PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance enacted by the Superintendent, and Provincial Council of Canterbury, entitled "The Education Ordinance, Amendment Ordinance, 1865," it is, among other things, provided that it shall be lawful for the Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, for the time being, from time to time to change or alter the boundaries of any and every Educational District, proclaimed under the authority of "The Education Ordinance, 1864:"

And whereas on the Sixth day of April, One thousand eight hundred and sixty nine, the Hororata Educational District was proclaimed under the authority of the said Ordinance; and whereas it is desirable to alter the boundaries of the said district:

Now therefore, I, WILLIAM ROLLESTON, Superintendent of the Province aforesaid do hereby, in pursuance of the powers so vested in me, proclaim that the boundaries of the Hororata Educational District, shall be as follows:—

Commencing at the point where the road to the east of section 10,806 touches the River Hororata; thence westerly along such river to its junction with the gully running through section 10,010; thence following such gully south-westerly and westerly to the spot where it again joins the River Hororata; thence westerly along such river to the western boundary of

Run 57; thence northerly along such western boundary and easterly along the northern boundary of the same run to the River Wakaepa; thence easterly along such river to the road to the east of section 10,806; thence southerly along such road to the starting point.

#### COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

##### SHIP HYDASPES.

**S**IR,—Having inspected the ship Hydaspes upon her arrival, I have the honour to report:—

I found the several compartments creditably clean, well ventilated, and, with the exception of the space allotted to the married people, properly arranged.

I beg to endorse the opinion so frequently expressed by the Commissioners, that the hospital for single women should be constructed on the upper deck if possible, and on no account within the married peoples' compartment.

The immigrants unanimously spoke in the highest terms of the treatment they had received at the hands of the Captain, Surgeon, and Officers of the ship, and the Matron appears to have performed her duties most efficiently.

The provisions generally were of good quality, and were stated to have been served out regularly throughout the voyage.

The distilling apparatus had worked satisfactorily throughout, and the supply of water was reported sufficient and good.

I have much pleasure in recommending the payment of all gratuities, and the further employment of the Surgeon-Superintendent should he desire it.

Herewith I forward you, as directed, the Health Officer's report on the sanitary condition of the immigrants.

**S**IR,—I have the honour to report that I visited the ship *Hydaspes*, at her anchorage six miles outside the heads, I found the health of all on board in a very satisfactory condition.

A case of measles had occurred on board during the ship's passage down the river, and the girl sent on shore at Gravesend; on July 13 another case occurred in a child of twelve months old, this being at once placed in the female hospital the disease did not spread. Several cases of dysenteric diarrhoea had occurred, traceable, in the Surgeon's opinion, to the temporary use of tank water in place of distilled water.

Neither deaths nor births had occurred on board.

My attention was drawn by the passengers to the impropriety of placing the Female Hospital in the married immigrants compartment—the most crowded portion of the ship—and where are large families of young children who would be exposed to the danger of contagion whenever any communicable disease was brought into Hospital. I would to this add that there are many objections to an arrangement which brings together married and single women into the same Hospital. Whenever practicable I would recommend that all Hospitals should be in deck houses, and that in all cases there be provided a male Hospital, and one each for single and married females.

LANE v. FRANKS.

WRIT OF *Fi Fa*.

**W**HEREAS I the undersigned Alexander Back Sheriff of the Canterbury District of New Zealand have taken in execution and levied upon the real estate
