#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

##### HOKIANGA RIVER.

Superintendent's Office,  
Auckland, 26th January, 1863.

MASTERS of Vessels and others navigating the Hokianga River are hereby informed that, on and after the 1st day of March proximo, the following will be the Code of Signals for taking Hokianga Bar and entering the River:—

1. SIGNALS.—From the Signal-staff on the South Head the following Signals will be made:—

- No. 1. Blue Peter—Keep to Sea; Bar is not fit to take.
- No. 2. Red Flag—Take the Bar; there is no danger.
- No. 3. Blue with White Cross—Ebb Tide; Bar not fit.
- No. 4. White—First Quarter Flood.

—When these flags are understood, they should be answered from the ship by a pendant or flag where best seen. The Pilot will be at the entrance of the Heads in his boat, but seldom outside the Bar.

2. If a vessel is too far to the North for entering, a White Square will be hoisted on the South yard-arm; and if too far to the South, it will be hoisted on the North yard-arm. Vessels to be particularly guided by the hoisting of the White Square at the yard-arms, and take that direction. No vessel should take the Bar until the Flagstaff bears E  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.

WHEREAS by the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," it was provided that the Governor in Council might by Warrant under his hand from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the said Colony all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act subject to such regulations as he might think fit, and might from time to time rescind such delegation:

Now therefore I, Sir George Grey the Governor of the said Colony of New Zealand with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof and in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, do by this Warrant under my hand delegate to Robert Graham, Esq., so long as he shall hold the Office of Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, in the said Colony, the several powers vested in me by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to be rescinded as in the said Act provided, and subject to the Regulations issued on the Fifteenth day of September One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and to any other Regulations to be from time to time duly made.

#### ORDER IN COUNCIL.

*Regulations respecting Delegation of Powers to Superintendents under "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861."*

At the Government House at Wellington, the fifteenth day of September, 1862.

Present:—

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Warrants under the hand of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the fifteenth day of September One Thousand Eight hundred and sixty two, the Governor has, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to the Superintendents respectively of the Provinces of Auckland, Taranaki, Wellington, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough, Canterbury, Otago and Southland, certain powers conferred on him by the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," subject to certain Regulations to be made by the Governor in Council under the recited Act;

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, by virtue of the authority given to him by the 14th Section of the above recited Act, doth hereby make and ordain the following Regulations:

1. The delegation of powers under the said Warrants shall continue to be in force for the period of one year from this date, subject to be rescinded according to the provisions of the above recited Act.

2. Each Superintendent shall, immediately after exercising any of the Delegated Powers, notify the same to the Governor, and he shall transmit to the Governor particulars of all Appointments and copies of all Regulations made by him.

3. He shall, so soon as conveniently can be, notify all Regulations made by him to the Colonial Secretary or Chief Secretary of each of the Australian Colonies, and cause the same to be published in England in *The Times* newspaper.

4. In the exercise of powers delegated under the 9th Section of the said Act, the Superintendent of any Province may either in the first instance or afterwards from time to time, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* of the Province, except out of any District, proclaimed as infected under the said Act, any port or place within the limits of such District, and every such excepted port and place shall be deemed not to be within the proclaimed District, and the Superintendent may also from time to time by Proclamation as aforesaid, rescind any Proclamation of an infected District, wholly or as to any part thereof, and also the Proclamation of any such exception as aforesaid.

5. In the exercise of powers delegated under the 10th section of the Act, the Superintendent of any Province may prohibit the importation, either by land or by sea, of cattle into such Province from any other Province, or any particular port or place in any other Province, or across the borders of a Province or any particular part thereof.

6. In all such last mentioned cases such Superintendent shall cause notice as speedily as possible of such prohibition to be given to the Superintendent of the Province from which importation shall be prohibited, and also to the Governor.

7. The Superintendent of any Province may in his discretion suspend or forbear to exercise all or any of the powers delegated to him under the said Act.

8. The Superintendent of each Province shall, as soon as can be after the commencement of each sitting of the Provincial Council of such Province, lay before such Council copies and par-

ticulars of all Appointments, Regulations, Acts and Proceedings whatever issued, made or done by him under the Delegated Powers of the said Act.

9. If the Provincial Council of any Province shall by Resolution declare their dissent from all or any of such Appointments, Regulations, Acts, and Proceedings, such resolution shall be forthwith transmitted by the Speaker to the Governor for his consideration.

