Gaols on the Tuapeka Gold Field.

PROCLAMATION,

By His Honor JOHN LARKINS CHEESE RICHARDSON, Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

WHEREAS power is vested in the Superintendent of the Province of Otago to declare any house, building, enclosure, or place to be a public Gaol:

Now therefore I, John Larkins Cheese Richardson, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by virtue of the powers so vested in me, do hereby Proclaim and declare that the enclosures or rooms numbered two in each of the three several Lock-ups or Watch-houses situate respectively at Weatherston's Gully, Tuapeka, and Waitahuna, shall henceforth be Public Gaols of the Colony of New Zealand.

Given under my hand, and issued under the Public Seal of the Province of Otago, this fourth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

Diseased Cattle Act, 1861.

PROCLAMATION,

By His Honor JOHN LARKINS CHEESE RICHARDSON, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, in the Colony of New Zealand.

WHEREAS by Section No. 9 of the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," it is enacted that "If at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious

or contagious disease has broken out in any district out of the Colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of this Act, and from time to time, to make such Regulations as to him shall seem fit for prohibiting the importation of Cattle into the Colony from such district, and the landing or driving of such Cattle, and for destroying Cattle imported, landed, or driven contrary to such Regulations;" and by Section 10 of the same Act, it is also enacted that "If at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out amongst Cattle in any District of the Colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such District is infected within the meaning of this Act, and from time to time to make such Regulations for destroying diseased Cattle therein, and from prohibiting the removal or transportation of Cattle from one part of the Colony to another, and for preventing the further spread of such disease, as to him shall seem fit." And it is by the same Act also enacted that the Governor in Council may by warrant under his hand from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the Colony, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor, or Governor in Council, by the said Act, subject to such Regulations as he may think fit, and may from time to time rescind such delegation: AND WHEREAS the Governor hath, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to JOHN LARKINS CHEESE RICHARDSON, Esquire, so long as he shall hold the

office of Superintendent of the Province of Otago, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act is provided, and subject to the Regulations issued by the Governor in Council, on the first day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and to any other Regulations to be from time to time duly made;

NOW THEREFORE I, the said JOHN LARKINS CHEESE RICHARDSON, by virtue of the powers vested in me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare, that after the date hereof the several Colonies of Australia—that is to say, the Colony of Victoria, the Colony of New South Wales, the Colony of Queensland, the Colony of South Australia, and the Colony of Western Australia, as well as the Colony of Tasmania, and the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, and the Islands of Great Britain and Ireland, shall be deemed to be infected districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the above-mentioned Act, and that no Cattle after the date hereof until further notice, shall be imported into the Province of Otago from such districts: provided, however, that the Superintendent of the Province may allow any Cattle to be landed from vessels from the Islands of Great Britain and Ireland subject to such conditions and restrictions as he may deem expedient, and the circumstances of any case may require.

And, Whereas Cattle have been lately imported from the said Colony of New South Wales into the Province of Southland, in the Colony of New Zealand, and the Cattle in the said Province have thereby become infected, I do therefore further proclaim and declare that after the date hereof the Province of Southland, in the Colony of New Zealand, shall be deemed to be an infected district within the meaning of the said Act, and that no Cattle shall be removed or transported from the said Province of Southland into the Province of Otago.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING DELEGATION OF POWERS TO SUPERINTENDENTS UNDER DISEASED CATTLE ACT, 1851."

At the Government House, at Auckland, the First day of October, 1861.

Present:—

His Excellency the Governor in Council.

WHEREAS by Warrants under the hand of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the first day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the Governor has, with the advice and consent of the

Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to the Superintendents respectively of the Provinces of Auckland, Taranaki, Wellington, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough, Canterbury, Otago, and Southland, certain powers conferred on him by the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1851," subject to certain Regulations to be made by the Governor in Council, under the recited Act: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, by virtue of the authority given to him by the 14th section of the above-recited Act, doth hereby make and ordain the following Regulations:—

1. The delegation of Powers under the said Warrants shall continue to be in force for the period of one year from this date, subject to be rescinded according to the provisions of the above-recited Act.

2. Each Superintendent shall, immediately after exercising any of the Delegated Powers, notify the same to the Governor, and he shall transmit to the Governor particulars of all Appointments, and copies of all Regulations made by him.

