PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, in accordance with clause 19 of the "Municipal Council Ordinance, Sess. XIV, No. 2," the Municipal Council of Kaiapoi have made certain by-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, and for the general good rule and good government of the said Municipal District of Kaiapoi; and whereas these by-laws have been, by and with the advice of my Executive Council, assented to by me in accordance with the provisions of clause 28 of the said Ordinance: Now, therefore, I, SAMUEL BEALEY, Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, in pursuance of the powers vested in me in that behalf, do hereby declare such by-laws to be in force within the said district from and after the Twelfth day of December last.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

BY-LAWS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL  
OF KAIAPOI.

1. *Adjournment, if no Quorum.*—If, at the expiration of a quarter of an hour from the time appointed for meeting, there be not

present the quorum of five members, the Council shall stand adjourned to the next sitting day.

2. *Adjournment, if Members reduced below Quorum.*—If at any time after the commencement of business it be noticed that there is not a quorum of members present, the Chairman shall adjourn the Council to the next sitting day.

3. *Time of Meeting.*—Unless otherwise ordered by resolution of the Council, the Council shall sit on every Monday evening, at seven o'clock, excepting during May, June, July, and August, and during these months at six o'clock.

4. *Special Meetings.*—The Clerk of the Council shall, by circular notes, call a special meeting of the Council, on a requisition from the Chairman, or from any three members. The notice convening such meeting shall state the business proposed to be transacted thereat.

5. *Chairman.*—The Chairman may address the Council on any business before it, but may not move or second a resolution.

6. *Questions of Order, and cases unprovided for.*—All questions of order or form shall be decided by the Chairman. He shall also decide in all cases not provided for by these rules, taking for his guide the usage of the Provincial Council so far as the same is applicable to the proceedings of this Council. In the event of any appeal against the decision of the Chairman, the same shall be decided at the next sitting of the Council, in the same manner as any other question brought before such Council.

7. *Chairman to provide for Custody of Books, &c.*—The Chairman shall make all

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necessary regulations for the convenience of members of the Council, and the custody of books and records.

8. *Minutes.*—The Clerk shall at each sitting of the Council keep draft minutes of the proceedings at such sitting. Such minutes shall afterwards be fairly entered in a Minute Book, and shall be submitted for approval at the next sitting of the Council; when approved, they shall be signed by the Chairman of the sitting of which they are a record.

9. *Notice Book.*—The Clerk shall keep a Notice Book, in which he shall enter all the notices of motion given by members of the Council, in the order in which they are given; and all such notices shall be called on by the Chairman in the order in which they are entered in the Notice Book; but, by leave of the Council, the consideration of any notice may be deferred to a later period of the sitting.

10. *Limitation on Speaking.*—Every member, when speaking, shall address the Chair, standing. No member shall speak except on some motion before the Council; nor shall any member (except the mover of a resolution) speak twice on the same motion, unless a "free discussion" shall have been resolved on.

11. *Breaches of Order.*—The Chairman shall at once call to order any member proceeding to speak twice on the same question, or introducing irrelevant matter into his speech, or any member using unbecoming language. A member called to order by the Chairman shall immediately sit down.

12. *Questions of Order.*—Questions of order may be forthwith taken into consideration whenever they arise.

13. *Notices of Motion.*—It is desirable that subjects of importance should only be brought under the consideration of the Council in pursuance of a notice given in writing, and read at some previous sitting. Such notices may be given at any convenient opportunity in the course of the sitting. No resolution of which such previous notice has not been given shall be adopted, except with the concurrence of at least five members of the Council. Nor shall any such resolution, except by special permission of the Council, be entertained, of which notice has not been given immediately after the reading of the minutes of the previous sitting. The relative order in which the subjects to be considered at any meeting of the Council shall be so considered shall be determined by the Chairman, subject to alteration by resolution of the Council.

14. *Motions in Writing.*—Every motion or amendment (except matters of form) shall be handed to the Chairman in writing.

15. *Motions not Seconded.*—Every motion or amendment not seconded shall drop, without debate.

16. *Motion not to be Withdrawn.*—After a motion has been put by the Chairman, it cannot be withdrawn without the leave of the Council.

17. *Amendments.*—Amendments to any motion may be moved without notice. No amendments may be moved upon an amend-

ment. An amendment to a motion shall be put before the motion, and, if carried, the motion as amended shall then be put.

