WHEREAS, by the "Thistle Act, 1858," it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Superintendent of the Province of Auckland from time to time

by Proclamation in the Provincial Government Gazette, to declare that the said Act should come into operation within any District, and thereby to proclaim the limits of the district.

THE following Bye-laws for the Hundred of Panmure are published for general information.

BYE-LAWS FOR THE YEAR 1862.

At a Meeting of the Wardens for the Hundred of Panmure, held on the 12th February, 1862, it was resolved as follows:— That all Bye-laws heretofore in force in the said Hundred be repealed, and the following substituted instead:—

1. That each License-holder be allowed to run six head of Great Cattle, three head of

Small Cattle, being under eighteen months old, to be considered equivalent to one head of Great Cattle. Foals not to reckon as stock until twelve months old, then to be considered as one head of Great Cattle until two years old, when they will rate as Horses. One Horse to reckon as two head of Great Cattle.

2. Pigs found on the run without being rung, the owner to pay the sum of Two Shillings and Sixpence, and for every time so offending.

3. Any person found worrying Cattle with dogs within the Hundred, shall pay for every such offence the sum of Two Pounds Sterling, exclusive of the amount for any damage done to such Cattle, which may be recovered by the owner thereof.

4. No person shall be allowed to run an Entire beast within the Hundred, under a penalty of One Pound Sterling for the first offence, and for every subsequent offence Two Pounds Sterling.

5. That the owners of all Cattle found trespassing on the Hundred, shall pay for every head of such Cattle the sum of Ten Shillings in addition to the poundage fees.

6. Any Sheep found trespassing on the run shall be pounded, and the owner shall pay the sum of Three Pence each head, in addition to the poundage fees.

PUBLIC NOTIFICATION.

WHEREAS a majority of the persons occupying property liable to be rated under the provisions of the "Local Improvement Act, 1858," having a frontage to that portion of the Cabbage Tree Swamp Road which is bounded on the one side by the road from Auckland to the Whau, and on the other side by the road which leads by the Three Kings to Mount Albert, and occupying at least one-half of the frontage to the said portion of the said street, have represented to me that they are willing to be specially rated for the purpose of improving the said portion of the Cabbage Tree Swamp Road aforesaid.

And Whereas, I, the said Superintendent, for the purpose of raising one moiety of the estimated cost of the said improvements, do hereby, by virtue of the powers and authority to me by the said Act given, order and direct that an equitable rate, at the sum of two shillings and sixpence for every chain of frontage to the said portion of the Cabbage Tree Swamp Road be levied upon all real property having a frontage to the said portion of the said Road, except upon such land as is by the said Act excepted. ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT OF THE
AUCKLAND PROVINCIAL HOSPITAL,
LUNATIC ASYLUM, AND PRISONS,
FOR 1861.

HOSPITAL.

Of the 4 cases of "Abscess" remaining last return, all have been discharged. The case of "Erysipelas" remains still in hospital, the subject being an old man unable to work. The 3 cases of "Blindness" remain still incurable. Of the 5 cases of "Disease of the Brain and Paralysis," 1 has died, 1 has been discharged, and 3 remain without prospect of recovery. The case of "Epilepsy" is still in hospital, unimproved. The case of "Pneumonia" was discharged cured. The "Asthmatic" case remains. The 2 cases of "Phthisis" have proved fatal. Both cases of "Hemorrhoids" have been discharged, cured; one after operation by the ligature. Both cases of "Fistula" have been discharged cured, after operation. Three of the 6 cases of "Rheumatism" have been dis-

charged, and 3 remain. The case of "Scrofula" remains still uncured, the subject is a native girl. Of the 3 "Syphilitic" cases, 1 died; the disease assumed the form of a corroding ulcer of the integuments of the head and face, and proved fatal by Erysipelas; the other two were discharged. Of the three "Fractures" all have been discharged, cured, (one of them after amputation of the leg referred to in last return). The case of "Sprain" has been discharged, also the case of "Stiff-joint" after compound dislocation of the ankle, the patient having obtained a good use of his foot. Two cases of "General Debility" have been discharged, and two remain.

