License authorizing Hutt Valley Electric-power Bourd to erect, maintain, and use Electric Lines within the Hutt Valley Electric-power District.

THE RIGHT HON. P. FRASER PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the Electric-power Boards Act, 1925, the Public Works Act, 1928, and of all other powers in anywise enabling him in this behalf, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, deth hereby authorize the Hutt Valley Electric power Board. doth hereby authorize the Hutt Valley Electric-power Board (hereinafter with its successors and assigns referred to as "the licensee"), subject to the conditions set forth in the Schedule hereto, to lay, construct, put up, place, reconstruct, maintain, and use within the Hutt Valley Electric-power District the electric lines described in the Second Schedule hereto; and, further, for the purposes of section seventy-six of the Electric-power Boards Act, 1925, doth hereby authorize the licensee subject to the said conditions to construct and maintain the said electric works.

#### FIRST SCHEDULE.

#### 1. LICENSE SUBJECT TO REGULATIONS.

In respect of the lines hereby authorized, the licensee shall comply with the Electrical Supply Regulations 1935, the Electrical Wiring Regulations 1935, and with any regulations made or to be made in amendment or amplification thereof or in substitution therefor. The conditions by clause 27–11 of the Electrical Supply Regulations 1935, directed to be implied in all licenses, shall be incorporated in and shall form part of this license except in so far as the same may be inconsistent with the provisions hereof.

#### 2. SYSTEM OF SUPPLY.

The system of supply shall be as described in paragraphs (a) and (f) of clause 21-01 of the regulations.

Electrical energy at a pressure of 11,000 volts shall be received in bulk from the Public Works Department.

The primary-distribution voltage shall be 11,000 volts between phases. The secondary-distribution voltage shall be

between phases. The secondary-distribution voltage shall be approximately 400 volts between phases and 230 volts between any phase and neutral.

## 3. DURATION OF LICENSE.

This license shall, unless sooner determined in accordance with the provisions hereinafter expressed, continue in force until the 29th day of October, 1950. Upon the expiry of the said term, or upon the sooner determination of this license by revocation or otherwise, all rights hereby granted to the licensee shall cease and determine; but such expiration that the licensee of arrival transfer of the licensee of arrival transfer of the licensee of the lic or determination shall not relieve the licensee of any liability theretofore incurred under this license.

#### 4. CHARGES FOR ELECTRICAL ENERGY.

The charges for electrical energy shall not exceed 1s. per The charges for electrical energy shall not exceed 1s. per unit for lighting purposes and 6d. per unit for motor-power, heating, or cooking purposes: Provided that "lighting purposes" shall include the operation of motor-generators for lighting purposes; and provided further that if accounts are paid within fourteen days of due date the charges shall not exceed 10d. per unit for lighting purposes and 4½d. per unit for motor-power, cooking, and heating purposes.

In the case of wholesale supply the charge shall not exceed £12 per kilovolt-ampere per year plus 1s. 2d. per unit. "Wholesale supply" for this purpose shall be held to be a supply in respect of which the consumer shall guarantee to pay not less than £180 per year.

### 5. Completion of Works.

The period for completion of the works authorized in paragraph A of the Second Schedule hereto shall be eight vears.

### 6. Telegraph Lines.

The licensee shall rectify to the satisfaction of the Minister of Public Works any interference or disturbance caused by of Public Works any interference or disturbance caused by the erection or operation of the licensee's system that affects the satisfactory working of the lines of communication which are the property of the Railways or Post and Telegraph Departments and were erected prior to the licensee's lines, or of the Railway Department's lines of communication proposed to be constructed along the middle-line of the railway extension from Waterloo to Silverstream.

The Tiroa Native Land Emergency Regulations 1942.

#### ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this 18th day of March, 1942.

#### Present:

THE RIGHT HON. P. FRASER PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS disputes have arisen between certain persons claiming to be the owners of or enjoying certain rights of property in parcels of land comprising parts of the Rangitoto-Tuhua and Maraeroa Blocks and other blocks, at or near Mangapeehi of the one part, and Ellis and Burnand, Limited, a body corporate claiming to enjoy certain leases, licenses, profits, easements, agreements, or other rights over the same and other parcels of land of the other part:

the same and other parcels of land of the other part:

And whereas disputes between the same parties as aforesaid have also arisen in connection with the use and occupation of certain lines of tramway from Mangapeehi to and over the said lands, and in connection with the rights, powers, claims, and obligations of the said parties in respect thereof, authority having been given to the Council of the County of Waitomo by Order in Council bearing date the nineteenth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and forty-one, purporting to be made under the authority of the Tramways Act, 1908, and its amendments, to constitute, maintain, and use the said tramway and branches thereof upon and subject to the terms set forth in such Order in Council, and in respect of which authority by deed dated the Council, and in respect of which authority by deed dated the tenth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and forty-one, the County of Waitomo delegated to the said Ellis and Burnand, Limited, solely and exclusively the powers vested in or conferred upon the said county by the said Order in Council:

said Order in Council:

And whereas the lines of tramway, tramway, and branches thereof hereinbefore referred to have for a considerable time past and both prior to and after the constitution thereof as a tramway under the Tramways Act, 1908, and its amendments, been used and employed by the said Ellis and Burnand, Limited, not only for the carriage of timber but also for maintaining certain essential supplies and services:

And whereas the existence of such disputes may interfere with the winning and transport of timber required for

with the winning and transport of timber required for purposes connected with the war in which His Majesty is engaged, and may also interfere with the future adequate maintenance of the supplies and services hereinbefore mentioned, and their final settlement in the premises becomes necessary and expedient:

And whereas owing to the nature and complexity of the questions involved it is uncertain whether in actions before either the Supreme Court or the Native Land Court a complete and speedy decision could be reached sufficient to settle all the matters in dispute so as to enable the winning settle all the matters in dispute so as to enable the winning and transport of timber from the lands of the parties or any other lands and the adequate maintenance of the supplies and services hereinbefore mentioned to proceed immediately and to continue without fear of recurrent disputes:

Now, therefore, pursuant to the Emergency Regulations Act, 1939, His Excellency the Governor-General, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, deth hereby make the following regulations.

doth hereby make the following regulations:—

1. These regulations may be cited as the Tiroa Native Land Emergency Regulations 1942.

2. In these regulations, if not inconsistent with the context.

"The said Act" means the Native Land Act, 1931:
"The Court" means the Native Land Court:
"The company" means and includes Ellis and Burnand,

"The company" means and includes Ellis and Burnand, Limited, its successors and assigns:

"Parties" includes the company and the other parties referred to in the preamble to these regulations and all other persons (including the Waikato-Maniapoto District Maori Land Board) having any estate or interest in the lands hereinbefore referred to or claiming to be affected by any proceedings instituted under to be affected by any proceedings instituted under

these regulations.

these regulations.

3. The matters in dispute between the parties hereinbefore named and referred to, or between any one or more of the said parties and the company particularly set out in the next succeeding regulation, shall stand referred to the Native Land Court in like manner as if there had been power to confer jurisdiction therein upon the Court under section thirty-four of the said Act, and as if such power had been exercised notwithstanding that the rights of persons other than Natives are in question or affected.

4. The matters in dispute referred as aforesaid are the matters following, namely:—

matters following, namely :-

(a) A dispute as to the interpretation of the provisions of an agreement dated the seventeenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and thirtyseven, between the parties or some of them and others having reference to a proper determination and limitation of the areas therein mentioned as "cutover" areas:

(b) A dispute as to Te Waretini's claim against the company for timber removed from Rangitoto-Tuhua 36A 2c 4A, being her "kainga" land and as to the trespass

(if any) by the company thereon:

(c) A dispute as to what compensation, damages, or other consideration (if any) is payable to the Native owners or any of them for the breach or breaches (if any) by the company of its rights of user, whether under agreement or Native Land Act order or otherwise, of the tramway from Mangapeehi to and over the said lands:

over the said lands:

(d) A dispute as to the rights, privileges, and powers of the Native owners or any of them in respect of the free carriage of goods or user of the said tramway or otherwise as from and prior to the date of the said Order in Council of date the nineteenth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and forty-one:

(e) A dispute as to the rights of Purutanga te Ringitanga in reference to his participation (if any) in Tiroa timber royalties, and as to his rights as sole owner of Rangitoto-Tuhua 36A 2A 2A through which the said tram-line passes:

of Rangitoto-Tuhua 36A 2A 2A through which the said tram-line passes:

(f) A dispute as to the lands of the Wehi family at Mangapeehi leased to the said company:

(g) A dispute as to the amount of compensation or other consideration (if any) which should be paid by the company upon its own account or as indemnifier of the Waitomo County Council to the Native owners or any of them as consideration for the future operation of the said tramway:

(h) A dispute as to the amount of compensation (if any)

(h) A dispute as to the amount of compensation (if any) payable to the company in respect of the alleged wrongful interference and stoppages of the tramway and milling operations by the Native owners or any

one of them:

(j) All other disputes (if any) between the said parties arising out of the user by the company of the said lands for tramway purposes the settlement of which disputes may be deemed by the Court to be necessary to give effect to the purposes of these regulations.

to give effect to the purposes of these regulations.

5. Subject to the express provisions of these regulations the Court shall have in respect of the matters hereby referred all incidental and ancillary powers conferred upon the Court by the said Act, and generally all such authority and jurisdiction as the Court enjoys in any matter within its ordinary jurisdiction, together with the powers of the Supreme Court to admit evidence by affidavit, and to order evidence to be furnished by affidavit and by means of interrogatories and by the production and admission of documents.

6. The Court may direct to what extent any party shall be regarded as standing in the position of plaintiff and defendant respectively, and to what extent any proceedings shall be conducted on the footing of a representative action so as to bind all persons whether parties thereto or not having like interests to those of parties before the Court.

7. The Court shall have power to make in favour of any party such interim and final declaratory vesting or other orders as regards land or interests in land, tramway or interests therein, or rights or powers connected with lands or tramway, and also as regards damages, compensation, rents, profits, royalties, wayleave, or other consideration accrued or to accrue in respect of any lands or tramway or interests, rights, or powers as aforesaid as the Court thinks necessary, just, or expedient for the settlement of the said disputes so that the winning and transport of timber from necessary, just, or expedient for the settlement of the said disputes so that the winning and transport of timber from the lands of the parties or any other land and the adequate maintenance of the supplies and services hereinbefore mentioned may proceed immediately and thereafter continue without delay, interruption, or dispute.

8. The Court may make any such order of cressid for such

8. The Court may make any such order aforesaid for such term of years as the Court may think necessary, just, or expedient for the more effectual and final settlement and determination of all or any of the disputes aforesaid.

9. Any order made by the Court affecting land or interests in land or interests.

in land or rights connected with land may, on the direction of the Court and on production thereof to the District Land Registrar for the land registration district in which the land affected by such order is situated, and on payment of a fee of £1, be registered in the Register book or Provisional Register-book without production of the duplicate certificate or other instrument of title.

10. If in consequence of the effect or expected effect of any order made under any of the powers conferred by the three last preceding regulations, or if in consequence of any judgment or decision upon any such dispute as aforesaid the Court deems it just and equitable so to do, the Court may order payment by any party to any person of any moneys by way of damages, compensation, costs, or other consideraby way of damages, compensation, costs, or other consideration either in a lump sum or by periodical payments, or as royalty or wayleave or upon any other basis of computation or by way of set-off or deduction from any moneys otherwise payable. In any case in which the Court makes a vesting order regarding land or any interest in or rights connected with land and awards compensation to be paid in respect thereof by the party or person in whose favour or on whose behalf or for whose benefit such order is made, then if such party or person might have acquired the land or interest in land or rights connected with land, the subject of such order by appropriate steps or proceedings commenced by such party or person or by some other persons on his behalf under the said Act or under the Tramways Act, 1908, or the Public Works Act, 1928, or under any other Act, the compensation awarded by the Court shall be deemed to be in lieu of and in full satisfaction of all claims for compensation which might otherwise have been made under the said Act or under any other Act by the party or person in whose favour the Court shall have awarded compensation as aforesaid. shall have awarded compensation as aforesaid.

