HIS Honor the Superintendent directs it to be notified that the portion of rural section No. 366, in the Mandeville District hereinafter described, has been dedicated to the public as a Public Highway:—

Commencing at a point on the southern boundary of the said section, five chains fifty-seven links, from the south-eastern corner of the said section; running thence northerly in a straight line parallel with, and five chains fifty-seven links, distant from the eastern boundary of the said section to the northern boundary thereof; thence westerly along the said northern boundary, one chain or thereabouts; thence at a right angle southerly, thirteen chains forty links; thence at a right angle westerly, five chains fifty-seven links; thence at a right angle southerly, one chain; thence at a right angle easterly, five chains fifty-seven links; thence at a right angle southerly, fifteen chains thirty links; thence at a right angle westerly, five chains fifty-seven links; thence at a right angle southerly, one chain; thence at a right angle easterly, five chains fifty-seven links; thence at a right angle southerly, eleven chains fifty-nine links to the southern boundary of the said section; and thence easterly along the said southern boundary, one chain, or thereabouts, to the commencing point.

THE Provincial Government of Canterbury, New Zealand, is prepared to receive proposals for the construction of a Railway between Christchurch and the South Bank of the River Kowai, a distance of about twenty-six miles, in accordance with the following resolutions of the Provincial Council:—

- “1. That capitalists be invited to undertake the construction of a cheap Railway from Christchurch to the South Bank of the Kowai, and to furnish the necessary rolling stock, buildings, &c.”
- “2. That it be a request to the Government to take by Ordinance or otherwise such steps as may be necessary to make £30,000 of the unexpended balance of the loan, and any interest that may accrue thereon, available as a fund for guaranteeing capitalists' interest on the cost of the said Railway.”
- “3. That before any tender be accepted the sanction of the Provincial Council be first obtained.”

It is important to observe the effect of the special grant system as applied to certain Schools; a careful observation or enquiry into the working of the system since its introduction, can only lead to the conclusion that it has interested parents, residents, and the Teachers in securing a good attendance. There can be no doubt that the Oxford, Harewood, Rangiora Girls', Tai Tapu, and Little Akaloa Schools, are better attended under this than under the ordinary system, and better than in similar Districts where the grant is administered on a different principle. For example, Arowhenua, Leithfield, Ashley, Upper Heathcote, Okain's Bay, &c., Schools, in Districts where the number of children far exceeds the number at School; if these Schools would not be better attended under the special grant system, a great economy of the grant would be effected.

This system not only secures a larger but also a more punctual attendance than otherwise.

Government aid in England is also administered by a Capitation Grant, for all children who have attended School not less than 176 days in the year, and who can pass an examination in certain standards prescribed for the respective classes.

The manner of testing the average here, has resulted favourably to the recipients of the grant; the number present on the fine and favourable days selected for the examinations without notice, having mostly proved greater than the averages according to the Quarterly Returns. The register and returns might therefore prove a fairer and more correct criterion.

With further reference to the subject of efficiency, I would offer a few criteria which may prove interesting to School managers and Teachers. They are gathered from observation of the results in the Quarterly and Annual Returns, and are these:—

1. The approximation of the quarterly and annual number of attendants.
2. The relation of the average daily attendants to the number of attendants during the quarter.
3. The proportionate number of girls to boys, in mixed Schools.
4. The relation of the amount of School fees to the average attendance.
5. The arrears of School fees.

These criteria are not infallible; they are affected by local and other peculiar circumstances. They afford a general rule of similar data leading to similar results.

I.—As to the approximation of Quarterly and Annual number of Attendants.

It must be evident that where there is a constant source of dissatisfaction to parents, there will be frequent removals of children; their places may be filled up by others, but this only increases the discrepancy between the several results of attendance.

II.—The average Daily Attendance is liable to be similarly affected.

The total average for the quarter is nearly 2000, the total number of attendants nearly 3000; from this result two-thirds of the actual number of attendants is a fair average. With a close and concentrated population as at Lyttelton and the Bays a larger average, and in more scattered districts a less average, may be reasonably expected.

III.—The proportionate number of Girls to Boys.

