PROCLAMATION

By His Honor WILLIAM CARGILL,
Esquire, Superintendent of the
Province of Otago.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, by and with the consent of the Legislative Council thereof, Session VII., No. 7, intituled, "An Ordinance for the Regulation of Prisons," it is enacted that "it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor, from time to time, as to him shall seem meet, by Proclamation, to declare any House, Building, Enclosure, or Place, to be a Public Gaol: and from and after the publication of any such Proclamation, such House, Building, Enclosure, or Place, shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Gaol."

And whereas, by another Ordinance enacted by the Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by and with the advice of the Provincial Council thereof, Session I., No. 6, intituled, "An Ordinance to empower the Superintendent of the Province of Otago to perform certain acts heretofore performed by the Governor or Lieutenant-Governors of New Zealand, and by the Resident Magistrate of Otago," it is provided that all such powers as are conferred by the Ordinances enumerated in the Schedule thereto appended, upon "the Governor-in-Chief, Governors, Lieutenant-

Governors, or the Officer administering the Government of the Colony or Province for the time being, are thereby, within the Province of Otago, conferred on the Superintendent thereof:" And whereas the said first-mentioned Ordinance is included in the said Schedule: And whereas it is necessary that part of the Building intended for a Gaol, erected on the Government Reserve, west of Dee Street, Invercargill, in the said Province, should be proclaimed a Public Gaol of the Colony;

Now, THEREFORE I, the said Superintendent of the Province of Otago, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the Building aforesaid, which is entered to by an inner door of the Building, shall be deemed and taken to be a Public Gaol of the Colony of New Zealand; and that the other portion of the said Building, which is entered to by the outer door thereof, is, until further proclamation, reserved to be used as a Lock-up House.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Honor WILLIAM CARGILL,

WHEREAS by an Ordinance passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, in the seventeenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria and in the first session of the said Provincial Council, intitled "An Ordinance to establish and regulate Ferries," it is among other things enacted that "It shall be lawful for the Superintendent to authorise Ferries to be established and erected at convenient places on the rivers, creeks, and lakes within the Province of Otago, for the conveyance of passengers, animals, and goods across the same;" and whereas by section 3 of the "Ferries Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1856," passed by the said Superintendent and Provincial Council, it is enacted that "Every Ferry shall be deemed to be a Public Ferry within the meaning of this Ordinance, which shall be proclaimed to be such by the Superintendent, with the advice and consent of his Executive Council, by proclamation to be inserted in the Provincial Government Gazette;" and whereas it is expedient that the Ferry established on the Oreti River about one mile above the Waikivi junction, and known by the name of the Oreti Ferry, should be proclaimed a public Ferry,—Now therefore I, the said Superintendent, with the advice and consent of my Executive Council, do hereby, in virtue of the powers vested in me by the said Ordinances, proclaim the said Ferry, called the Oreti Ferry, to be a Public Ferry within the meaning of the before recited "Ferries Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1856."

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

PENCARROW LIGHT HOUSE.

NOTICE is hereby given that on and after the first day of January next, a new light will be exhibited on Pencarrow Head at the entrance of Port Nicholson, (Wellington) Cook's Strait, New Zealand.

The new light will be of the second order, (Catadioptric system) with eclipses at intervals of two minutes; it will be 420 feet above high water mark, and visible in ordinary weather at a distance of thirty English miles.

The following are the magnetic bearings and distances of the site of the new Light House:—

From Baring Head, N.W. by N., 3¼ miles.
From Sinclair Head, E. by N. ½ N., 6 miles.

From Outer Rock of Barretts' Reef, S.E. by E ½ E., 1 mile.

From Steeple Rock, S.S.E., 2 miles.

From Cape Campbell, N.N.E. ¼ E., 33 miles.

The Lighthouse is in Latitude 41° 22' 0" S.
Longitude 174° 51' 15" E.
