PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by "The Roads Ordinance, 1869," it is amongst other things enacted that if at any time previous to the first day of August in any year a majority of the Ratepayers of any portion of a district described in Schedule B to the said Ordinance should petition the Superintendent that a portion of the district to be specified in such petition should be formed into a separate district, it should be lawful for the Superintendent, in Council, by Proclamation, to be inserted in the *Government Gazette*, and one newspaper circulating in the district, to declare that such part of the district mentioned in the said petition should be a Road District:

And whereas a petition signed by a majority of Ratepayers within a portion of the Malvern Road District, being a district described in the Schedule B to the said Ordinance, was duly forwarded to the Superintendent, pursuant to the said Ordinance, and it was thereby prayed that the portion of the province therein mentioned might be formed into a separate district:

Now, therefore, I, WILLIAM ROLLESTON, Superintendent of the said Province, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, and in exercise and execution of the powers vested in me by the said Ordinance, do hereby declare that the portion of the Province hereinafter described and heretofore comprised in the Malvern District shall henceforth be a Road District, under the name of "The East Malvern District," that is to say:

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Commencing at a point on the southern bank of the river Waimakariri, the same being the easternmost corner of Run 41; thence south-westerly, following the south-eastern boundary of that run to the easternmost corner of the Southern Malvern Road District; thence north-westerly, following the north-eastern boundary of that district to a point on the western boundary of section 3719, where it is intersected by the western boundary of the before-mentioned run; thence following a straight line to the north-eastern corner of section 13715; thence in a straight line to an angle in the Dalethorpe and Kowai Road, situate thirty-three chains fifty links north of the southernmost corner of section 14081; thence north-easterly, following the eastern side of the said road to the north-west corner of section 5177; thence easterly, following the northern boundary of that section to the north-eastern corner thereof; thence north-westerly, following a straight line to the southernmost corner of section 5321; thence following the south-western, the western, and the north-western boundaries of that section, and the south-eastern boundary of section 4573, to the southernmost corner of section 4803; thence following the south-western boundary of the latter section to the westernmost corner thereof; thence following a straight line to the westernmost corner of section 4739; thence following the north-western boundary of that section to the river Waimakariri aforesaid, and from thence returning along the south-western bank of that river to the commencing point.

REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE AROWHENUA CEMETERY:—

1. The Managers appointed by the Superintendent under "The Cemetery Reserves Management Ordinance, 1870," shall have the entire control and management of the Arowhenua Cemetery.
2. The Managers having power by the 9th section of the said Ordinance to allocate portions of the Cemetery to the various religious denominations requiring the same, no interference will be permitted with such allocations. A portion of the Cemetery will be set apart as open ground for purposes of general interment.
3. Persons desirous of obtaining an exclusive right in any plot of ground in the Cemetery for the purpose of making graves or family vaults, or erecting monuments, may do so at a rate not exceeding 10s. 6d. per square yard, such persons shall receive the following document signed by one of the Managers and the Secretary.

4. Applications for this purpose may be made to the Managers or to the Secretary, or other person authorised by them to receive the same.
5. Every burial plot shall be 9 feet by 4 feet, and every grave shall be 5 feet in depth at the least. In the event of the purchaser of private ground desiring a greater depth, an extra charge of 2s. 6d. shall be made for every foot more than 5 feet.
6. All railings or erections of any kind shall be subject to the approval of the Managers.
7. Any purchaser of private ground may transfer his or her interest therein to any other person, upon payment of a fee of 5s. for such transfer.
8. A plan of the Cemetery shall be kept, shewing the plots as laid off in the several divisions; and each plot shall have a separate number on the plan.
9. A book shall be kept in which shall be entered the number of every plot sold; the name of the purchaser thereof, together with the date of the sale or transfer of the same. A register shall also be kept of all burials in the Cemetery, which regis-

ter shall be open for the inspection of the public, on payment of a fee of 1s. for each inspection.

10. In all cases of intended interment, the person having the management or control of the same, shall apply to the Sexton, or other duly authorised person, for a warrant for such interment, which warrant shall be granted upon payment of the following fees, viz. :—

ADAMS, WILLIAM—RAKAI GORGE. CONDITIONS.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the tap-room, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.

2. To provide not less than eight beds for travellers, in not less than six separate bedrooms.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weather-tight and fit for the accommodation of at least four horses.

4. At all times to keep a proper supply of water for the house, and for horses and cattle, and to provide in a convenient position a proper trough for watering cattle.

To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient moveable sheep-proof yard, containing a superficial area of not less than 900 square yards; or at the option of the licensee to keep one acre of land enclosed by a permanent sheep-proof fence. For the occupation of this yard or paddock during the night, the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following, viz.:—Sixpence per score for all sheep under 300 in number, fourpence per score for all over that number and under 500, and twopence per score for all over 500.