FEVERS.—The numerical sum of "Admissions, Discharges, and Deaths," in 1861, does not differ widely from that of the preceding year, being, however, slightly in excess. The most notable feature in the present return is to the great increase of "fever" cases, the number admitted amounting to 33, while only six were admitted in 1860. In fact there occurred in the past year throughout the island, a widely spread epidemic of fever, the type of which was decidedly typhoid, some of the cases, in particular one from Waiheke, rivalling in intensity the worst usually met with in the crowded cities of the old country. Of the 33 admitted, 8 died, or 24 per cent. The 1st, J. F. male, aged 24 years, was admitted February 23rd, on the 11th day of the disease. This patient speedily became comatose, and died on March 3rd, being the 9th day from admission. 2nd. M. K. female, aged 12 years, admitted in a state of insensibility, and died on the 6th day afterwards. 3rd. W. H. male, aged 21 years, a half caste, died on the 7th day from admission. 4th. W. R. male, aged 27 years, died on the 4th day from admission. 5th. J. L. female, aged 25 years, died on the 3rd day from admission. 6th. G. H. A. male, aged 24 years, was ill a week before admission, soon became comatose and died at the end of 8 days. A considerable amount of serum was found to have been effused upon the upper and back part of the left hemisphere of the brain. 7th. A. McM. female, aged 12 years, ill a week before admission, died 11 days afterwards. 8th. J. B. male, aged 25 years, brought from Aotea, where he had been ill 3 weeks, died on the 5th day from admission. In all these (except the last, which was complicated with Pneumonia) the predominating symptoms were indicative of brain-disorder. Some of the recoveries were hair-breadth escapes, and during the prevalence of the epidemic which lasted from January till July, the most unremitting attention was demanded of the Hospital attendants. It is worthy of remark, that in no case was the disease communicated by those affected to the other patients in Hospital, thus evincing the general cleanliness and ventilation of the wards, and confuting the slanderous statements to the contrary, made in and out of the Provincial Council.

ABSCCESS.—Under the heading of "Abscess" is the fatal case of H. McG., soldier's wife

aged 23 years, admitted from ship-board in a most reduced state from mammary abscess. She survived 27 days. No post mortem examination was permitted.

BRAIN AFFECTIONS.—There are 5 fatal cases of Brain Affection. 1st. C. B., male, aged 43 years, an old apoplectic case, the result of many years' hard drinking. 2nd. E. B., male, aged 58 years, very similar to the last, was fourteen days in hospital. 3rd. A. W., female, aged 43 years, lower extremities paralyzed; in hospital seven days. 4th. F. F., male, aged 45 years, of very intemperate habits; idiotic when admitted; speedily became paralytic. Great disease of the brain was found on dissection, chronic softening and superabundant effusion into the ventricles. 5th. S. A., female, aged 54 years, of sober habits, but the subject of much family affliction and mental anxiety. Had an apoplectic attack previous to her admission; speedily became comatose and paralytic on right side. The left side of the brain looked like thick custard, and there was much serum in the ventricles.

DELIRIUM TREMENS.—One patient died from delirium tremens, F. A., male, aged 40 years, of very drunken habits; was apoplectic on admission, and died in forty hours afterwards. No examination.

PNEUMONIA.—One patient, W. B., male, aged 61 years; died thirteen hours after admission with inflammation of the lungs, two-thirds of the right lung being found completely solidified and incapable of admitting air. The heart was greatly dilated and almost wholly converted into a mass of fat.

PHTHISIS.—Five persons died of "pulmonary consumption." 1st. Y. P., seaman, of the French ship "General Teste," aged 17 years; died on the sixth day from admission. 2nd. O. McC., aged 30 years; survived several months. Had acute curvature of the spine; both lungs were found filled with tubercles in all stages. 3rd. S. T. female, aged 13 years; had been repeatedly in hospital for spitting of blood to an extraordinary extent, considering the age of the patient. Was not examined. 4th. T. W., aged 23 years, seaman, of H.M.S. "Miranda," sent on shore to hospital in a hopeless state; survived a month. The right lung was found completely disorganized. The liver also was tuberculated, and the corneæ of both eyes ulcerated. 5th. W. M., aged 22 years, a seaman, belonging to the United States; was forty days in hospital; died rather suddenly. Right lung found collapsed and pleura full of sero-purulent fluid.

