PROCLAMATION.

By ROBERT GRAHAM, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, in the Colony of New Zealand.

WHEREAS by the "Superintendent's Deputy Act, 1856," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Superintendent of any Province, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* of such Province, to appoint such person as he may think fit, being a registered elector of such Province, to be his Deputy, and as such to perform and exercise all the acts and power (except such powers as are conferred by the Constitution Act, 15 and 16 Vict. c. 72) which may be exercised and performed by such Superintendent, or such of them only as shall be specified in such Proclamation.

Now, therefore, I, Robert Graham, Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, do hereby appoint

JOSEPH NEWMAN, Esq., J.P.,

to be my Deputy in the said Province, and to perform and exercise all the acts and powers which may be exercised by me (except such powers as are conferred by the Constitution Act, 15 and 16 Vict. c. 72.)

ANNUAL MEDICAL REPORT FOR 1863.

Provincial Hospital, April 15th, 1864.

SIR,—I beg to lay before your Honor the Annual Report on the Institution under my medical care, for 1863.

In reporting from year to year on the medical transactions of the various Provincial Institutions under my profession I charge, an apology is due for unavoidable tautology, there being really much sameness in the cases, so that it is difficult to say anything on the subject that might not be characterised as mere "ringing the changes."

Hospital.

Of the 53 patients remaining at the end of last year, 28 have been discharged, 12 have died, and 13 remain in hospital. The number admitted during the year amounts to 370, being 84 in excess of the number admitted during the preceding year. Of the total treated (423) there have been discharged 307; the total number of deaths has been 51, or 11½ per cent.; and 65 remain at the end of the year 1863. The average daily number of patients has been 60, and the average number of days in hospital for each patient has been 60 also.

Fever.

18 cases of fever were treated, 6 whereof died. Most of the fever cases were very severe, of a decidedly typhoid type; their duration averaged 5 weeks, and several of them were attended with cerebral, pulmonary, and intestinal complications, singly or conjointly. The first fatal case was that of R.T., a delicate young man, admitted January 9th, having been a month ill in lodgings. He was regarded as nearly convalescent when admitted,

and preferred sitting up dressed to lying in bed. He appeared to be going on favourably for a week, when, without warning, he was seized with a violent and prolonged convulsive fit. Death took place in about 24 hours from the first attack. On examination, a quantity of coagulated blood was found overspreading the back of both hemispheres of the brain; much serum, mixed with blood, was found effused into the pericardial and pleural cavities. The lungs were greatly congested with dark liquid blood, and the substance of the heart was pale and flabby. The peculiarity of this case was that the blood had become so thin as to exude from the heart and arteries. The second case is that of J. G., a strong robust young man, admitted January 13th, ill a fortnight before admission. His illness was thought to have been occasioned by exposure to the sun, being employed on a farm. His symptoms indicated oppressed brain, and he died on the fifteenth day after his admission. Early and profuse perspirations marked this case, but no favourable crisis took place. On examination, unusual vascularity of the membranes of the brain was observed, also purulent softening anteriorly. The blood was fluid throughout the body. The next fatal case was that of B. W., labourer, aged 29 years. Had been ill eight days previous to admission on March 23rd. The prominent symptom in this case was intractable vomiting. After death, on April 8th, the stomach presented a perfectly black appearance. 4th, W. K., a clerk, aged 22 years, living in the same house with the last. Admitted for mild fever on March 31st, and progressed satisfactorily for five weeks; was able to dress himself and walk up and down the ward; appetite good; was suddenly seized with violent pain in the abdomen, which speedily swelled, and became exquisitely tender. Death took place in thirty hours from the first attack of pain, and on inspection a small round hole was discovered in the small intestines, occasioned by a perforating ulcer, and permitting feculent matter to escape. It is remarkable that in this case there was no diarrhoea. 5th, F. T., tutor, aged 23 years. After ten days' illness, was admitted on May 3rd, labouring under mild fever, attended by gentle perspirations. At the end of three weeks, when he was believed to be convalescent, he was suddenly seized with a fit of convulsions. These soon ceased, but were followed by maniacal symptoms and most profuse perspiration, which alternated with diarrhoea, and produced the utmost prostration. Death took place in 43 days from admission. The brain was found full of serum, and the left lung was infiltrated with purulent matter. 6th. At a late period of the year, viz., September 30th, W.P., a seaman, was admitted in the last stage of typhoid fever. Died on the third day from admission. Numerous patches of ulceration were found in the small intestines. The blood was fluid and dark.