The number of girls in actual and average attendance is little more than two-thirds of the number of boys. In the towns the proportion of girls is less, owing to the number of private Schools for girls. In country Schools the larger proportion of girls is a criterion of an orderly School, for few parents will send their girls to a disorderly one.

The presence of a Mistress on the premises increases the confidence of parents. Her assistance in School and in instructing in sewing, is a further inducement to send the girls. The constant attendance of an efficient female Teacher, should increase the attendance of both girls and younger children.

With a Mistress in full attendance but with a small proportion of girls, there is fair reason for questioning the character and efficiency of a School.

The large proportion of girls at the Papanui, Timaru, and Woodend Schools, which enjoy the constant services of efficient Mistresses, is as remarkable as the small proportion at other Schools where the services of the Mistress, from ill-health or other causes are merely nominal.

IV.—*The relation of the amount of School Fees to the average Attendance.*

In some Schools the amount of fees is swollen by subscriptions, as at Governor's Bay and Governor's Bay North; but generally they will not amount to more than £2 2s. per average attendant per annum, or twice as many guineas as the annual average, a higher amount implies a high and exclusive rate of fees as at Arowhenua. At the ordinary rate of one shilling per week, the fees should not amount to less than the above standard. Unless the discrepancy can be explained, there must either be laxity in the collection of the fees or incorrectness in the account. Lower fees secure larger attendance.

V.—*Arrears of School Fees.*

Large arrears indicate defective arrangements either as to the rate of fees, or, as to their collection. They may possibly also be an indication of inefficiency, for a Teacher who, is not giving satisfaction to the parents, cannot insist upon the punctual payment of School fees.

(FEBRUARY 26—MARCH 25, 1869.)

INSPECTOR'S REPORT FOR THE MONTH.

TO THE HON. H. J. TANCRED, CHAIRMAN.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit a Summary Report on the Schools examined during the month.

OF THE SCHOOLS EXAMINED:—

St Luke's School, ... February 27 ... Present, 120 ... The attendance and efficiency are on the increase. The square shape of the room is inconvenient; if the funds of the Committee would permit the alteration, several advantages would result from an oblong arrangement of the present area.

1. Good order could be maintained with less harass to the Teachers.
2. There would be less draft.
3. The light, warming, and ventilation would be improved.

Two of the elder pupils, intelligent and well behaved, have been advanced by the Teachers or managers to the position of pupil-teachers. Their services are more than equivalent to those of a single Assistant in their place. An Assistant, however, efficiently instructs alternate classes in a branch School-room.

Lower Heathcote, ... March 1 ... Present, 33 ... The School has not fulfilled the promise of last quarter's more favourable examination. It is split up into too many little classes, seven in all; much time must be lost in their separate instruction. The Bible knowledge, Reading, and Arithmetic are inferior.

Christchurch R. C. Boys' School, March 2 ... Present, 70 ... (including the infant class from the Convent School.) Satisfactory.

Papanui, St. Paul's School, March 3 ... Satisfactory ... Some very creditable attempts were made at maps of New Zealand or parts of it.

Avonside School, ... March 4 ... Present, 46 ... Slowly improving. The inferiority of the reading is mainly attributable to the children not having their own books. They thus lose the use of them at all times, except when up at class. They get no home lessons. No benefit accrues to themselves or others at home from the use of their books on evenings, holidays, and wet days. Each child should buy his own book; and there should be a small surplus stock, belonging to the School.

Upper Heathcote, ... March 5 ... Present, 28 ... Considerable pains are taken and the results are in some respects creditable. Bible, Writing, and Arithmetic, satisfactory; Reading and Spelling, with a few exceptions deficient, especially in the lower classes. The latter seem to have not had their full share of attention.

The following improvements are also desirable:—

1. A better arrangement of the desks as more conducive to good order and satisfactory progress.
2. Greater cleanliness, neatness, and order.
3. Easier gradations of reading books.

Kaiapoi Wesleyan School, ... March 8 ... Present, 62 ... Satisfactory. The higher classes are small in number, and comparatively low in attainment; the attendance of the older children is interrupted by occasional work. The progress of the younger and more regular attendants is very creditable.

