## GOLD DISCOVERY.

### TWOTHOUSAND POUNDS REWARD.

Superintendent's Office,

THE following Resolution, adopted by the Provincial Council of the Province of Auckland, is published for general information.

"Resolved—That an address be presented to His Honor the Superintendent requesting him to offer a reward not exceeding Two Thousand Pounds to be awarded to any person or persons who shall discover an available gold-field in the Province of Auckland, and make the same known to the Provincial Government, this Council pledging itself to vote such sum when necessary, subject to the following conditions:—

"1. Claim or claims to be sent into the Provincial Government.

"2. An available gold-field shall be considered to exist whenever such a quantity of gold shall be obtained from it, as shall have afforded employment to not less than 500 diggers for three months at fair average wages.

"3. All matters relating to any claim

shall be referred to and decided by three commissioners, to be appointed for that purpose by the Superintendent, by and with the advice and consent of his Executive Council.

"Commissioners award to be made not later than nine months from the date of reception of claim."

BOUNDARIES.

Commencing at Mangahahuru at the beginning of Mr. Bedlington's survey line, thence along the Mangahahuru stream to Hauru, Orae, Ohopu, and on to Wairua, thence along the Wairua river to the Horo, Okoromatua, Rangiriri, Muturangi, Tawakotiwa, Otaramoana, Waiotu, Te Rira, Pohikoko, and on to the termination of Mr. Bedlington's line, thence along this line bearing by compass  $314^{\circ} 14'$  52,012 links, to the point of commencement.

TE APOTU BLOCK.

*Estimated to contain 947 acres.*

BOUNDARIES.

Commencing on the side of Kaurihohore Block on Mr. Searancke's survey line, bearing by compass  $87^{\circ} 45'$  8,712 links,  $139^{\circ} 25'$  5,548 links to Ngorungoru or Mangahakuru to the boundary of Hikurangi; thence following that stream until it meets the boundary of Kaurihohore; thence along the boundary of Kaurihohore to the point of commencement of Mr. Searancke's survey line.

OWHIUA BLOCK.

*Estimated to contain 847 acres.*

BOUNDARIES.

Commencing at Waipuna on the water-side of Whangarei, thence to Maire and Pukurahe, thence inland on the side of Waimahanga, bearing by compass  $49^{\circ} 0'$  7,026 links,  $133^{\circ} 0'$  6,000 links, on the side of Tamatarau  $199^{\circ} 17'$  1,465 links, to Waikaraka stream, thence following high-water mark to Owhiua, and thence to Waireki, and from thence to Waipuna by line bearing  $292^{\circ} 0'$  5,450 links, when the boundaries close.

WARRANT

*Nominating Auditor of Public Accounts of the Province of Auckland.*

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, Knight, Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the "Provincial Audit Act, 1861," that the Superintendent and Provincial Council of any Province in New Zealand within one month after the commencement of the Session of such Council which shall ensue next after the passing of the said Act shall concur in the nomination of some fit and proper person to be Auditor of the Public Accounts: Provided that in default of such appointment within the time aforesaid, the Governor shall nominate a fit and proper person for such office, and the person so nominated by the Governor for such office shall thereupon be appointed to the same by Warrant under the hand of the Speaker of such Council.

And whereas the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Auckland did not concur in the nomination of such person to be such Officer as aforesaid within the time before mentioned:

Now therefore I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, do hereby nominate

JOSEPH NEWMAN, of Auckland.

In the said Province, Ironmonger and Merchant, to be the Auditor of the Public Accounts of the said Province of Auckland.

#### PROCLAMATION.

By JOHN WILLIAMSON, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, in the Colony of New Zealand.

WHEREAS, by the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," it was provided that the Governor in Council might by warrant under his hand from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the colony of New Zealand, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act, subject to such regulations as he might think fit, and might from time to time rescind such delegation; and whereas the said Governor hath with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand delegated to John Williamson, Esquire, so long as he shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, the several powers vested in the said Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor in Council, on the first day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made.

Now, therefore, I, the said John Williamson, by virtue of such powers in me vested do hereby proclaim and declare,—That after the date hereof, the several colonies of Australia, that is to say, the colony of New South Wales, of Victoria, of South Australia, of Western Australia, and Queensland, as well as the colony of Tasmania, and the colony of the Cape of Good Hope, and the islands of Great Britain and Ireland, shall be deemed to be, for the purposes of the above recited Act, infected districts within the meaning of the said Act, and no cattle shall be allowed to be imported from the above mentioned districts, into the Province of Auckland, until further notice; and that in case any cattle shall be imported from the said districts contrary to this Proclamation, such cattle shall be destroyed forthwith in such manner and at such places as the Superintendent may proclaim and appoint. Provided, however, that the Superintendent of the Province may allow any cattle to be landed from vessels

from the Islands of Great Britain and Ireland subject to such conditions and restrictions as he may deem expedient, and the circumstances of the case may require.

#### PROCLAMATION.

By JOHN WILLIAMSON, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Auckland.

WHEREAS, by the "Thistle Act, 1858," it was amongst other thing enacted that it should be lawful for the Superintendent of the Province of Auckland from time to time by Proclamation in the Provincial Government Gazette, to declare that the said Act should come into operation within any District, and thereby to proclaim the limits of the District.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers and authority in me vested, I, the said Superintendent, do hereby proclaim and declare that the said "Thistle Act, 1858," shall, on and after the first day of March next, come into operation within the Waiheke District, and the limits of the said District shall be,—All those portions of the Island of Waiheke, known as Brigham's original purchase; Chisholm's purchase; the Government block at Te iwi tua roa of 10,900 acres; De Wittes' purchases; Samuel Allen Wood's land at Rocky Bay, Merrick's purchases in Awawaroa; Brown and Campbell's purchases in Te Matuku; Capt. Porter's purchases in Orapiu Bay; the Government purchase of Omaru; the lands purchased by Alexander Cromwell, John A. Simms, and Robert Gillingham; Brown and Campbell's purchase at Patio and Waikorariki; the land purchased by Andrew Sinclair at Pikau; the land purchased by Marriat and Turner at Pakihi; the Government block at Opopo; Webster's purchase, containing 885 acres, at the East end of the island, and Mrs. Shepherd's land at the Patu; being all of the island of Waiheke that is not native territory.

## PROCLAMATION.

By JOHN WILLIAMSON, Esquire,  
Superintendent of the Province  
of Auckland, in the Colony of  
New Zealand.

WHEREAS by an Act made and passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled the "Auckland Waste Land Act, 1858," it is among other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Superintendent by Proclamation to declare that a certain block of land therein described should be set apart and reserved for certain Immigrants expected to arrive from the United Kingdom or elsewhere, other than the Australian Colonies.

Now, therefore, pursuant to the authority vested in me in that behalf, I, the Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, do hereby proclaim and declare that 20,000 acres being portion of the Matakoho Block, Kaipara, shall be reserved and set apart for certain Immigrants expected to arrive. The said Matakoho Block being bounded on the North by the Okahu and Tokatoka Blocks, on the East by the Monganui River, and by the line cut by Mr. Buchanan, on the South by the Arapawa Creek and by Native Land, and on the West by the Wairoa River.