1. There shall be two men constantly in attendance for the purpose of working the punt or boat, except from  $\frac{1}{2}$ -past 8 till 9 a.m., and from  $\frac{1}{4}$ -past 12 till 1 o'clock p.m.
2. The punt or boat to cross the river without charge, as often as required, from 6 o'clock in the morning until sundown from the 15th day of September till the 15th day of March inclusive; and from the 16th day of March till the 14th day of September inclusive, from daylight till sundown; except between the hours stated in Regulation No. 1.
3. From sundown until 10 o'clock at night, and from daylight until 6 o'clock in the morning, a charge of one shilling shall be paid, for each horse, or single horse and vehicle, and 6d. for each foot passenger.
4. From 10 o'clock, p.m., to daylight throughout the year, the charge for each horse, or single horse and vehicle, shall be 2s. 6d., and for each foot passenger, 1s.
5. Passengers arriving at the Ferry before sunset to be taken over free, even in the event of the Ferry Boat being on the opposite side at the time they arrive.
6. Ministers of Religion with their horse or vehicle to be taken over at any hour free of charge. (But this clause shall not exempt any person or persons in their company from paying the usual fare.)
7. Should the punt or boat be halfway across the river when any person or persons arrive at the Ferry, the punt or boat is required to proceed on her way with the utmost despatch, and to return without delay to convey the waiting passenger or passengers.

**ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT OF THE  
AUCKLAND PROVINCIAL HOSPITAL,  
LUNATIC ASYLUM, AND  
PRISONS, FOR 1862.**

**PROVINCIAL HOSPITAL.**

The number of patients admitted into the Auckland Provincial Hospital in 1862, exceeds that in 1861 by 23, and amounts to 286, of whom 272 were Europeans, consisting of 227 males and 45 females; and 14 were Maories, composed of 12 males and 2 females. Of the 54 remaining last Return, 33 have been discharged, 9 have died, and 12 remain; all of whom, whether from blindness, paralysis, epilepsy, or old age, must be regarded as permanent inmates of the Institution. The total number of deaths during the year is 32, of whom 26 were males and 6 females, being about  $9\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. of the total treated; and of this mortality it will be seen on perusing the following remarks, that a large proportion took place within a few days (in some cases a few hours only) after admission; showing that such patients were sent into hospital merely to die. The daily average number of patients amounted to 57, and the average period of each in the hospital extended to 46 days. Of the number remaining at the end of the year, 25 may be regarded as incurable, either in consequence of disease or general debility, and as being more suitable inmates of a house of industry than of an hospital.

**FEVERS.**—The number of fever cases admitted during the year, amounts only to 10, less than one-third of the number admitted the previous year. Four of them proved fatal:—1st G. H. P., male, aged 22 years, admitted May 4th, almost in an expiring state, proved by his dying the next day. 2nd, Hipirini, a native lad from the Roman Catholic College at the North Shore, admitted July 30th, and died 4 days afterwards. 3rd, A. M., a seaman, aged 30 years, admitted August 1st, and died August 5th. 4th, L. D., a female, aged 21 years, admitted December 27th, and died on the 30th ult. There cannot be a doubt that all of these patients were injured by removal from their

places of abode at an advanced state of their illness.

**ERYSIPELAS.**—Two cases of erysipelas proved fatal:—1st, A. M., male, aged 55 years, admitted January 20th, having been ten days ill in his lodgings. The most extensive sloughing of the cellular tissue and integuments of the right leg and thigh ensued, notwithstanding the practice of free incisions all over the affected limb, and death by exhaustion took place at the end of 14 days. The 2nd case was that of R. R., a boy of ten years, from Onehunga, admitted May 6th, with violent erysipelas of right arm and shoulder, caused by the prick of a fish-bone in the point of one of his fingers a week before admission. Collapse speedily set in, and death took place in 5 days.

**OPHTHALMIA.**—There are two fatal cases under the head of affections of the eyes:—1st, H. C., male, aged 34 years, many years blind in both eyes, and a permanent inmate of the hospital. He was of a consumptive habit, and gradually sank on September 16th. The right lung was found full of small abscesses and the intestines were ulcerated. 2nd, Peter, a Wahu-man, long blind totally, and finding a home in the hospital. Died consumptive September 28th.

**DELIRIUM TREMENS.**—A fatal case of apoplexy, the result of excessive drinking, occurred on September 9th, in eight hours after admission, in E. C., a soldier's wife, aged 30 years, sent to hospital by the Commissioner of Police. On examination, a large mass of clotted blood was found overlaying the upper surface of both hemispheres of the brain. The 2nd fatal case of "delirium tremens" was that of T. S., also a female, aged 40 years; had had repeated attacks previously, died on the third day from admission. Copious serous effusion found in and upon the brain after death. 3rd, T. R., male, aged 37 years, died likewise on the third day after admission. He also had had previous attacks of the disease. 4th, I. L., male, aged 43 years, admitted December 7th after a fortnight's debauch, and died December 10th. This was an old case likewise, and in addition to the serous effusion in and upon the brain this patient's heart was found enormously enlarged, no doubt caused and aggravated by intemperance. We were so fortunate as to have ten recoveries from this frightful disease during the year.