Abscesses and Ulcers.

There were two fatal cases under this head.

1st. J.J., labourer, aged 61 years, admitted October 25th, 1862, for ulcers on the legs and general debility. After the ulcers healed, he became affected with chronic vomiting and entire loss of appetite. Death took place about 4 months after admission. There was no inspection of the body. 2nd. W.T., a farmer, aged 35 years, admitted on June 16th, with an enormous abscess of right thigh, apparently the consequence of fever, from which he was convalescent on admission. His strength gradually sank under the profuse suppuration, and death took place 16 days after admission.

Brain, &c.

W.E., discharged soldier, aged 45 years, admitted June 1st, 1857, having been thrown from horseback on his head. He never fully recovered from the effect of this injury, always complaining of giddiness, headache, &c. He died on March 4th, and on examination the back part of the skull was found to be of enormous thickness, amounting in parts to $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch. The state of the brain and its membranes was healthy. 2nd. J.H., ex-policeman, aged 30 years, admitted September 3, 1862, for idiocy, dependent on diseased brain. The approach of this disease was very gradual, but when fully developed its progress was rapid. Death took place nine months after admission. Much serum was found in and upon the brain, the substance of which was firm. 3rd. M.C., a Frenchman, aged 55 years, was admitted in a state approaching to insensibility on August 22nd, and died three days thereafter. Great effusion of serum was found in and on the brain, with opacity and thickening of the arachnoid membrane. There existed in this case an impermeable stricture.

Lungs and Pleura.

The first case under this head was a very remarkable one. D.B., a tanner, aged 50 years, admitted September 7th, with cough and difficulty of breathing, and utter prostration. Death took place three days after admission. On examination, four pints of blood, fluid and coagulated, were found filling the right pleura, and by its pressure completely condensing the lung. In the lower lobe of this lung, an ulcerated opening, large enough to admit the point of a finger, was discovered. The left lung was perfectly healthy; the heart was enlarged. The liver presented the 'nutmeg' character. It is remarkable that there was no expectoration of blood in this case. The patient stated that in a fit of coughing, he felt something give way in his side, and was immediately seized with difficulty of breathing. Nothing was observed in this case to lead to the conclusion that disease had originated otherwise than by accident. 2nd. W.M., farm-servant, aged 53 years, admitted January 24th, with pneumonia, and subsequently became dropsical. Gradually declined, and died on September 20. The lungs were found condensed, and both sides of the chest contained much serum. Heart enlarged; liver "nutmeg;" kidneys shrunken and granular. Two

years previously sustained a compound fracture of the left leg, which was amputated in this hospital.

Delirium Tremens.

Three out of 14 cases of this disease proved fatal. 1st. J. M., dealer, aged 34 years, admitted April 4th, and died in eighteen hours thereafter. Had been ill for a fortnight previously. 2nd. P. S., a discharged soldier, aged 47 years. Admitted May 12th, in an insensible state, and died in 33 hours thereafter. 3rd. J. J. M., printer, aged 56 years. Admitted August 3rd, with a comminuted fracture of the left arm; being of intemperate habits, he speedily became the subject of delirium, and died on the following day. Some circumstances connected with this case being considered suspicious, a Coroner's inquest was held by the Resident Magistrate, on view of the body of the deceased, when a verdict of death from the effects of drink was returned by the jury.

Phthisis.