18. *Transfer of Motion.*—Any member by whom notice of motion has been given may authorise any other member to move the same in his absence.

19. *Adjournment.*—A motion for adjournment may be made at any time, but not so as to interrupt a member speaking. If such motion be negatived, no new motion to the same effect may be moved within a quarter of an hour.

20. *Resumption of Adjourned Debate.*—The member upon whose motion any debate shall have been adjourned shall be entitled to pre-audience on the resumption of the debate, unless he has previously spoken.

21. *Divisions.*—Every question put to the vote shall be put first in the affirmative, and then in the negative, when the Chairman shall declare by the sound of voices which party has the majority. If a division be required by any member, the Chairman shall put the question "Aye" or "No" to each member, *seriatim*, and shall declare the result by a list to be made up by the Clerk.

22. *All Members present to Vote.*—Every member present when a question is put to the vote must vote.

23. *Appointment of Committees.*—A motion for the appointment of a Standing or Select Committee shall state the number of which it is to consist, and be accompanied by a list of the names of the members proposed to be placed on such Committee; but the two motions shall be considered separate questions, and shall be put separately to the Council. Any member may, as an amendment, propose other names than those which have been proposed.

24. *Mode of appointing Committee.*—Upon the appointment of a Committee having been agreed to, any member may require it to be formed in manner following. Each member present shall give to the Clerk a list of the members proposed by him to serve on such Committee. Any list containing a larger number of names than that fixed for the Committee shall be void. When all the lists are collected, the Chairman and Clerk shall ascertain the names of the members, not exceeding the required number, who have the greatest number of votes, and such members shall be declared by the Chairman to constitute such Committee. In case of an equality of votes between two or more members, the Chairman shall decide by lot which shall serve on the Committee.

25. *Adding Names to Committee.*—The names of members serving on any Committee may be altered or added to by resolution in the usual way.

26. *Chairman of Committee.*—Every Committee shall appoint its own Chairman, who shall have an original as well as a casting vote.

27. *Appointment of Officers.*—All officers of the Council shall be appointed by resolution of the Council. The names of all the candidates shall first be put to the vote, and the one having the smallest number of votes

shall be struck off. The remainder shall then be again put to the vote, and the name having the smallest number of votes shall be struck off; and so on until there shall be an absolute majority of the members present for one of the candidates. In case of an equality of votes for two or more candidates, the Chairman shall decide which shall be struck off the list or be elected. The votes of members of the Council shall, at the election of officers be taken by ballot.

28. *Lapsed Motions.*—All notices of motion not disposed of on their proper day, either in consequence of the absence of a quorum, or of the adjournment of the Council, shall be set down on the notice paper for the next sitting day, previous to the notices given for that day.

29. *Petition.*—Every member presenting a petition shall affix his name at the head thereof; and no petition may be presented after the Council shall have proceeded to the business of the sitting.

30. *Strangers.*—Until otherwise ordered, the sittings of the Council shall be private, but reporters for the public press may upon application be admitted, and may be allowed to take copies of the recorded proceedings of the Council. They may, however, at any time be ordered to withdraw by the Chairman, or by resolution of the Council.

31. *Suspension of Rules.*—Any one of these rules may be suspended at any sitting of the Council without notice, with the consent of not less than seven members.

#### A PROCLAMATION

*Disallowing certain Ordinances passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Canterbury.*

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act made and enacted in the Imperial Parliament, holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to grant a Representative Constitution to the Colony of New Zealand," it is amongst other things enacted that whenever any Bill shall have been assented to by the Superintendent, as in the said Act provided, the Superintendent shall forthwith transmit to the Governor an authentic copy thereof, and it shall be lawful for the Governor, at any time within three months after any such Bill shall have been received by him, to declare, by Proclamation, his disallowance of such Bill, and that any such disallowance shall make void and annul the same, from and after the day of such Proclamation, or any subsequent date to be named therein:

And whereas the Ordinances hereinafter specified have been enacted by the Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof, and the said Ordinances were received by the Governor on the twentieth day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Ordinances should be disallowed:

Now, therefore, I, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the authority vested in me in that behalf by the said recited Act

of Parliament, do hereby proclaim and declare my disallowance of the following Ordinances passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Canterbury, viz. :—

"The Wakefield Settled Estate Ordinance 1864."

"The Christ's College Loan Ordinance 1864."

