## STEAM FERRY TO NORTH SHORE.

Superintendent's Office,  
Auckland, July 9th, 1858.

TENDERS will be received at this Office until noon of Wednesday, 15th Sept., 1858, from persons willing to contract for the maintenance of a STEAM FERRY between Stokes' Point on the North Shore, and the City of Auckland, for a period of one year, on the conditions following:—

The Boat to start for Stokes' Point from the Queen-street Wharf every morning at eight o'clock, and leave the landing place at Stokes' Point on her return at half-past nine o'clock. To start from the Queen-street Wharf for Stokes' Point every evening at four o'clock, and to leave Stokes' Point for Auckland at half-past five o'clock.

The Contractor will be permitted to make a charge for passengers not exceeding one shilling each for adults, and sixpence each for children, and a charge for merchandise or produce at a rate not exceeding five shillings per ton.

Between the hours of ten o'clock and three the Contractor would be at liberty to make a trip to the Tamaki, to Howick, to Shoal Bay, or other places within the Harbour as might be found convenient.

There are at present three Ferries by small boats from Auckland to the North Shore, viz.: to Stokes' Point three times a week, to Stewart's Point in Shoal Bay, twice a week, and to the Flagstaff once a week. The number of passengers who have travelled by these ferries during the year ending 30th January last, is returned as 6046.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS  
GORE BROWNE, Companion of the

most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

**W**HEREAS the land hereinafter mentioned has been acquired by purchase, from the Aboriginal inhabitants of New Zealand, and it is expedient that the acquisition thereof should be notified by Proclamation accordingly.

Now, therefore, I, the Governor, do hereby proclaim and notify that the Native Title has been extinguished over the Block of Land whereof the boundaries are mentioned or described in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

Given under my hand, and issued under the Public Seal of the Colony of New Zealand, at Government House, at Auckland, this ninth day of July, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

PROVINCE OF AUCKLAND.

*District of Raglan.*

Part of the Mata Reserve, estimated to contain 1500 Acres.

**BOUNDARIES.**

A line commencing at a point a little below the rapid of Opotoru, which was marked by

the surveyors, thence on along Mr. Rogan's survey line till it crosses the road to Aotea, thence on to the end of the said survey line, and on to Paraoa, it then goes in a Southerly direction till it arrives at Ti Korunui, thence in a straight line till it meets the boundary line of Ruapuke and Karioi, it then goes in a Northerly direction along the old boundary line (Karioi) to a point a little below the rapid of Opotoru, where the boundary closes.