Ten out of 20 cases of pulmonary consumption proved fatal in the course of the year. 1st. J. J., farm servant, aged 21 years. Admitted December 18th, 1862, and died March 10th, 1863. Had been repeatedly in hospital for the same disease. 2nd. W. G., seaman, aged 35 years. Admitted on February 19th, and died April 29th. Latterly intractable dysentery set in. 3rd. R. T., seaman, aged 29 years. Admitted November 14th, 1862, and died September 3rd. This case was attended by repeated attacks of spitting of blood. 4th. C. A., seaman, aged 60 years. Admitted November 21st, and died on December 3rd. This was a case of chronic ulceration of the lungs. 5th. A. J. H., mate of the ship "Helvellyn," aged 32 years. Sent to hospital on November 28th, and died December 9th. This disease was complicated with dysentery. 6th. T. W., butcher, aged 20 years. Admitted December 16th, 1862, and died July 20th. 7th. J. McL., seaman, aged 28 years. Admitted March 6th from a ship in harbour, and died August 4th. 8th. Paraone, a native prisoner. Admitted September 2nd, and after several attacks of Hæmoptysis, died on September 17th. On examination, the lungs were found full of tubercles, in all stages, and universally adherent to the chest, so that it must have been with much difficulty that the patient breathed. The heart was enlarged and fatty. It is remarkable that in this, an evidently phthisical case, there was a prodigious deposit of fat all over the body. 9th. T. B., a labourer, aged 27 years. Admitted on the last occasion April 14th, 1862, and was carried off by dysentery on May 4th. 10. A. O'L., the wife of a soldier of the 14th Regiment, aged 22 years. Admitted May 11th, and died May 27th.

Heart.

There were 3 fatal cases of heart disease during the year. 1st. R. O., aged 48 years.

Admitted March 16th, and died next day. The heart weighed 2 lbs. The aorta was dilated, and its valves ossified. The pericardium was closely adherent to the heart. The liver was enlarged and the stomach ulcerated. 2nd. P. P., an old sailor, aged 58 years. Admitted on the last occasion on April 23rd, with urgent symptoms of diseased heart, and dropsy, dyspnoea, &c. Died July 8th. The heart weighed 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ lbs. There was much fluid in the pleura and pericardium. The aorta was dilated and ossified, and the valves shortened. Liver enormously enlarged. 3rd. E. L., seaman, aged 22 years. Admitted September 11th, and died September 22nd. The fatal event was caused by sudden hemorrhage from the bowels.

Peritoneal Inflammation.

One fatal case of abdominal inflammation occurred. J. B., aged 8 years. Admitted January 3rd, with violent abdominal pain and distension, supposed to be dependent on worms. On inspection, the abdomen was found to be distended with purulent effusion. At the commencement of the large intestine, an ulcerated sore was found, giving vent to the intestinal contents. In this locality, and exterior to the bowel, a long round worm was found in a putrid state.

Liver.

Three cases of this class of diseases proved fatal. 1st. T. O., a pensioner, aged 56 years. Admitted January 7th, in the last stage of a liver disease, marked by jaundice and general dropsy. Death took place sixteen days after admission, by way of coma. The liver presented the "hobnail" character, and was rough externally and shrunken. The great cavities were full of a greenish serum. The heart also was enlarged. 2nd. W. W., a Chinaman, aged 25 years. Admitted, with liver disease in an advanced stage, on March 17th, and died on April 2nd. 3rd. M. C., aged 25 years, female. Admitted March 3rd, with an enormous liver, and repeated attacks of bleeding from the nose. The lungs were compressed into a very small compass. The stomach also was found ulcerated and the heart enlarged.

Stomach.

Of the cases returned under this head, one proved fatal, viz: C. McH., labourer, aged 48 years. Admitted May 19th, with chronic vomiting, became progressively weaker, and died June 22nd. The lower end of the gullet, at its entrance into the stomach, was found in a state of scirrhus, with its coats thickening and its calibre contracted. The inner surface of the stomach was ulcerated, and the liver was enlarged.

Intestines.

