PROCLAMATION.

Molyneux Road District abolished, and Port Molyneux, Puerua, Otanomomo, and Finegand Road Districts formed.

By His Honor JOHN HYDE HARRIS, Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, intituled the "Roads Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1862," it is among other things enacted in the 12th section thereof, that for the purposes of the said Ordinance the said Province except as is therein excepted, may, from time to time, be divided into districts; and until otherwise provided pursuant to the provisions of the said Ordinance, there shall be twenty-five districts, which shall be named and bounded as described in the Schedule to the said Ordinance annexed; and it is also in the said 12th section provided that it shall be lawful for the Superintendent, with the advice and consent of the General Road Board, from time to time to alter, vary, diminish, or enlarge the boundaries of any or all of such districts, and to increase the number of districts, by forming and naming new districts, or by dividing any district into two or more districts.

And whereas, in the said Schedule, the Molyneux Road District, therein named, is described as comprising all that area bounded on the north by the Trunk Road, the Clutha River and its southern branch; on the east by the Clutha River and the Ocean; on the south, by the boundary of the Hundreds; and on the west, by the Puerua River and a continuation of that straight line halving Blocks XXXI., XXXII., and XXXIV., stretching from the Puerua River to the Trunk Road.

And whereas it is expedient to abolish the said Molyneux Road District and to form in lieu thereof

four new Road Districts, to be called respectively, the Port Molyneux, Puerua, Otanomomo, and Finegand Road Districts.

Now, therefore I, John Hyde Harris, Superintendent of the said Province, with the advice and consent of the Otago General Road Board, do hereby proclaim and declare that the said Molyneux Road District shall, from the day of the date hereof, be abolished, and in lieu thereof there shall be four new Road Districts, that is to say, the Port Molyneux, Puerua, Otanomomo and Finegand Road Districts, and that—

THE PORT MOLYNEUX ROAD DISTRICT shall comprise all that area bounded on the north-west by the Omaru River, on the south-west by the south-west boundary of the East Clutha Hundred; on the south-east by the Kororo Creek, on east by the Native Reserve, the Ocean, and the River Clutha; and on the north-east by the Puerua. And that

THE PUERUA ROAD DISTRICT shall comprise all that area bounded on the north by the Puerua and section 8, block XXV, and section 7, block XXX, Clutha Survey District; on the west by sections 6, 4, and 2, block XXX, Clutha Survey District, and a continuation of the same line to the crossing of the Puerua; thence, on the north-west by the Puerua to the boundary of the hundred; on the south-west by the south-west boundary of the East Clutha Hundred; and on the south-east by the River Omaru. And that

THE OTANOMOMO ROAD DISTRICT shall comprise all that area bounded on the north-east and north by the Waitapeka; on the north-west and west by the Main Road from Balclutha to Port Molyneux; on the south by section 5, block XXX, and section 6, block XXV, Clutha Survey District, and by the River Puerua. And that

THE FINEGAND ROAD DISTRICT shall comprise all that area bounded on the north and west by the Main Road from Balclutha to Port Molyneux; on the south

and west by the Waitapeka; and on the east by the Rivers Koau and Clutha.

PROCLAMATION.

Hillend Road District abolished; Kaitangata Road District altered and diminished; and Tuakitoto, North Molyneux, and Stony Creek Road Districts formed.

By His Honor JOHN HYDE HARRIS, Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, intituled the "Roads Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1862," it is among other things enacted in the 12th section thereof, that for the purposes of the said Ordinance the said Province, except as is therein excepted, may, from time to time, be divided into districts; and until otherwise provided pursuant to the provisions of the said Ordinance, there shall be twenty-five districts, which shall be named and bounded as described in the Schedule to the said Ordinance annexed; and it is also in the said 12th section provided that it shall be lawful for the Superintendent, with the advice and consent of the General Road Board, from time to time to alter, vary, diminish, or enlarge the boundaries of any or all of such districts, and to increase the number of districts, by forming and naming new districts, or by dividing any district into two or more districts.

And whereas in the said Schedule the Hillend Road District therein named is described as comprising all that area bounded on the north-east by Tokomairiro District; on the south-east, by Kaitangata District; on the south-west, by the River Clutha; and on the north-west by the boundary of the Hundreds.

And whereas in the said Schedule the Kaitangata Road District therein named is described as comprising all that area bounded on the north-east by Tokomairiro District; on the south-east, by the watershed of the ranges leading from Mount Misery, over Stations I and J to Q; thence by an east and west line to the Matau River; on the south-west, by the Matau and Clutha Rivers; and on the north-west by the Trunk Road.

And whereas it is expedient to abolish the said Hillend Road District, and to alter and diminish the boundaries of the said Kaitangata Road District, and to form three new Road Districts, to be called respectively the Tuakitoto, North Molyneux, and Stony Creek Road Districts.

