PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly, entitled "The Registration Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, from time to time, by proclamation in the *New Zealand Gazette*, to divide the Colony, for the purposes of the said Act, into such and so many Districts as he shall think fit, and every such District shall be called by a distinct name, and shall be a Registrar's District: Provided always, that the Governor may, at any time, revoke the whole or any part of such Proclamation, and issue a new Proclamation, dividing the Colony or any portion of it anew into Districts, or increasing the number, or altering the boundaries of Districts, as from time to time he may think requisite; and it is provided that the Districts existing at the time of the passing of the said Act should, until duly altered, be deemed to be Districts proclaimed under the said Act.

Now, therefore, I, the Governor of the said Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said in part re-

cited Act, do hereby revoke every Proclamation at any time heretofore issued, appointing and declaring Registrar's Districts for the purposes of the Registration of Births, Deaths, and Marriages. And I do by this Proclamation divide the said Colony, for the purposes of the said Act, into Districts, the names and boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

MOUNT GREY DISTRICT.

From the South bank of the Hurunui to the North bank of the Ashley.

KAIAPOI DISTRICT.

From the South bank of the Ashley to the North bank of the Waimakariri.

CHRISTCHURCH DISTRICT.

From the South bank of the Waimakariri to the North bank of the Rakaia, except Lyttelton and Akaroa Districts.

ASHBURTON DISTRICT.

From the North bank of the Rakaia, including the Islands, to the North bank of the Rangitata.

TIMARU DISTRICT.

From the South bank of the Rangitata to the North bank of Watangi.

LYTTELTON DISTRICT.

From the Old Ferry over the Heathcote, at the end of the Ferry road, thence along the South bank of the Estuary of the Avon and Heathcote and the Sea coast (including the Islands in Port Victoria) to a point half way between the Eastern headland

of Port Levy and the Western headland of Pigeon Bay, thence to the North branch of the Little River, thence down the course of that River and Lake Forsyth to the Sea, thence along the east edge of Lake Ellesmere to the River Halswell, Cooper's Knobs, thence along the highest ridge of the Hills to the Flagstaff on Mount Pleasant, thence in a right line to the starting point.

AKAROA DISTRICT.

All that portion of the Province lying to the Eastward of Lyttelton District.

And I hereby declare that this Proclamation shall come into operation and take effect on the first day of October next.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly, entitled the "Marriage Act Amendment Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time by Proclamation in the *New Zealand Gazette* to divide the Colony of New Zealand, for the purposes of the said Act, into such and so many districts as he shall think fit, and every such district shall be called by a distinct name, and shall be a Registrar's District. Provided always that the Governor may at any time revoke the whole or any part of such proclamation, and issue a new proclamation, dividing the Colony or any portion of it anew into Districts, or increasing the number or altering the boundaries of Districts, as from time to time he may think requisite, and it was provided that the Districts already proclaimed under "The Marriage Act, 1854," shall be deemed to be Districts constituted under the now reciting Act.

Now, therefore, I, the Governor of the said Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said in part recited Act, do hereby revoke every proclamation at any time heretofore issued, appointing and declaring Registrars' Districts, under the said "Marriage Act, 1854," and the said "Marriage Act Amendment Act, 1858," or either of the said Acts, and I do, by this Proclamation, divide the said Colony, for the purposes of the said Act, into Districts, the names and boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

MOUNT GREY DISTRICT.

From the South bank of the Hurunui to the North bank of the Ashley.

KAIAPOI DISTRICT.

From the South bank of the Ashley to the North bank of the Waimakariri.

CHRISTCHURCH DISTRICT.

From the South bank of the Waimakariri to the North bank of the Rakaia, except Lyttelton and Akaroa Districts.

ASHBURTON DISTRICT.

From the North bank of the Rakaia, including

the Islands, to the North bank of the Rangitata.

TIMARU DISTRICT.

From the South bank of the Rangitata to the North bank of the Waitangi.

LYTTELTON DISTRICT.

From the Old Ferry over the Heathcote, at the end of the Ferry road, thence along the South bank of the Estuary of the Avon and Heathcote and the Sea Coast (including the Islands in Port Victoria) to a point half-way between the Eastern headland of Port Levy and the Western headland of Pigeon Bay, thence to the North branch of the Little River, thence down the course of that River and Lake Forsyth to the Sea, thence along the east edge of Lake Ellesmere to the River Halswell, Cooper's Knobs, thence along the highest ridge of the Hills to the Flagstaff on Mount Pleasant, thence in a right line to the starting point.

