WEEDEN, WILLIAM, "The Halfway House," Great South Road.

## CONDITIONS.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, beside the taproom or room answering as such, one public and two private sitting-rooms.
2. Not less than thirteen beds for travellers in not less than four separate bedrooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.
4. At all times to keep a proper supply of water for the house, and for horses and cattle.
5. To keep at all times a proper supply of oats and oaten or grass hay: oats to be charged for to travellers at not more than 6d. per quart measure, and to be always served out with an imperial quart measure.
6. To provide and keep in repair good and sufficient stock-yard for cattle, capable of holding not less than 50 head.
7. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient moveable sheep-proof enclosure capable of holding not less than 2000 sheep, or at the option of the licensee.
8. To keep a lamp burning with two burners from sunset to sunrise, giving a sufficiently bright light and being so lighted as to be conspicuous from a distance all round the house.
9. Nil.
10. To be sworn in and to act as a constable, especially when required by the magistrates or the police.
11. On all occasions to render every assistance, and to supply information to magistrates and to the police in the execution of their duty.

12. To keep a clean and orderly house, and to render it as comfortable for the accommodation of travellers as the circumstances of position and distance from town will fairly allow.
13. Nil.
14. The license to be cancelled if any of the conditions of the license be not fulfilled regularly; or if any drunkenness be proved to have been allowed on the premises, or if any spirits shall be supplied from the house or premises to any Aboriginal Native of New Zealand.
15. A printed or fairly written copy of the Conditions to be kept at all times posted up in some conspicuous place in the tap-room in the public and in each private sitting-room for the information of travellers.
16. A tariff of charges to be kept posted up in like manner.
17. To provide a Visitors' Book, which shall be kept in a conspicuous part of the house, and be open to visitors and lodgers to insert any remark on the accommodation or attendance. The book to be open at all times to inspection by magistrates or the police, and to be sent to the Clerk of the Bench at Christchurch a week before the annual licensing meeting, for the purpose of being produced at that meeting.

**SHAKESPERE, EDMUND, the Halswell River.**

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room or room answering as such, one public sitting-room.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least two horses.

**VINCENT, WILLIAM, and STACE, OWEN, The Rakaia, "Dunford's Accommodation House."**

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and two private sitting-rooms. Also, to provide a separate room and special and proper accommodation for female travellers.
2. Not less than 20 beds for travellers, in not less than twelve separate bedrooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least twenty horses.

9. Not to keep a lamp burning at night outside the house.

20. The license to be suspended or void, at the option of the Bench, if the accommodation required by the license is not completed to the satisfaction of the Inspector of Police, by the 30th November, 1862.

**TURTON, WILLIAM, the "Ashburton Accommodation House."**

**REDFERN, SALATHIEL, Oxford, "Redfern's Accommodation House."**

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house,

besides the tap-room or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.

2. Not less than twelve beds for travellers, in not less than six separate bedrooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

**CAMERON, DONALD and DUNCAN, Saltwater Creek.**

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.
2. Not less than eight beds for travellers in not less than four separate bedrooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

18. License to be void if a certificate from the Inspector of Police at Kaiapoi, stating that the conditions of the license have been complied with, be not produced to the Resident Magistrate at Christchurch within three months from this date.

HASTIE, JOHN, "Accommodation House," South Bank of Hurunui.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

6. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient stock-yard for yoking up cattle.

Officers of the Supreme Court, magistrates, police constables on duty, and prisoners to be put across free of charge. To afford every assistance in his power in directing strangers to a safe fording.

18. Stalls to be put up in stables within three months from this date.

BURNS, JOHN, Ashburton. "Burn's Accommodation House."

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room or room answering as such, one sitting-room.

2. Not less than six beds for travellers in not less than three separate bedrooms.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least four horses.

4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12, 14, 16, 17, as Weeden's.

9 and 13. Nil.

6. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient stock-yard for cattle, not less than five panels square.

15. A printed or fairly-written copy of the conditions to be kept at all times posted up in some conspicuous place in the tap-room and in the sitting-room, for the information of travellers.

18. To plough and mark, to the satisfaction of the Provincial Government, a line from the Rakaia Ferry to his house, within two months from the time the road is staked out by the Government Engineer.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room for ladies and families, and one private room for gentlemen.
2. Not less than five beds for travellers in not less than four separate bedrooms; also, one large sleeping-room.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

9. Not to keep a lamp burning at night outside the house.
13. To afford every assistance in his power to direct strangers to a safe fording.
18. To put up and work ferry signals to the satisfaction of the Provincial Engineer.

HARDCASTLE, THOMAS, and GILL, JOHN, River Hinds. "Hardcastle's Accommodation House."

7. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient moveable sheep-proof enclosure, capable of holding not less than 2000 sheep; or, at the option of the licensee, to keep one acre of land enclosed by a permanent sheep-proof fence.
8. To keep a lamp burning with two burners, from sunset to sunrise, giving a sufficiently bright light, and being so lighted as to be conspicuous from a distance all round the house.
9. Nil.
10. To be sworn in and act as a constable, especially when required by the magistrates or the police.
11. On all occasions to render every assistance, and to supply information to magistrates and to the police in the execution of their duty.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room or room answering as such, one private sitting-room.

2. Not less than twelve beds for travellers in not less than five separate bed-rooms.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, same as William Stranks'.

13. To keep at all times a safe ferry-boat (punt) in good working order, and ready for conveyance of passengers across the Arowenua at all reasonable times between the hours of sunrise and sunset. The fare for passengers to be 6d. each when the rope can be used for working the punt, and one shilling when the rope cannot be used, and for every horse 2s. Officers of the Supreme Court, magistrates, and police constables on duty and prisoners to be ferried free of charge; and to keep a printed or fairly-written copy of the charges posted in some conspicuous place.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 14 and following, the same as William Stranks'.

FITCH, JAMES SAWYER, River Pareora, "Pareora Accommodation House."

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room or room answering as such, one public sitting-room.

2. Not less than eleven beds for travellers in not less than four separate bedrooms.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least four horses.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, the same as William Stranks'.

JONES, WILLIAM BENJAMIN, Mariki.

1. Same as William Stranks'.

2. Not less than six beds for travellers in not less than four separate bedrooms.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, the same as William Stranks'.

SMITH, DAVID, Waituna Creek. "Smith's Accommodation House."

1. Same as William Stranks'.

2. Not less than ten beds for travellers in not less than two separate bedrooms.

2. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least seven horses.

The remaining conditions, Nos. 4 and following, the same as William Stranks'.

WILSON, HENRY, River Waitangi. "Wilson's Waitangi Accommodation House."

1. Same as William Stranks'.

2. Not less than eight beds for travellers in not less than four separate bedrooms.
