Polling-places for the Manukau Electoral District appointed.

GALWAY, Governor-General.

IN pursuance and in exercise of the powers conferred upon me by the Electoral Act, 1927, I, George Vere Arundell, Viscount Galway, Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby abolish all existing polling-places, and do hereby appoint the places mentioned in the Schedule hereto to be the polling-places in the said Electoral District of Manukau.

- Mount Wellington, Garage, Freeman's Store, corner of Panorama Road and Titoki Street.

- Onehunga, Garage, George Knight's Store, Oranga Avenue.
- Onehunga, the Royal Oak Hall, Symonds Street.
- Onehunga, the Salvation Army Barracks (principal).
- One Tree Hill, Room at Costley Home, Green Lane.
- One Tree Hill, St. Oswald's Church Hall, Campbell Road.
- Panmure, the Township Road Board Office, Domain Road.
- Penrose, the Public Hall.
- Te Papapa, the Public Hall.
- Westfield, Room in Office Building, City Abattoirs.
