CORRESPONDENCE

*Respecting the Withdrawal of Restrictions on the Importation of Cattle from Gipps Land.*

12th August, 1862.

The Honorable the Superintendent  
of Otago.

SIR—In accordance with a promise made to the inhabitants of Wetherstone's, on the 6th instant, I now do myself the honor to forward for your Honor's consideration the accompanying Memorial on the subject of the high and increasing price of meat, which has obtained on the Gold-fields, consequent on the restrictions which have been promulgated against the importation of cattle into this Province.

The Executive are unanimous in the opinion that the present stringent prohibitions should be partially released; and from inquiries which I have made, it appears to me that no possible objection could be urged against the importation of cattle from Gipps Land, a District of Australia, to which the suspicion even of infection has never been attached.

It might be said that this would open the door to their admission from other ports, but this could effectually be obviated by making it imperative on the Inspector to produce a certificate of the embarkation of the cattle from the Collector of Customs there. Mr. Logie, the Chief Inspector of Sheep, is in favor of this plan, and suggests, further, that they should be subject to be slaughtered at Port Chalmers.

The severity of the past winter has had the effect of deteriorating the Stock in this Province to such an extent that there is a great fear even the present limited supply cannot be maintained. In this opinion also I am sustained by Mr. Logie.

For these considerations I would respectfully urge upon your Honor the importance of taking some immediate steps for remedying this most unsatisfactory order of things, and recommend the prayer of the Memorialists to your earnest consideration.

SIR—I have the honor to forward, for the information of the Government, a letter from the Deputy-Superintendent of Otago, accompanied by a Memorial to my address, of the 12th instant, expressive of an opinion that it is desirable, under existing circumstances, to relax the restrictions which have been promulgated against the importation of cattle into that Province.

You will perceive that an unanimity of opinion exists between the Deputy-Superintendent and the Executive Council, as to the expediency of partially relaxing the restriction, and the former suggests that the restriction should be withdrawn in regard to the District of Gipps Land, where it is stated that disease has not yet appeared, and that the importation should be allowed under duly authorised certificates on embarkation, further guarded by the cattle being slaughtered at Port Chalmers.

The Government will observe that the prayer of the Memorialists notice, as an obstruction to permanent settlement in the Province, that the prices of beef and mutton are at the extravagant height of ten to twelve pence per pound, owing to a system of monopoly; but it is only right to observe that there is no monopoly as regards mutton, as there is no obstacle whatever to the introduction of sheep; and I learn from various sources that the high price of meat is to be ascribed more to the system of combination among the sellers at Otago rather than to the restrictions in force on the introduction of large cattle, for I am positively informed that any amount might be forwarded from the Northern Island and there be disposed of profitably at Dunedin at 6d. per lb. by the importers.

I feel it imperative to state that the introduction of disease among the cattle into the Province of Otago would have the effect of totally destroying the local supply and paralysing the exertions of the agriculturists, the successful issue of which depends mainly upon the preservation of their working bullocks.

But, as this subject is one which very generally affects the whole of the Middle Island, I would suggest that an opinion as to the expediency of the relaxation be invited from the Superintendents of Canterbury, Southland, and Marlborough, now present at Wellington.

Should the Government be of opinion that a partial relaxation may be safely

made, I would suggest that a communication be made with Gipps Land, in order to see how the desired object may be obtained.

SIR—I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Honor's letter of the 26th ultimo (written at Wellington) transmitting a letter from the Deputy-Superintendent of Otago, together with a memorial to yourself, expressive of an opinion of the desirability, under existing circumstances, of relaxing the restrictions which have been promulgated under the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," against the importation of cattle into that Province from other countries.

The opinions of the Superintendents of the Provinces of Canterbury and Southland have, in accordance with your suggestion, been taken on this subject, and they entertain strong objections to the relaxation of the present prohibition against the importation of cattle. Your Honor has also pointed out the disastrous consequences of the introduction of pleuropneumonia, and as I am informed that there are cattle in plenty in other Provinces in New Zealand, which may be

exported to Otago, I trust that your Honor will agree with me that it is not advisable to make the relaxation in question.

SIR—Referring to your Honor's letter, No. 821, of the 17th inst., on the subject of the importation of cattle into Otago from Australia, I have to inform your Honor that the opinion of the Government on this question has been communicated in my letter of the same date as that on which your letter was written.

I will communicate with the Colonial Secretaries of New South Wales and Victoria, in accordance with your Honor's recommendation; with a view, in case an absolute necessity should arise for the relaxation of the prohibition of the importation of cattle, to the suggestion of any measures the adoption of which would diminish the risk of infection arising from such importation.

SIR—Not having received any reply to my communication on the subject of the Importation of Cattle from Gipps Land, and the sudden and great increase in the price of meat, combined with the prospect of the immediate arrival of miners from Victoria, have induced me to take immediate action towards effecting a reduction in the price of meat by issuing a proclamation admitting the introduction of cattle from Port Albert, in Gipps Land, under certain restrictions.