AKAROA DISTRICT.

All that portion of the Province lying to the Eastward of Lyttelton District.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Militia Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to constitute throughout the colony, or any part thereof, Militia Districts, and such districts from time to time to vary, and to designate the Militia of any such district by the name of a Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Company.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, in exercise of the above recited power, doth by this present order constitute a Militia District to be called and known by the name of

CHRISTCHURCH,

and doth define the boundaries of the said District as follows, that is to say:

The circumference of a circle, the radius of which extends fifteen miles from the present Land Office in the Town of Christchurch.

And doth designate the Militia within the said district by the name of a Battalion.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Militia Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall

be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make, vary, and abolish Regulations under which the services of Volunteers shall be accepted in any Military District: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, and in exercise of the powers in this behalf vested in him by the said recited Act, doth hereby make and ordain the following regulations under which the services of Volunteers shall be accepted in the District of Christchurch.

1. The term of service for each Volunteer to be one year from the day he is sworn in, provided always that if any Volunteer shall go to reside out of the district, he shall, if he desire, be discharged from further service as a Volunteer.

2. Every Volunteer shall attend to be trained and exercised at such time and place as shall be fixed by the Governor, or by such person or persons as he may, from time to time, authorise in that behalf. Provided always that no Volunteer shall be compelled to attend to be trained or exercised more than one hundred and sixty-eight hours in any one year.

3. All Officers of companies will be appointed by the Governor, and names for that purpose are to be submitted to him for his approval by the company to which they are proposed to be appointed, and all Sergeants and Corporals must be examined, and passed as competent, by the Adjutant, before they will be appointed.

4. All rolls, documents, and correspondence shall be kept at the office of the Adjutant, and shall be open at all times during office hours for the inspection and information of the Officers of the company to which they relate.

5. All orders and communications from the Governor, or Government of the Colony, shall be transmitted to and given out by the Adjutant.

6. Every Volunteer who shall absent himself during any part of the time appointed for training or exercise, and shall not account for such absence to the satisfaction of the Adjutant and the Captain of his company, shall forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding one pound for every day on which he shall be so absent.

7. If any Arms, Accoutrements, Ammunition, or other Government property shall be injured, destroyed, or expended, by being used except on service, the Volunteer in whose charge such Arms, Accoutrements, or Ammunition, or other property were at the time, shall pay a sum not exceeding the value of the same respectively.

8. Every Volunteer who shall appear at drill without the appointed Arms, Accoutrements and Dress, or any part thereof, or with the same in a dirty or neglected state, shall pay a sum not exceeding ten shillings for every such offence.

9. Every Volunteer who shall be guilty of inattention, or carelessness, or who shall misbehave himself at drill in any manner, not before specified, shall pay a sum not exceeding twenty shillings nor less than five shillings for every such offence.

10. All such fines shall be fixed by the Captain and Adjutant, and shall be paid to the Adjutant on demand, and if not so paid they may be recovered in a summary way by him, on behalf of the Government, in any Resident Magistrate's Court in the Colony.

11. Volunteers enrolled under these Regulations shall be subject to the provisions contained in the following Clauses of the Militia Act, 1858, namely, Sections 1, 3, 6, 7, 9, 18, 19, 20, 21, (except the proviso thereto) 22, 23, (except when assembled for the purpose of being trained and exercised only) and 24.

IN accordance with the provisions of an Act passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, intitled the Waste Lands Act, 1854, the following amended regulations for the manage-

ment of the Waste Lands of the Crown within the Province of Canterbury are published for general information, previously to being proposed to the Provincial Council for their adoption.

Amendments to be proposed by the Provincial Secretary. Clauses 33, 35, 43, 51, 52, 65, 66, and 71 of the regulations issued by the Governor in a proclamation bearing date 12th February, 1856, to be expunged and the following substituted :—

33. Upon payment of the purchase money in full, the purchaser shall receive from the commissioners a "license to occupy" in the form set forth in Schedule A to the Waste Lands Regulations, and such license shall be restored to the commissioners upon receipt of a Crown Grant of the land purchased.

