MEMORIAL TO THE LATE PRINCE  
ALBERT.

IN directing the publication of the correspondence on the subject of a National Memorial to the Prince Consort, the Superintendent cordially responds to the call of H. M.'s Government, that opportunities should be afforded "to every class in the British Empire of joining in this tribute of the Nation's gratitude," and cordially accepts on the part of the Province of Otago the opportunity thus afforded, of uniting with Her Gracious Majesty in rearing a Monument to the late Prince, which will evince "the love of a grateful country to the memory of its benefactor."

include the pence of the artizan and the labourer, as well as the shillings and pounds of the middling and wealthy classes."

NATIONAL MEMORIAL TO THE  
PRINCE CONSORT.

SIR—I have the honor to transmit to  
your Excellency the proceedings of a  
meeting held in this Metropolis, to pro-  
mote the National Memorial to the Prince  
Consort.

The Committee appointed for this ob-  
ject, in order to give a truly national  
character to the Memorial, have made  
arrangements to give to persons of every  
class in England an opportunity of joining  
in this tribute of the nation's gratitude;  
so that the Fund may include the pence of  
the artizan and the labourer, as well as  
the shillings and pounds of the middle  
and the wealthy classes.

The Prince's constant aims to promote  
the interests of all were not limited to the

United Kingdom, and the Committee feel  
it a part of their duty to provide that the  
same opportunity should be offered to Her  
Majesty's subjects in the Colonies. For  
this the Committee seek your Excellency's  
good offices, and solicit you to make  
the matter known to all classes in  
your Government, either at a general  
meeting, or in such other manner as you may  
deem best; and, by the aid of your offi-  
cers, and other influential persons in the  
different districts, to arrange for the re-  
ceipt of contributions, however small, to  
the intended Memorial.

I enclose some forms and suggestions,

Read the following Report of the So-  
ciety of Arts:

The Council of the Society of Arts,  
taking a deep interest in the success of

the proposal to erect the National Monument to the Memory of the Prince Consort, their lamented President, and considering that it is due to all the subjects of the Queen, that every individual amongst them, however humble, should have the opportunity of contributing his mite towards this object, have agreed to the following report:

1. The subscriptions hitherto have been limited almost exclusively to those of the wealthy and mercantile classes, whilst a very small portion has been subscribed by the people generally. The Nobility and Gentry, the City Corporations, Banks, Mercantile Firms, Municipal Corporations, and the like, have been addressed by the Committee presided over by the Lord Mayor of the City of London. No steps, however, have been taken, nor does it appear that any are contemplated, to make known to each individual man and woman constituting the body of the people, and residing either in the Parishes and Hamlets of the United Kingdom or in the Colonies, the Memorial which it is proposed to erect, nor has any opportunity been hitherto afforded them of adding their contributions to the general fund. If this were done, all would affectionately unite with their Queen in raising a Monument to the memory of the Prince who neglected no opportunity to promote their welfare. It is only through very extended parochial and other agencies, that the necessary information can be generally given, and the Council has, therefore, determined forthwith to invite influential persons, representing all the great interests of the country, the Church of England, and other religious denominations, as well as the great employers of labour, to unite with them as a Committee to convey this information, and to make such arrangements as may afford to every one of her Majesty's subjects, throughout the United Kingdom and the Colonies, the opportunity of taking a part, however humble, in promoting the Memorial, by subscriptions however small.

The Queen, "following the movement of her people," has asked "to be allowed to take part with them in doing honour to her beloved Prince;"\* and the Council, believing that the women of England especially will rejoice to work in concert with their Queen, intend to invite Ladies to be members of the proposed Committee.

2. Should more funds be realised than will be required to carry properly into effect the Monument "on a scale of sufficient grandeur," as stated in the communication made by the Queen's command to the Lord Mayor, it will be for Her Majesty, who has already pointed out the

character of the intended Monument, to decide on the application of any surplus to some object of comprehensive utility which the Prince Consort had at heart.

\* The following is a copy of Her Majesty's letter:—

Osborne, February 19, 1862.

MY LORD—The Queen wishes me to add a few words to the answer to your letter, which you will receive with this, expressive in a more special manner of Her Majesty's personal wishes.

She is aware that she could not with any propriety contribute, as a wife, to a monument to her husband, but she is also the Sovereign of this great empire, and as such, she cannot but think she may be allowed to join with the nation in the expression of a nation's gratitude to one to whom she owes so much.

Who has a dearer interest than the Queen in the well-being and happiness of the people? And if it has pleased God to make her reign, so far, happy and prosperous, to whom, under Divine Providence, is this so much owing as to her beloved husband, in all matters of doubt or difficulty her sure counsel, her un-failing guide and support?

No one can know, as the Queen knows, how his every thought was devoted to the country—how his only aim was to improve the condition of the people, and to promote their best interests. Indeed, his untiring exertions in furtherance of these objects, tended, in all probability, to shorten his precious life.

