SAFETY OF LIFE AT SEA: WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

THE attention of masters and operators is drawn to the following information and signals, and the procedure to be followed by a ship in distress when establishing communication :-

#### Speed of Distress Messages.

The speed of transmission of messages in connection with cases of distress, urgency, or safety shall not exceed 16 words per minute.

#### Distress Frequency.

In case of distress, the wave to be used is the international distress wave of 500 kc/s (600 m.), preferably with type A2 or B. Ships which cannot transmit on this wave use their normal calling wave. A station in distress may use any means at its disposal to attract attention, indicate its position, and obtain assistance.

#### Automatic Alarm Signal.

The alarm signal is composed of a series of twelve dashes transmitted in one minute. The duration of each dash is four seconds and the duration of the interval between each dash one second.

This special signal is for the purpose of attracting the attention of ships equipped with an auto alarm, and must be used by ships solely to announce that a distress call or message is about to follow.

Note.-It is important that the signal should be sent as accurately as possible in order to actuate the auto alarm.

#### Distress Signal.

The distress signal consists of the group SOS sent as one sign, and means that the ship sending it is threatened by grave and imminent danger and requests immediate assistance.

## $Distress\ Call.$

The distress call consists of the distress signal sent three times followed by the word DE once, and the call sign of the ship in distress sent three times.

This call has absolute priority over all transmissions. All stations which hear it must immediately cease all transmissions capable of interfering with the distress call or messages, and must listen on the wave used for the distress call. The call must not be addressed to a particular station, and must be sent only on the authority of the master.

When circumstances permit, the transmission of the call is separated from the end of the alarm signal by an interval of 2 minutes' silence.

#### Distress Message.

The distress message consists of the distress call followed by the name of the ship in distress and information concerning its position, the nature of the distress and the kind of assistance required, and any other information which might facilitate the rescue.

# Distress Procedure.

A ship in distress should send the automatic alarm signal first, then the distress call, followed, as soon as possible, by the distress message.

These signals are sent only on the authority of the master. The signals should be repeated at intervals until an answer has been obtained, especially during the silence periods. The intervals should be long enough to allow ships time to start their transmitting apparatus after hearing the call. If no reply is received on the frequency of 500 kc/s (600 m.) the distress call and message may be repeated on any other available frequency on which attention might be attracted.

A ship station which observes that another ship is in distress may transmit the distress message if the ship in distress is not itself able to transmit it and the master so acting has reason to believe that further assistance is necessary.

The position of a ship in distress should be given as accurately as possible in latitude and longitude or as a true bearing and distance from some point when near the land or when stranded. The position, when given as a true bearing and distance, should contain a geographical reference to prevent confusion, as, for instance, "Flat Point, Banks Peninsula," to distinguish it from Flat Point near Kahau Rocks. If the ship is drifting the master should state whether his ship is in a light or loaded condition, and also the probable direction and rate of drift. In addition to radio signals the appropriate visual and/or sound signals should, of course, be made to indicate position during darkness or poor visibility.

#### Misuse of Distress Signals.

The use of the international distress signal, except for the

The use of the international distress signal, except for the purpose of indicating that a vessel is in distress, and the use of any signal which may be confused with the distress signal, are prohibited on every ship.

The alarm signal and the distress signal may, as previously mentioned, only be used by ships in serious and imminent danger which require immediate assistance. In all other cases in which assistance is required, or in which a ship desires to issue a warning that it may become necessary to send out a distress call at a later stage, the urgency signal must be used. If, after having sent a distress call, the master subsequently decides that assistance is not required, he must so advise

decides that assistance is not required, he must so advise all stations immediately in order to prevent ships unnecessarily deviating from their course.

# $Urgency\ Signal.$

This signal consists of three repetitions of the group XXX. It is sent before a call and indicates that the ship or station at is sent before a can and indicates that the snip or station using it has a very urgent message to transmit concerning the safety of a ship, or of some person on board or within sight. If used by a ship it does not necessarily imply that the ship is in imminent danger or requires immediate assistance.

The signal has priority over all other communications, except those of distress, and all ships or coastal stations which hear it must avoid interference with the urgent message. Ship stations which hear the urgency signal must listen for a period

stations which hear the urgency signal must listen for a period of three minutes. If, at the expiration of this period, no urgent message has been heard, they may resume their normal service.

The urgency signal should be used in all cases in which the sending of the distress call is not fully justified or when the circumstances are such that it may be necessary to send a

distress call at a later stage.