HEART DISEASE.—Four patients died of heart disease. 1st. W. K., male, aged 64 years; had been repeatedly in Hospital with general dropsy. 2nd. J. McC., male, aged 45 years; repeatedly in hospital; on the last occasion from May 22 to Oct. 8. There was enormous hypertrophy of the heart, which weighed four pounds and equalled in size a bullock's heart.

The ascending aorta was aneurismal, and the liver also was diseased. 3rd. T. G., male, aged 46 years; died fourteen hours after admission; enormous hypertrophy; aortic valves ossified and shortened. 4th. J. B., male, aged 31 years; died thirty-six hours after admission. Morbid appearances found were hypertrophy of both ventricles, valvular disease, pericardium full of serum.

LIVER DISEASE.—There was admitted 14th October, a very interesting case of Liver Disease in A. N., female; aged 40 years. The symptoms were deep greenish-yellow jaundice, want of appetite, and progressive emaciation. After death on December 19th, three angular biliary calculi, weighing 50 grains in all, were found impacted in the neck of the gall-bladder and cemented together by inspissated bile. The liver was greatly enlarged, and the heart resembled a mass of yellow fat. The subject of this disease was of very temperate habits and had been long ill.

STOMACH.—A fatal case of intractable vomiting occasioned by excessive drinking occurred in E. S., female; aged 23 years. She died on the day after admission.

BOWELS.—There were three fatal cases of Bowel Complaint:—1st. P. O., male; aged 56 years. This was an example of Recto-vesical fistula. 2nd. I. I., male; aged 27 years. Died the day after admission. 3rd. J. C., male; aged 52 years. A case of diseased liver and bowels. Died a fortnight after admission.

RHEUMATISM.—There was one fatal case under this head, P. O'H., male, aged 62 years, who had besides protracted dysentery.

CANCER.—A fatal case of Cancer of the Uterus occurred in J. H., aged 36 years. She had been ill for years, and the organs affected were in a putrid state.

SYPHILIS.—Two fatal cases of Syphilitic disease occurred. 1st. In P. P., male, aged 58 years, who for years had suffered from a corroding ulceration on his left temple, ending in Erysipelas rapidly fatal. 2nd. W. D., male, aged 57 years, affected with phagedenic ulceration, and survived only six days.

GENERAL DEBILITY.—Under this heading is returned the fatal case of W. N., male, aged 65 years. He had been in Hospital since December, 1859, and sank November 22, 1861.

ACCIDENTS.—Thirty-eight (38) cases of accident occurred during the year, of which 14 were fractures. One of these has proved fatal in the present year, 1862—namely, Fracture of the Pelvis and of the neck of the left thigh bone. A very rare instance of dislocated thigh occurred—namely, *downwards* and *inwards*; the subject thereof was employed in excavating at the "Huia" Mills, when a bank of earth fell upon him, almost burying him alive. After the lapse of ten days he was sent to Hospital, when from the tumefaction and confusion, the exact nature of the injury could not be ascer-

tained. After some time, however, it became manifest, and reduction was effected under Chloroform, and a good recovery obtained.

ACCIDENTS AND GENERAL OBSERVATIONS.—Two capital operations were performed. 1st. M. I., female, aged 41 years, had her right forearm amputated for scrofulous disease of the hand and wrists. This patient has made a favourable recovery. 2nd. M. K., male, aged 34 years, having had his right hand dreadfully lacerated by a circular saw, at the "Huia" Mill, underwent amputation of the fore-arm, and recovered favourably. My best thanks are due to those of my professional brethren, who on these occasions lent me their valuable assistance.

The conduct of the patients during the year has been good, very few of them requiring admonition.

In concluding the remarks on the Hospital, I would call attention to the fact, that since the sale of the building allotments adjoining the Hospital on the Grafton-road, our supply of water from the brook has been cut off, and suggest that a Tank be sunk to collect the rain water which falls on the roof of the building,

Of the 54 cases remaining about two-thirds are chronic, and do not call for any remark; they would be more suitable inmates of a house of Industry, than of an Hospital.

Of the remaining third, the most urgent is the case of aneurism of the aorta in G. S., admitted April 15th, aged 41 years.

LUNATIC ASYLUM.

