A. C. KNIGHT, Esq., MINISTER FOR EDUCATION.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the results of the Examination of Pupil Teachers and Candidates, held in the Durham Street Schoolroom, June 29th and 30th, and July 1st.

Seventy-one presented themselves for examination. Of these 44 were candidates: 11 took the examination for the end of First year, 11 for the end of Second year, and 5 for the end of Third year.

As this is a Supplementary Examination, and many who either failed or lost a year at the last examination were allowed to try again, the standard has been kept fully as low as that of the last examination. One half marks has constituted a pass.

Several have passed the Examination and have been classed who are not of age to take office. I should recommend that they be allowed to accept appointments as soon as they reach the prescribed age without re-examination.

Some important points in connection with the Pupil Teachers' Syllabus, Work, and Examination, I hope to embody in a Special Report.

I very much regret that illness has caused a long delay in presenting these results.

HIS HONOR THE DEPUTY-SUPERINTENDENT directs the publication of the following General Instructions and Regulations, for the guidance of School Committees.

A. C. KNIGHT,
Minister for Education.

No. 1.—There will be paid to the credit of the Chairman of each Committee, quarterly, in advance, the sum necessary for salaries, which he will pay monthly to the teachers in his district, in such proportions as advised from the Education Office. A sum will also be placed to his credit half-yearly, to meet the ordinary and incidental expenditure, such as for fuel, cleaning school and premises, small repairs, and for purchasing such prizes of books for deserving scholars as the Committee may deem desirable, the total amount not to exceed 6d. per head on the average daily attendance for the year; but before incurring any such expenditure it must be approved at a Committee meeting, and a minute passed to that effect. The Minute Book and Vouchers for such expenditure will have to be produced at the annual audit of School Committee accounts. On no consideration can an overdraft be permitted. Special authority will be required from the Education Department for any expenditure other than purely incidental. The attention of Committees is drawn to the necessity of having the printed form of agreement between Chairman and teacher, to be forwarded from this office, signed, and the conditions contained therein enforced, especially as regards the latter part relating to house and premises left in good order.

No. 2.—Any child between five and six years of age, being child of a householder residing within three miles of a District School, may attend any District School on payment of a fee of 10s. per annum.

No. 3.—Any child over thirteen years of age, and any child over five years of age not being the child of a householder residing within three miles of a District School, may attend any District School on payment, in advance, of a fee of 5s. per quarter. These fees to be collected by some person appointed by the Committee, and to be brought to account in the books of the Chairman.

No. 4.—Chairmen of Committees are requested to give notice to the Education Office when holidays are given ; also, to notify, without delay, the closing of school on account of sickness or other emergency. The matter of holidays left in the hands of the Committee.

No. 5.—Those Committees which have not already done so, are requested to forward to the Education Office ground plans, drawn to scale five feet to one inch, of all buildings on the school grounds ; also, plan of site, on small scale, on the same sheet. £2 2s. will be allowed in each case where the plan is neat and satisfactory.

No. 6.—The Education Department, subject to an appropriation being made for the purpose, sanctions a sum of money for planting school sites.

No. 7.—The National Society's Admission, Attendance, and Summary of the Capitation Class Register to be used. Attendance to be marked on wet days, and the Education Department must consider any such omission as a falsification of the register. The absence of each pupil to be marked, as well as the attendance. The attendance to be marked by an oblique stroke, thus / against each pupil's name, the absence to be marked thus A, *e.g.*, John Brown / for John Brown present ; Thomas Jones A for Thomas Jones absent. The roll to be called twice a day, once at about 10.30 a.m., and once at about 2.30 p.m. Committees to warn masters that neglect or incorrectness in keeping the register will be looked upon as a grave dereliction of duty. The Summary Register to be entered up regularly every Friday afternoon ; all under masters, assistants, and pupil teachers assisting in the work after the dismissal of school. On days of unfavourable weather, should the numbers present fall below one-fourth of the previous year's average, that day's attendance not to be reckoned in taking the average daily attendance for the week. The number of such days to be stated in the Quarterly Returns. Should the attendance on account of unfavourable weather fall below one-fifth of such yearly average, the principal teacher (master or mistress) may dismiss the school, notifying the fact at once to the Local Committee, and stating every such dismissal in the Quarterly Returns. The quarters terminate on the 31st day of March, 30th days of June and September, and 31st day of December. The Quarterly Returns should be forwarded to the Education Office as soon after the termination of each quarter as possible. Certificate of instruction of pupil teacher or pupil teachers according to the Regulations of the Education Office to be forwarded with the Quarterly Returns.

No. 8.—No child shall be allowed to receive instruction in extra subjects until he has passed a satisfactory examination in the fourth standard. The fees charged for instruction in extra subjects shall be £1 per quarter, to be paid in advance to some person authorised by the Committee to receive the same, and brought to account in the books of the Chairman.

No candidate for pupil teachership will be received who has not either passed in Standard IV. or can produce a certificate that he or she is well versed in the subjects of that standard.

No. 9.—The Committee are requested to instruct a teacher in each school to devote three half hours in each week to teaching vocal music. Where satisfactory progress is made, the teacher will be entitled to receive at the rate of Five Pounds per annum for giving such instruction.

No. 10.—Committees are requested to inform teachers that, when the Drill Instructor visits a school such scholars as he may request shall be placed under his sole authority whilst receiving his branch of instruction. Any master reported by the Drill Instructor as being competent to give instruction in military drill, will be required to devote two half hours in each week to the same. The mistress or her assistants will be expected to devote two half hours in each week in instructing the girls in calisthenics, the exercises to correspond to those given by the Drill Instructor. Committees are requested to inform the teachers that they are expected, when practicable, to attend the drill class for the instruction of teachers held by the Drill Instructor as may be advertised, and will be allowed travelling expenses on Drill Instructor’s certificate of attendance.

No. 11.—No written communication relative to District School matters will be received at the Education Office unless forwarded through the District Committee. As soon as practicable after receiving any such communication in writing, the Chairman is requested to call the Committee together, lay the matter before the Committee, and thereupon forward the same to the Education Office, with any explanation or comment they may deem necessary.

No. 12.—Each District Committee shall keep a Minute Book, in which a faithful record shall be kept of all resolutions passed and business transacted at each Committee meeting. Before any business is transacted at a meeting of Committee, the minutes shall be read and confirmed.

No. 13.—Any Committee incurring an unauthorised expenditure will be liable for the same. When any public money is paid to the credit of a Committee, the Chairman will be advised of the same from the Education Office, and of the purposes to which it is to be devoted. Should the money or a portion of it be used in any other way, the 57th Clause of “The Education Ordinance, 1875,” will be enforced.
