*Award for Gallantry*

HIS EXCELLENCY the Governor-General has announced that the Queen has been pleased to approve the posthumous award of the George Cross to Sergeant Murray Ken Hudson of the Royal New Zealand Infantry Regiment (Regular Force), who lost his life in a grenade accident at Waiouru on 13 February 1974. With great courage and utter selflessness Sergeant Hudson attempted to remove an armed grenade from a soldier under training, in an attempt to save the soldier's life. Both lost their lives in the accident.