**DISEASE OF BRAIN.**—A fatal case of obscure affection of the brain, not altogether unconnected with drink, occurred on October 30th, in W. S., male, aged 35 years. He was admitted in the beginning of the year, after the races; and some time before death was paralytic. On examination a tumour the size of a bean was discovered at the base of the brain.

**PNEUMONIA.**—A fatal case of pneumonia is recorded in the person of I. R., male, aged 30 years, admitted in a dying state on

December 4th, and died on December 6th, 38 hours after admission.

**EPILEPSY.**—A fatal case of epilepsy occurred in G. C., male, aged 22 years, admitted January 24th, and died March 24th. The fits in this case were very frequent and violent, and on dissection a projecting spine of bone was found irritating the anterior lobes of the brain. The brain weighed 3 lbs. 8½ ounces.

**CONSUMPTION.**—Three fatal cases of Phthisis are returned; two of them remaining from last year. 1. P. F. seaman, aged 27 years, died March 10th. 2. J. R. male, aged 38 years, admitted January 30th, and died April 30th. Enormous caverns were found in the lungs, there was also diseased liver. 3. J. W. male, aged 37 years, died May 18th. In addition to diseased lungs, the heart was found enlarged.

**MALIGNANT QUINCY.**—Under Quinsy is the case of S. C., female, aged 12 years, admitted from the ship "William Miles," November 13th, with malignant sore throat and dying two hours and a-half after admission.

**DISEASES OF HEART AND ARTERIES.**—Under diseases of the Heart and Arteries is the fatal case of G. S., referred to in last report, death took place February 5th; the aneurism having burst a week before death, and discharged an immense quantity of blood. The tumor arose from the arch of the Aorta, and was double the size of the heart, and filled with concentric layers of fibrine. 2. D. M., male, aged 36 years, admitted 10th February, and died next day. The heart was found greatly enlarged, with ossified valves. Pericardium universally adhered; Disease of liver and abdominal dropsy.

**LIVER DISEASE.**—Under "liver" disease is C. J., female, aged 31 years, admitted April 29th, from the Lock-up, died May 30th. The liver was enormously enlarged, and rose as high as in a line with the third rib, which it protruded in an extraordinary manner. The heart also was diseased, and the stomach was ulcerated. 2. C. G., female, aged 30 years, admitted September 15th, and died October 31st. Enormous tubercular disease of the liver was found. 3. J. O'N., male, aged 55 years, admitted May 5th, and died August 5th. Liver weighed 11lbs., consisting wholly of a mass of white tubercular matter, with extensive caverns filled with serofulous pus. Several quarts of serum were found in the abdomen.

**DYSENTERY.**—There are two cases of fatal Dysentery. 1. R. D., a medical man, aged 50 years. Had been long ill at Otahuhu, and was admitted February 10th, and died February 21st. He was emaciated to the last degree. 2. E. B., male, aged 47 years, admitted 21st November and died next day.

**RHEUMATISM.**—Under chronic Rheumatism is the fatal case of J. F., a Nova-Scotian, aged 33 years. He was in Hospital at the end of last year, and died September 12th.

The most extensive disease was found in right hip joint, with destruction of the head of the thigh bone, perforation of pelvis, collection of matter in loins and down the thigh. 2. W. G., male, aged 60 years, He had been in the Hospital about twelve years, during eight of which he was closely confined to bed. The knee-joints were completely disorganised and filled with pulpy matter. The feet and legs resembled those of a person affected with Elephantiasis. The heart was converted into a mass of fat, and all over the body the cellular tissue was enormously hypertrophied.

**WOUNDS.**—Under wounds is the case of J. F., male, aged 52 years. He was sent down from Papakura on September 4th, having received a severe lacerated wound on the calf of right leg seven days before.—Mortification ensued, and death took place on the 8th of September.

**FRACTURES.**—Under the head of Fractures is the case of W. F., male, aged 60 years; remaining from last year, with fracture of neck of left thigh bone; death took place on January 9th. In addition to the fracture of thigh, the pelvis was found to have been fractured. 2. W. McC., male, aged 53 years, admitted from Otahuhu on October 3rd, having fallen into a scoria quarry from a height of 30 feet. He died on October 6th. The right haunch bone was found fractured, the fourth rib of the same side, also the left forearm. The pericardium contained a quantity of blood. The last fatal case is that of R. R., male, aged 60 years, sent in from Panmure in a dying state on September 6th, and dying on September 8th.

