THE following General Regulations have been adopted, temporarily, for the Management of the Christchurch Hospital:—

MEDICAL OFFICERS.

The medical officers shall be two in number, a Physician and a Surgeon. They shall have general superintendence of the whole institution (under the inspection of His Honor the Superintendent, or some person appointed by him). They shall instruct the Steward, Matron, and Resident Dispenser in their duties. They shall have the entire direction of the diet, medicine, and general treatment of the patients. One at least of the medical officers shall visit the Hospital daily.

RESIDENT DISPENSER.

There shall be a Resident Dispenser, who shall dispense medicine, attend to emergencies, and carry out the instructions of the physician and surgeon.

STEWARD.

There shall be a Steward, who shall order all provisions of food, fuel, &c., which may be necessary. He shall keep regular accounts, which shall be audited once a month by the Provincial Auditor. He shall be responsible for the good order and discipline of the whole establishment, and shall see that the directions of the physician and surgeon are carried out. He shall have the authority of master over the nurses and servants, and shall be sworn in as a special constable. He shall not allow any provisions whatever or intoxicating liquors to be introduced into the Hospital by patients, nurses, or visitors.

MATRON.

There shall be a Matron, who shall have charge of the bedding, linen, and furniture, and shall be responsible to the Superintendent for their safe keeping. She shall have the authority of mistress over the nurses and servants, and shall take care that

they attend to their duties. She shall keep a list of the property of the Hospital, such as furniture, &c., so that the stock may be ascertained at any moment.

NURSES AND SERVANTS.

Nurses and servants shall be employed from time to time upon the requisition of the Physician or Surgeon.

PATIENTS.

Patients shall be admitted by order of the Superintendent, and they shall pay towards the support of the Hospital a sum not exceeding Thirty Shillings a week, such payment being guaranteed by the written undertaking from the patient, accompanied, where possible, with the name of some respectable householder, as a security. They shall obey the directions of the medical officers, and shall behave themselves in a quiet and orderly manner. They may receive visits from friends between the hours of 2 and 4 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, and at no other time, except by order from one of the medical officers.

TIMES OF ADMISSION.

Tuesday and Friday in every week shall be the regular days of admission, except in cases of emergency. No admission, except in cases of emergency, shall be made without previous application to the office of the Provincial Secretary, and the hours of admission shall be from 10 a.m. to 12 at noon, and from 5 to 6 p.m.

VISITORS.

Two visitors (one lady and one gentleman) shall be requested to inspect the Hospital once a week, and write their observations in a book kept for the purpose. They shall be appointed by the Superintendent, with the advice of the Executive Council from time to time, for a period not exceeding three months.

MINISTERS OF RELIGION.

Officiating Ministers of Religion may be admitted at all reasonable times, on application to the Steward.

XIV., No. 14," the Municipal Council of Christchurch have made certain by-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, and for the general good rule and good government of the said Municipal District of Christchurch, and whereas these by-laws have been, by and with the advice of my Executive Council, assented to by me in accordance with the provisions of clause 28 of the said Ordinance: Now, therefore, I, William Sefton Moorhouse, Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, in pursuance of the powers vested in me in that behalf, do hereby declare such by-laws to be in force within the said district from and after the 28th day of April last.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

BY-LAWS for REGULATING the PROCEEDINGS of the MUNICIPAL COUNCIL of CHRISTCHURCH.

1. *Adjournment, if no Quorum.*—If, at the expiration of a quarter of an hour from the time appointed for meeting, there be not present a quorum of members, the Council shall stand adjourned to the next sitting day.

2. *Adjournment, if Members reduced below Quorum.*—At any time after the commencement of business it be noticed that there is not a quorum of members present, the Chairman shall adjourn the Council to the next sitting day.

3. *Time of Meeting.*—Unless otherwise ordered by resolution of the Council, the Council shall sit on every Monday evening, at seven o'clock.

4. *Special Meetings.*—The Clerk of the Council shall, by circular notes, call a special meeting of the Council, on a requisition from the Chairman, or from any three members. The notice convening such meeting shall state the business proposed to be transacted thereat.

5. *Chairman.*—The Chairman may address the Council on any business before it, but may not move or second a resolution.

6. *Questions of Order, and cases unprovided for.*—All questions of order or form shall be decided by the Chairman. He shall also decide in all cases not provided for by these by-laws, taking for his guide the usage of the Provincial Council so far as the same is applicable to the proceedings of this Council. In the event of any appeal against the decision of the Chairman, the same shall be decided at the next sitting of the Council, in the same manner as any other question brought before such Council.

7. *Chairman to provide for Custody of Books, &c.*—The Chairman shall make all necessary regulations for the convenience of members of the Council, and the custody of books and records.

8. *Minutes.*—The Clerk shall at each sitting of the Council keep draft minutes of the proceedings at such sitting. Such minutes shall afterwards be fairly entered in a minute book, and shall be submitted for approval at the next sitting of the Council; when approved, they shall be signed by the Chairman of the sitting of which they are on record.

