HIS Honor the Superintendent directs it to be notified that he has made the

following Reserves, temporarily, under the 19th clause of the Waste Land Regulations; viz:—

No. 422, in red.—Fifteen acres, more or less, situate in the Bealey Town, commencing at a point on the western bank of the River Bealey, the same being one chain fifty links south-east of the south-eastern corner of section No. 32, thence westerly following a line parallel to and one chain distant from the southern boundary of that section a distance of ten chains seventy links, thence southerly at a right angle a distance of nine chains fifty links to the northern bank of the Waimakariri, following that bank in a south-easterly direction to the western bank of the River Bealey before-mentioned, and from thence returning along the same to the commencing point—for the uses of the Provincial Government, and other public purposes, and particularly for a ferry.

No. 423, in red.—One acre three roods, more or less, commencing at a point on the northern boundary of the Bealey Town where it is crossed by the eastern side of the West Coast road, following that road in a northerly direction a distance of eight chains, thence easterly at a right angle a distance of two chains thence southerly again at a right angle a distance of nine chains sixty links to the boundary before-mentioned, and from thence returning along the same to the commencing

point—for the uses of the Provincial Government, and for other public purposes, and particularly for a police station.

No. 424, in red.—Four hundred and seventy acres, more or less, situate in the Malvern district, commencing at the intersection of the road north-west of the gorge hill estate with the Tramway Reserve, following that reserve in a south-easterly direction a distance of forty-two chains fifty links, thence south-westerly following a straight line to a point on the southern bank of the River Hawkins, the same being twenty-six chains west of the north-western corner of section No. 8040, thence south-westerly following a line parallel to the north-western boundary of that section, a distance of forty chains, thence westerly following a straight line to the south-eastern corner of section No. 3719, following northerly along the eastern boundary of that section to the road first before-mentioned, and from thence returning along that road to the commencing point—for the uses of the Provincial Government, and for other public purposes.

No. 425, in red.—Sixty-five acres, more or less, situate in the Malvern District, being bounded on the north by Porter's Pass road, on the east by section No. 6471, on the south by a line in continuation of the southern boundary of that section, and on the west by I.P.R.C. on Run No. 130, and a line in continuation of the eastern boundary of the same—for the uses of the Provincial Government, and other public purposes.

No. 426, in red.—One hundred and fifty acres, more or less, situate at Craigie Burn, being bounded on the north by Reserve No. 387, and a line in continuation of the south-western boundary of the same reserve, on the north-west by a line in continuation of the north-western boundary of Reserve No. 205, on the south-east by the Craigie Burn, and on the south-west by the before-mentioned Reserve No. 205—for the uses of the Provincial Government, and other public purposes.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and two private sitting-rooms.

2. To provide not less than twenty-five beds for travellers, in not less than fifteen separate bedrooms.

3. To provide a shed, sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least twelve horses.

4. At all times to keep a proper supply of water for the house, and for horses and cattle; and to provide, in a convenient position, a proper trough for watering cattle.

5. To keep at all times a proper supply of oats, and oaten or grass hay. Oats to be charged for to travellers at not more than 6d per quart, and to be always served out with the authorised quart measure.

6. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient stockyard for cattle, containing a superficial area of not less than 225 square yards. For the occupation of this yard during the night, the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following, viz.:—Twopence per head for all cattle under 50 in number, and one penny per head for all over that number.

7. To provide and keep in repair a good and movable sheep-proof yard, containing a superficial area of not less than 900 square yards; or, at the option of the licensee, to keep one acre of land enclosed by a permanent sheep-proof fence. For the occupation of this yard or paddock during the night, the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following; viz.—Sixpence per score for all sheep under 300 in number, fourpence per score for all over that number and under 500, and two-pence per score for all over 500.

8. To keep a lamp burning, with two burners, from sunset to sunrise, giving a sufficiently bright light, and being so lighted as

to be conspicuous from a distance all round the house.

9. To be sworn in and act as a constable; especially when required by the Magistrates or the police.

10. On all occasions to render every assistance, and to supply information to Magistrates, and to the police, in the execution of their duty.

11. To keep a clean and orderly house, and to render it as comfortable for the accommodation of travellers as the circumstances of position and distance from towns will fairly allow.

12. Nil.

13. The licenses to be cancelled by order of any three Justices of the Peace, if it be proved to their satisfaction that any of the conditions of the license are not regularly fulfilled; or if any drunkenness be proved to have been allowed on the premises, or if any spirits shall be supplied from the house or premises to any aboriginal Native of New Zealand.

14. A printed or fairly written copy of these conditions, and a tariff of all charges, to be kept at all times posted up in some conspicuous place in the tap-room, and all the sitting-rooms, for the information of travellers.

15. To provide a visitor's book, which shall be kept in the custody of the licensee; but whenever asked for shall be produced to visitors and lodgers, for the insertion of any remarks on the accommodation or attendance; a notice to this effect to be kept posted in the same manner as the tariff of charges. The book to be open at all times to inspection by the Magistrates or police, and to be sent to the Clerk of the Bench at Christchurch, a week before the annual licensing meeting, for the purpose of being produced at that meeting.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in their house, besides the taproom, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.

2. To provide not less than five beds for travellers, in not less than three separate bedrooms.

3. To provide a shed, sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least five horses.

Conditions 4 and 5 same as Savage's.

6. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient stockyard for cattle, to be large enough to contain 100 head. For the occupation of this yard during the night, the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following, viz.:—Twopence per

head for all cattle under 50 in number, and one penny per head for all over that number.

7. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient movable sheep-proof yard, to be large enough to contain 1000 sheep; or, at the option of the licensee, to keep one acre of land enclosed by a permanent sheep-proof fence. For the occupation of this yard or paddock during the night, the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following, viz.:—Sixpence per score for all sheep under 300 in number, fourpence per score for all over that number and under 500, and twopence per score for all over 500.

Conditions 8, 9, 10 and 11 same as Savage's.
