Open Seasons for Game in Certain Acclimatization Districts

IMPORTANT.—Although this is published under the Animals Protection and Game Act 1921–22, this Act will be repealed on 1 April 1954 and the provisions of the Wildlife Act 1953 will apply during this shooting season.

A number of general conditions previously published as part of the Minister's annual notification are now incorporated in the Whilife Act. Consequently, General Conditions Nos. 2 (a), 2 (b), 2 (h), 8, 4, and 5 should be deleted from page 289 of the Supplement, dated 27 February 1952, to the New Zealand Gazette of 21 February 1952.

The Wildlife Act alters the title of "Excepted Areas" to "Closed Game Areas" and the list of the areas set out in previous notifications is further amended by deletions and additions shown under the respective acclimatization districts.

Furthermore, the Third Schedule, except for the following:
"Distribing Stock. Statutes Amendment Act, 1947,

"Disturbing Stock. Statutes Amendment Act, 1947, Section 66 (1).

"(1) Every person commits an offence and is liable to a fine of £50 who, without the authority of the oscupier, goes upon any private land with dog or firearm and disturbs any stock, depastured thereon" should be deleted from pages 299 and 300 of the Supplement of 27 February 1952, as these conditions are incorporated in the provisions of the Wildlife Act. The Fourth Schedule on pages 300 and 301 of the Supplement should also be deleted as the Wildlife Act provides "All wildlife is hereby declared to be subject to this Act

Rainfall normals have been revised and now refer to the standard period 1921-50. Where observations are not available for the whole period, or where the site of the rain-gauge has been changed, the normals are partly interpolated.

Notes on the Weather for January 1954

General.—Pressures were unusually high over the whole country, and it was a month of dry settled weather. In some districts there was no rain at all after the 10th. By the end of the month the countryside was very parched. Dairy production fell off sharply, but conditions were much better for sheep farmers, though they, too, would have welcomed more rain.

On the 13th and 14th south-westerly gales caused considerable damage in parts of South Otago and Southland.

Rainfall.--Rainfall was mainly at least 50 per cent below Rainfall.—Rainfall was mainly at least 50 per cent below normal, and the deficiency exceeded 75 per cent in Hawke's Bay and in the Auckland Province north of Hamilton and Whakatane. The driest area was around Castlepoint, where rainfall was negligible. Conditions were not generally quite so dry in the South Island, but Christchurch received the lowest January rainfall since 1897.

The only considerable area with rainfall about normal was part of the Gisborne district, and Tolaga Bay actually reported a small surplus.

Temperatures.—Temperatures were above normal over the Auckland Province, except for Gisborne, and also over most inland districts of the South Island. The greatest departures were over the Northland area and in central districts of the North Island, where temperatures were 2° F. warmer than usual. In most remaining districts temperatures were near normal, but they were appreciably cooler than usual about western and southern coasts of the South Island.

-Sunshine was above normal over the southern Sunshine.—Sunshine was above normal over the southern half of the North Island and over the whole of the South Island except for eastern and southern Southland and Banks Peninsula. Wellington Province and inland and western districts of the South Island were specially favoured with many stations recording a surplus of forty to sixty hours. From the Auckland city northward it was appreciably more cloudy than usual, with sunshine mainly twenty hours below average.

Weather Sequence.—On New Year's Day an anticyclone centred over the North Island brought fine weather to the whole country. During the next three days a weak trough of low pressure passed northward over New Zealand, accompanied by light or moderate rain in western and southern districts of the South Island and a few brief showers in most other districts. However, rain became general with the passage of two depressions over the South Island on the 5th and 6th; there were some considerable falls on the West

Coast.

The weather cleared rapidly as another anticyclone moved on to the country, but on the 7th and 8th there were still a few showers in Northland. On the two following days there was some rain in all districts except Central Otago as another depression moved across the country. With rising pressures conditions improved rapidly on the 11th in the North Island, but weak disturbances still affected the South Island for several days. By the 13th fine weather prevailed except on the West Coast. However, winds from a westerly quarter remained strong in the far south and on the 14th strong gales caused considerable damage in parts of Southland and South Otago.

A large anticyclone which had been approaching from the Tasman Sea moved on to the country on the 15th, and the spell of warm sunny weather which the North Island had been enjoying became general. There were, however, a few showers at first in some districts, chiefly about Gisborne and the Bay of Plenty.

On the 19th and 20th a shallow disturbance brought unsettled conditions in the far south. A tropical cyclone which had crossed Fiji on the 15th was off East Cape at midnight on the 20th moving steadily south-eastward. It brought welcome rain to the Gisborne district.

