PROCLAMATION.

By THOMAS BANNATYNE GILLIES, Esquire,
Superintendent of the Province of
Auckland.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Local Legislature of the Province of Auckland, passed in the nineteenth session thereof, intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to Slaughter-houses," it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for the Superintendent, by proclamation in the *Provincial Government Gazette*, from time to time to constitute and define Slaughter-house districts, and to appoint one or more public Slaughter-houses for each of such districts, and the limits of such districts, and the appointment of such Slaughter-houses from time to time to alter or revoke as occasion may require. And whereas John Williamson, the Superintendent of the said Province, did on the 3rd day of March, 1868, proclaim, constitute and define the town of Shortland to be a Slaughter-house district within the meaning of the said Act, the limits of which should comprise all those lands bounded on the west by the sea, on the south-west and south by the Wai Whuka Urunga Creek to the Church Mission Station, on the east by a line on a bearing of north 37° west from the Church Mission Station to the Karaka Stream, and on the north by the Karaka Stream to the sea. And whereas the said John Williamson, as such Superintendent, did, on the said 3rd day of March, 1868, appoint the premises situate at Karaka Creek, erected by Mr.

William Walters, of Auckland, and other premises therein mentioned, to be respectively public Slaughter-houses for the said district within the meaning of the said Act. And whereas it is expedient to revoke such appointment of the premises at Karaka Creek, erected by Mr. William Walters. Now, I, THOMAS BANNATYNE GILLIES, Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, in exercise of the powers vested in me in this behalf, do hereby revoke the appointment of the Slaughter-house above described as a public Slaughter-house for the said district within the meaning of the said Act.

OPAHEKE ROAD ACT, 1871.

AN ACT to close up certain roads in the Parish of Opaheke, in the County of Eden, in the Province of Auckland, and to authorise the Governor to grant the land occupied by the said roads to Henry Chamberlin, of Auckland, Esquire.

PREAMBLE.

WHEREAS it is expedient to close up the roads mentioned and described in the Schedule A to this Act annexed as being no longer required for public uses. And whereas the said roads so to be closed up as aforesaid pass through certain lands, the property of Henry Chamberlin, of Auckland, Esquire. And whereas it is expedient that the land occupied by the said roads should be granted to the said Henry Chamberlin, his heirs and assigns in fee simple.

Be it therefore enacted by the Superintendent of Auckland by and with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof as follows :-

ROADS IN SCHEDULE "A" TO BE CLOSED.

1. From and after the passing of this Act the said roads mentioned and described in the Schedule A to this Act annexed shall be closed and cease to be used for public purposes.

LAND MAY BE GRANTED TO HENRY CHAMBERLIN.

2. It shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand to grant the land occupied by the said roads to the said Henry Chamberlin his heirs and assigns in fee simple upon such terms as to or otherwise as may be deemed advisable.

SHORT TITLE.

3. The Short Title of this Act shall be "The Opaheke Road Act, 1871."

SCHEDULE "A."

A road 100 links wide, bounding lots 26 and 30 of the parish of Opaheke on the south, and bounding lots 29 and 31 of the said parish on the north.

A road 100 links wide, bounding lot 27 of the said parish on the south, and bounding lot 30 of the said parish on the north.

A road 100 links wide, bounding lots 25 and 28 of the said parish on the west, and bounding lots 24 27, and 30 of the said parish on the east.

A road 100 links wide, intersecting and traversing lots 29, 31, and 46 of the said parish, as the said roads are delineated on a plan intituled "Opaheke Road Act, 1871," deposited in the Waste Lands Office at Auckland, and therein distinguished by being colored brown, and marked with straight lines and dotted lines inside.
