WHEREAS it is enacted by section 165 of the Harbours Act 1950 (hereinafter called the said Act) that where the foreshore outside the limits of a harbour is not vested in any Harbour Board or other local authority the Governor-General may, by Order in Council, grant for a period not exceeding twenty-one years the control of such part or parts thereof as he thinks fit to any local authority, Domain Board, or persons acting as trustees for the inhabitants of the locality, upon such conditions as may be prescribed in the Order:

And whereas the foreshore hereinafter described is not vested in any Harbour Board or other local authority, and the Ocean Grove Domain Board (hereinafter called the Board) has applied to the Governor-General in Council for the control thereof:

And whereas it is desirable that the control should be granted

to the Board:
Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by the said Act, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, doth hereby grant to the Board the control of the foreshore as described in the First Schedule hereto, and subject to the terms and conditions set forth in the Second Schedule hereto.

FIRST SCHEDULE

That portion of the foreshore at Tomahawk Beach, Otago Peninsula, commencing at the mouth of the Tomahawk Creek and extending generally westwards to the outlet of the Tomahawk Lagoon, as the same is shown, spotted brown, on plan marked M.D. 6873, and deposited in the office of the Marine Department at Wellington.

SECOND SCHEDULE

3. His Majesty or the Governor-General, and all officers in the Government Service, acting in the execution of their duty, shall at all times have free ingress, passage, and egress out and over the said foreshore without payment.

4. Nothing herein contained shall authorize the Board to do or cause to be done anything repugnant to or inconsistent with any law relating to the Customs, or with any regulation of the Minister of Customs, or with any provision of the Harbours Act 1950 or its amendments, or any regulations made thereunder, and that are or may hereafter be in force.

5. The rights, powers, and privileges conferred by this Order in Council shall not apply to those portions of the foreshore required for securing the shore ends of any telegraph cables that are at present or may be at any time laid down within the said area of foreshore.

6. The Board may enclose any part or parts of the foreshore described in the First Schedule hereto for the purpose of holding athletic sports or games, and may by by-law fix a charge of admission to such enclosed part or parts, provided that the total number of days on which such enclosures are made shall not exceed six in any one year.

7. The Board may, subject to the provisions of section 178

(5) If any ship shall use the said wharf for the discharge of any goods or cargo after the usual working-hours or on wharf holidays, the master of such ship shall pay to the company for the use of the said wharf a charge at the rate of 1s. per ton in addition to the above on all goods or cargo so discharged from such ship.

This charge will be made only when, in the opinion of the company, it is necessary to employ labour to stack or remove cargo in sheds in consequence of the discharge of such goods or cargo as aforesaid.

Every passenger landing on or embarking from the said wharf shall pay to the company the sum of one shilling (1s.).

5. DURATION OF LICENCE

This licence shall, unless sooner lawfully determined, continue in force until the 31st day of March 1972.

6. ALTERATIONS TO AUCKLAND ELECTRIC-POWER BOARD'S LINES OR WORKS

Where the construction, existence, or use of the lines hereby authorized necessitates any alteration to the Auckland Electric-power Board's existing lines or works, and/or the erection of any new or additional lines or works on the opposite side of any street to that on which the Board's existing lines or works are situated, the cost of any such alteration and/or additional cost involved in erecting any such new or additional lines or works shall be borne by the licensee.

- (a) That the artificial aid is recommended for the patient by an orthopædic surgeon employed or engaged by the Hospital
- Board; and
 (b) That the artificial aid is of a type approved by the Hospital
- (b) That the artificial aid is of a type approved by the Hospital Board; and
 (c) That the patient is not entitled to obtain the artificial aid under the provisions of the War Pensions Regulations 1945, or otherwise than under the Social Security (Hospital Benefits for Outpatients) Regulations 1947; and
 (d) That the patient is not already in possession of a similar artificial aid obtained under the provisions of the Social Security (Hospital Benefits for Outpatients) Regulations 1947 or of the War Pensions Regulations 1945 that is, in the opinion of an orthopædic surgeon employed or engaged by the Hospital Board, still satisfactory and serviceable or capable of satisfactory repair; and
 (e) That a sum that equals half the cost of any artificial aid but does not in any case exceed £2 10s. shall be recoverable from the person to whom it is supplied.
 4. (1) For the purposes of this clause the term "repair" means
- 4. (1) For the purposes of this clause the term "repair" means all necessary attention to place in serviceable condition, and includes rebuilding or remodelling.

