The Lighting Restrictions Orders 1942.

PURSUANT to the Lighting Restrictions Emergency Regula-tions 1941, the Dominion Lighting Controller doth hereby make the following Orders.

#### ORDERS.

#### PART I.—PRELIMINARY.

#### Order No. 1.

- 1. These Orders may be cited as the Lighting Restrictions Orders 1942.

  2. These Orders shall come into force on the seventh day after
- publication thereof in the Gazette.3. (1) These Orders are in substitution for all Orders previously made by the Controller, other than those relating to-
  - (a) Lights on or in motor-vehicles:(b) Lights on bicycles:(c) Headlights on tram-cars.

(2) All Orders previously made by the Controller, other than those relating to the matters specified in paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) of subclause (1) of this clause, are hereby consequentially revoked.

(3) All applications, permits, approvals, consents, authoriza-tions, exemptions, requirements, conditions, and generally all acts of authority that originated under any of the Orders hereby revoked and are subsisting on the coming into force of these Orders shall enure for the purposes of these Orders as if they had originated thereunder, and shall, where necessary, be deemed to have so originated.

(4) The revocation by these Orders of any previous Orders shall not affect the liability of any person for any offence in relation thereto committed before the date of the coming into force of these

Orders.

4. The standards of screening and restriction of lighting, and of reduction in lighting, required by the Lighting Restrictions Emergency Regulations 1941, and by these Orders, shall be applied universally, and shall not be subject to local variations by order of any authority other than the Dominion Lighting Controller.

5. These Orders shall be enforced in accordance with the Emergency Reserve Corps Regulations 1941\* and the Lighting Restrictions Emergency Regulations 1941†.

"Area visible from the open sea." means any district of which the whole or any part is visible from the open sea, and which is defined as such by the Local Lighting Controller, but does not include any place situated

CONDITIONER, but does not include any place situated outside the boundaries of any coastal area:

"Blackout screen" means a screen that will completely prevent the passage and escape of artificial light from the part of the premises for which the screen is provided:

"Brownout screen" means a screen that will prevent the passage and escape of artificial light from the part of the premises for which the screen is provided, to an extent not less than that to which such passage and escape would be prevented by a beige-coloured holland blind.

"Coastal area" means any of the areas enumerated and defined below; and, in the case of any of the coastal areas numbered 2, 3, 4, 5, 8, 9, 10, and 12, means all the land lying within the distance specified in the definition of that area from any point on the seaward boundary or boundary. daries of the county or counties specified in that definition; and, in the case of every coastal area, includes every city, borough, and town district situated within or having any part of its boundaries contiguous to any part of the land in that coastal area, that is to say,—

#### A. In the North Island

"Local Lighting Controller," in relation to any area, place, or premises, means the Local Lighting Controller for the district in which the area, place, or premises is or are situated:

"Occurred" in relation to any premises means the previous."

the district in which the area, place, or premises is or are situated:

"Occupier," in relation to any premises, means the person by whom or on whose behalf the premises are for the time being actually occupied, and "to occupy" has a corresponding meaning:

"Premises" includes, without limiting its generality, any building, part of a building, group of buildings, or structure used as a separate premises, and whether used as a dwellinghouse, hotel, flat, church, apartment, office, factory, shop, school, workshop, shed, store, hall, camp, or otherwise howsoever, and whether occupied or not:

"Screen" includes any blind, curtain, or screen, removable or permanent, a permanent covering by paint or other

or permanent, a permanent covering by paint or other material, and any combination of these: "Skylight" includes any glazed or unglazed opening in a

roof: "Visible from the open sea" includes visible with aided

vision from any point at sea that is not more than 150 ft. above sea-level:
"Window" includes any glazed or unglazed opening in an

external wall:

Expressions defined in the Lighting Restrictions Emergency Regulations have the meanings so defined.

#### PART II.-LIGHTING RESTRICTIONS OUTSIDE PERIODS OF EMERGENCY.

#### EXTERNAL LIGHTING.

#### Order No. 2: General.

1. Except as hereinafter expressly provided, no lighting shall be displayed or permitted to escape from any light-source at any time, whether or not it is visible from the open sea.

2. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Order,—

(a) No electric-discharge lamp or electric-discharge tube shall be used as an external light-source:

(b) No light outside any premises shall be left on time-switch control.

