Sir,—I herewith forward to you copy of a letter I have this day addressed to His Honor the Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

As the exception, in favor of Gipps' Land has not, so far as I am aware, been made by your Government, the argument therein mainly insisted on does not apply to your Province; but the healthy condition of the Cattle of this Colony which I have endeavoured to substantiate leads me to hope that I shall not be considered unreasonable if I request your favorable consideration of the subject, with a view to the removal of the restrictions which prevents the Landing of Tasmanian Stock in the Province of Auckland.

Sir,—I do myself the honor to call your attention to the existing condition of the Law regulating the admission of Live Stock into the Province of Otago as it affects the Commerce of this Colony.

By a proclamation issued by the Superintendent of the Province of Otago, New Zealand, dated 20th September, 1862, The importation of Cattle from Tasmania (amongst other countries) is absolutely prohibited. At the same time, Cattle may be landed in the Province of Otago from Gipps' Land, Victoria, without restriction, whether for Agricultural use or for slaughter.

I have the honor to forward to you herewith a Copy of an act of the Parliament of Tasmania empowering the Governor in Council to take measures for the prevention of the introduction into this Colony of the disease called Pleuro Pneumonia together with a copy of a Proclamation issued by the Governor under the

Provisions of the Act referred to.

You will not fail to observe from that document that the Government of the Colony is amply armed with the necessary power (for preventing the introduction of Pleuro-Pneumonia into Tasmania; and that the only country excepted from the operation of the Act is Gipps' Land, Victoria, from whence your own Proclamation also permits the introduction of Cattle.

I am in a position to state that the exercise of the powers vested in the Government for this important object has been productive of the most satisfactory results and that Tasmania is now, and has hitherto always been, free from any symptoms of Pleuro-pneumonia amongst its Cattle. And I would call your particular attention to the fact that our importations of Cattle from Gipps' Land itself are rigidly restricted to the admission of Beasts for immediate slaughter, no animal being permitted to leave the Public Slaughter yards alive

Under these circumstances, I would submit that the stringency of your present prohibitive Regulation might be safely relaxed in favor of this Colony.

The Province of Otago permits the importation of Cattle from Gipps' Land, but prohibits the admission of Tasmanian Stock, which have hitherto been always free from Pleuro-Pneumonia.

The Colony of Tasmania admits Cattle from no other country but Gipps' Land and thence only for slaughter.

It is obvious that there can be no greater risk of infection or contagion for the Herds of Otago, from the clean Stock of Tasmania than from the clean Stock of Gipps' Land.

The Commercial and Agricultural interests of both countries would be manifestly promoted by a relaxation of the restrictions which now exclude our Cattle from your Ports. Otago is in want of that description of Stock for draught and agricultural purposes which Tasmania is able and anxious to supply.

The law now enforced by the Government of Otago is thus proved to limit, as I would submit unnecessarily, and as you will no doubt admit disadvantageously to both countries, the Agricultural and trading operations of each.

It is within your power to interfere effectually to put a termination to this undesirable condition of affairs as affecting the inter Colonial commerce of your Province with Tasmania.

On the part of the Government of this Colony I have the honor to express a hope that you will give the subject your early and favorable consideration, and I trust that you will find yourself at liberty to take such steps as the constitution of the Province may render necessary for removing the restrictions, and remedying the inconveniences, occasioned by the operations of the existing Law.

Sir,—I have the honor, by desire of His Excellency Sir Dominic Daly to call your attention to the fact that not a single case of Pleuro-pneumonia among cattle has ever been known to exist in this colony; and the dryness of the climate renders it probable that even were the disease introduced it would soon die away of itself; while the stringent regulations adopted to prevent the crossing of diseased Cattle over the frontier of the Province are of the most effective description.

Under these circumstances I am to express His Excellency's hope that you will so far modify the Proclamations issued by you under the diseased Cattle Act as to exempt from their operations Cattle exported from this colony to the Province of Auckland.

PROCLAMATION.

By ROBERT GRAHAM, Esquire,
Superintendent of the Province
of Auckland, in the Colony of
New Zealand.

WHEREAS by the "Diseased Cattle Act 1861," it was provided that the Governor in Council might by Warrant under his hand, from time to time, delegate, to the Superintendent of any Province within the Colony of New Zealand, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor, or Governor in Council, by the said Act, subject to such regulations as he might think fit; and might from time to time rescind such delegation: and whereas the said Governor did with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegate to John Williamson, Esq., so long as he should hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, the several powers vested in the said Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act subject to being rescinded as in the said Act provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor in Council on the first day of October, 1861.

And to any other regulations to or from time to time duly made; And whereas the said John Williamson, in pursuance and by virtue of such powers so vested in him did on the 28th day of February, 1862, proclaim and declare that after the date thereof the several Colonies of Australia, that was to say the Colony of New South Wales, of Victoria, of South Australia, of Western Australia and Queensland, as well as the Colony of Tasmania and the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope and the Islands of Great Britain and Ireland, should be deemed to be for the purposes of the said recited Act, affected districts within the meaning of the said Act, and no cattle were allowed to be imported from the above mentioned Districts, into the province of Auckland, until further notice; And whereas the said John Williamson has ceased to hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Auckland; And whereas the said Governor hath with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, and in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority did by his Warrant under his hand delegate to Robert Graham, Esq., so long as he should hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, the several powers vested in him by the said recited sections of the said Act, subject to be rescinded as in the said Act provided, and subject to the regulations issued on the fifteenth day of September, 1862, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made; And whereas it is expedient to remove the restriction on the importation of cattle from certain Districts included in the said recited proclamation of the 28th day of February, 1862:

Now therefore, I the said Robert Graham, by virtue of such powers in me vested, do hereby proclaim and declare that from the date hereof, and until further notice, it shall be lawful for all persons to import cattle into the Province of Auckland, from the following places, viz:—The Islands of Great Britain and Ireland, Tasmania and South Australia. And I further proclaim and declare that the said proclamation of the 28th day of February, 1862, to remain in full force and effect save and except as altered hereby.