An anticyclone intensifying over the Tasman Sea began to extend on to the Dominion, but a weak trough, which became stationary for a time, brought light rains to central and eastern districts of the North Island on the 22nd and 23rd. The spell of warm dry weather which had been affecting the greater part of the country since the 11th continued as the anticyclone moved leisurely eastwards across the Kaikoura coast on the 25th and in the Gisborne district on the 26th, while another weak trough brought light rain and drizzle to southern and eastern districts of the South Island on the 29th and 30th. At the end of the month a tropical disturbance over the Tasman Sea was moving slowly southward, and a moist northerly air-stream covered the country. PURSUANT to the Control of Prices Act 1947, the Price Tribunal, hereby makes the following Price Order:

PRELIMINARY

- 1. This Order may be cited as Price Order No. 1533, and shall come into force on the 1st day of March 1954.
 - 2. (1) Price Order No. 1479* is hereby revoked.
- (2) The revocation of the said Price Order shall not affect the liability of any person for any offence in relation thereto committed before the coming into force of this Order.
 - 3. (1) In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires,-
 - "The said Act" means the Control of Prices Act 1947:
 "Distributor", in relation to any lot of potatoes, means a wholesaler, as defined in the said Act, who sells those potatoes otherwise than to a retailer for purposes of retail sale:
 "Grower", in relation to potatoes, means a person engaged

retail sale:

"Grower", in relation to potatoes, means a person engaged in the business of growing potatoes for sale:

"Grower's station", in relation to any grower, means the railway-station that is nearest or most convenient of access to the grower's premises:

The expression "Good table" in reference to any lot of potatoes means potatoes of good shape according to variety, not more than 15 per cent of which can be passed through a square the sides of which have an inside measurement of 2 in.; the lot shall be free from green potatoes, from second growth, from dry or wet rots (including late blight or frost damage); the lot shall be practically free from earth, which shall not in any case exceed 3 per cent by weight of the lot; the weight of the lot affected by mechanical injury (including bruises and cuts) shall not exceed 2 per cent; and the lot shall be practically free from scab or other defects not herein mentioned:

be practically free from scab or other defects not herein mentioned:

The expression "f.a.q." in reference to any lot of potatoes means potatoes of fair average quality, being potatoes not more than 15 per cent of which can be passed through a square the sides of which have an inside measurement of 2 in.; not more than 2 per cent by weight of the lot shall be affected by dry or wet rots (including late blight or frost damage) or by severe mechanical injury (including severe bruises and cuts); and not more than 6 per cent by weight of the lot shall be affected as aforesaid or by scale or by second growth or by other defect; and the lot shall be reasonably free from earth or from rough or unshapely tubers.

The expression "Under-grade" in reference to any potatoes means potatoes that are not "good table" or "f.a.q." potatoes:

potatoes:

The expression "f.o.b.s.e." means "free on board, sacks or other containers extra", and the expression "f.o.r.s.e." means "free on rail, sacks or other containers extra".

- (2) Terms and expressions defined in the said Act, when used his Order, have the meanings severally assigned thereto by that Act.
- 4. Subject to any general or specific directions that may be given by or on behalf of the Tribunal, any expenses that are reasonably incurred by a wholesaler or retailer in undertaking the transport of any potatoes at his own expense may be regarded for the purposes of this Order as if they were transport charges paid by him, and the maximum price of the potatoes shall be determined accordingly. accordingly.
- 5. The provisions of this Order shall apply notwithstanding that any potatoes to which this Order is applicable are sold otherwise than by weight.
- 6. The several prices, allowances, and margins of profit fixed by this Order apply with respect to sales by auction as well as to other sales.
- 7. (1) The growers' prices fixed by this Order do not include the cost of sacks or other containers.
- the cost of sacks or other containers.

 (2) The maximum price that may be charged or received by a grower for the sacks in which any lot of potatoes to which this Order applies are packed shall be computed as follows:—

 For corn sacks of a size 48 in. by 26½ in., 46 in. by 26½ in., 44 in. by 26½ in., 46 in. by 23 in.; At the rate of 10s. per ton of potatoes:

 For all other sacks or bags: No extra charge.

(3) Where any potatoes to which this Order applies are packed in sacks the maximum price that may be charged or received for the potatoes shall be computed on the gross weight of the potatoes and the sacks.