(c) Unless there is a responsible person in attendance to operate the light-control switches all lights shall be switched off during hours of darkness. For the purposes of this clause a responsible person is a person of the age of fourteen years or over.

3. In the case of premises themselves visible from the open

sea or situated within an area visible from the open sea, external lights used solely for the lighting of the approaches to the premises may be used at night, so long as the following conditions are

complied with, namely:—

(a) That the light-sources are so shrouded that each light-source and its container cannot be seen with unaided vision from any 1 oint one mile or more distant; and
(b) That no light from the light-source escapes on to, or is

reflected by, nearby premises or structures; and (c) That each light-source is reduced in power to such extent

as may be condidered necessary by the Local Lighting Controller.

4. In the case of premises within any coastal area, not being premises visible from the open sea, and not being situated within an area visible from the open sea,—

(a) Illuminated signs mounted on the undersides of verandas may be used during daylight hours, but shall be disconnected during hours of darkness:

(b) External lights used solely for the lighting of the approaches to the premises may be used at night provided that no light is emitted above an angle of 5 degrees below

horizontal, and that the power of each light-source does not exceed 60 watts.

5. In the case of premises themselves not visible from the open sea, and situated outside any coastal area,—

(a) External lights of any description may be used during daylight hours, but shall be disconnected during hours of darkness:

daylight hours, but shall be disconnected during hours of darkness:

(b) External lights used for the lighting of the approaches to the premises may be used at night.

6. Every external light-source that is visible from any of the waters of any of the following harbours—namely, Waitemata Harbour, Port Nicholson, Lyttelton Harbour, Otago Harbour, Greymouth, Westport, Oamaru, Timaru, Picton, Napier, Gisborne, and New Plymouth—shall be shrouded so that neither the light nor its shroud nor its support can be seen from any part of the harbour, and so that no undue amount of light therefrom may escape on to, or be reflected by, nearby premises or structures.

7. External lights may be used at night for the lighting of railway shunting yards and tracks, Harbour Board wharves, ships being loaded or unloaded, ships being built or repaired, and air ports, so long as the lights are shrouded and reduced in power in accordance with orders given by the Controller in respect of any particular lights or class of lights.

8. At Waitemata Harbour, Port Nicholson, Lyttelton Harbour, and Otago Harbour, and at Greymouth, Westport, Oamaru, Timaru, Picton, Napier, Gisborne, and New Plymouth, all wharf working lights and railway yard lights shall be screened so that as far as is practicable without interfering unduly with working conditions each source of light and its shroud cannot be seen from any part of the harbour.

9. With the prior approval of the Local Lighting Controller.

of the harbour.

9. With the prior approval of the Local Lighting Controller, and subject to such conditions and restrictions as he may impose s. With the prior approval of the Bosal Eighting Controlers, and subject to such conditions and restrictions as he may impose in each case, open spaces situated within any coastal area, not being spaces visible from the open sea, and not being situated within areas visible from the open sea, may be lighted at night for the training of any branch of the Emergency Reserve Corps, so long as every light-source is adequately shaded and so reduced or limited in power as to avoid any possibility of sky glow.

10. Open spaces situated outside any coastal area may be lighted at night for any purpose, so long as the power of the lights is restricted to the extent necessary to prevent sky-glow being visible from any point ten miles or more out to the open sea.

11. Fires may be made and maintained in the open during daylight hours, but every such fire shall be kept under such control as will assure it being completely extinguished by sunset.

12. This Order shall not apply to navigation lights exhibited with the consent and in accordance with the instructions of the Naval Board or the Air Board, nor to the use, in accordance with the terms of approval thereof, of any harbour light or aircraft obstruction light that is approved by the Controller.

Order No. 3: Road and Street Lighting.

#### Order No. 3: Road and Street Lighting.

1. Every electric-discharge lamp used as a road or street light-source shall be replaced by an incandescent filament lamp complying

source shall be replaced by an incandescent filament lamp complying with clauses 2 and 4 of this Order.

2. Every road and street light-source visible from the open sea or from any of the waters of any of the following harbours—namely, Waitemata Harbour, Port Nicholson, Lyttelton Harbour, Otago Harbour, Greymouth, Westport. Oamaru, Timaru, Picton, Napier, Gisborne, and New Plymouth—shall be so shrouded and the power so adjusted that neither the source nor the shroud nor the support is visible with unaided vision during hours of darkness from any point one mile or more out to the open sea, or any point within the harbour, and so that no undue amount of light therefrom may escape on to, or be reflected by, nearby premises or structures.