THE following sub-sections of section four of the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," also section eight of the same Act, are published for general information.

- (a.) When any ship or vessel having cattle on board shall arrive within any such port or place in the Colony the Inspector shall forthwith or as soon as conveniently can be go on board such ship or vessel and by inspecting such Cattle or otherwise satisfy himself whether such Cattle or any of them are or may be reasonably suspected to be infected with any infectious disease or whether the same are free from infectious disease.
- (b.) If such Inspector shall be satisfied that such Cattle are free from infectious disease and were not imported from any District where infectious disease shall be known to prevail he shall give to the Master of such ship or vessel a certificate to the effect after which certificate so obtained but not before such Cattle may be landed.
- (c.) If such Inspector shall be satisfied that such Cattle or any of them are actually infected with such disease he shall forthwith give notice to that effect to the Master of such ship or vessel and it shall be the duty of such Master within 24 hours after such notice to destroy the same without suffering the same to be landed.
- (d.) If such Cattle shall have been imported from any District where infectious disease shall be known to prevail or if such Inspector shall have reasonable ground to suspect that the same Cattle or any of them are infected with such disease he may give such Master a certificate to that effect (to be termed a Quarantine Certificate) and shall therein specify some place at which the same Cattle may be landed and some place to which the same may be driven to be appointed by the Governor for a Quarantine ground at or near the said port or place after which certificate so obtained the said Master may land such cattle or cause the same to be landed at such place so named in such Quarantine Certificate but at no other place and may drive such Cattle or cause the same to be driven to the said place so appointed as a Quarantine ground but to no other place and no Master of such ship or vessel shall permit or suffer such Cattle to be so landed or driven otherwise than in accordance with such Quarantine Certificate.
- (e.) The Inspector shall make a report from time to time of all things done by him under this Act which report shall be made in the first instance to the Superintendent of such Province and shall by him be transmitted to the Governor.

8. Every Master of a ship or vessel who shall land or suffer to be landed any Cattle without having obtained such Certificate as aforesaid or shall refuse or neglect to destroy Cattle according to any such notice as aforesaid or shall otherwise offend against the provisions of this Act hereinbefore contained shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding £500.

CONDITIONS.

(Applicable to all the preceding Contracts.)

Samples of the various articles to be supplied will have to be submitted for inspection if required.

The Contractors for supplies will be required to deliver the same from time to time at such places, and in such quantities, as may be indicated by the Superintendent.

The Contractors for the performance of any work or service will be required to perform the same, as it may be ordered for the Provincial Government by some officer authorized by the Superintendent in that behalf.

The Government does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any of the tenders sent in.

Any of the contracts may be annulled upon the expiration of one calendar month's notice, in writing, of an intention to discontinue the same, to be given by the contractor on the one part, or by the Superintendent, or by some person authorized by him, on behalf of the Provincial Government, on the other part.

Payment for any of the above supplies, works, or services will be made monthly, after the bills have been rendered in a complete state by the Contractor, and passed.

Tenders to be sealed and endorsed "Tender for (name of article or service)."

In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the Officer receiving the supplies, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey composed of persons named by the Superintendent. If the Board shall decide that the article is not of a proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing which it will be procured by the department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or in which, from some other cause, injury would be sustained by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge, for whom the supplies are to be received, shall have power to reject any article of an inferior quality, and to purchase others at the expense of the Contractor.

In the event of the Contractor for the performance of any work or service being dissatisfied with the decision of the officer in condemning the same, the Superintendent will, upon the written request of the Contractor, made immediately after such decision, and the Superintendent may also, at any time, without such request, summon a Board of Survey to examine any work; and if such Board of Survey shall declare any such work to be inferior in quality to the work contracted for, or otherwise improperly done, the Contractor, upon notice thereof, shall immediately replace such work by other, satisfactory to the Board of Survey; and in default thereof, the Superin-

tendent, or some other officer authorized by him in that behalf, is hereby authorized to procure such work to be replaced in any manner he may think fit, and the Contractor shall bear and pay to the Provincial Government all costs, charges, and expenses attendant thereon, as well as any excess of price for the same, together with a sum of money, by way of penalty, equal to one-fourth of such costs, charges, and expenses, and excess of price, all which are hereby made chargeable on any sum which may be due from the Provincial Government to the Contractor.

The tenders (forms of which may be obtained at this Office) to contain the names and places of residence, at length, of the persons tendering, and to be signed by two respectable sureties, engaging to become bound in a penalty of £100 for the fulfilment of the contract if the tender be accepted, and no tenders will be received unless upon such forms.

All contract bonds must be signed by the contractor and his sureties before the date of entering upon the contracts.