Application of this Order

- 8. (1) This Order applies to potatoes, including imported potatoes, that are intended for human consumption
- (2) All potatoes sold or delivered to a purchaser during the currency of this Order shall be deemed to be intended for human consumption unless they are sold for some other specific purpose.
- 9. (1) The provisions of this Order fixing growers' prices shall apply only with respect to potatoes grown in New Zealand (a) that are the produce of seed potatoes planted on or before 31 January 1954; or (b) that are the produce of seed potatoes planted after 31 January 1954 and that are delivered to the purchaser after the commencement of this Order and on or before 31 May 1954.

- (2) For the purposes of the last preceding subclause no potatoes sold on the basis of f.o.b.s.e. or f.o.r.s.e. shall be deemed to be delivered to the purchaser after the commencement of this Order if-
 - (a) In the case of sales f.o.b.s.e., the vessel on which the potatoes
 - are laden leaves the port of shipment at any time before midnight of the 28th day of February 1954; or

 (b) In the case of sales f.o.r.s.e., the trucks on which the potatoes are laden leave the grower's station at any time before midnight of the said date.
- (3) Except as provided in the last preceding subclause potatoes sold fo.b.s.e. or f.o.r.s.e. shall be deemed to be delivered to the purchaser after the commencement of this Order notwithstanding that they may have been actually laden on board any vessel or trucks before the commencement of this Order.
- 10. (1) With respect to potatoes grown in New Zealand, the provisions of this Order as to distributors' prices, wholesalers' prices, and retailers' prices respectively shall apply only with respect to potatoes (a) that are the produce of seed potatoes planted on or before 31 January 1954; or (b) that are the produce of seed potatoes planted after 31 January 1954, and that are sold on or before 31 May 1954.
- planted after 31 January 1904, and that are sold of 31 May 1954.

 (2) Except as provided in the last preceding subclause, the provisions of this Order as to distributors' prices, wholesalers' prices, and retailers' prices respectively shall apply with respect to all potatoes intended for human consumption (whether grown in New Zealand or imported into New Zealand) that are sold by a distributor, wholesaler, or retailer (as the case may be) for delivery at any time after the coming into force of this Order.

- Distributors and Other Wholesalers to Specify Weights and Grades of Potatoes on Relevant Invoices
- 16. (1) Every distributor or other wholesaler who sells any potatoes to which this Order applies shall specify in the relevant invoices, with respect to each item, the weight and the grade of the potatoes comprised in the item.
- (2) For the purposes of this clause the term "grade" with respect to any lot of potatoes means, as the case may require, "good table" or "f.a.q." or "under-grade."

 (3) Where no grade is specified in any invoice, the potatoes referred to in the invoice, shall, for the purpose of this order be deemed to be "under-grade."

Retailers' Prices

- 17. (1) Subject to the following provisions of this clause, the maximum price inclusive of the container that may be charged or received by any retailer for any potatoes to which this Order applies, shall not exceed the sum of the following amounts:—
 - (a) The price actually paid or payable by the retailer for the potatoes, but not exceeding the appropriate price fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order.
 (b) Any grading, transport, or other charges actually paid or payable by the retailer:
 (c) An amount equal to 33½ per cent of the sum of the amounts specified in paragraphs (a) and (b) hereof.
- (2) The retail price of any potatoes, computed in accordance with the last preceding subclause, shall be calculated by reference to the prices and weights disclosed in the appropriate invoices.
- (3) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the foregoing provisions of this clause, but subject to the provisions of subclauses (4) and (5) hereof, the retail price of potatoes inclusive of the container to which this Order applies shall not in any case exceed the appropriate price set out in the Schedule hereto.

Any authority given by the Tribunal under this clause may apply with respect to a specified lot or consignment of potatoes or may relate generally to all potatoes to which this Order applies sold by the retailer while the approval remains in force. the approval remains in force.

Retailers to Exhibit Prices

19. Every retailer who offers or exposes any potatoes to which this Order applies for sale in any shop shall keep in a prominent position in such proximity to the potatoes to which it relates as to be obviously descriptive thereof a ticket, placard, or label on which shall be stated in legible and prominent characters the retail price per pound of the potatoes.

BRANDING OF GOOD TABLE POTATOES

20. Every grower, distributor, or wholesaler who grades any potatoes as "good table" shall affix to every sack so graded a tag on which shall be written the words "Good Table Grade" and the name and address of the person so grading the potatoes: Provided, however, that where a grower so grading potatoes is a member of a growers' association approved by the Minister of Agriculture his registrous purposes. Agriculture his registered number may be given in place of his name and address.