3. Every road and street light-source that is situated within any coastal area, and that is not visible from the open sea, shall be so

coastal area, and that is not visible from the open sea, shall be so shrouded that no light is emitted above an angle of five degrees

below horizontal.

4. The power of every road and street light-source shall be so adjusted that the sky glow from the lighting system of which it is a part shall not be visible with unaided vision from any point ten miles or more out to the open sea.

5. Except where the Controller has authorized or required the removal of any light, every road and street lighting system and part.

removal of any light, every road and street lighting system and part thereof shall be maintained with at least the number of light points provided on the 20th day of February, 1941, but these shall be shrouded and adjusted in power in accordance with this Order.

#### INTERNAL LIGHTING.

#### Order No. 4: General.

- 1. Every screen and shroud required by this Order to be provided shall be used to prevent the emission of light throughout hours of darkness.
  - 2. Subject to the provisions of clause 3 of this Order,-

  - Subject to the provisions of clause 3 of this Order,—

     (a) For every window and skylight visible from the open sea through which light might otherwise be emitted, a blackout screen shall be provided:
     (b) For every window and skylight not visible from the open sea through which light might otherwise be emitted, a brownout screen shall be provided. Any window so covered may be partly opened for ventilation so long as each interior light-source is so situated or shrouded that there is no direct emission of light from the light-source through the opening.

     The provisions of paragraph (b) of clause 2 of this Order

3. The provisions of paragraph (b) of clause 2 of this Order shall not apply to any skylight not visible from the open sea, so long as the following conditions are complied with, namely:—

(a) That each interior light-source is itself so shrouded with

an opaque reflector that no direct light from the source passes above the horizontal;

(b) That in the opinion of the Local Lighting Controller there is no excessive contribution to sky glow by light reflected through the skylight from the interior.

4. (1) Every doorway visible from the open sea shall, in addition to its door, be provided with a blackout screen if by the opening of the door light is permitted to be visible from the open sea.

(2) If light might otherwise escape from any doorway not visible from the open sea, the door shall be kept closed at all times during hours of darkness, except to the extent required for ingress and

5. (1) Subject to the provisions of Order No. 5 hereof, unless there is a responsible person in attendance on the premises to operate the light-control switches, or unless all windows and skylights from which light might otherwise escape are covered by blackout screens, all lights shall remain switched off during hours of darkness. For the purpose of this order a responsible person is a person of the age of fourteen years or over.

(2) Subject to the provisions of Order No. 5 hereof, no light inside any premises shall be left on time switch control.

#### Order No. 5: Interior Police Inspection Lights.

Notwithstanding the provisions of clause 5 of Order No. 4 hereof, the Chairman of the Central Committee of the Emergency Precautions Service in any district may, with the approval of the Service in any district may, with the approval of the Senior Police Officer in that district, permit to remain unscreened sufficient window space for police inspection purposes, and permit to be displayed unattended interior lights necessary to allow the inspection of strong-room and safe doors, so long as the following conditions are complied with, namely:—

- (a) That every application for such police inspection lighting bears the approval of both the police officer and the Chairman before the dispensation is put into operation; and
- (b) That the illumination and unscreened window space shall not be more than is necessary for the door of the safe or strong-room to be sufficiently visible for the purpose of night inspection from a position immediately outside the premises; and
- (c) That the degree of illumination, and the method of providing it, shall be subject to the approval of the Local Lighting Controller; and
- (d) That the light-source shall be contained within an opaque reflector so that the light emitted from the reflector is restricted approximately to the door of the safe or strong-room; and
- (e) That the reflector and the light-source shall be rigidly fixed so that neither can swing or tilt; and
- (f) That every such dispensation shall be revocable at any time, and shall automatically be revoked immediately upon any breach of these conditions.

#### Order No. 6: Shop-front and Window Lighting.

- 1. Every screen and shield required by this Order to be provided shall be used to prevent the emission of light throughout hours of darkness.
- 2. Every doorway visible from the open sea shall, in addition to its door, be provided with a blackout screen if by the opening of the door light is permitted to be visible from the open sea.

  3. Every shop window visible from the open sea shall have the window lighting disconnected and, unless completely separated from the interior by opaque material, shall be provided with a blackout screen.
- 4. Every open shop-front visible from the open sea shall have provision for the front to be completely covered by blackout screens.