Woodend School, ... March 9 ... Present, 30 ... Satisfactory. The School has been conducted during harvest; the holidays having been at Christmas. The younger children have reaped the full benefit, in the absence of the older ones; their attainments reflect great credit upon the faithful and diligent services of an efficient Master and Mistress.

Okain's Bay School, ... February 4 & 6 ... Present 35 ... Very satisfactory. The children are thoroughly interested in their school work. The parents appear to have confidence in the Teacher. There is always something more to be learned. From these causes children here are induced to stay on beyond the early age at which many leave other Schools. There is a constant supply of suitable books and apparatus. The attainments are creditable. A good general knowledge of the Bible extends to even the younger classes. The first two classes wrote papers, and the third class on slate, short accounts of several Bible events. The reading is carefully taught. The first and second classes wrote from dictation. The written spelling of the second class was fair, but not above the average. About two-thirds of the School write creditable copy-books. Of the rest, most of them can write their names, and nearly all are learning to write on slate. The Arithmetical knowledge includes the Multiplication Table by two-thirds of the School; and good "ciphering" up to the compound rules, in the second, and to the higher rules and cubic root, in the first-class. The two highest classes are learning History; Geography is more generally taught. Creditable outlines of parts of New Zealand were drawn from memory. The study of Algebra and Mensuration, &c., by two more advanced pupils, does not interrupt the general course. They can work steadily by themselves, with only an occasional reference to the Teacher.

Little Akaloa School, ... February 5 ... Present 37 ... This School has made a very marked improvement under the present Teacher and his predecessor. Both instances shew the advantage of having a married Teacher, although the wife, as here, may take no active part in the School routine. The more punctual and regular attendance,—the exquisite neatness of the time table and the register, the creditable copy-books, and generally the improved order, are more particularly commendable. Quiet energy secures complete control without fuss or noise. The progress since last examination is satisfactory.

Duvauchelle's Bay School, ... February 8 ... Present 30 ... Much improved.

Pigeon Bay ... February 8 & 9 Present 24 ... Satisfactory.

Papanui Wesleyan School... February 12 ... Present 43 ... Much improved, more especially in the younger classes. The elder boys require more strict control.

St. Albans School ... February 7 ... Present 60 ... Several classes were short of books. This partly explains the bad reading of the Third Book and Second Book classes. But the latter book is too difficult for the class using it. The copy-books are hurriedly and carelessly done; they do not shew signs of regular and careful supervision.

Christchurch Convent School, February 16 ... Present 59 Girls (and a number of little boys, who will be examined on another occasion with the Boys' School). The School is in admirable order. The children and their books are remarkably neat and clean. The classes, with one exception, answered well in Bible history. Considerable accuracy in this subject and in the secular knowledge indicate careful teaching.

Ohch. St. Andrew's School... February 17 ... Present 59 ... This small and low-roofed room is quite inadequate to the number of children cooped up in it. Its enlargement, or the removal of the School to a more commodious building, is becoming a matter of urgent necessity. The attendance and efficiency are well sustained, notwithstanding the neighbourhood of several good private and other Schools. The attainments are highly creditable. The Mistress appears to be over-tasked, though of most unflagging energy.

Christchurch Wesleyan School, February 18 ... Present 130 ... Satisfactory.

Christchurch St. Michael's ... February 24 ... Present 108 ... Satisfactory.

Two Candidates for appointments have passed their examinations satisfactorily, and have obtained certificates.

Walter J. Sercombe, for any vacant appointment; John S. Ward for the Mastership of the Mount Grey Downs School.

Details of the School examinations are entered in the Journal.

INSPECTOR'S SUMMARY REPORT FOR THE MONTH.

TO THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD.

SIR,—I have the honour to submit a Summary Report on the Schools examined during the month.

Broadfields School ... January 11 ... Present 23 ... The desks are better arranged than in October last. The organization and discipline are improved. The progress of the pupils is very creditable.

