PROCLAMATION.

By ROBERT GRAHAM, Esquire,
Superintendent of the Province of Auckland.

WHEREAS, by the "Thistle Act, 1858," it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Superintendent of the Province of Auckland from time to time by Proclamation in the Provincial Government Gazette, to declare that the said Act should come into operation within any District, and thereby to proclaim the limits of the District.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers and authority in me vested, I, the said Superintendent, do hereby proclaim and declare that the said "Thistle Act, 1858," shall, on and after the first day of July next, come into operation within the Waiwera District, and the limits of the said District shall be—

On the North the Pokapuka and the Ahuroa Block, on the West a line direct from the South-West angle of the Ahuroa Block to the Flat-topped mountain and the Waitoke stream, to the Great North Road on the South-East, the Great North Road and the Southern boundary of the Parakakau Block and the Wainui Block to the Orewa River, and on the East the sea.

Given under my hand, at Auckland, in the said Province, the 27th day of July, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three.

PROCLAMATION.

By ROBERT GRAHAM, Esquire,
Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, in the Colony of New Zealand.

WHEREAS by the "Diseased Cattle Act 1861," it was provided that the Governor in Council might by Warrant under his hand, from time to time, delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the Colony of New Zealand, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor, or Governor in Council, by the said Act, subject to such regulations as he might think fit; and might from time to time rescind such delegation: and whereas the said Governor did with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegate to John Williamson,

Esq., so long as he should hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, the several powers vested in the said Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor in Council on the first day of October, 1861, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made; And whereas the said John Williamson, in pursuance and by virtue of such powers so vested in him did on the 28th day of February, 1862, proclaim and declare that after the date thereof the several Colonies of Australia, that was to say the Colony of New South Wales, of Victoria, of South Australia, of Western Australia and Queensland, as well as the Colony of Tasmania and the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope and the Islands of Great Britain and Ireland, should be deemed to be for the purposes of the said recited Act, affected districts within the meaning of the said Act, and no cattle were allowed to be imported from the above mentioned Districts into the Province of Auckland, until further notice; And whereas the said John Williamson has ceased to hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Auckland; And whereas the said Governor hath with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, and in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority did by his Warrant under his hand delegate to Robert Graham, Esq., so long as he should hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, the several powers vested in him by the said recited sections of the said Act, subject to be rescinded as in the said Act provided, and subject to the regulations issued on the fifteenth day of September, 1862, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made; And whereas it is expedient to remove the restriction on the importation of cattle from certain Districts included in the said recited proclamation of the 28th day of February, 1862:

Now therefore, I the said Robert Graham, by virtue of such powers in me vested, do hereby proclaim and declare that from the date hereof, and until further notice, it shall be lawful for all persons to import cattle into the Province of Auckland, from the following places, viz.:—The Islands of Great Britain and Ireland, Tasmania, South Australia, Twofold Bay, Jervis Bay, Port Stephens, and Newcastle, N.S.W.; And I further proclaim and declare that the said proclamation of the 28th day of February, 1862, to remain in full force and effect save and excepted as altered hereby.

"The Licensing Act, 1863,"
"The Turnpike Act, 1863,"

having been laid before the Governor, His Excellency has been pleased to leave the same to their operation.

NOTIFICATION.

WHEREAS by the Turnpike Act 1863, the Superintendent of the Province of Auckland is authorised to erect Toll Bars and Toll gates on the Great South Road, at such places as to the said Superintendent shall seem fit, and to direct Tolls to be paid for all animals and vehicles passing or re-passing through the same at a rate not exceeding the rates set forth in the Schedule to the said Act annexed. And it is provided by the said Act that no such toll shall be taken at any such Toll-bar, Toll-gate, or Toll-house, until a list of the Tolls payable thereat shall have been publicly notified in the Provincial Government Gazette at least one month previously. And whereas Toll Bars have been erected on the Great South Road at or near Newmarket.

I hereby declare and notify that from and after the second day of September, 1863, I have directed the following Tolls to be taken thereat.

RESOLVED,—That an address be presented to His Honor the Superintendent, forwarding the amended second and concluding Report of the Committee appointed to consider the Fencing and Impounding Acts now in operation, together with the Minutes of the said Committee; and that His Honor be requested to circulate the said Report throughout the Province, so as to elicit expressions of public opinion on the same, and to cause to be prepared Bills in terms of said Report.

AMENDED SECOND AND CONCLUDING REPORT

Of the Committee appointed to consider the Fencing and Impounding Acts now in operation.

Your Committee have considered in detail the Acts referred to them, and after examining witnesses, considered that they were in possession of sufficient information themselves to proceed upon their duties. The conflicting interests to be considered, and if possible reconciled, especially in the laws relating to trespass, were fully brought out in the deliberations of the Committee. But the very conflicting nature of the interests at stake, rendered it all the more incumbent upon your committee to weigh the matters referred to them, and as far as possibly could be done, to advise such alterations in the existing Acts, as would on the whole protect the rights and promote the interests of the community at large. The Fencing Act, 1854-5, is an Act to make provision for the putting up of partition or boundary fences, and for securing, that in case of the absence of one owner, the adjoining land owner or occupier shall put up a good fence before he can claim one-half of the value of such fence. It seemed therefore necessary to prevent litigation that the proper way to secure these ends would be to specify the various names of timber, and the various kinds of other fences, one of which may be put up and considered a legal fence. Your committee, however, taking

into consideration the very various circumstances of different parts of the province, have thought it advisable to specify that any other sort of fence mutually agreed upon may be put up in lieu of one of the specified kinds. With reference to the Impounding Act, however, the question as to the sufficiency of the fencing of any land trespassed upon, your committee have thought would be best decided, after the fact of trespass had taken place, provided, however, that any of the various kinds of fences specified in the clause recommended for a new Boundary Fences Act, or put up in accordance with that proposed Act, ought to be held good as a fence to protect land against trespass.