A measure of such importance to the inhabitants of Gipps Land and this Province, and one likely to confer mutual benefits will, I am sure, receive your cordial co-operation.

I shall be happy to learn what measures you propose adopting to ensure the exportation of cattle free from disease, as our regulations on their arrival will mainly depend on the efficiency of those which have been adopted on the cattle being shipped. Of course this communication will not interfere to prevent immediate action on the proclamation, as the Provincial Government confide in your disposition to meet its views.

SIR—In forwarding you a duplicate copy of the Proclamation in the *Gazette* of the withdrawal of the prohibition on the exportation of cattle from Gipps Land, I have the honor to inform you that a deputation waited on me a few days since with a Memorial, signed by several thousands, praying that the restrictions might be withdrawn from the whole of the Australian Colonies; and I informed them in reply that I was directly and decidedly opposed to their views; that I would nevertheless consult the Executive Government on the subject, but under no circumstances whatever would I act until I had communicated with you and received the instructions of His Excellency's Government; as in cases of this vital importance I consider that I should be guilty of a dereliction of duty were I to act upon the delegated power which His Excellency has intrusted me with, without special instructions.

I am happy to inform you that by an alteration in a local Ordinance, I have every reason to believe that the market will be largely supplied with sheep during the ensuing year.

SIR—I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Honor's letter, No. 1024, of the 24th ultimo, reporting that you had issued a Proclamation, a copy of which you transmit, admitting the importation into the Province of Otago of cattle from Port Albert, in Gipps Land, under certain restrictions, and also of your Honor's letter of the same date, transmitting a copy of an *Otago Provincial Government Gazette*, containing the appointments of Messrs. Logie and Campbell as Inspectors of cattle, under the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861." Both these letters reached me since I wrote my letter to your Honor, dated the 10th instant, No. 213.

As it appears that a great and sudden increase in the price of meat had taken place, upon the receipt of intelligence that large numbers of miners were immediately coming over from Australia, the General Government see no reason to doubt the propriety of the course which, under the discretion vested in your Honor by the delegation which you hold from His Excellency the Governor, you have thought it your duty to adopt.

SIR—Since writing to your Honor on the 17th instant on the subject of the relaxation of the prohibition against cattle importation, my attention has been drawn to the circumstance of a petition very numerously signed having been laid before you, praying for a total removal of the restrictions upon the importation of stock from the neighbouring colonies.

Undoubtedly the high price of meat in Otago has already caused much privation among a large part of the population, and His Excellency's Government have not become aware of it without sincere regret. At the same time, two things must be considered. In the first place, the Government cannot conceive that, in the face of such prices as appear to be obtained for wethers, the pressure can be more than temporary, as the importation of wethers from Australia must command so large a profit. And according to the natural process of trade it cannot be long before a supply of mutton should be in the market, sufficient to prevent any permanent suffering on the part of the mass of the people. In the second place, the total removal, at Otago alone, of the prohibition upon the importation of cattle, would lay the whole Middle Island open to a danger which it was the settled intention of the

Legislature to guard against, and would be a grave injustice to the Provinces of Canterbury and Southland, whose Executive authorities have expressed such strong opinions as to the necessity of maintaining the restriction. It is a mistake to suppose that the interests of wealthy runholders and stockowners influenced the Assembly in passing the Act of 1861; the principal thing had in view was this, that the introduction of pleuro-pneumonia would be ruinous to the agricultural interest throughout the country.

With the certainty that a proper supply of mutton can be introduced into Otago, it seems quite unnecessary to run the risk of introducing so deadly a disease; and while, therefore, His Excellency's Government (as already intimated to you) see no reason to interfere with the course you adopted in relaxing the restriction so far as relates to cattle imported from Gipps Land, they have to request that no further steps may be taken by you without previous reference to them.

(It is probable that the same error may have appeared in the *New Zealand General Government Gazette*.)

The following are the correct Signals at the Flagstaff, Otago Heads:

Blue Peter: Keep to sea, the Bar is not fit to take.

Red Flag: Take the Bar, there is no danger.

Blue, with a White St. Andrew's Cross: Ebb tide, and Bar not fit to take.

White Flag: First quarter Flood.

*The following Signals are in use at the Port.*

Pilot: The Union Jack at the fore.

Customs Boat: The Union Jack at the peak.

Gunpowder on Board: The Union Jack at the main.

Medical Assistance: The Union Jack over the Ensign at the peak.

Government Emigrants on Board: Ensign at the mizen mast head.

Mails on Board: White flag at the fore.

Boarding Officer: Blue flag at the main.

Clearing Officer: White flag at the main.

Police: The Ensign at the main.

Do. at night: Two lights vertical at the peak, having five feet between the two.