- (2) In respect of the repair of any artificial aid prescribed by clause 2 of this notice the following conditions are hereby imposed:—

 - (a) That the repair is recommended by an orthopædic surgeon employed or engaged by the Hospital Board; and
 (b) That the artificial aid to be repaired is of a type approved by the Hospital Board; and

Alterations to the Scale of Charges Upon the New Zealand Government Railways

N pursuance of all powers and authorities enabling me under the Government Railways Act 1949, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, I, William Stanley Goosman, Minister of Railways, do hereby make the following alterations to the General Scale of Charges made on the 13th day of April 1939, and published in the Supplement dated the 19th day of April 1939, to the New Zealand Gazette of the 13th day of April 1939, and the Local Rates Scale of Charges made on the 18th day of December 1950, and published in the Supplement dated the 19th day of December 1950, to the New Zealand Gazette of the 14th day of December 1950, in force on the New Zealand Government Railways open for traffic, and do hereby declare that such alterations shall come into force on the 16th day of December 1951.

Ngahauranga Gorge By-laws

WHEREAS by section 9 of the Main Highways Act 1922 (here-inafter called "the said Act") the powers, rights, duties, and liabilities vested in or imposed on the Governor-General or Minister of Works (in the case of Government roads), or vested in or imposed on any local authority (in the case of highways other than Government roads), are, in the case of main highways, transferred to and vested in or imposed on the Main Highways Board (hereinafter called the said Board):

And whereas the road hereinafter referred to is a main highway.

And whereas the road hereinafter referred to is a main highway, and it is desirable that by-laws should be made in respect thereof:

Now, therefore, the said Board, acting by authority of the said Act and of the Transport Act 1949, and of all other powers in anywise enabling it in this behalf, doth hereby make the following by-laws.

BY-LAWS

1. Interpretation

(1) These by-laws may be cited as the Ngahauranga Gorge Stock Traffic By-laws 1951.
(2) These by-laws shall come into force on the date of their

(2) These by-laws shall come into force on the date of their publication in the Gazette.

(3) These by-laws shall apply to the Wellington-Paekakariki Centennial State Highway between its junction with the Masterton-Wellington State Highway at Ngahauranga and the southern boundary of the Johnsonville Town District, this portion of highway being generally known as the Ngahauranga Garet

g generally known as the Ngahauranga Gorge.

(4) In these by-laws, unless inconsistent with the context,—

"Engineer" means the Engineer of the Ministry of Works for
the time being a member of the No. 9n District Highways

Council: person " " Authorized means and includes "Engineer" "Authorized person" means and includes "Engineer" as hereinbefore defined, and any Traffic Inspector or Overseer in charge of any portion of the said main highway to which these by-laws apply: "Cattle" includes any bull, cow, ox, steer, heifer, or calf: "Sheep" includes any ram, ewe, wether, or lamb: "The said highway" means the road described in subclause (3) of this clause.

2. PROHIBITION OF STOCK TRAFFIC

- (1) No person shall drive any horse, ass, mule, goat, sheep, ox, or other cattle (other than any cow in milk) not in harness or yoke upon or along the Ngahauranga Gorge between the hours of 7 a.m. and midnight on the same day, except with the prior permission in writing of the Main Highways Board or a Transport Department Inspector, and then only in accordance in all respects with any condition imposed in granting such permission.
- (2) No person in charge of any animal on the Ngahauranga Gorge shall permit or suffer the same to loiter on the said road.
- (3) If any person is charged with an offence under subclause (1) of this clause, it shall be a sufficient defence to the charge if such person proves that the cattle in question were being driven to or from some property having a frontage on or entrance from the said highway and to which no other reasonable route was available.

3. ASCERTAINMENT OF OFFENDERS

(1) Any authorized person or police officer may require any person driving, or causing or permitting to be driven, or allowing cattle along or upon the said highway, to supply on demand information as to his name and address and the name and address of the owner of the cattle, together with particulars relating to the place from which the cattle were driven, their intended destination, the route by which they travelled, and any other information which may be required by such authorized person or police officer in the exercise of his duties.

(2) If any person driving, or causing or permitting to be driven, or allowing cattle along or upon the said highway, shall refuse to give any of the information required to be given by him in pursuance of these by-laws, or shall give false information, or shall withhold information so as to create a false impression, he shall be guilty of an offence.

(3) Any other person who, on the request of any authorized person or police officer, shall fail, when required, to give information which is in the power of such person to give, and which relates to any breach or alleged breach of these by-laws, shall be guilty of an offence.

4. OFFENCES AND PENALTY

(1) Every person who does, or causes or procures to be done, anything contrary to or otherwise than is provided by these by-laws, or who shall omit anything therein required to be done by him, shall be guilty of an offence.

(2) Every person guilty of an offence against these by-laws shall be liable for each such offence to a fine not exceeding £20 (treaty pounds).