At the end of 1860, there were 40 persons in the Lunatic Asylum: of these during 1861 there have been discharged 4, viz., R. T., male; aged 52 years, European; had been in the Asylum 4 years, the last two confined to his bed, and constantly imploring every one who visited him to destroy him. Most unexpectedly this man recovered the use of his reason, and after a proper period of probation, was discharged under the custody of his friends, since which he has been doing well. 2. A native man admitted July, 1860; discharged April, 1861. 3. M. C., male, aged 17 years. Admitted November, 1860, with mental derangement occasioned by drinking, speedily improved and was discharged January 31st, 1861. 4. P. H., male, aged 31 years. Admitted December 18th, 1860, under circumstances similar to the last; discharged January 7th, 1861. Two of the 40 have died, viz., M. H., female, European, aged 51 years. Admitted June, 1859; died suddenly in an apoplectic fit, 8th August, 1861. On examination a large quantity of serum was found under the arachnoid membrane. A year before her death she had a severe attack of Erysipelas of the head and face. 2. A native man aged about 60 years; sent into the Asylum from Kohimarama at the time of the native conference in July, 1860. Decided evidence of diseased brain soon appeared and after some months' confinement

to bed he died March 17th, 1861. A large quantity of blood was found extravasated beneath the dura mater. Of the 34 cases remaining, 3 have been in the house upwards of 9 years, 2 about 8 years, 2 seven years, 3 six years, 3 five years, 7 four years, 6 three years, and 8 one year and under.

ADMISSIONS.—There were admitted during 1861, 17 new cases, 13 males and 4 females, all of whom were Europeans. Of these, 5 have been discharged, viz., 1st. W. B. male, aged 61 years, maniacal from drink, discharged after 3 months' treatment. 2nd. A. B. male, aged 32 years, similar to the last in exciting cause. Admitted May 28th, and after some weeks confinement made his escape from his keeper while at work outside the building, contrived to get to Sydney, and again returned to Auckland and gave himself up to the Police, and was legally discharged October 26th. 3rd. G. D. male, aged 38 years, admitted June 13th, having been found incapable of managing his affairs: in about 2 months he was sufficiently restored to enable him to proceed to England. 4th. W. B. male, aged 42 years, of violent temper, and greatly depressed by blighted prospects, was admitted July 23rd, and after 3 months' treatment, was sufficiently recovered to warrant his being discharged to proceed to Melbourne, where some of his friends reside. 5th. J. C., male, aged 44 years, a case in several points resembling the last, was admitted August 17th, and discharged recovered November 14th. Of the new cases, 4 have died; 1st. G. L., male, aged 31 years, carried on business for some years in Auckland, but symptoms of derangement having manifested themselves, he was admitted into the Lunatic Asylum on January 9th. He soon became perfectly idiotic, and paralytic, and died June 20th. On examination, a large quantity of clear water was found effused into, and upon the surface of the brain, the substance of which was very soft. 2nd. J. M., female, aged 39 years; of very intemperate habits, and for a long time the subject of mental derangement, for which she had been treated at home, was brought to the Asylum June 11th, in an idiotic state, and died a fortnight thereafter. No examination was permitted. 3rd. J. E., male, aged 38 years, admitted from the coast on June 17th, in a paralytic state, and quite idiotic, died August 17th, and on dissection, a sharp point of bone was discovered projecting from the inner surface of the skull, and irritating the dura mater. 4th. T. H. E. male, aged 47 years, admitted in an idiotic and paralytic state on October 7th, and died November 29th. On examination the vessels of the dura mater was found greatly engorged, the arachnoid membranes presented a milky appearance, the result of chronic inflammation. There were about 4ozs. of serum in the ventricles. The liver also was greatly enlarged. Of the remaining, some are in a hopeful state, others cannot be expected to improve.

The total number remaining this year exceeds that of the last year by two, and as there is

little prospect of this number being diminished and the house is at present crowded, increased accommodation is urgently required.

PRISONS.—There has been a considerable increase in the number of sick in the Mount Eden Gaol, but the cases do not call for any special remark. One death occurred at Mount Eden, in the person of Eugene Donovan, aged 56 years, on November 16th, from Aneurism of the Aorta and diseased heart.