Out of 27 cases of these affections, 5 proved fatal. 1st. T. S., aged 50 years. Admitted in a sinking state, with dysentery, on April 20th, and died six days thereafter. 2nd. R. P., pensioner, aged 59 years, sent in from Howick on April 25th, and survived only two

days. 3rd. T. D., labourer, aged 23 years. Admitted February 30th, with dysentery, occurring soon after recovery from fever. Died April 4th. The mucous membrane of the large intestine was found extensively ulcerated. 4th. E. R., female, aged 30 years. Admitted on September 18th, in the last stage of chronic dysentery, and died October 6th. 5th. A. G., labourer, aged 24 years. Admitted March 31st, for disease of the lungs and larynx, attended with hoarseness and almost complete loss of voice. In the end of April, he was attacked with dysentery, and died on May 11th. The large intestines were found extensively inflamed and ulcerated. A polypous growth as large as a pea was found in the interior of the larynx, and the right lung was infiltrated with pus.

Dropsy.

Two cases of abdominal dropsy, or "ascites," proved fatal. 1st. H. K., a discharged soldier, aged 40 years. Admitted March 21st, with enormous collection of fluid in the peritoneum; was tapped without permanent relief, and died on April 9th. The liver was greater enlarged. 2nd. R. W., labourer, aged 36 years. Admitted July 21st, for general dropsy, dependent on diseased liver. Died August 30th. The liver weighed $4\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. The heart was fatty and lungs tubercular.

Scrophula.

One case of scrofulous glands, L. M., a Portuguese sailor, proved fatal on April 27th, after two months' sojourn in hospital. The lungs and heart were found diseased.

Uterine Scirrhus.

There were two fatal cases of this disease. 1st. A. D., aged 40 years, suffered from floodings, pain, &c., for many months, was admitted on July 21st, and died on September 2nd. The uterus was found in a putrid state. 2nd. A. P., aged 42 years, a very similar case to the last. The ravages of the disease involved the bladder and rectum. Death took place on December 10, after distressing and protracted sufferings.

Fractures.

D. N., labourer, aged 25 years. Admitted April 25th, ten days after having received a compound comminuted fracture of the left leg, with extensive laceration of the muscles and integument. When received into hospital, the limb was gangrenous, and the strength was so far exhausted as not to admit of amputation. Very soon locked-jaw and tetanus set in, and death took place on May 3rd.

Burns and Scalds.

H. Paged, 55 years. Admitted July 13th, severely burned over the greater part of the body, in consequence of her clothes catching fire. As in the last case, locked jaw and tetanus occurred, and the patient died on July 16th.

General Debility.

Five cases of general debility are returned

as having proved fatal. The average age of each of the patients was 73 years.

Cases in Hospital.

A few remarks will now be made on the 65 cases which remain in hospital at the end of the year. 30 of them may be regarded as chronic cases, consisting of blind, paralytic, epileptic, rheumatic, infirm, and idiotic. They are permanent inmates, and have no other house of refuge than the hospital.

Of the 35 remaining, there is 1 case of fever, likely soon to be discharged cured. Of abscess and ulcer there are 2 cases, promising favourably; one of them is a specimen of the good effects of conservative surgery, viz., a case of recovery with a useful limb after a compound comminuted fracture and dislocation of the ankle. The duration of this case was 16 months. There is 1 case of erysipelas getting well. There are two cases of idiocy, 1 of chronic bronchitis, 3 of dysentery progressing favourably. 1 case of abdominal dropsy, dependent on diseased liver, has been several times tapped, without more than temporary relief. 3 cases of rheumatism, 4 of syphilis, 1 uterine, and 5 fractures, are remaining from last return, progressing slowly to a cure. 2 simple fractures of the leg are doing well, and two compound, also of the leg, likely to recover. There are two cases of compound dislocation of the ankle, in which the main bone of the leg was protruded through a lacerated wound of the soft parts, by falls from a height. In both, immediate reduction was practised, and the lips of the wound closed. One of these men was able to walk in eight weeks from the time of the accident; the other is still in bed, but is likely to make a satisfactory recovery. There remain 1 case of cutaneous disease; sprains and contusions, 3; general debility, 5.

Remarks.