Southbridge School ... January 12 ... Present 27 ... The *site* is a good selection. It is well fenced by a sod wall and a ditch. The exposed situation requires the shelter of a live fence and trees. The buildings are well finished and painted. The School-room is of sufficient height; it is provided with suitable means of light, warmth, and ventilation. The premises are in excellent order. A well has been sunk. The books, apparatus, and fittings are, on the whole, satisfactory, and sufficient for the present requirements, but the desks are ill-contrived and unsuitable, some as to steadiness others as to height, and in other respects. The Chairman of the Local Committee has taken notes of the proper height, dimensions, and arrangement of suitable desks. The School is commencing satisfactorily under a trained Teacher of considerable experience. It was very satisfactory to observe that the education of the children had been cared for before the establishment of a School; their attainments were so far very creditable.

South Selwyn School ... January 13 ... Present 14 ... Seven of whom came at and after ten o'clock. Allowing a quarter of an hour for difference of time, in a very out of the way district, *there were 11 present at ten o'clock*. There is some but not a satisfactory improvement in cleanliness, neatness, and order since last examination. The exemplary state of the Springston, Leeston, Southbridge, and other neighbouring Schools, cannot be expected from this School with its inferior

appliances, but it is capable of great improvement. It was better under the former Master. The register and copy-books shewed the same want of care neatness, and cleanliness as the room. With the exception of the copy-book, of Arthur Stewart, an older pupil of the former Master, and now not much at School, those of the children present at the examination were either dirty, hurriedly written and uncorrected, or ill-adapted to the capability of new Scholars. The Bible knowledge is very inferior, with the exception of that of Stewart above-mentioned, and of the Mawsons, from Leeston School. The secular knowledge of the three Watsons, Stewart, and Mawson, sen., are very creditable; the lower classes are less satisfactory than the small numbers and large time at the Teacher's disposal would warrant. There is, however, a desire to remedy existing defects.

INSPECTOR'S SUMMARY REPORT FOR THE MONTH.

TO THE HONORABLE H. J. TANCRED, CHAIRMAN.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit a Summary Report on the Schools examined during the month.

The examinations were without notice.

Lyttelton Wesleyan School ... February 1 ... Present 60 ... The School-room and the children were clean, neat, and orderly. A few (five or six) came in a little late. There are many little classes—fewer might be preferable; but as the classification is quite correct as to each individual child, and their progress on the whole satisfactory, there is no strong ground of objection to the arrangement. The reading is particularly good; the ease, fluency, expression, and correct diction of the younger children, afford a pleasing proof that habitual errors are not so inevitable as is commonly supposed. Spelling good. Copy-books neat, but the handwriting not a good style. The arithmetical knowledge is inferior, but very few of the children are over ten years of age.

