PROCLAMATION

Extending the limits of the Dunstan Gold Field within the Province of Otago.

By the Honorable JOHN HYDE HARRIS, Esquire, Superintendent of the said Province.

WHEREAS it is desirable to alter and extend the limits of the Dunstan Gold Field in the Province of Otago:

Now, therefore, I, John Hyde Harris, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by virtue of the powers delegated to me by His Excellency the Governor, under and by virtue of the Gold Fields Act, 1858, do hereby proclaim and declare all that territory hereinafter described, situate to the north of the Dunstan Gold Field to be henceforth included within, and to form part of, the Dunstan Gold Field under the provisions of the said Act, that is to say: from the junction of the Kawarau and Kirtle Burn up the east bank of the Kirtle Burn to the first or most southern creek falling in to the Kirtle Burn; thence to the source of the said creek; thence by the Water Shed Line of the Mount Pisa Range to the source of the Park Burn; thence to its junction with the Clutha River, across the Clutha River

and continuing the same line eastward for one mile to the east of the Clutha River; thence southward, keeping one mile distant from the Clutha River to the north-eastern corner of the present boundary of the said Dunstan Gold Field.

And I declare that this Proclamation shall come into operation and take effect upon and after the day of the date hereof.

PROCLAMATION

Of the Appointment of a Warden under and by virtue of "Gold Fields Act, 1858-60."

EXPLORATION OF THE WEST COAST.

THE following communication from Dr. Hector to his Honor the Superintendent, is published for general information:—

Geological Survey, Otago, N.Z.,
Schooner "Matilda Hayes,"

Riverton, 8th June, 1869.

DEAR SIR,—I have the honor to inform you that having succeeded in engaging the services of a native crew to accompany me to the West Coast in a large sealing boat, and also a native pilot, well acquainted with the sounds and harbours there, who will remain in the schooner, I am now only waiting for the first favourable opportunity to continue my voyage from this port.

I landed at the Bluff on the 25th, and reached this place by way of Invercargill on the 28th ult., the schooner arriving on the same day, having been wind-bound a much shorter time than was anticipated. Finding that the Maoris were absent at Stuart's Island, procuring their annual stock of mutton birds, but were expected to return in a few days, I gladly availed myself of a kind offer made by Mr. Francis, of Manipora, to accompany me on an excursion to the limestone caves on the Waiau River, which forms the western boundary of the Province of Southland. This very interesting trip, which we extended to the Mareroa River, occupied seven days, and enabled me to complete my cursory examination of the country

from the district I visited in April last, lying to the west of Wakatipu Lake, southwards to this coast.

The limestone caves, which present no features of peculiar interest, occur in a stratum of impure fossiliferous limestone of tertiary age, exactly the same as that which prevails at Oamaru, and the true equivalent of the Caversham sandstone, which is so plentiful around Dunedin.

These strata cross the Waiau Valley at right angles, with a dip or inclination to the north. The caves on the right or western side of the river are merely natural excavations of the softer portion of the strata, the hard ledges remaining as overhanging eaves, and, from a few fragments of human bones found by Mr. Aitkin, they appear to have been resorted to by the Maoris. Those on the opposite side of the river are crooked fissures that ramify often for several hundred yards through the limestone rock, but nowhere having sufficient width or altitude of roof to entitle them to the appellation of caverns or grottos, although in some of them there are very pretty groups of stalactites depending from the roof, composed of semi-translucent calc spar. The limestone, with its characteristic fossils, is largely developed in Southland, skirting the Longwood range of hills and the south flank of the Takitimo Mountains, and thence passing under the plains to the east, to re-appear in the Moonlight Ranges; and it is probable that it extends over a considerable area to the west of the Waiau River. The remainder of the country passed over, is occupied principally by the older group of tertiary strata, consisting of sandstones, shales, and conglomerates, inclined at high angles in the neighborhood of the Takitimo Mountains, which I judge at a distance, to consist of slate rocks, with probably an exposure of hornblendic gneiss, like that composing the Bluff, along their south-western base.

The structure of the whole country is, however, masked by great development of terrace materials to the height of 2,000 feet above the sea, indicating the great extent which was once attained by the Lake system, which is still represented by the Manipora and Te Anau Lakes, and which I have reason to believe at one time included the basin of the Wakatipu Lake. I observed no country in the course of this trip which is likely to prove auriferous; the schistose rocks only rarely appearing through the disturbed tertiary formations, and then having the same trappean and gneissoid character that distinguishes the non-auriferous strata to the west of Wakatipu Lake. On the north flank of Mount Hamilton—where I was told that prospectors had been at work—I found that a blue clay shale with veins of carbonate of

lime, and probably of tertiary age, had been mistaken for the auriferous slates. On the Windy River, which joins the Oreti from the Eyre Mountains, I was, however, informed that a small quantity of gold was recently obtained; but I was not within several miles of the locality, and from all I have seen, there is little reason to expect that the gold fields will extend in a south-westerly direction from the Waikatipu Lake.

I was much pleased with the country in the valley of the Waiau, but there is only a small extent of open land upon the Otago side of the river, below where it leaves the Manipora Lake.

Returning to Riverton on the 5th inst., I found that the Maoris had arrived, and with the assistance of Mr. Howell, I was able to obtain a first-rate crew without much trouble. There are seven Maories going in the sealing-boat, but only five are to return, as two of the number belong to Jackson's Bay, and intend to remain with their own tribe. To the five others I have agreed to give £20 each for the trip, and a farther sum of £20 for the use of the boat. They have signed a written agreement to keep with the schooner for the purpose of towing, guiding, and aiding her, and to make themselves useful to me in any way I may wish. No time is specified, but they understand that I will not require them for less than four months from this date. Besides the above crew, I have, by the advice of Mr. Howell, also engaged a Maori named Henry Paramatta, who was formerly a mate in one of his whaling vessels, and accompanied him in that capacity as far as California, and who is so well acquainted with the details of the Harbors of the West Coast, that he is qualified to act as pilot.

The whole expense of the Maori addition to my party, will, I am glad to find, be under £200, instead of £500 as was anticipated.

As boisterous weather with westerly winds has prevailed ever since our arrival in this port, no time has really been lost by this delay, as it would have been impossible for us to have rounded the South-West Cape.

Upon the evening of the 5th inst., at 10:25 p.m., (10:15 p.m., of Dunedin time), a severe earthquake shock was felt here, there being several sharp concussions, followed by a rocking motion which lasted fifteen seconds.

I have had some conversation with Mr. Howell, regarding his letter to Government, offering information respecting the coal, sandstone, and slate, which exist in Preservation Inlet, a copy of which was forwarded to me. He has freely communicated to me all the particulars he could give, respecting the source of mineral

wealth, and which he considers to be of great value. He particularly instances the occurrence in a very accessible situation, extensive beds of flagstones, well adapted to the paving of streets. As Preservation Inlet is the first place I make to from this, I hope soon to be able to furnish more exact information on this subject.