During the past year several improvements have been effected in and around the premises. The site of the hospital has been carefully drained, and 14 iron tanks have been substituted for the old wooden pipes. There is still, however, need of a much larger supply of water for our increasing number of sick. From the rapid influx of population, there is an urgent necessity for enlarged hospital accommodation. At present much crowding exists.

LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Of the 48 cases remaining at the end of last year (1862), 3 have died. 1. H. H., female, aged 42 years. Admitted March 19th, 1861.

The symptoms were violently maniacal, and were induced by habits of intemperance. She died suddenly on July 13, 1863. Rupture of blood-vessel was found, also a large quantity of serum. 2nd. A. M.F., female, aged 17 years. Admitted December 7, 1858, with congenital idiocy, dependent on imperfect development of the brain, and producing not only idiocy, but arrested and distorted physical development. She died on October 25th, 1863. 3rd. J. R., male, aged 69 years. Admitted October 30th, 1862, in a state of helpless imbecility, and died on November 28, 1863.

Seventeen cases were admitted during the year, viz., 13 males and 4 females, all Europeans. Of these 2 have died. 1st. A. S., male, aged 39 years. Admitted April 30th, 1863, with maniacal symptoms, induced by intemperate habits. He gradually sank, and died on July 13th, 1863. His brain was found hardened; it weighed 3½ lbs. Arachnoid membrane opaque and thickened. 2. J. S., male, aged 25 years, admitted June 1, 1863, and next morning was found dead in his cell, hanging by the neck from the grating of the window. A coroner's inquest was held on his body by the Resident Magistrate, when a verdict was returned of suicide while labouring under mental alienation. Of the old cases, 3 have been discharged—1. J. B., male, aged 25 years, admitted January 11, 1861, for dementia. After a sojourn of a year and three-quarters, he was discharged to proceed to Melbourne, in accordance with the wish of his friends. 2. J. C., male, aged 31 years, admitted January 17, 1862, for melancholia. He improved considerably, and was discharged August 6th, 1863. 3rd. A. S., male, aged 26 years, admitted on October 13, 1862, with dementia. Had a violent attack of dysentery, on recovering from which his reason returned in a good measure, and he was discharged under the care of his friends on April 27, 1863. 4th. M. T., female, aged 23 years, admitted on October 17, 1863, with melancholia (under influence of which she had attempted suicide.) Improved considerably, and was taken out by her friends on March 2, 1863.

Six of the new cases have been discharged. 1. J. G., male, aged 60 years, admitted July 7, 1863, for monomania, and discharged to the custody of his friends September 9, 1863. 2. G. A., male, aged 30 years, admitted on July 8, 1863, in a state of maniacal excitement from drink. Soon improved when debarred from liquor, and was discharged August 6, 1863. 3. P. H., male, aged 35 years, admitted July 17, 1863, with chronic mania. After a time he became rational, and was discharged on September 29th ult. He has been earning his livelihood since. 4. J. H. P., male, aged 23 years, seaman, admitted on September 2nd, in a state of maniacal excitement occasioned by a quarrel with the captain of his ship. He was discharged quite well on September 29. 5. M. W., female, aged 23 years, admitted October 2nd, for a violent paroxysm of mania, or rather of hysteria, caused by anxiety on her husband's account, who was in the Militia. She was discharged in a calm state on October 28th ult. 6. H. B., surgeon, aged 50 years, admitted maniacal from drinking, on December 3rd. In a few days he became rational, and was discharged on December 17.

At the end of 1863, there remained in the Asylum, 49 inmates, viz., 33 males and 16 females, including 5 Maoris, 4 men and 1 woman.

For the most part, the lunatic patients have been very healthy. Much benefit is expected from the industrial system which is to be introduced into the new Asylum.

PRISONS.

Nothing noteworthy has occurred in either of the Prisons in a medical point of view. The health of the prisoners has been good, and no death has occurred in the Stockade.

An aged female, imprisoned in the City Gaol, while undergoing her sentence, fell into very infirm health, and was removed to the Provincial Hospital, where she died.

In both prisons the want of an infirmary, or sick room, is much felt, and when any dangerous illness occurs, the patient is usually removed to the Provincial Hospital. Sentence of death by hanging was carried into effect in one instance on Richard Harper, within the precincts of the Mount Eden Stockade, on the 22nd September, 1863.