**SCURVY.**—Four cases of genuine sea scurvy were sent on shore from the ship "Blundell," and recovered favourably.

**ACCIDENTS.**—The number of casualties treated during the year amounts to 47, including 19 fractures. Of these, three proved fatal, and a few remain under treatment. Some of the accidents from the sawing stations were of a very dreadful nature, but in none was any capital operation deemed necessary.

On the 23rd December, Mr. W. M'Guire, who was the head nurse of the Hospital for many years, died of general debility. He had been failing for some months previously.

**REMARKS, &c.**—Attention is earnestly called to the representations made in last report of the want of water at the Hospital. The well should be sunk deeper, or a tank should be constructed to collect the rain water which falls on the roof. It is recommended that the Hospital and Asylum buildings should be insured against the contingency of fire. A complete set of surgical instruments should be provided for the use of the Hospital, also a new supply of books for the library, which is in a wretched condition. The Hospital fence is also in great need of repair, and it is recommended that trees be planted around the paddock for ornament and shelter. The female patients are at present unavoidably associated with the men by using the same passages and thoroughfares. It is surprising that by the present arrangement some danger has not occurred to morality; yet nothing improper has ever come under my notice. The rear of the building should be enclosed by a suitable fence or wall, divided into yards for male and female patients respectively, and between them there should be no communication. The roof of the building leaks in many places, and would require to be shingled anew. Most of the water casks are un-serviceable, and a new supply is imperatively demanded.

**LUNATIC ASYLUM.**

At the end of 1861, there were forty-two inmates in the Lunatic Asylum, of these three have since died, viz.—1. C. C., female, aged 54 years, on February 8th, worn out by the ravages of cancer of the breast, after a residence of seven years in the Asylum 2. A Native female of consumptive habit, died on June 1st. She had been about six months in the Asylum. 3. P. C., male, aged 32 years, admitted 6th February, and died June 4th. At one period this poor man scarcely ever ceased bellowing, but he latterly sank into paralytic helplessness. Vast effusion of serum was found in and upon the brain. Two were discharged, of whom, however, one has been since re-committed, not on account of any violence on his part but from having been so unfortunate as to be smitten with a tender regard for a lady in a higher sphere of life than himself.

Of the thirty-seven old cases remaining, no improvement can be reported in any except a few, I mean as to sanity.

During 1862, there have been admitted twenty new cases; eight of these have been discharged, but two were subsequently re-committed. One died of dysentery on June 5th, after an illness of three weeks; this man was sent to the Asylum from the town gaol, where he had long been confined for murder. About six feet of the large intestine were found in a gangrenous state.

At the end of 1862, there remain forty-eight inmates, being six in excess of the number remaining last year, being the accumulation of the past ten years.

The condition of these unfortunate people is greatly to be pitied; cooped up within narrow yards or cells; they are merely prisoners, vacant, idle, "raging waves of the sea, foaming out their own shame."

The nuisance of the Asylum is severely felt, and bitterly complained of by the inhabitants of the Grafton suburb, and its speedy removal to a suitable locality, and establishment on a scientific basis, have become imperious necessities.

As matters are at present, medical treatment suitable for insane persons is impracticable, and so crowded has the Asylum become that until increased accommodation is obtained all new cases are under the necessity of being sent to the town gaol.

PRISONS.—In the Mount Eden prison the number of cases admitted into the sick room was 92. Of these three were sextuplicate, four quintuplicate, six quadruplicate, eleven triplicate, twenty-five duplicate, and forty-seven single admissions.

The proportion of sick amounts to two-thirds of the total number of prisoners lodged

in the gaol, viz., 159, of whom only 63 never complained at all.

Most of the cases were of a simple character. Two cases of gunshot wounds received by prisoners attempting to escape, were admitted. Happily the wounds were not of a dangerous nature, and soon healed perfectly.

A military convict sustained a severe injury from the premature explosion of a blasting charge. His eyes were much injured, but he has recovered a valuable measure of sight.

The accommodation provided for the sick prisoners is bad, and a few serious cases were obliged to be transferred to the Provincial Hospital.

Since recent alterations in the gaol, the sick room has been used as a mess room for the hard labour men, completely preventing the seclusion of the sick, and causing much noise and confusion.

The state of the City gaol has been remarkably healthy, in fact only one prisoner has died in all the gaols for the last four years.