3. He shall, so soon as conveniently can be, notify all Regulations made by him to the Colonial Secretary, or Chief Secretary of each of the Australian Colonies, and cause the same to be published in England in the *Times* newspaper.

4. In the exercise of powers delegated under the 9th Section of the said Act, the Superintendent of any Province may, either in the first instance or afterwards, from time to time by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* of the Province, except out of any District proclaimed as infected under the said Act, any Port or place within the limits of such District, and every such excepted Port and Place shall be deemed not to be within the proclaimed District; and the Superintendent may also from time to time by Proclamation as aforesaid rescind any Proclamation of an infected District wholly or as to any part thereof, and also the Proclamation of any such exception as aforesaid.

5. In the exercise of powers delegated under the 10th Section of the Act, the Superintendent of any Province may prohibit the importation, either by land or by sea, of Cattle into such Province from any other Province, or any particular Port or Place in any other Province, or across the borders of a Province, or any particular part thereof.

6. In all such last-mentioned cases, such Superintendent shall cause notice as speedily as possible of such prohibition to be given to the Superintendent of the Province from which importation shall be prohibited, and also to the Governor.

7. The Superintendent of any Province may in his discretion, suspend or forbear to exercise all or any of the powers delegated to him under the said Act.

8. The Superintendent of each Province shall as soon as can be after the commencement of each sitting of the Provincial Council of such Province, lay before such Council copies and particulars of all appointments, regulations, acts, and proceedings whatever, issued, made, or done by him under the delegated powers of the said Act.

9. If the Provincial Council of any Province shall by resolution declare their dissent from all or any of such appointments, regulations, acts, and proceedings, such resolutions shall be forthwith transmitted by the Speaker to the Governor for his consideration.

Slaughtering Cattle—Port Chalmers.

PROCLAMATION

By His Honor JOHN LARKINS CHESSE

BY VIRTUE of the authority vested in me in that behalf, I, JOHN LARKINS CHESSE RICHARDSON, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, do hereby constitute and proclaim the Town of Port Chalmers, in the said Province, and the territory around the said Town, within three miles from the outer boundary thereof, to be a District for the purposes of an ordinance of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of New Zealand, Session 8, No. 5, intituled "An Ordinance for regulating the Slaughtering of Cattle in certain places," and I do hereby proclaim, that from and after the first day of March next, no person shall keep a Slaughter House, or place for slaughtering cattle intended for sale, barter, shipping, or for exportation, except such house or place be duly licensed for that purpose, in manner provided in and by the said recited Ordinance.

Taiari River Signal Station.

NOTICE is hereby given, that on and after the First day of February next, the following signals will be exhibited at the Flagstaff, situated on Taiari Island, to steer the vessel by when crossing the bar, to indicate which channel is open, the state of the tide, and whether prudent or otherwise to approach the harbour.

In the North Channel, if the vessel be too far to the Northward, the White ball will be hauled out to the south yard-arm; and if too far to the Southward, it will be hauled out to the North yard-arm.

In the South channel, if the vessel be too far to the Westward, the ball will be hauled out to the North yard-arm; and if too far to Eastward, it will be hauled out to the South yard arm.

Blue Peter; keep to sea, the Bar is not fit to take.

Red Flag; take the Bar, there is no danger.

Blue do., with White St. Andrew's Cross; ebb tide, and the Bar not fit to take.

White do. half-mast high; first quarter flood.

White do. at the mast-head; second do.

Red do. half-mast high; third do.

Do. do. at the mast-head; last do. do.

White do. at the North yard-arm; North channel is open.

Do. do. at the South yard-arm; South channel is open.

Masters of vessels are particularly cautioned

not to take the Bar during any other state of the tide than the last quarter flood.

Red Flag; take the Bar, there is no danger.

Blue do., with White St. Andrew's Cross; ebb tide, and the Bar not fit to take.

White do., half-mast high; first quarter flood.

Do. do. at the mast-head; second do. do.

Red do. half-mast high; third do. do.

Do do, at the mast-head; last do. do.

Masters of vessels are particularly cautioned not to take the Bar during any other state of the tide than the last quarter flood.

The application should be supported by respectable inhabitants (householders) not in any way connected with the traffic. No private interview will be granted to the applicant or his agent in support of any application.

The Bottle License includes the Wholesale License.

Wholesale Licenses are granted without a written application every Wednesday.