9. *Notice Book.*—The Clerk shall keep a Notice Book, in which he shall enter all the notices of motion given by members of the

Council, in the order in which they are given; and all business shall be called on by the Chairman in the order in which it is entered in the Notice Book; but, by leave of the Council, the consideration of any notice may be deferred to a later period of the sitting.

10. *Limitation on Speaking.*—Every member, when speaking, shall address the Chair, standing. No member shall speak except on some motion before the Council; nor shall any member (except the mover of a resolution) speak twice on the same motion, unless a "free discussion" shall have been resolved on.

11. *Breaches of Order.*—The Chairman shall at once call to order any member proceeding to speak twice on the same question, or introducing irrelevant matter into his speech, or any member using unbecoming language. A member called to order by the Chairman shall immediately sit down.

12. *Questions of Order.*—Questions of order may be forthwith taken into consideration whenever they arise.

13. *Notices of Motion.*—No member shall bring any subject under the consideration of the Council, except in pursuance of a notice given in writing, and read at some previous sitting. Such notices of motion may be given at any convenient opportunity in the course of the sitting.

14. *Motions in Writing.*—Every motion or amendment (except matters of form) shall be handed to the Chairman in writing.

15. *Motions not Seconded.*—Every motion or amendment not seconded shall drop without debate.

16. *Motion not to be Withdrawn.*—After a motion has been put by the Chairman, it cannot be withdrawn without the leave of the Council.

17. *Amendments.*—Amendments to any motion may be moved without notice. No amendments may be moved upon an amendment. An amendment to a motion shall be put before the motion, and, if carried, the motion as amended shall then be put.

18. *Transfer of Motion.*—Any member by whom notice of motion has been given may authorise any member to move the same in his absence.

19. *Adjournment.*—A motion for adjournment may be made at any time, but not so as to interrupt a member speaking. If such motion be negatived, no new motion to the same effect may be moved within a quarter of an hour.

20. *Resumption of Adjourned Debate.*—The member, upon whose motion any debate shall have been adjourned, shall be entitled to pre-audience on the resumption of the debate, unless he has previously spoken.

21. *Divisions.*—Every question put to the vote shall be put first in the affirmative, and then in the negative, when the Chairman shall declare by the sound of voices which party has the majority. If a division be

required by any member, the Chairman shall put the question "Aye" or "No" to each member *seriatim*, and shall declare the result by a list to be made up by the Clerk.

22. *All Members present to Vote.*—Every member present when a question is put to the vote must vote.

23. *Appointment of Committees.*—A notice of motion for the appointment of a Standing or Select Committee shall state the number of which it is to consist, and be accompanied by a notice of the names of the members proposed to be placed on such Committee; but the two motions shall be considered separate questions, and shall be put separately to the Council. Any member may, as an amendment, propose other names than those of which notice has been given.

24. *Mode of appointing Committee.*—Upon the appointment of a Committee having been agreed to, any member may require it to be formed in manner following. Each member present shall give to the Clerk a list of the members proposed by him to serve on such Committee. Any list containing a larger number of names than that fixed for the Committee shall be void. When all the lists are collected, the Chairman and Clerk shall ascertain the names of the members, not exceeding the required number, who have the greatest number of votes, and such members shall be declared by the Chairman to constitute such Committee. In case of an equality of votes between two or more members, the Chairman shall decide by lot which shall serve on the Committee.

25. *Adding Names to Committee.*—The names of members serving on any Committee may be altered or added to by resolution in the usual way.

26. *Chairman of Committee.*—Every Committee shall appoint its own Chairman, who shall have an original as well as a casting vote.

27. *Report of Committee.*—Upon the presentation of the report of a Committee, it shall be read, but no further steps be taken, except after the usual notice.

28. *Appointment of Officers.*—All officers of the Council shall be appointed by resolution of the Council. The names of all the candidates shall first be put to the vote, and the one having the smallest number of votes shall be struck off. The remainder shall then be again put to the vote, and the name having the smallest number of votes shall be struck off, and so on until there shall be an absolute majority of the members present for one of the candidates. In case of an equality of votes for two or more candidates, the Chairman shall decide which shall be struck off the list or be elected. The votes of members of the Council shall at the election of officers be taken by ballot.

29. *Lapsed Motions.*—All notices of motion not disposed of on their proper day, either in consequence of the absence of a quorum, or of the adjournment of the Council, shall be set down on the notice paper for the

next sitting day, after the notices given for that day.

30. *Petition*.—Every member presenting a petition shall affix his name at the head thereof; and no petition may be presented after the Council shall have proceeded with the business on the notice paper.

31. *Strangers*.—Until otherwise ordered, the sittings of the Council shall be private, but reporters for the public press may, upon application, be admitted, and may be allowed to take copies of the recorded proceedings of the Council. They may, however, at any time be ordered to withdraw by the Chairman, or by resolution of the Council.

32. *Suspension of By-Laws*.—Any one of these by-laws may be suspended at any sitting of the Council without notice, with the consent of not less than seven members.