  5. In the case of any shop window or open shop-front not visible from the open sea, instead of a brownout screen being provided for the window or shop-front, the lights may be displayed so long as the following conditions are complied with, namely:

  (a) That the lights are shielded by means of a pelmet or pelmets of open meterial or by open point, so that no light.

(a) That the lights are shielded by means of a pelmet or pelmets of opaque material, or by opaque paint, so that no light-source can be seen from any point outside the shop; and
(b) That the total power of the window and shop light-sources is regulated so that the amount of light emitted from the window and the interior, as measured in the street at any point on a vertical plane 4 ft. above street-level at a distance of 6 ft. from the building-line, does not exceed 0·1 (one-tenth) of a foot candle; and

(c) That no individual light-source in the shop window exceeds in light output that of a 60 watt tungsten filament general service electric lamp.

#### Order No. 7: Seaside Abodes.

1. In this order, unless the context otherwise requires,—
"Abode" includes any building, house, bach, caravan,
tent, or structure, whether or not completely enclosed,
whether movable or fixed to the soil, and irrespective of the material of which it is made:
"Seaside abode" means any abode at a seaside holiday

"Seaside abode" means any abode at a seaside holiday resort that may be sited for the night at a place that is visible from the open sea, or that might, if its windows were not suitably screened, contribute to sky glow that might be visible from the open sea:

"Owner of any seaside abode" means the person who lets the abode for short periods, whether he be the true owner or a lessee or other tenant of the true owner.

2. The owner of any seaside abode, before giving possession hereafter of the whole or any part thereof to any other person or persons, shall fit or provide a blackout screen for each window and skylight thereof, and thereafter shall maintain every such blackout screen in good repair and condition for use by all persons occupying, or who may occupy, such seaside abode.

3. The occupier of every seaside abode for which the owner has provided blackout screens shall, before yielding up vacant possession thereof, put every blackout screen provided for the abode in good order and condition.

in good order and condition.

Part III.—Provisions for Lighting Restrictions during Periods of Emergency.

#### EXTERNAL LIGHTING

#### Order No. 8: Centralized Switch Control.

1. In every external lighting system, except where exemption in writing is given by the Controller, provision shall be made so that every light may be disconnected immediately upon the sounding of any emergency warning signal.

of any emergency warning signal.

2. Road and street lighting circuits in any lighting system shall be so grouped that they can be immediately switched off on the sounding of any emergency warning signal.

3. For the purposes of this order the expression "external lighting system" includes road and street lighting, harbour wharf lighting, yard lighting, external premises lighting, road traffic signal lighting, and tramway track lighting.

#### Order No. 9: Torches.

1. Any person may, for any necessary purpose, use a hand torch-light during any period of emergency so long as the light so used complies with the provisions of clause 2 hereof.

2. Every torch used during any period of emergency shall have the aperture through which light is emitted totally obscured with the exception of a circular area of ½ in. diameter, covered with a diffusing medium equivalent in light obscuration properties to not less than those of a single thickness of white tissue paper.

#### Order No. 10: Aids to Movement.

At every place to which the public have unrestricted access and at which the interests of public safety usually require the provision of special warning lights, or of added lighting, provision for safety shall be made by the responsible person or authority by means of white painted surfaces, or white painted barriers, to give warning of the danger.

#### Order No. 11: Permitted Lights.

Nothing in this part of these Orders shall apply to any lights expressly permitted or required to be displayed under the Lighting Restrictions Emergency Regulations 1941, or by direction of the Controller.

#### INTERNAL LIGHTING.

#### Order No. 12: Provision for Blacked-out Space.

1. Every occupier of premises shall forthwith make, and at all times hereafter maintain, provision for the complete blacking out at any time for an indeterminate number of hours of a room or rooms that provide enough accommodation for the greatest number of persons that may be in the premises at any time during hours of darkness.

2. In all premises where any person or persons may be required to work during any period of emergency every window and every skylight and every doorway shall be provided with a blackout screen which can be placed in position immediately on the sounding

screen which can be placed in position immediately on the sounding of any emergency warning signal.