#### A PROCLAMATION

*For the Naturalization of certain Persons.*

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, Knight Commander of the most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the "Naturalization Act, 1863," it is enacted that every person who shall be declared to come within the operation of that Act by any Proclamation, to be issued in that behalf by His Excellency the Governor, shall, as from the time in such Proclamation specified, be deemed and taken, until the termination of the next Session of the General Assembly, to be, and to have been from such specified time, a natural-born subject of Her Majesty within the Colony of New Zealand, as fully to all intents and purposes as if his name had been inserted in the Schedule to that Act annexed: Provided always that every such Proclamation shall contain the description, occupation, or calling of every person therein named, and his place of residence at the date of such Proclamation.

Now, therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested by the said Act, do hereby proclaim and declare that the persons hereinafter mentioned shall come within the operation of the said Act from the dates hereinafter specified, viz. :—

CHARLES WARREN,

from the Second day of March, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, native of Sweden, master mariner; residence, Lyttelton, in the Province of Canterbury.

CHARLES LEWERTSON,

from the Second day of March, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, native of Denmark, master mariner; residence, Lyttelton, in the Province of Canterbury.

MAXIMILIAN ALEXANDRE,

from the First day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, native of Prussia, jeweller and watchmaker; residence, Blenheim, in the Province of Marlborough.

#### *Dog Island (Foveaux Straits) Lighthouse.*

Dog Island Lighthouse is situated on a small island of that name in Foveaux Straits, off the entrance to the Bluff Harbour, in 46° 39' 35" South latitude, and 168° 26' East longitude, as measured on the Admiralty chart.

The light will show all round, and will be a Holophotal Dioptric Revolving White Light, of the first order, attaining its greatest brilliancy every half-minute.

It will be elevated about 150 feet above the level of the sea, and will be visible in clear weather about eighteen nautical miles, allowing fifteen feet for the height of the observer's eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The tower is built of native stone of a grey colour, and will be 118 feet in height from the ground to the top of the lantern.

This light is expected to be ready for permanent exhibition not later than April, 1865.

#### *Mana Island (Cook's Straits) Lighthouse.*

Mana Island Lighthouse is now in course of erection on the north-western promontory of Mana Island, off the entrance to Porirua Harbour, on the eastern shore of Cook's Straits, in 41° 5' south latitude and 174° 48' east longitude, as measured on the Admiralty Chart.

The light will be a Fixed Dioptric White Light of the second order, and will be seen in every direction where not intercepted by land.

The light will be elevated about 450 feet above the sea, and will be visible in clear weather about 29 nautical miles, allowing fifteen feet for the height of the observer's eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The tower will be seventy feet in height, from the base to the vane.

This light is expected to be ready for permanent exhibition in March, 1865.

*Godley Head (Banks' Peninsula) Lighthouse.*

Godley Head Lighthouse is situated on Godley (or Cachalot) Head, forming the north-western entrance of Port Lyttelton, Banks' Peninsula, in  $43^{\circ} 35' 32''$  South latitude and  $172^{\circ} 49' 30''$  East longitude, as measured on the Admiralty Chart.

The light will be a Fixed Dioptric White Light of the second order, is elevated about 450 feet above the level of the sea, and illuminating an arc of  $200^{\circ}$ . It will be visible from seaward, in clear weather, about 29 nautical miles, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere, from E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S., round by the north to about N.N.W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W.

The tower will be thirty feet in height from base to vane.

This light is expected to be ready for permanent exhibition about March, 1865.

*Tairoa's Head Lighthouse.*

Tairoa's Head Lighthouse is situated on the headland bearing that name, on the east or seaward side of the entrance to Otago Harbour, in  $45^{\circ} 47'$  South latitude, and  $170^{\circ} 45'$  East longitude, as measured on the Admiralty Charts.

The light will be a Fixed Dioptric Red Light of the third order, and will be seen to seaward from about E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N., round by the North to about N.W.; and up the Harbour it will show from about W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S. to about S.W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W., the latter line indicating the turning-point of the Cross Channel.

The light will be elevated about 196 feet above the level of the sea, and will be visible in clear weather about 20 nautical miles, allowing fifteen feet for the height of the observer's eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

The tower, which, together with the dwelling-houses, will be painted white, will be

$39\frac{1}{2}$  feet high from the ground to the top of the lantern.

This light is expected to be ready for permanent exhibition on and after the night of Monday, January 2, 1865.

Note.—All the bearings given in the above notice are compass bearings from the Lighthouse.