35. Save as hereinafter provided, no section of Rural Land shall be sold, containing less than twenty acres; but any section so limited by frontage lines or private lands as to contain less than twenty acres may be sold by auction at the upset price of forty shillings per acre; the time and place of sale, and the mode of sale and payment of purchase money to be as nearly as may be in accordance with the Regulations herein contained applicable to the sale of Town Land. *Provided nevertheless* that if any section so limited shall be included in a Pasturage License with Pre-emptive Right, the holder of such License shall be entitled to exercise such Pre-emptive Right under these Regulations upon payment of the sum of forty pounds for such section.

43. If any person shall contract with the Superintendent to make and complete within a given time any public road, bridge, or drain, or any part of any such road, bridge, or drain, furnishing such security as the Superintendent may require for the due completion of such contract, and shall select such portion of rural land as he shall be willing to accept by way of payment or compensation, or by way of part payment or compensation for such work; *It shall be lawful* for the Superintendent to reserve such portion of land from public sale for such given time but no longer; and such person shall on the completion of such contract be entitled to a free grant of such land, or so much thereof as the Board shall adjudge, not exceeding one acre for every two pounds sterling which the Superintendent shall certify to the Waste Lands Board to be the *bona fide* value of the work so done by such person according to the prices for work and materials at the time of performing such contract current in the district.

Every such reservation of land from public sale shall be published in the Government Gazette of the Province as directed in clause 19 of these Regulations.

No such reservation shall continue in force for a longer period than 12 calendar months from the date on which it shall have been made.

No land included in a Pasturage License with Pre-emptive Right shall as against the holder of such Pre-emptive Right be so reserved or granted until he shall have been allowed the option of purchasing such land in the manner prescribed in clauses 64 and 66 of these Regulations.

No greater amount of land than 250 acres shall under the provisions of this clause be reserved or granted to any one person under any such contract, unless in payment of work for which a vote has been passed by the Provincial Council.

No greater amount of land than 1000 acres in the aggregate shall in any one year be reserved or granted under the provisions of this clause, without the special sanction of the Provincial Council.

*Provided always* that every parcel of land so

granted shall be subjected to the same conditions as to form and frontage as any rural land sold under these Regulations. *Provided also* that no application for less than 20 acres shall be received under this clause, but that where any amount of compensation awarded by the Board shall be of a less extent than 20 acres of land, the person entitled may pay the balance in cash upon the same terms as other applicants for the purchase of rural lands under these Regulations.

51. The fee shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Waste Lands Board every year, in advance; for the first year on the issue of the License, and for the second and every subsequent year on any sitting day of the Board between the 20th day of April and the first day of May, inclusive; and every pasturage license not renewed by payment of the required fee, on or before the first day of May, shall, unless good cause to the contrary be shown to the satisfaction of the Waste Lands Board, be considered as abandoned.

52. Every pasturage license shall be in the form set forth in the Schedule C to the Waste Lands Regulations, and shall be transferable by endorsement in the form set forth in such schedule, and such transfer shall be deemed to be complete upon notice thereof being duly given to the Waste Lands Board and not before. A pasturage license shall entitle the holder thereof to the exclusive right of pasturage over the land specified therein upon the terms above stated. Such license shall be renewed by endorsement from year to year, until the land specified therein shall be purchased, granted, or reserved under these regulations; and the fee to be paid in respect of such license shall not be altered until the first of May, 1870. Such license shall give no right to the soil or to the timber, and shall immediately determine over any land which may be purchased, granted, or reserved, under these regulations. A reasonable right of way shall be allowed through all pasturage runs.

65. The applicant for any rural land included in any pre-emptive right shall deposit with the Treasurer of the Waste Lands Board a sum equal to 4s. per acre of the purchase money, and the remainder he shall pay within one week from the date of his application being granted, or forfeit such deposit. Such deposit, however, shall be immediately returned on demand, if the holder of the pre-emptive right shall give notice of his intention to purchase any portion of the land applied for, and pay the requisite deposit.

66. If the holder of the pre-emptive right decide upon purchasing any portion of the land applied for, he shall forthwith pay to the Treasurer of the Waste Lands Board a deposit of 4s. per acre of the purchase money of such portion; and, if he shall not within six weeks thereafter have paid the remainder of the purchase money, he shall forfeit such deposit together with all right or title to the land.