3. In any premises, other than a dwellinghouse, apartment, boardinghouse, flat, lodging, or hotel, that are not used during hours of darkness, or in respect of which a scheme of evacuation in any period of emergency has been approved by the Chairman of the Emergency Precautions Service in the district in which the premises are situated, the Chairman may, in writing signed by him, exempt the occupier of the premises from the requirements of clause I hereof: Provided that, notwithstanding any such exemption, the occupier shall provide sufficient blacked-out space for the accommodation of all persons required to be on duty or directed to remain on the premises during any period of emergency.

4. If in the case of any premises the Controller at any time orders that provision be made immediately for the complete blacking out of those premises, such order shall be deemed to require that provision, as required by clause I hereof, be made in respect of the whole of the premises or such parts thereof as the order may specify.

specify.

PART IV .- SPECIAL PROVISIONS AFFECTING PUBLIC SERVICES.

Order No. 13: Detection and Repair of Line Faults.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in any other Order, any authorized officer of an Electric Supply Authority, Tramway Authority, or Government Department, while engaged in locating and repairing any break or fault in any telephone, telegraph, or electric line, may use not more than one spotlight either during or outside periods of emergency. The use of every such spotlight shall be as sparing as possible, and shall be restricted to the work of locating and repairing such faults and breaks.

#### Order No. 14: Signal Lights.

1. Subject to the provisions of clause 2 of this Order, nothing in Parts I, II, and III hereof shall apply to traffic-signal lights of

any railway or tramway.

2. As far as is practicable and consistent with safe conduct of traffic, every such light shall be shrouded and the power of the light-source reduced.

Part V.—Provisions relating to Tramway Services outside Periods of Emergency.

#### Order No. 15: Tram-car Lighting.

1. Every interior light in any tram-car, whether it is inside the cabin or in the open compartment, shall be so shrouded that no

catin or in the open compartment, shall be so shrouted that ho light-source may be seen from any position outside the tram-car.
2. The degree of illumination inside the tram-car shall not exceed 1.25 foot candles as measured on a horizontal plane at seatlevel, nor be less than 0.75 of a foot candle at any point in the

passageways between seats, as so measured.

3. The brightness of any illuminated destination and route sign on any tram-car shall be no more than is required for the inscription on it to be just legible at night, under the conditions of street lighting permitted under Part II of these Orders, to persons of normal vision standing at a distance of 100 ft. in front of the sign.

#### Order No. 16: Tram Stop Indicators.

Every tram stop along every tram-car route in every area visible from the open sea shall be identified by a light-source that is coloured and illuminated and of a size and brightness just sufficient for adjacent stop indicators to be readily visible at half the distance between the tram stops.

#### Order No. 17: Aids to Vision.

1. Every window in the partition between the driver and passenger accommodation of every tram-car shall be covered by a screen sufficient to prevent any image of the interior appearing in the windscreen.

2. The front windscreen of every tram-car shall be equipped

2. The front windscreen of every tram-car shall be equipped with an efficient windscreen wiper to prevent interference with the driver's vision by weather conditions.

3. In every area visible from the open sea both points giving entry to any loop line or crossover shall be enclosed within a circular area painted white, and having a diameter of not less than 5 ft. in the case of tracks 3 ft. 6 in. wide, and not less than 6 ft. 6 in. in the case of tracks 4 ft. 8 in. wide, or shall be indicated by the painting of white marks not less effective than those described herein.

PART VI.—SPECIAL PROVISIONS RELATING TO CERTAIN PLACES OUTSIDE PERIODS OF EMERGENCY.

#### Order No. 18: Partial Blackout

 This order shall apply with respect to the following places:
 The Cities of Auckland, Lower Hutt, Wellington, and Dunedin, and the Boroughs of Birkenhead, Devonport,
 Northcote, Gisborne, Napier, New Plymouth, Petone, Eastbourne, Lyttelton, Timaru, Oamaru, Port Chalmers, Greymouth, Westport, and Picton, together with such portions of the counties surrounding the above cities or boroughs as are visible from within the harbour or roadstead.

Upon the order of the officer of the Army or Navy in charge of the area in which any of the places mentioned in clause 1 of this

Order is situated.

