KNOW ALL MEN by these presents, that I, Joseph Dransfield, of Lyttelton, in the Province of Canterbury, in New Zealand, Merchant, being seized in fee simple of that part of Rural Section numbered 1033 on the Map of the Chief Surveyor of the said Province of Canterbury, setting out the rural lands in the Mandeville District, commencing at the south-eastern corner of the said section; running thence westerly along the southern boundary of the said section to the south-western corner thereof; thence northerly along the western boundary of the said section about three chains seventy links; thence easterly parallel with the said southern boundary to the eastern boundary of the said section; and thence southerly along the said eastern boundary to the commencing point, and delineated and coloured "green" on the plan in the margin hereof (subject to a certain agreement for the sale of the said section to John Armstrong, of Kaiapoi, in the said Province, farmer), in consideration of the sum of Fifteen Pounds to me paid (the receipt whereof I do hereby admit and acknowledge), do (at the request of the said John Armstrong), hereby dedicate; and I, the said John Armstrong, in consideration of the sum of Ten Shillings to me paid (the receipt whereof I do hereby admit and acknowledge), do hereby dedicate and confirm the said land to the public, To the INTENT that the same may for ever hereafter be used as a public highway to all intents and purposes whatsoever.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

(AUGUST 6—SEPTEMBER 2, 1872.)

INSPECTOR'S MONTHLY REPORT.

TO THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit a Summary Report on the schools examined during the month.

Addington (Boys') ... August 7 ... Present 18 (average 21) The attendance is at present at a low average, a new master having but recently been appointed.

Addington (Girls') ... August 7 ... Present 21 (average 21) Satisfactory.

Hillsborough and Opawa (inspected) August 8 ... Present 33 (average 29) Attendance increasing. Order and registers fair. School opened July 22.

St. Albans ... August 12 and 13 Weather unfavourable. Present 157 (average 166) The progress since last examination very satisfactory. Organisation and discipline superior. Room very cold the first day, and too close the second. It is surprising how the school can have been conducted all the winter without a fire.

Lyttelton Borough School ... August 14, 15, 16 ... Present 238 (average 220). The present space is insufficient for the accommodation of the large and increasing attendance.

The Committee have added to the staff an assistant mistress in No. 3 division of the school. Two candidates for pupil-teachership nominated by the Committee, have subsequently been examined; they are both eligible, but David Grubb being the more successful competitor, is first recommended for the proposed appointment; the other candidate, Thomas Grange, might also advantageously be employed in this school, and the two being of nearly equal attainments, would study well together under the competent training of Mr. Ross.

The attainments are generally satisfactory in each department; any minor defects for future correction were sufficiently indicated at the time, and also on the forms of report annexed.

The distribution of the classes is of too mixed a character.

Mr. Ross being a trained and certificated teacher, is more competent for the instruction of the senior pupils.

Mr. Borthwick, in division No. 3, is a very successful teacher of the youngest classes.

The assistants in each division are also well suited for their respective departments.

But the senior class in division 2 is more advanced than the lowest class in division 1. These classes should change places.

There are also in divisions 2 and 3 two classes, each reading the same class-book. They should unite in one class in whichever room there is sufficient space for them.

Two children were found in the old Infants' School under one teacher. This room might be turned to better account.

Woodend ... August 20 ... Present 47 ... Considerably improved since last examination.

Harewood Road ... August 22 ... Present 35 (average 34). The number in attendance falls far short of the expectations of the promoters of the school. There are at present few elder girls in attendance. A permanent assistant mistress who would also teach sewing is required.

The progress since last examination is on the whole fair.

N.B.—A person has been teaching in the school without the sanction of the Board.

The Woodend Educational Meeting was duly held on the 20th August. The meeting declared the desirability of the formation of an Educational District, and elected a Committee of nine members. Two Auditors were also appointed.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that in pursuance of "The Public House Ordinance, Session XXIV., No. 17, 1866," and "The Public House Ordinance, Amendment Ordinance, Session XXVII., No. 7, 1867," the Adjourned Quarterly Meeting of the Justices of the Peace was held on Tuesday, the 17th day of September instant, at the hour of eleven in the forenoon, at the Resident Magistrate's Court, Christchurch, when the following Public House Licenses were granted:—

CONDITIONS OF ADAMS' LICENSE.

1. All the premises to be kept in good repair. To provide in his house, besides the taproom, or room answering as such, one public and one private sitting-room.

2. To provide not less than eight beds for travellers, in not less than six separate bedrooms.

3. To provide a shed sufficiently weathertight and fit for the accommodation of at least four horses.

4. At all times to keep a proper supply of water for the house, and for horses and cattle, and to provide in a convenient position a proper trough for watering cattle.

5. To keep at all times a proper supply of oats and oaten or grass hay. Oats to be charged for to travellers at not more than sixpence per quart, and to be always served out with the authorised quart measure.

6. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient stockyard for cattle, containing a superficial area of not less than 225 square yards. For the occupation of this yard during the night, the licensee may make a charge of rates not exceeding the following, viz.:—Twopence per head for all cattle under fifty in number, and one penny per head for all over that number.

7. To provide and keep in repair a good and sufficient moveable sheep-proof yard, containing a superficial area of not less than 500 square yards; or, at the option of the licensee, to keep one acre of land enclosed by a permanent sheep-proof fence. For the occupation of this yard or paddock during the night the licensee may make a charge at rates not exceeding the following, viz.:—Sixpence per score for all sheep under 300 in number; fourpence per score for

all over that number and under 500; and twopence per score for all over 500.

8. Nil.

9. To be sworn in and to act as a constable, especially when required by the magistrates or the police.

10. On all occasions to render every assistance, and to supply information to magistrates and to the police in the execution of their duty.

11. To keep a clean and orderly house, and to render it as comfortable for the accommodation of travellers as the circumstances of position and distance from town will fairly allow.

12. Nil.

13. The license to be cancelled by order of any three Justices of the Peace, if it be proved to their satisfaction that any of the conditions of the license are not regularly fulfilled, or if any drunkenness be proved to have been allowed on the premises, or if any spirits shall be supplied from the house or premises to any aboriginal native of New Zealand.

14. A printed or fairly written copy of these conditions, and a tariff of all charges to be kept at all times posted up in some conspicuous place in the taproom, and in all the sitting-rooms, for the information of travellers.

15. To provide a visitor's book, which shall be kept in the custody of the licensee, but whenever asked for shall be produced to visitors and lodgers for the insertion of any remark on the accommodation or attendance. A notice to this effect to be kept posted in the same manner as the tariff of charges. The book to be open at all times to inspection by Magistrates or the Police, and to be sent to the Clerk of the Bench at Christchurch a week before the Annual Licensing Meeting, for the purpose of being produced at that meeting.