12. Every decision, judgment, order, and direction of the Court made in respect of the matters referred to it by these regulations shall be final, and shall not be subject to appeal to the Native Appellate Court or any other tribunal.

13. Every party or person who shall at any time fail to comply with the terms and conditions of any order made by the Court pursuant to these regulations shall be deemed to commit a breach of these regulations and shall be liable at law accordingly.

So soon as the Court in accordance with these regulations shall by its decision, judgment, order, or direction have disposed of and determined the disputes enumerated and referred to in Regulation 4 hereof, the decision, judgment, order, and direction of the Court shall be deemed to be in substitution for all causes of action arising out of the aforesaid disputes, and the parties thereto shall be deemed to have released and discharged each other from all causes of action arising thereout, and from all other causes of action of whatsoever nature (if any) in any way arising out of the premises or incidental thereto.

15. For the purposes of the application to the matters hereby referred of section thirteen of the said Act the said matters shall be deemed to have arisen within the Ikaroa Native Land Court District.

General Notes.—For most of the country February was more summerlike than the two preceding months; but a long spell of easterly weather in the middle of the month made conditions dull and damp, especially east of the North Island ranges. The dry weather prevailing in Auckland and, to a lesser degree, in Taranaki provinces has burnt up the pastures, and milk-production is showing a considerable decline. On the other hand, Hawke's Bay and Wairarapa are unusually green. There has been sufficient rain in the South Island to give abundant growth in most districts. The persistence of showery conditions have made harvesting difficult at times, and has delayed the ripening of seed and grain. It appears that oats and wheat have fairly heavy crops.

Rainfall.—As already noted, rainfall was light in Auckland and Taranaki, this feature being most marked in the Northland and Bay of Plenty districts. Other dry areas were centred near Nelson and Blenheim, while moderate deficiencies predominated in North Canterbury, Westland, and Southland. Surplus rain fell in Hawke's Bay and Wairarapa, well over double the normal total being received in a region south of Hastings. Moderate excesses were experienced in most of the area extending from Central Canterbury to Central Otago.

Thunderstorms.—There were numerous thunderstorms throughout the month, the more active occurring during the two periods from 17th to 20th over the centre of the North Island and on the 24th and 25th in the South Island, where some severe hail was experienced.

Temperatures.—As in January, mean temperatures were cooler than the normal generally by one or two degrees Fahrenheit. Although a few light frosts occurred during the cold spell about the 4th and 5th there were no unusual extremes of temperatures. NOTES ON THE WEATHER FOR FEBRUARY, 1942.

Sunshine.—The Auckland Province had an appreciable excess of sunshine above the normal, and, apart from the Wairarapa, most other districts approached or slightly exceeded the average.

Weather Sequence.—At the beginning of the month a period of rain accompanied the passage of a trough across New Zealand, and later low-pressure centres developed and remained to the south of the South Island, while occasional showers persisted in the west. A secondary disturbance on the 5th brought in the general change to southerlies when showers became more widespread, while some snow fell on the ranges.

By the 7th pressure had risen and the weather became fine. A narrow band of rain accompanied a slight disturbance on the 8th and 9th, but an anticyclone built up behind it and became centred over the South Island.

After the 10th the centre of highest pressure remained east of the Dominion, with the result that easterly winds prevailed over the country and brought fog and occasional drizzle to the cast coast, conditions being fair to the west. By the 15th there was an extensive belt of high pressure crossing over southern New Zealand. Moderate southerly winds became predominant. Widespread low cloud with further mist and drizzle was prevalent in and east of the ranges, and heavier rain occurred on the 19th and 20th about the central provinces but especially in Hawke's Bay, an active centre being off the east coast.

Fine anticyclonic conditions prevailed from the 21st to the 23rd, but on the 24th a pressure trough from the west reached southern New Zealand, showers occurring with its passage. Canterbury experienced several violent thunderstorms on the 25th. Thereafter westerly to south-westerly winds prevailed and, apart from isolated showers, the weather was mainly fine and clear. However, on the 28th north-westerlies were beginning to freshen and cloud increase. increase. M. A. F. BARNETT, Director.
