PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "*The Counties Act, 1856*," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor on the recommendation of the Superintendent of any Province of the said Colony from time to time by proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette* of the Colony to divide such Province into Counties, and that all such Counties shall have such designation and limits as in and by the Proclamation constituting the same shall be prescribed.

Now therefore, I, the Governor of

New Zealand, on the recommendation of the Superintendent of the Province of Otago, do *proclaim and declare* that I do hereby divide the said Province of Otago, into two Counties, to be designated respectively "THE BRUCE COUNTY" and "WALLACE COUNTY," and the limits of the said Counties respectively shall be as follows:—

Of the Bruce County,

On the North the Province of Canterbury, on the West the 169th degree of longitude East from Greenwich, and on the East and South the Sea.

Of Wallace County,

On the North the Province of Canterbury, on the East the 169th degree of longitude East from Greenwich, and on the West and South the Sea.

Given under my hand and issued under the Public Seal of the Colony of New Zealand, at Auckland, in the Colony aforesaid, this twenty-fourth day of January, in the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

WHEREAS in the Session of the Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, held in the twentieth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, Ordinances were passed, intitled respectively the "Land Sales and Leases Ordinance 1856," and the "Roads Ordinance Amendment Ordinance 1856;" And Whereas the said Ordinances were presented to me for the assent of His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand on the 11th December, 1856, and were then reserved by me for the signification of the Governor's pleasure thereon: And Whereas His Excellency has been pleased to assent to the said Ordinances;

Now therefore I, the said William Cargill, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, do hereby proclaim that His Excellency Colonel Thomas Gore Browne, the Governor of New Zealand, has assented to the said Ordinances, and that I received the signification of his Excellency's assent on the 25th day of February, 1857.

PROCLAMATION

By His Honor William Cargill,
Esquire, Superintendent of the
Province of Otago.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, intitled "An Ordinance to establish and regulate Ferries, Session I., No. 8," it is among other things enacted that "It shall be lawful for the Superintendent to authorise Ferries to be established and erected at convenient places on the rivers, creeks, and lakes within the Province of Otago, for the conveyance of passengers, animals, and goods across the same;" and whereas by section 3 of the "Ferries Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1856," passed by the said Superintendent and Council, it is enacted that "Every Ferry shall be deemed to be a Public Ferry within the meaning of this Ordinance, which shall be proclaimed to be such by the Superintendent, with the advice and consent of his Executive Council, by proclamation to be inserted in the Provincial Government Gazette;" and whereas it is expedient that the Ferry established on the Taieri River at or near the Native Village, East Taieri, at the place marked as reserved for a Ferry on the map of the district, and known by the name of the Lower Taieri Ferry, should be proclaimed a public Ferry,—Now therefore I, the said Superintendent, with the advice and consent of my Executive Council, do hereby, in virtue of the powers vested in me by the said Ordinances, proclaim the said Ferry called the Lower Taieri Ferry to be a Public Ferry within the meaning of the before recited "Ferries Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1856."