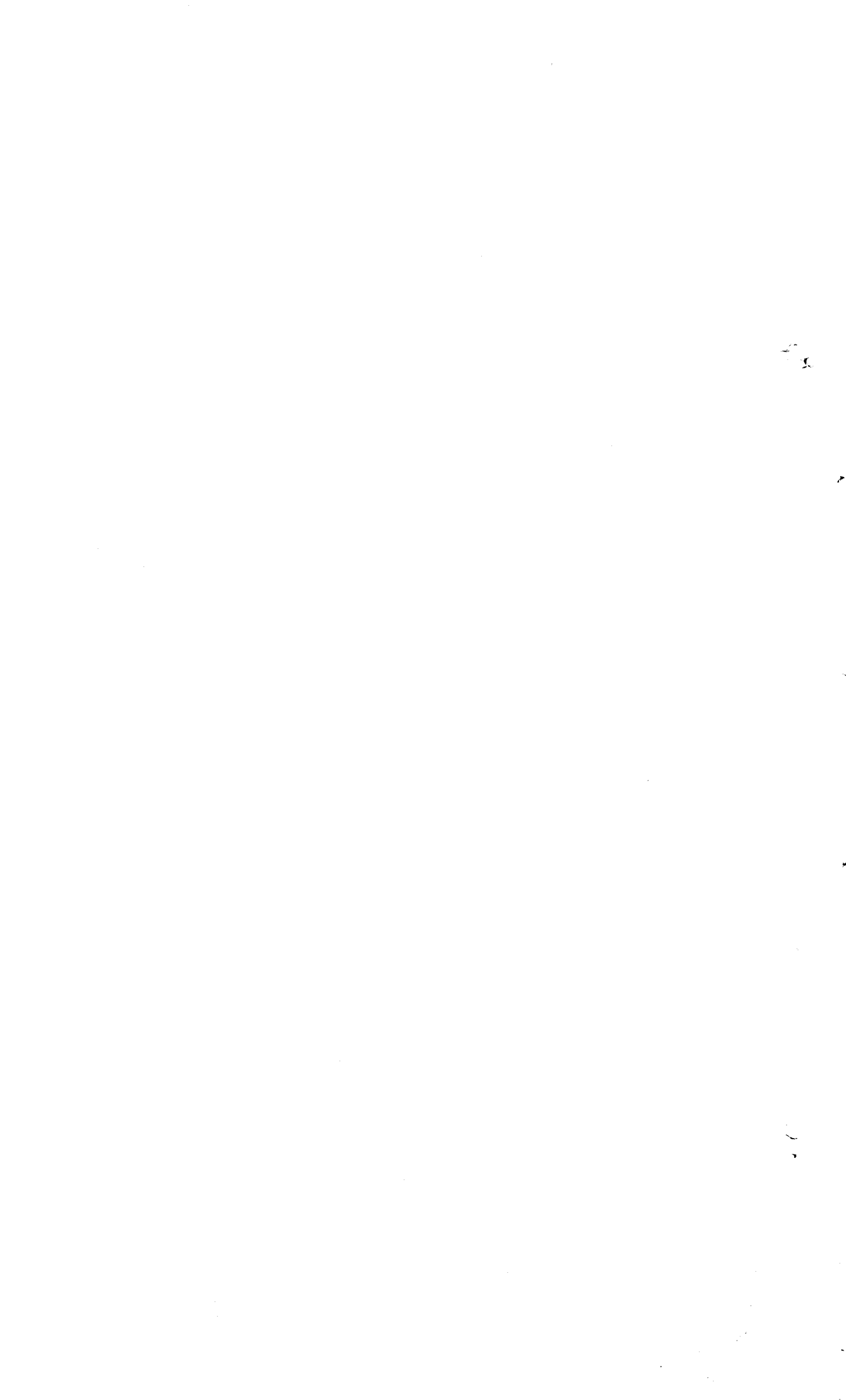