Surely, then, it will not be out of place that, following the movement of her people, the Queen should be allowed to consider how she may best take part with them in doing honour to her beloved Prince, so that the proposed monument may be recorded to future ages as reared by the Queen and people of a grateful country to the memory of its benefactor.

#### (SPECIFICATION OF STEAMER REQUIRED.)

To be a Screw Steamer, Schooner-rigged, of about one hundred and fifty tons, forty-five horse power engines, good Cabin and Steerage accommodation; to be equipped with one Life Boat, two Whale Boats, with oars and sails complete, also a duplicate set of oars; to have full length chain cables of one hundred and twenty fathoms each, good anchors, and one new five-inch hawser; to be manned with a crew of five men for each of the Whale Boats, together with the crew of the vessel; to supply Cabin fare for two, Steerage fare for two, and to supply fuel, water, and victualled for a five months' voyage.

The Vessel to be employed in the Survey of the Harbours of the West Coast of Otago, and the Master of the Vessel to act under the orders of the Chief Surveyor.

#### A PROCLAMATION

*Revoking the Proclamation of Wetherstone's and Gabriel's Gullies, and the Lands adjacent thereto, as a Mining Board District within the Province of Otago.*

By his Honor JOHN LARKINS CHEESE RICHARDSON, Esquire, Superintendent of the said Province.

WHEREAS, by the "Gold Fields Act, 1858," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, by Proclamation, to declare any Gold Field, or any part thereof, containing not less than one hundred persons holding Miners' Rights or Leases, to be a district for the purpose of forming a Mining Board with the powers and authority therein described, and to declare the name of such district, and define the limits thereof, and from time to time to alter such limits and make others, and to revoke such Proclamation, if he shall think fit.

And whereas, by warrant under the hand of His Excellency Thomas Gore Browne, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand, dated at Auckland the eighth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and issued under the seal of the said colony, Thomas Gore Browne, the Governor as aforesaid of the said Colony, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, and in exercise of the power and authority in him vested for that purpose, did thereby delegate absolutely and without restriction unto me, John Larkins Cheese Richardson, as Superintendent of the Province of Otago, all the powers vested in him under or by virtue of the "Gold Fields Act, 1858," (except the powers contained in sections 7, 8, 15, 27, and 40 of the said Act,) to have, hold, and exercise the powers within the Province of Otago thereby given.

And whereas by a Proclamation made on the fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in pursuance of the powers delegated to me as aforesaid, I proclaimed and declared Wetherstone's and Gabriel's Gullies, and the lands adjacent thereto, to be a district of the said Gold Field for the purpose of forming a Mining Board with the powers and authority in the said Act described, and named the same Gabriel's District, and defined the limits thereof to be as therein set forth; And whereas owing to the failure of the Members of the said Mining Board to form a quorum for the despatch of business, it has become expedient to revoke such proclamation;

Now, therefore, I, the said John Larkins Cheese Richardson, by virtue of the powers delegated to me as aforesaid, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation, and declare all the powers and authorities of the said Board to have ceased and terminated.

#### A PROCLAMATION

*Extending the Rules and Regulations of the Otago Gold Fields to Gabriel's District, at Tuapeka.*

By his Honor JOHN LARKINS CHEESE RICHARDSON, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

WHEREAS, by warrant under the hand of his Excellency THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand, dated at Auckland the eighth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and issued under the seal of the said Colony, the said Thomas Gore Browne, as Governor aforesaid, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council thereof, and in exercise of the power and authority for that purpose in him vested, did delegate absolutely and without restriction unto me, John Larkins Cheese Richardson, as Superintendent of the Province of Otago, all the powers vested in him under or by virtue of the "Gold-fields Act, 1858," except the powers contained in sections seven, eight, fifteen, twenty-seven, and forty of the said Act, to have, hold, and exercise the powers within the Province of Otago thereby given.

And whereas, on the twenty-seventh day of June, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, I, the said John Larkins Cheese Richardson, by virtue of the powers so delegated to me as aforesaid, issued certain Rules and Regulations of the Otago Gold-fields; and whereas, on the twenty-first day of July in the said year, I issued additional Rules and Regulations of the said Gold Fields; and whereas, on the tenth day of October in the said year I issued further additional Rules and Regulations of the said Gold Fields;

And whereas the aforesaid Rules and Regulations have been and now are in force throughout the Gold Fields of the said Province, excepting only in so far as

relates to that portion of the Gold Fields included within Gabriel's District, at Tuapeka; and whereas it is expedient to extend and apply the aforesaid Rules and Regulations to the said District,

Now therefore, I, the said JOHN LARKINS CHEESE RICHARDSON, do hereby cancel all Rules and Regulations heretofore in force within the said District, and do substitute in lieu thereof all the Rules and Regulations issued on the twenty-seventh day of June, the twenty-first day of July, and the tenth day of October aforesaid; and I do proclaim and appoint that the same shall be in force, and take effect therein from the date of this Proclamation.