- Heathcote Valley School* ... February 2 ... Present 45 ... The numbers and efficiency of the School are increasing.
- Akaroa School* ... February 3 ... Present 37 ... The dimensions, furniture, and arrangement of the room are inconvenient; they render the successful conduct of the School a work of more than ordinary difficulty. The School seems slow in settling down to work after the Christmas holidays. A new set of maps is wanted. The stock of books is not well kept up, several classes were short of books. These should have been obtained in the holidays in anticipation of the re-opening of the School. The "Scottish School-book Association's" are an excellent series, but their substitution for those in use in the other Schools of the Province proves to be undesirable. Those in the Board's depôt, besides their other advantages have a *fixed price*, and are more readily obtainable than the books got from Dunedin. The School may have suffered in consequence of the Teacher's illness; the best Scholars seem to have left; the attainments of those present were considerably below the average of children of the same age. Some of the copy-books were very creditable. The Teacher's illness and the inconvenient appliances afford some excuse for what is deficient; but there should be great improvement and possibly no holidays before next quarter's examination.
- Ashley Bank,* ... March 10 ... Present, 3 ... The protracted harvest, a local holiday, and other circumstances, reduced the attendance. It has lately increased.
- Loburn School,* ... Same day ... Present, 21. Commencing satisfactorily. The School well built and supplied. The arrangements and order satisfactory. A low rate of fees has been adopted.
- Mount Grey Downs,* ... Same day ... Present, 8 ... The School opened on the 8th. A larger attendance is expected next week. The School-room is well-built and finished; but the porch is too small, is open to the south-west, and in a line with the door, instead of at right angles to it. The interior is well fitted and arranged. A low rate of fees has been adopted.
- Leithfield,* ... March 11 ... Present, 30 ... Satisfactory except as to some minor points, indicated at the time.
- Saltwater Creek,* ... Same day ... Present, 24 ... Satisfactory. The School is now well supplied. The better arrangement of desks, &c., has proved more conducive to good order. The children are kindly and carefully taught; they seem to enjoy their school life.
- Kaiapoi Church School,* ... March 12 ... Present, 86 ... Very satisfactory. Punctuality, propriety, cleanliness, and order appear to be the rule of School. The writing and the diction, formerly defective, have been somewhat improved. The Local Committee appear to exercise an effective interest in the material and moral welfare.
- Harewood Road School,* ... March 15 ... Present, 14 ... Satisfactory. The writing very creditable.
- Courtney School* ... March 16 ... Present 14 ... Satisfactory
- South Selwyn School,* ... March 17 ... Present, 18 at 9:35. At this time the Master left the main body in the School-room, and went out to search for stragglers and suspected truants, in the the cross-roads, ditches, and fences. Five were found. There is considerable improvement as to punctuality, but there is a great want of method, and of the influence of example. The children appear to pass much of their time unemployed; and, unnoticed by the Teacher, to indulge in some very bad and idle habits. As to the attainments, the Bible knowledge, Reading and Writing, subjects, which most mark the Teacher's cultivation and care, were deficient; the Tables and Spelling, learned from memory were more satisfactory. The Arithmetic and the Writing are *done* by the children, and *shewn up* to the Teacher; the result of their not being looked over and taught while at work, is that five or six children, learning addition, begin their sums at the wrong side; and the copy books of the more slovenly disposed children, are the most disgraceful I have ever seen. The Teacher is well-disposed, and has the good-will of his neighbours, but is not qualified for the charge of a more highly organised School.

North Road School, March 28 ... Present, 16 ... Improving

Lyttelton Church School March 23 ... Present, 42 ... Improving.

The improvement since last examination is considerable. The clock has been set going, but does not as yet keep good time. It gains an hour a day. The School opened punctually at nine. The School-room had been properly cleaned, and was in good order. The good behaviour and orderly conduct of the children indicated better discipline. There is also some improvement in the attainments, but the School has only been open about eight weeks since the Christmas holidays, and the Assistant-Mistress has been ill nearly all the time. The Bible knowledge is creditable. The Reading is tolerable, but is wanting in fluency in even the earlier pages of the books. The Spelling is fair in the same pages. The Writing is improving. The Arithmetic of the lower classes, which formed more than three-fourths of the number present, is most meagre; they can't work even easy examples in simple addition, and they do not know the earlier part of the Multiplication Table. The children in these classes are mostly from seven to eleven years of age, and some of them promoted from the Infant School. The Infant School does not seem to give effective help. It is not under inspection.

The organisation is defective in the following points :—

1. The School is split up into too many little classes, eight in all.
2. The classification is injudicious, several dull and backward boys are in classes too difficult for them; also, some of the second class read and spell better than others in the first.
3. The books in use are mostly too difficult, since only one or two in each class can read the earlier pages with any fluency.
4. The supply of books is deficient, and many copies are worn out with either use or bad usage.

One source of disappointment in this School is the dearth of promising boys of nine or ten years of age, likely candidates for Scholarships; such boys are found in most Schools of the kind and even in others of inferior organization.

The following are recommendations for the improvement of the organization of the Lyttelton Church School.

- I. The employment of two effective Pupil Teachers instead of an Assistant.
- II. The reconstruction of the classes and the reduction of their number from eight to three.
- III. A change of books,—the introduction of a different, possibly of a better series, as the readiest way of curing stereotyped defects in reading.
- IV. The use of only the easier books until fluency in them has been acquired.
- V. Darnell's copy-books.
- VI. Half-quarterly examinations and promotions only at those times, until the School has increased in numbers and efficiency.

G. B. Ellman, candidate for the Mastership of the South Selwyn School, passed his examination very satisfactorily on the 22nd inst.

Several other candidates appeared, but withdrew without completing the examination. It would be preferable for the Committees to sift the applications, and only to send up the likely Candidates.