Your committee have agreed to the following resolutions which they recommend to the Council for adoption. They also recommend that their report, as adopted, should be circulated throughout the province, so as to elicit expression of public opinion on the same; and that his Honor the Superintendent be requested to prepare, against next Session of Council, Bills for the erection of boundary fences, and for the impounding and other treatment of trespassing cattle.

I. FENCING ACT.

I. That the principles of the Fencing Act be extended to include land-order holders and others who may be similarly situated.

II. That provision be made for the cutting and repair of live fences.

III. That in clause 8, 11, and 12, the word "beneficial" be struck out.

IV. That clauses 4 and 13 be made more explicit.

V. That provision be made in clause 13 that no person shall be able to recover any sum beyond the actual value of the fence.

VI. That clauses 18, 19, and 20 be struck out, as being beyond the power of the Provincial Council to deal with, and already provided for by "The Sale for Non-payment of Rates Act, 1862," of the General Assembly.

VII. That it be compulsory on owners of land abutting on any public road or highway to have all ditches which have been formed on any such road properly and sufficiently cleaned out at least once every year; and all water-courses running into such ditches; and also to properly trim and keep clean, once every year, all live fences.

VIII. That clause 24 be struck out.

IX. That in lieu of clause 21 of the Fencing Act, the following be put in as subsections, viz. :—

1. A stone wall, not less than four feet six inches in height *exclusive* of the coping, and not less than two feet six inches in breadth at bottom.

2. That the rails should not be longer than nine feet with not less than twelve inches in the area of the section. Dimensions of posts, not less than seven feet long;

seven inches broad, by two and a half inches: or five inch by four inch, and to be put in the ground not less than two feet three inches. *The woods for posts* should be restricted to Puriri, Totara, Heart of Kauri, Kuaka, Tanakaha, Rata, Maire, Puhotukawa, Kowhai, *Imported Blue or Red Gum, Iron Bark, Stringy Bark.* *Woods for rails* should be restricted to Rimu, Tanekaha, Totara, Manuka, Heart of Kauri, Kuaka, Kowhai, Miro, Puriri, Rata, Maire, Puhotukawa, *Imported Blue or Red Gum, Iron Bark, Stringy Bark.*

3. That a wire fence as follows be legalized. Posts of the dimensions and of one of the woods formerly named as fit for posts; not more than nine feet apart, with either six wires, or five wires with one rail of wood, or four wires with two rails of wood.

4. That sub-section 3 of both Acts be legalised, with the addition, instead of "hard wood," of one of the woods formerly named, and an option of making a top rail instead of the highest wire.

5. A White Thorn fence with a bank and brush five feet high, and ditch three feet wide, White Thorns planted not more than one foot apart.

6. A bank faced or topped with stone, five feet high, and a ditch three feet wide.

7. A paling fence, not less than five feet high, provided that the paling be not more than three inches apart.

8. That any other fence, mutually agreed upon by adjoining proprietors, be admitted as a legal fence for a boundary.

X. That the title of the new Act ought to be "The Boundary Fences Act."

XI. That any boundary fence already erected according to the present Fencing Act, ought to continue to be considered a legal fence, although not included in the description of fences above given for the new Boundary Fences Act.

II. IMPOUNDING ACT.

1. That another clause ought to be inserted after clause 11, providing that in places above ten miles from a public pound, people should be allowed to impound cattle trespassing upon their own land, or to drive them to the owner; and in case the owner does not come for them within three days, application to be made to two Justices of the Peace or a Resident Magistrate to dispose of the said cattle in the manner he may think proper, who shall, before he or they give such order, be satisfied that due notice has been given to the owner, or due publicity in case there be no owner found, and the proceeds of such disposal shall be applied as in cases where the impounding has taken place within a public pound.

2. That it is desirable to divide into Hundreds and proclaim all surveyed lands, whether held by private individuals or Government, and only such parties as own land

or are licensed by Government, or other land owners, ought to be allowed to run cattle, and that in proportion to their acreage.

3. That all people having pigs or goats should be compelled to keep them on their own premises, or to pay all damages the pigs or goats may do, whether on fenced or unfenced land.

4. That parties occupying or possessing land should be required to fence in their own cultivations, and in case of trespass, and without a sufficient fence being erected, no damage or impounding to be enforced within proclaimed Hundreds.

5. That all Pounds should be erected in the most public situations, and at all times open to inspection, and kept free from obstruction to view the same.

6. That when the title of any native land is recognized by the Government, such lands should be amenable to the Fencing and Impounding Acts.

7. That all fees and damages should be paid previously to the release of cattle from a pound.