If the holder of any pre-emptive right other than those created by clause 60 of the Waste Lands Regulations shall neglect or refuse to purchase any portion of the land applied for, such portion shall from and immediately after such neglect or refusal be released from all right of pre-emption and open to purchase on the terms of these regulations, as if the same had not been included in any pre-emptive right.

71. All payments on account of pasturage runs shall in future be made on or before the first day of May, in accordance with clause 51, at the Land Office at Christchurch, and the Waste Lands Board shall sit at that place for the Treasurer to receive the same.

**TO HIS HONOR THE SUPERINTENDENT.**

The Commissioners appointed by your Honor to enquire into and report upon the treatment of the immigrants by the ship *Cameo*, the accommodation afforded, and the quantity and quality of the stores supplied to them, beg leave to report as follows:—

1. The Commissioners have taken such evidence on the above subjects as was within their reach, including that of witnesses brought forward by the captain of the vessel. From the time, however, which has elapsed since the arrival of the *Cameo*, and the consequent dispersion of her passengers, the evidence procurable has been comparatively limited.

2. The rations provided for the immigrants appear to have been generally satisfactory both in quality and quantity.

3. The supply of medical comforts, although perhaps not smaller than usually furnished, proved in regard to beer, wine, and spirits insufficient for the necessities of the passengers. It was supplemented to some extent by the ship's stores.

4. The requirements of the "Passengers Act" in respect to the space allotted to the passengers and to their berthing have been complied with, excepting that the lower bunks were not constructed so as to permit the decks below them being properly cleaned. The *Cameo* appears however to have been more crowded than is at all desirable, and the Commissioners consider it unwise to send in a vessel of her size and class so large a number of emigrants as she contained. Considerable pains appear to have been taken to secure the ventilation of the between-decks, but they were not adequately lighted.

5. The emigrants' cooking stove was not large enough for the number of persons by whom it had to be used.

6. The Surgeon appears to have shown proper attention and skill in the treatment of persons requiring medical attendance, and to have judiciously distributed the medical comforts at his disposal. The health of the passengers generally has been good.

7. The Surgeon seems however to have been entirely ignorant of his authority or his duty as superintendent of the emigrants, or that he had anything to do with the maintenance of order and

discipline amongst them. He states that no definite instructions on this subject were ever furnished to him; that his attention was never drawn to the "Passengers' Act;" and that he had never seen a copy of it until shown him by the Commissioners. He appears to have taken no notice of the "Abstract" of this Act, which was posted in various parts of the ship and which indicates his duty as Surgeon Superintendent.

8. The Schoolmaster and Matron received the usual instructions from the Agent of the province in England, but seem to have paid little attention to them. They appear to have been wanting in discretion and energy of character, and to be unfit for the appointment they held.

9. The result of this has been an absence of any proper control over and order among the emigrants.

10. The conduct of some of the single women especially appears to have been insubordinate and unruly, and improper familiarities to have been tolerated between them and the crew. One occasion has been brought under the notice of the commissioners, on which liquor was supplied to one of the single females, in the cabin of one of the petty officers.

11. Among the single men frequent cases of drunkenness are reported. A considerable quantity of spirits seems to have been taken on board by some of them contrary to law, and not to have been taken away by the officers of the ship.

12. The sale of spirits to the steerage passengers has been proved and is admitted by the captain to a certain extent, but the surgeon states that this was done by his sanction for medical reasons. Beer appears to have been supplied at the mere discretion of the steward, without control on the part of his superior officers.

13. A sufficient check does not seem to have been kept on the use of the naked lights; and the condition of the vessel on her arrival bespeaks a great want of attention to cleanliness.

14. A steerage passenger of unsound mind and filthy habits was allowed to embark, and appears to have been the cause of much trouble and discomfort to the rest of the passengers. He has, since his arrival, been committed to safe custody as a dangerous lunatic.

15. The commissioners consider it due to Captain Pole to state that the witnesses examined by them speak favourably of the desire manifested by him throughout the voyage to promote the comfort of the passengers.

16. The commissioners append to this report minutes of the evidence taken by them.
