay any other dues or charge on account of the ship in the ports in Egypt, at which the vessel calls.

5. Any agent (not being the owner or master of the ship) who is hereby made liable for the payment of the dues hereby levied in respect of any ship may out of any moneys received by him on account of that ship or belonging to the owner thereof retain the amount of such said dues paid by him together with any reasonable expenses he may have incurred by reason of the payment of the said dues or his liability to pay such dues.

6. If the owner, master, or agent of a British ship fails, on demand of the Consular Officer, to pay the said dues, the Consular Officer may, in addition to any other remedy which he is entitled to use, enter upon the ship and distrain the goods, tackle, or anything belonging to the ship and detain that distress until the said dues are paid.

7. If payment of the said dues is not made within the period of three days next ensuing the distress, the Consular Officer may, at any time during the continuance of the non-payment, cause the distress to be appraised by two sufficient persons or sworn appraisers, and thereupon sell the same and apply the proceeds in payment of the said dues due together with any reasonable expenses incurred by him under this Order, paying the surplus (if any) on demand to the owner or master of the ship.

8. A receipt for the said dues shall be given by the Consular Officer to every person paying the same.

9. (1) This Order shall come into force on the 1st day of October, 1932.

(2) This Order shall be published in notices exhibited in the *London Gazette* and in His Majesty's Consulates in Egypt.

(3) Proof shall not in any proceeding or matter be required that the provisions of the preceding paragraph of this article have been complied with nor shall any act or proceeding be invalidated by any failure to comply with these provisions.

NOTE.—A cloudy month with moderate south-east winds prevailing. Barometric pressure throughout the month was generally abnormally high. Precipitation was 66 per cent. below the mean of previous years, but the number of days on which rain fell (15) was equal to the average (15.1). The total bright sunshine of 130.6 hours was only 37 per cent. of the possible. There were three sunless days. Frost was recorded on the grass on two mornings. Mean dew-point at 9 a.m., 43.0°; and mean vapour pressure, 0.277 in.

NOTES ON THE WEATHER FOR SEPTEMBER, 1932.

General.—During each of the past five months rainfall has been below normal for the greater part of the Dominion, and the last three months have been exceptionally dry. Taken as a whole, indeed, the period has probably been the driest, for the time of the year, experienced during the past sixty or seventy years. Fortunately, New Zealand can dispense with much of its winter rain, and the reports on the condition of stock and pastures are mostly very favourable, particularly so far as the North Island is concerned. Dairy herds are giving good yields; there has generally been a good percentage of lambs which are doing well; losses of ewes and lambs have been slight; and the weather has been favourable for the preparation of the fields and the sowing of crops. The rain that fell during the month came mainly in the form of a steady, fine rain in cool and cloudy weather, and consequently the maximum benefit was received from it. Heavy, soaking rains will, however, be needed during the next two months if good crops and sufficient feed for stock are to be ensured. In Taranaki and parts of the South Island, especially Marlborough, the situation is somewhat precarious.

As regards temperature and sunshine, the prevailing easterly winds exercised a marked controlling influence on the conditions experienced. On the east coast, especially of the North Island, sunshine was very much below average. The persistent dull weather resulted in temperatures, also, being much below normal, although after the 3rd there was no really very cold weather. But the farther westwards one goes, the greater is the improvement noted until on the west coast, as for instance at New Plymouth and Hokitika, and in parts of the interior, both temperature and sunshine prove to have been above the average for September.

Rainfall.—Again, very many places had less than half the average rainfall and deficits of over 75 per cent. are by no means uncommon. Nevertheless, in eastern districts of the North Island from Hawke's Bay to East Cape and in parts of the Coromandel Peninsula, more than the normal rainfall was received, Hawke's Bay, particularly, having a very wet month.

Temperatures.—In Hawke's Bay temperatures were three degrees or more below normal, and elsewhere on the east coast the departure was between two and three degrees. West of the main ranges, the month was nowhere much colder than usual, and on the west coast and in Central Otago it was actually rather warmer. On the whole, therefore, there was a distinct improvement as compared with the preceding months.

Pressure Systems.—There was an extraordinary persistence of high pressure around New Zealand during September, but especially in about latitude 45° S. On the 1st and 2nd a fairly deep double westerly depression passed, both primary and secondary bringing pressures in the neighbourhood of 29.4 inches to the southern extremity of the Dominion. Thereafter, barometers practically never fell below 29.8 inches in the Foveaux Strait area. It was in connection with the depression

of the 1st and 2nd that the only typical strong north-westerly winds occurred, while the southerly winds following it on the 3rd brought the last touch of real winter weather, snow falling on the high levels and hail on parts of the east coast. In north-westerly gales on the 2nd some damage was done on the Canterbury Plains, and severe dust storms were experienced. Another series of westerly depressions passed between the 5th and the 8th, but they were shallow and the winds accompanying them were not strong. Nevertheless, they brought the heaviest rains experienced during the month to the west coast of the South Island.

On the 9th a very intense anticyclone advanced across the South Tasman Sea. The centre, as it passed on the 10th, was just to the south of New Zealand, and barometers at several places read over 30.7 inches. At this time of year one expects the anticyclones to pass well to the north. The consequence of this departure from normal conditions was that the prevailing pressure gradient was reversed, there being a fall towards the north instead of a rise. In place of the usual westerlies or north-westerlies, winds between south and east were experienced. These conditions prevailed with only few and short breaks until the end of the month. There is no record of a similar spell of weather in past years. During the period a number of cyclones formed off the central east coast of Australia. There was much stormy weather on the New South Wales coast, and vessels crossing the Tasman Sea reported strong easterly winds of unprecedented persistence. In many cases, delays were occasioned. By the time the cyclones reached New Zealand, most of their energy was expended. The principal ones passed on the nights of the 15th and 19th respectively, and on the afternoon of the 27th. The last mentioned was the deepest and its centre crossed the Auckland Peninsula, while the others followed more northerly tracks. Each of them caused widespread rain. That of the 15th was responsible for the only really good rain experienced in the eastern portion of the South Island, Canterbury, particularly, having moderate to heavy rains. In connection with the last one, heavy thunderstorms occurred in parts of the Auckland Peninsula. There were some particularly sudden downpours, and Ruatangata experienced a hailstorm in which some of the stones reached an inch in length. This depression caused very persistent and, in places, heavy rain in Hawke's Bay, and resulted in some flooding of the low-lying areas near Napier.
