HIS Honor the Superintendent directs it to be notified that "The House of Representatives having resolved that there should be an exhibition in Wellington during the next session of the Assembly of all varieties of Flax Fibre prepared in the colony, manufacturers are invited to forward to the Flax Commissioners, through the Superintendent of their province, samples of the fibre, rope, sacking, or any other material, prepared by them from the New Zealand Flax. The samples of fibre should not be less than 20lbs in weight, and ten or fifteen fathoms of each kind of rope will be sufficient. It is desirable that a statement of the processes and estimated cost of manufacture should accompany the samples."
