PROCLAMATION.

PROCLAMATION.

I, SAMUEL BEALEY, Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, in pur-

suance of the powers vested in me by law, do hereby proclaim the Town of Timaru, as the same is herein-after defined, as a district for the purpose of regulating the slaughtering of cattle; and that, after the Fourteenth day of July next, no person shall keep a slaughter-house or place for the purpose of slaughtering cattle intended for sale, barter, shipping, or exportation, within the said district, except such house or place be duly licensed for that purpose, in manner provided by an Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council of New Zealand, Session VIII, No. 5:—

“ The Town of Timaru District comprises that part of the Province bounded on the north and east by the sea, on the south by the north boundary of section No. 1702, the north side of a road lying to the north of section No. 2367, the cemetery reserve 1706, and the north boundaries of sections 1706 and 1607, on the west by the east boundary of section No. 1606, the east and north boundary of section No. 707, the east boundary of section 1652, till it meets Whale's Creek, to the sea.”

A PROCLAMATION,

Extending the Jurisdiction of the Resident Magistrates' Courts at Christchurch, Lyttelton, Kaiapoi, and Wairarapa.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, Knight, Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c.

WHEREAS by the "Resident Magistrates' Jurisdiction Extension Act, 1862," it is enacted that every case of a claim for debt or damages, such as might at the passing of the said Act be lawfully tried in a Resident Magistrate's Court, where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed Twenty Pounds, may be tried in any Resident Magistrates' Court, with respect to which this Act shall be in operation when the debt or damages claimed do not exceed Fifty Pounds.

And it is provided that the Governor may, by proclamation in the Government Gazette of the Colony, declare that the limit of jurisdiction of any such Court shall be extended to One hundred Pounds, and such limit of jurisdiction shall be in such case extended accordingly.

Now, therefore, I, Sir GEORGE GREY, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the said recited Act, and of an Order in Council dated the Seventeenth day of December, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, authorising the issue of Proclamations under the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the provisions of the said recited Act, and especially the powers conferred by sections 2 and 3 thereof, shall be exercised to the limit of jurisdiction of One hundred Pounds in the Resident Magistrates' Courts at Christchurch, Lyttelton, Kaiapoi, and Wairarapa: And I do further proclaim and declare that this Proclamation shall take effect on and from the Eighth day of July, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.
