The Provincial Government are prepared to receive tenders for leasing the block of land reserved for the landing of diseased sheep on Adderley Head, containing 2530 acres or thereabouts, on the following terms:

## CONDITIONAL LICENSES.

## WOOD THOMAS, Purau—

## CONDITIONS:—

To provide at all times lodging for four travellers; oats and fodder sufficient for three horses; to keep a lamp burning with two burners from sunset to sunrise; to be sworn in special constable.

Licenses granted to the persons named below are subject to the conditions following, shown as they stand numbered on the printed form of License in each case:—

## MAIN, JAMES, Great South Road, "Half-Way House"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than six beds for travellers, in not less than four separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.
4. At all times to keep a proper supply of water for the house, and for horses and cattle.
5. To keep at all times a proper supply of oats, and oaten or grass hay. Oats to be charged for to travellers at not more than 6d. per quart measure.
6. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient stockyard for cattle, capable of holding not less than 50 head.
7. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient moveable sheep-proof enclosure, capable of holding not less than 2,000 sheep; or, at the option of the licensee, to keep one acre of land enclosed by a permanent sheep-proof fence.
8. To keep a lamp burning with two burners from sunset to sunrise, giving a sufficiently bright light, and being so lighted as to be conspicuous from a distance all round the house.
9. Nil.
10. To be sworn in and act as a constable, especially when required by the Magistrates or the Police.
11. On all occasions to render every assistance, and to supply information to Magistrates and to the

Police in the execution of their duty.

12. To keep a clean and orderly house; and to render it as comfortable for the accommodation of travellers as the circumstances of position and distance from town will fairly allow.
13. Nil.
14. The license to be cancelled if any of the conditions of the license be not fulfilled regularly, or if any drunkenness be proved to have been allowed on the premises, or if any spirits shall be supplied from the house or premises to any aboriginal native of New Zealand.
15. A printed or fairly written copy of the conditions to be kept at all times posted up in some conspicuous place in the tap-room, in the public and in the private sitting-room, for the information of travellers.
16. A tariff of charges to be kept posted up in like manner.

## GIGGS, GEORGE HENRY, River Selwyn, Parly's "Accommodation House"

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than eight beds for travellers, in not less than six separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least seven horses.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, are the same as in James Main's License.

## GILES, JOHN, River Orari, "Giles' Accommodation House"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house beside the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than fourteen beds for travellers, in not less than four separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least five horses.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, are the same as in James Main's License.

## YOUNG, JOHN ALBERT, Arowenua, Young's "Accommodation House"

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than twelve beds for travellers, in not less than five separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, are the same as in James Main's License.

**SMITH, DAVID**, Waituna Creek, "Smith's Accommodation House"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than ten beds for travellers, in not less than two separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least seven horses.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, are the same as in James Main's License.

**BUTTERWORTH, WILLIAM**, River Pareora, "Pareora Accommodation House"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than eleven beds for travellers, in not less than four separate bed-rooms.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, are the same as in James Main's License.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

**REDFERN, SALATHIEL**, Oxford, "Redfern's Accommodation House"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting room.
2. Not less than twelve beds for travellers, in not less than six separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, are the same as in James Main's License.

**WARD, JOSEPH**, Cheviot District, "Weka Pass Hotel"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than seven beds for travellers, in not less than six separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, are the same as in James Main's License.

**DUNFORD, WILLIAM**, Rakaia River, Dunford's "Accommodation House"

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than fifteen beds for travellers, in not less than six separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least seven horses.

8. Nil.
9. Not to keep a lamp burning at night outside the house.
- 10, 11, 12, same as in James Main's License.
13. Conditions regarding the ferry over the Rakaia to stand as per special contract with the Provincial Government. Officers of the Supreme Court, Magistrates, and Police Constables on duty, and prisoners to be ferried free of charge. To afford every assistance in his power in directing strangers to a safe fording across the river.

**TURTON, WILLIAM**, Ashburton or Hakatere River, "Ashburton Accommodation House"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than eleven beds for travellers, in not less than five separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.
- 4, 5, 6, 7, same as in James Main's License.
8. To keep a lamp burning with two burners from sunset to sunrise, giving a sufficiently bright light, and being so lighted as NOT to be VISIBLE ON THE SOUTH BANK of the Ashburton.
9. Nil.
- 10, 11, 12, same as in James Main's License.
13. If required, to accompany foot passengers and horsemen across the river at a charge not exceeding 6d. each; and persons driving drays or other vehicles, at a charge not exceeding 1s. for each dray or vehicle. Officers of the Supreme Court, Magistrates, and Police Constables on duty, and prisoners to be put across the river free of charge. To afford every assistance in his power in directing strangers to a safe fording across the river.

WARD, JOSEPH, Rangitata or Alford River, "Ward's Rangitata Accommodation House"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than ten beds for travellers, in not less than three separate bedrooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.
- 4, 5, 6, 7, same as in James Main's License.

9. Not to keep a lamp burning at night outside the house.
- 10, 11, 12, same as in James Main's license.
13. To provide a horse, and be ready at all reasonable times between the hours of sunrise and sunset to convey passengers across the River Rangitata on horseback, at a charge not exceeding 2s. 6d. each. To direct drivers of drays and other vehicles, and, if required, to accompany them across the River at a charge of 2s. 6d. each. To erect and maintain a flag-pole, 40 feet in height, and keep a sufficiently large flag flying thereon daily, from sunrise to sunset. The pole to be erected on the Terrace immediately above the house, so as to indicate the fording-place to persons arriving from the northward. Officers of the Supreme Court, Magistrate's and Police Constables on duty, and prisoners to be put across the river free of charge. To afford every assistance in his power in directing strangers to a safe fording across the river.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

13. To keep at all times a safe ferry boat (punt) in good working order, and ready for conveyance of passengers across the Waitangi at all reasonable times between the hours of sunrise and sunset. The fare for passengers, stock, sheep, drays, horses, &c., to be at double the rates charged at Dunford's Ferry, on the Rakaia, subject to revision at the next Annual Licensing Meeting. Officers of the Supreme Court, Magistrates, and Police Constables on duty, and prisoners to be ferried free of charge. To afford every assistance in his power in directing strangers to a safe fording across the river.

ANDERSEN, JOHN, Akaroa Harbour, Andersen's "Akaroa Accommodation House"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least two horses.
4. At all times to keep a proper supply of water for the house, and for horses and cattle.
5. To keep at all times a proper supply of oats, and oaten or grass hay, or to provide pasturage in lieu thereof. Oats to be charged for to travellers at not more than 6d. per quart measure.

To keep at all times a safe ferry boat in good working order and ready for conveyance of passengers between the town of Akaroa and the Head of the Harbour, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. from October to March, and between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. from April to September. The fare for passengers to be—5s. for one passenger, and 2s. 6d. per head for more than one passenger. Officers of the Supreme Court, Magistrates, and Police Constables on duty, and prisoners to be ferried free of charge.

CAMERON, DONALD AND DUNCAN, "Salt Water Creek Hotel," near Northport—

To afford every assistance in his power in directing strangers to a safe fording across the river.

LEITH, JOHN, Kowai, "Leith's Accommodation House"—

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than ten beds for travellers, in not less than seven separate bed-rooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.
