COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

SHIP "JOHN TEMPERLEY."

THE Commissioners have to report, that on their visit to the ship "John Temperley" they found the various compartments for the most part in a tolerable state of cleanliness. The arrangements were, however, defective, and especially the position of the female hospital, which is placed exactly abreast of the main hatchway, and consequently exposed to all the noise consequent upon the daily serving out of stores, and open to the effects of rain and the shipping of seas.

The Commissioners regret to be compelled to report that several of the single females appear, from the commencement of the voyage, to have caused great trouble by their riotous conduct; four of these are reported as having been imprisoned for misconduct in a cell built for the purpose. The bulkheads separating their compartment from that of the married immigrants were originally very slight, and required strengthening by barricading, having been repeatedly broken down by the girls during the voyage.

The Matron was totally inefficient, having no control over those in her charge.

The Commissioners regret to state that the Surgeon was totally unfit for the position in which he was placed, and they are unable to recommend him either for further employment or the receipt of the usual gratuity.

The Graveley's distilling apparatus acted satisfactorily throughout the voyage.

The Commissioners have again to deprecate the mixing of several classes of passengers (second-class and steerage) in a vessel containing immigrants. They have much pleasure in recommending the Captain and Officers for their gratuities.

CONDITIONAL LICENSES.

WILLIAM ADAMS — THE WILBER-FORCE.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair.
2. To provide not less than six beds for travellers, in not less than two separate bedrooms.
3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.
4. At all times to keep a proper supply of water for the house, and for horses and cattle.
5. To keep at all times a proper supply of oats and oaten or grass hay.
6. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient stockyard for cattle. For the occupation of this yard during the night, the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following, viz.:—Twopence per head for all cattle under 50 in number, and one penny per head for all over that number.
7. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient sheepyard, or at the option of the licensee, to keep one acre of land enclosed by a permanent sheep-proof fence. For the occupation of this yard or paddock during the night, the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following, viz.:—Sixpence per score for all sheep under 300 in number, fourpence per score for all over that number

and under 500, and twopence per score for all over 500.

8. To keep a lamp burning with two burners, from sunset to sunrise, giving a sufficiently bright light, and being so lighted as to be conspicuous from a distance all round the house.

9. To be sworn in and to act as a constable, especially when required by the Magistrates or the Police.

10. On all occasions to render every assistance, and to supply information to Magistrates and to the Police in the execution of their duty.

11. To keep a clean and orderly house, and to render it as comfortable for the accommodation of travellers as the circumstances of position and distance from towns will fairly allow.

12. To keep at all times a safe ferry-boat (punt) in good working order, and two horses, for conveyance of passengers across the river, between the hours of six a.m. and eight p.m. in summer, and between the hours of eight a.m. and five p.m. in winter. The fare to be as follows:—For foot passengers, two shillings each between the hours above named; the fares to be doubled at all other times; for sheep, not exceeding 600 twopence per head, exceeding that number at the rate of £2 per 1000; for crossing horses, when punt is used, two shillings and sixpence; for showing the ford to horsemen, drays, &c., one shilling; for

crossing travellers on horse provided by lessee, one shilling; officers of the Supreme Court, magistrates and police constables on duty, and prisoners, to be ferried free of charge. To afford every assistance in his power in directing strangers to a safe fording across the river.

13. The license to be cancelled by any three Justices of the Peace, if it be proved to their satisfaction that any of the conditions of the license are not regularly fulfilled, or if any drunkenness be proved to have been allowed on the premises, or if any spirits shall be supplied from the house or premises to any Aboriginal Native of New Zealand.

14. A printed or fairly written copy of these conditions and a tariff of all charges to be kept at all times posted up in some conspicuous place in the tap-room, and in all the sitting-rooms, for the information of travellers.

15. To provide a Visitor's Book, which shall be kept in the custody of the licensee, but whenever asked for shall be produced to visitors and lodgers for the insertion of any remark on the accommodation or attendance; a notice to this effect to be kept posted in the same manner as the tariff of charges. The book to be open at all times to inspection by Magistrates or the Police, and to be sent to the Clerk of the Bench, at Christchurch, a week before the annual licensing meeting, for the purpose of being produced at that meeting.

BEDFORD, GEORGE—COAL TRACK.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.

2. To provide not less than six beds for travellers, in not less than three separate bed-rooms.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight, and fit for the accommodation of at least six horses.

4. At all times to keep a proper supply of water for the house, and for horses and cattle, and to provide, in a convenient position, a proper trough for watering cattle.

5. To keep at all times a proper supply of oats, and oaten or grass hay. Oats to be charged for to travellers at not more than 6d per quart, and to be always served out with the authorised quart measure.

6. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient stockyard for cattle, containing a superficial area of not less than 225 square yards. For the occupation of this yard during the night, the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following, viz.—Twopence per head for all cattle under 50 in number, and one penny per head for all over that number.

7. To provide and keep in repair a good and movable sheep-proof yard, containing a superficial area of not less than 900 square yards; or, at the option of the licensee, to keep one acre of land enclosed by a permanent sheep-proof fence. For the occupation of this yard or paddock during the night, the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following, viz.—Sixpence per score for all sheep under 300 in number, fourpence per score for all over that number and under 500, and twopence per score for all over 500.

8. To keep a lamp burning, with two burners, from sunset to sunrise, giving a sufficiently bright light, and being so lighted as to be conspicuous from a distance all round the house.

9. To be sworn in and act as a constable, especially when required by the Magistrates or the Police.

10. On all occasions to render every assistance, and to supply information to Magistrates, and to the Police, in the execution of their duty.

11. To keep a clean and orderly house, and

to render it as comfortable for the accommodation of travellers as the circumstances of position and distance from towns will fairly allow.

12. Nil.

13. 1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room, and one ladies' room.