The urgency signal may be used only on the authority of the master and, as a general rule, be addressed to a specific station.

#### Safety Signal.

The safety signal consists of the group TTT, sent three times, The safety signal consists of the group TII, sent three times, with the letters and groups well separated, followed by the word DE, sent once, and the call sign of the station sending it, sent three times. It indicates that the station is about to transmit a message concerning the safety of navigation, or giving information regarding meteorological warnings.

All stations hearing the safety signal must continue to listen until the message announced by it is ended; they must also remain silent on all waves capable of interfering with the message.

Note.—A cold and rather dull month. There was a heavy south-west gale on the 2nd with occasional hail, and a strong north-west gale on the 6th. A fog occurred on the morning of the 25th, and there were three frosts.

#### NOTES ON THE WEATHER FOR MAY, 1936.

General.—One of the most notable south-westerly storms in the history of the country occurred on the 2nd May, and the weather remained wet and rather stormy until after the close of the first week. Thereafter there occurred a spell of settled weather unprecedented for the time of year. From the 8th until the end of the month no considerable disturbance affected the Dominion. There was very little wind, but what there was came mainly from a southerly direction. Temperatures were, consequently, much below normal. Frosts and morning fogs were numerous, but there were many fine days and conditions were never really severe. On the whole, little growth occurred in vegetation, and in certain districts pastures have been depleted. On the other hand, feed has, in some cases, been hardened and its nourishing properties consequently increased. In the principal dairying districts the milk-yield has fallen away, but stock are reported everywhere to be doing well. The yield of winter crops has been very variable without any pronounced general tendency.

\*\*Rainfall\*\*.—In parts of Central Otago and much of Southland, where there was a good deal of showery weather, the rainfall was above the average. Elsewhere the month was an extraordinarily dry one. The North Island had only about sixty per cent. of the normal fall, many places recording only about a quarter. Similar conditions prevailed in Nelson, Marlborough, and Canterbury.

\*\*Temperatures\*\*.—Temperatures were, in general, between two and three degrees below normal making the month one.

Mariborough, and Canterbury.

Temperatures.—Temperatures were, in general, between two and three degrees below normal, making the month one of the coldest Mays on record. In parts of the interior of Canterbury and in the far South, however, the normal temperature was exceeded. Some hard frosts were experienced, especially in the north-central portions of the North Island.

Sunshine.—A good deal of cloud occurred in eastern areas in what was otherwise fine weather, but the great majority of places had considerably more than the average amount of bright sunshine. Tauranga reports 208.7 hours, while Nelson and Lake Tekapo also had fine records.

Pressure Systems.—At the beginning of the month a deep cyclone was centred near Chatham Islands. Several secondary depressions moved into this from the west, each bringing lower pressures to the Dominion. The culmination came with the last of these on the 2nd. Pressure was extraordinarily low over the whole New Zealand area, and severe south-westerly gales were responsible for damage from one end to the other of the country. The weather was very cold with frequent heavy showers, and, in many places, hail. Snow fell on the high levels, and a number of violent thunderstorms were experienced. A storm of such violence over so great an area has probably not previously been recorded in the Dominion.

On the 3rd pressure rose and the weather improved. The westerly type of weather continued to prevail, however, until the 7th. Conditions remained unsettled with intermittent rain. A rather vigorous depression passed during the 6th and 7th causing practically general rain, with heavy falls in the ranges and western districts from Taranaki southwards. A certain amount of flooding occurred in the South Island. On the 6th there was a northerly gale in Cook Strait. The 7th brought a southerly change and snow, again, on the high country.

From the 8th until the end of the month anticyclonic weather prevailed throughout. The air pressure was frequently very high and fell below 30 in. for brief intervals only and then principally in the northern and southern extremities of the Dominion. Depressions advancing from the west rapidly lost intensity on nearing New Zealand, and none produced more than a slight disturbance. The one causing the greatest fall of pressure passed on the 29th. This was followed by rather colder weather, and a little snow again fell on some of the ranges. Generally speaking, however, the amount of snow on the mountains decreased during the month, and at the end there was less than usual at this time of year.

Between the 22nd and the 28th a series of disturbances followed each other on an easterly course far to the north of the Dominion. The last of these developed into a deep cyclone. During this period scattered rains were recorded on most days in North Auckland, but the effect of the storms was much less than might have been expected.

Such rain as did occur after the 8th was very erratic in its incidence and frequently of a very local character.
