PROCLAMATION.

By His Honor WILLIAM CARGILL,
Esquire, Superintendent of the
Province of Otago.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, Session 4, intituled, "Superintendent's Deputy Act, 1856," it is, among other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Superintendent of any Province, by Proclamation, to be published in the Government Gazette of such Province, to appoint such person as he may think fit, being a registered elector of such Province, to be his Deputy, and as such to perform and exercise all the acts and powers (except such powers as are conferred by the Constitution Act, 15 and 16 Vict., c. 72) which may be exercised and performed by such Superintendent; and the acts of such Deputy-Superintendent, so far as authorised by such Proclamation, shall be as effectual in all respects as if performed by the Superintendent himself: And whereas the said General Assembly is to assemble at Auckland, upon the 31st day of March, current, and I am about to proceed to Auckland for the purpose of attending as a Member thereof, and it is therefore necessary that I should appoint a registered elector to be my Deputy, to act during my absence as provided by the said recited Act:

Now therefore I, the said Superintendent, do hereby proclaim that I have appointed, and do hereby appoint,

JOHN M'GLASHAN, Esquire,

a registered elector of the Province of Otago, to be my Deputy, and as such to perform and exercise, during my absence from the Province, all the acts and powers (except such powers as are conferred by the Constitution Act, 15 and 16 Vict., c. 72) which may be exercised and performed by me.

Given under my hand, and issued under the Public Seal of the Province of Otago, at Government House, Dunedin, the thirteenth day of March, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-eight.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

NOTICE.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance passed by the Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, on the 5th, and assented to by the Superintendent of said Province, on the 11th days of December 1856, intituled, the "Cemeteries Ordinance, 1856," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall not be lawful, from

and after a time to be fixed by the Superintendent, and notified in the Provincial Government Gazette, to bury, or to permit, or suffer, to be buried, in the Burial Ground or Cemetery adjoining to the present road from Dunedin to Half-way Bush, as laid down on the authorised Map or Plan of Dunedin, any Corpse or Coffin, except in so far as therein allowed and as after-mentioned; and that whosoever, after such notification, shall bury, or cause, permit, or suffer, to be buried, any Corpse, or Coffin, contrary to the enactment, shall, for every such offence, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds, to be recovered in a summary way, with full costs of suit: And it is thereby provided that nothing therein contained shall prevent the interment within the limits of the before-mentioned Burial Ground or Cemetery, to be circumscribed as therein enacted, of the Corpse or Coffin of any person who stood in the following degrees of relationship to any person whose Corpse shall have been buried therein at any time prior to the passing of the said Ordinance; that is to say, the Corpse of any Husband, or Wife, or Parent, of any person whose Corpse shall have been so buried.

Now therefore I, the Superintendent aforesaid, do hereby notify that I have fixed, and do hereby fix, the 31st day of March 1858, as the date after which it shall not be lawful to bury, or to permit, or suffer, to be buried, in the before-mentioned Burial Ground or Cemetery, any Corpse or Coffin, except in so far as before-mentioned, and that any person, after the said 31st day of March 1858, contravening the aforesaid enactment shall be liable to the penalty therein set forth.

NOTICE.

WHEREAS, by an Ordinance passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, intituled, the "Cemeteries Ordinance, 1856," is is, among other things, enacted, that it

shall be lawful for the Superintendent, from time to time, to acquire, reserve, and appropriate, for the purposes of a Burial Ground or Cemetery, any land, in any locality or localities, within a convenient distance from the Town of Dunedin, and to authorise any such land to be enclosed, made, and formed, into a Burial Ground accordingly; and that, from and after any time, to be fixed by the Superintendent, and published in the Provincial Government Gazette, such land shall be open and used for such purposes under such regulations as may from time to time be made by the Superintendent, or other competent authority.

Now therefore I, the Superintendent, do hereby notify that I have reserved, appropriated, and authorised to be enclosed, for the purposes of a Burial Ground or Cemetery, that enclosed portion, consisting of about $4\frac{1}{2}$ acres of the General Cemetery Reserve at Little Paisley, in or near Dunedin; and that, from and after the 1st day of April 1858, the said enclosed portion of land shall be open and used for the purpose of a Burial Ground or Cemetery, under such regulations as may be made as aforesaid.
