PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act made and enacted in the Imperial Parliament holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, entitled "An Act to grant a Representative Constitution to the Colony of New Zealand," it is amongst other things enacted that whenever any Bill shall have been assented to by the Superintendent as in the said Act provided, the Superintendent shall forthwith transmit to the Governor an authentic copy thereof, and it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time within three months after any such Bill shall have been received by him, to declare, by Proclamation, his disallowance of such Bill, and that any such disallowance shall make void and annul the same from and after the day of the date of such Proclamation, or any subsequent day to be named therein:

And whereas the Ordinances hereinafter specified have been enacted by the Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof, and the said Ordinances were received by the Governor on the 11th day of January, 1859:

And whereas it is expedient that the said recited Ordinances should be disallowed:

Now, therefore, I, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the authority vested in me in that behalf by the said recited Act of Parliament, do hereby proclaim and declare my disallowance of the following Ordinances passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Canterbury, viz.:-

"The Immigrants' Barracks Ordinance, Sess. X., No. 2."

"The Public Hospital Ordinance, Sess. X., No. 6."

HIS Honor the Superintendent directs it to be notified for public information, that in pursuance of the powers vested in him by the Waste Lands Regulations, now in force within the Province of Canterbury, he has made the following reserves of land temporarily, until the next Session of the Provincial Council:—

Six hundred and forty acres, more or less, bounded on the North West by section 997, Clifford's land and Rhodes' land; on the North East by a road; and on the South East and South West on each side of the present track, to include 640 acres, for a Township at Waimata-mata.

Five acres at the South Western corner of section 965, being bounded on the Eastward by section 965, about 11 chains; on the South by the old road about 9 chains; and on the North West by section 1701, about 13 chains; for a Public Cemetery at Timaru.

Also, Town Sections at Timaru, Nos. 23 and 24, for Provincial Government Buildings.

Also, at Waimata-mata Bush, the following reserves for the preservation of timber thereon:—

Seventy-five acres, more or less, bounded on the North West by a road; on the South East by section 1096; and on the South West by the River. And Seventy-five acres, more or less, bounded on the North East by the River; on the South East by Rhodes' land; on the North West by the Wai Tamaheraki, and South West to the extent of seventy-five acres.

Also, five acres, more or less, situated at Okain's Bay; bounded on the South East by the Main-road; on the North East by a road, a distance of 10 chains; on the South West by section 827, a distance of 10 chains; and on the North West by waste land, 5 chains; for a Public Cemetery.

Also, two acres, one rood, more or less, situate at Okain's Bay; bounded on the South East by the Main Road, and a small Creek; on the South West by the road, one chain wide, along the bank of the River; and on the North East by a road, a distance of 3 chains; for a reserve for the Church of England.

Also, three acres, more or less, situate at Okain's Bay; bounded on the North East, by section 827, a distance of 5 chains; on the South East by a main road, a distance of 12 chains; on the South West by a road a distance of 3 chains; and on the North West by the road, one chain wide, along the bank of the River; to be reserved for the use of the Provincial Government, and other public purposes.

Also, one acre, two roods, twenty perches, more or less, situate at Okain's Bay; bounded on the North East by a small creek separating this from the Church of England reserve; on the South East by the main road, and on the South West by the River road, including the strip of land in the fork below the bridge; to be reserved for the use of the

Provincial Government, and other public purposes.

Also, ten acres, more or less, situate on the Southern headland of Wainui Bay, Akaroa, known as Cape Three Points; to be reserved for a Pilot Station and Ferry House.

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance passed by the Lieut. Governor and Legislative Council of New Zealand, entitled the "Slaughter House Ordinance, Sess. VIII, No. 5," it was enacted that it should be lawful for his Excellency the Governor by Proclamation from time to time to constitute and define certain Districts for the

purpose" of regulating the Slaughtering of Cattle in certain Districts. And whereas by an Ordinance of the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Canterbury entitled "The Empowering Ordinance, Sess. II, No. 2," the powers conferred on the Governor of New Zealand by the above recited Ordinance were within the limits of the Province of Canterbury conferred on the Superintendent of the said province.

Now, therefore, I, William Sefton Moorhouse, the Superintendent of the said Province of Canterbury, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the above recited Ordinances, and of all other powers and authorities in any wise enabling me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that from and after the 30th day of April, 1859, the "Ordinance for regulating the Slaughtering of Cattle in certain places" and the provisions thereof shall come into operation and be in force within the limits of the Town of Akaroa, as the same is defined in a certain proclamation of the Superintendent of the said Province of Canterbury, bearing date the 1st day of May, 1856, and marked as such town on the map of the town and suburbs of Akaroa, marked A 3, signed by the Chief Surveyor, and deposited in the Land Office, at Christchurch.

And I do further proclaim and declare that the said "Ordinance for regulating the Slaughtering of Cattle in certain places" and the provisions thereof shall from and after the said 30th day of April, 1859, come into operation, and be in force within the limits of the Town of Kaiapoi, as the same is defined in the "Kaiapoi Town Ordinance, Sess. VIII., No. 7," of the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the said Province of Canterbury, and numbered and marked MD 14 on the maps, setting out and describing the Mandeville District of the Province of Canterbury, in the Land Office, Christchurch.