(a) All road and street lights and all harbour, wharf, ship, and railway yard lights in that place shall immediately be disconnected and extinguished; and
 (b) As soon as the street and harbour lights are so disconnected

and extinguished the driver of every vehicle that is travelling on any road or street where its lights might be seen from any point in any harbour shall park the vehicle at the side of the roadway, and extinguish all lights on or in the vehicle, and the driver or other person in charge of any vehicle that is already parked shall extinguish all lights on or in the vehicle:

Provided that nothing in paragraph (b) of this clause shall apply with respect to any vehicle—

(a) Being at the time used for the purposes of any emergency

precautions service; or
(b) Used for the purposes of any fire brigade and being at the time used on urgent fire service; or
(c) Used as an ambulance, and being at the time used on urgent,
ambulance service: or

(d) Conveying a constable or a traffic inspector or a member of any of His Majesty's Forces engaged on urgent business in the execution of his duty.

NOTES ON THE WEATHER DURING JULY, 1942.

General Notes.—July was a month of rapid changes in the meteorological situations. For a winter month conditions were not severe, but an excess of dull, wet weather made it unpleasant in central New Zealand. Stock are wintering well, with plenty of green feed in most districts. The cold spell towards the end of the month, however, gave a temporary check to pastures. Autumn-sown wheat is reported to be making good growth.

\*\*Rainfall\*\*.—Rains were well spread over the month and totals were, in most cases, above average. The drier areas comprised the Hauraki Plains, southern Hawke's Bay, and the plains south of Christchurch. The greatest rainfall surpluses occurred in southern Taranaki, Wellington, Marlborough, and the ranges of South Nelson. The continuous rains of the 13th and 14th caused flooding in the Manawatu, Wairarapa. West Coast, and Marlborough.

\*\*Temperatures\*\* were comparatively mild during the early part of the month, but were much colder towards the close. The means were above normal by slight amounts in the South Island but by 2° F. in eastern districts of the North Island. The chief periods of snowfall were centred at the 14th and 30th. Frosts were severe in some localities, but were less intensive and

Sunshine.—While the duration of bright sunshine was better than average in the southern half of the South Island, elsewhere figures were poorer, there being a marked lack of sunshine in Taranaki, Wellington, and Nelson

Weather Sequence.—During the first two days a depression moved south-eastward over the North Island, causing strong northerly winds with considerable rain, which was heaviest in the far north. Between the 3rd and 6th the situation was of the westerly type, with gales at times about Cook Strait. In and west of the ranges there were heavy showers, but little rain fell to the east until the 7th, when winds turned to the south-west ahead of an anticyclone. This was centrally over New Zealand on the 8th, when fine weather was general.

On the 9th and 10th there was scattered drizzle from a weak trough, but a sharper one on the 11th brought heavier rain, especially in Westland. This trough was retarded when it reached Wellington, as a centre developed in the west. Northerly gales were experienced in the north and south-easterly about Cook Strait. In central New Zealand rain fell steadily and gave rise to flooding, which was severest in the Manawatu region.

Late on the 14th a cold front began its passage over the country, the following squally south-westerlies bringing snow to some low levels in the South Island and considerable coatings to the northern ranges. Showers became less frequent during the 16th and skies cleared, making widespread sharp frosts possible.

Conditions deteriorated on the 18th, when a deep depression from the South Tasman Sea caused heavy rain on the west coast south of New Plymouth. A weak anticyclone brought a rapid but brief improvement. As a result of complex disturbances in the next low-pressure trough rain fell at times in western and central districts on the 21st and 22nd. On the following two days an active depression moved from the north close to the eastern coast of Auckland Province. Widespread rain accompanied the depression, the heaviest falls being near East Cape. Pressure meanwhile remained relatively high in the far south. A further northern disturbance on the 28th and 29th gave general rain over the North Island, where cold south-easterlies brought snow to the hills. On the final days squally southerly winds prevailed, with showers of rain and hail or sleet on parts of the east coast. or sleet on parts of the east coast.

NOTES—(a) "Not elsewhere included" appears as n.e.i.; "other kinds" as o.k.; "articles and materials suited for, and to be used solely in, the fabrication or repair of goods within New Zealand" as a. and m.s. (b) Articles marked thus t are revised decisions. (c) The rates of duty payable on goods set out hereunder have not been shown except in the case of goods classed under Tariff items 416, 448, and 449 (2), and of goods admitted (under the provisions of section 11 of the Customs Amendment Act, 1927) at a rate of duty lower than that provided for in the First Schedule to the Customs Acts Amendment Act, 1934. Where goods are admitted under the provisions of section 11 aforesaid, the reduced rate is marked with an asterisk. (d) Steam-engines, gas-engines, oil-engines, and electric or other motors are not, unless otherwise indicated, to be regarded as parts of the machines with which they are imported.