Now therefore I, John Hyde Harris, Superintendent of the said Province, with the advice and consent of the Otago General Road Board, do hereby proclaim and declare that the said Hillend Road District shall, from the day of the date hereof be abolished. And I do also, with the like advice and consent, proclaim and declare that the boundaries of the said Kaitangata Road District shall henceforth be altered and diminished, and that henceforth

KAITANGATA ROAD DISTRICT shall comprise all that area bounded on the north by the watershed of the ranges from Two Stone Hill, and by block IV Tuakitoto Survey District; on the west by the Tuakitoto Lake, the Kaitangata River and Lake, and the Matau River; on the south by block II North Moly-

neux Survey District, and a direct line from the north-east corner of section 8 of the said block to Trig. Station Q; and on the south east by the watershed of the ranges to Two Stone Hill.

And I do also, with the like advice and consent, proclaim and declare that from the day of the date hereof there shall be three new Road Districts, to be called respectively the Tuakitoto, North Molyneux, and Stony Creek Road Districts; and that

THE TUAKITOTO ROAD DISTRICT shall comprise all that area, bounded on the north by the Southern Trunk Road; on the west by Lovell's Creek and the Tuakitoto Lake; on the south by block III, South Tuakitoto Survey District and the Watershed, from thence to Two Stone Hill; on the south-east by a direct line from Two Stone Hill to the north-west corner of section 34, block II, Kaitangata Survey District, by sections 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, and 39, block II, and section 24, block I, Kaitangata Survey District; on the north-east by sections 2 and 11, blocks XXXVI, XXXVII, and XXXVII, Tokomairiro Survey District, and that

THE NORTH MOLYNEUX ROAD DISTRICT shall comprise all that area bounded on the north by section 4, block X, South Tuakitoto Survey District, and sections 6, 17, 18 and 19, block I, Hillend Survey District; on the west by the Main South Road, and Balclutha Town Reserve; on the south-west by the rivers Clutha and Matau; and on the east by the Kaitangata Lake and River, and the Tuakitoto Lake, and that

THE STONY CREEK ROAD DISTRICT shall comprise all that area bounded on the north by Lovell's Creek; on the north-west by the north-west boundary of the North Tokomairiro Hundreds to Trig. Station D; on the west by the Southern Trunk Road; on the south by sections 14, 15, 16, 8, and 7, block I, Hillend Survey District, and section 3, block X, South Tuakitoto Survey District; and on the east by the Tuakitoto Lake and Lovell's Creek.

THE following Rules and Regulations have been submitted to the Superintendent and Executive Council in terms of section 5th of the "Cemetery Reserves Management Ordinance, 1864," and are published for general information.

CEMETERY AT FAIRFAX.

RULES AND REGULATIONS made under the "Cemetery Reserves Management Ordinance, 1864," for the Management of the Public Cemetery at Fairfax, Tokomairiro.

1. The Managers appointed by the Superintendent, according to the above Ordinance, shall have the entire control and management of the Cemetery.

2. The Managers having power by the 11th section of said Ordinance to allocate portions of said Cemetery to the various denominations requiring the same, no interference will be permitted with such allocations.

3. The Managers shall divide for purposes of interment the Cemetery into three classes, viz.:—

4. Class I., being ground of which the perpetual and exclusive right may be acquired, with the privilege

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of enclosing the ground and of erecting headstones or other monuments thereon. A portion of ground of this class shall be staked off into lots of 9 feet by 4½ feet each, and having a frontage to a road. These lots shall be sold for £1 1s. each.

5. Class II., being ground of which the perpetual and exclusive right may be acquired, but the purchaser shall not have right to enclose the same, or to erect a monument thereon other than a flat stone laid horizontally, with inscription, or marked out by corner stones with initials or figures, provided that the horizontal or corner stones do not rise more than eighteen inches above the surface of the adjoining ground. Lots of this class, 9 feet by 4½ feet, shall be sold for 10s. 6d. each.

6. Class III., being a considerable portion of ground which has been set aside for the interment of such persons as are not purchasers of and have not acquired a right to private ground. Before the warrant for interment in this ground is issued, it will be necessary that the person having the management or control of said interment shall make a declaration before one of the Managers that he, or the parties whom he represents, are unable to pay for either Class I or II. On ground of this class no monuments or memorials whatever shall be allowed, but the rights and privileges of Class II. may be acquired at a subsequent period by purchase.

General Regulations.

7. All graves to be 5 feet deep, but in the event of the purchaser of private ground desiring a greater depth, an extra charge of 2s. 6d. shall be made for every foot more than 5 feet deep.

8. Any purchaser of private ground in which no interment shall have taken place, may transfer his or her interest in said ground to any other person upon payment being made to the Treasurer by the Managers appointed for the time being, of a fee of (5) five shillings for such transfer.

9. A plan of the Cemetery shall be prepared, showing particularly the lots so laid off, together with the numbers thereof.

10. The said Treasurer for the time being shall keep a Book, in which he shall enter from time to time the number of every lot sold, the name of the purchaser thereof, together with the date of the sale of the same, and shall keep a record of the Burials in the Cemetery.

11. The said Treasurer for the time being shall receive the purchase money for the sale of such lots, and shall give a receipt for the same, which receipt shall be held conclusive evidence of the purchase and selection of the lots mentioned therein.

12. In all cases of intended interment, the person having the management or control of the same shall apply to the Sexton (or the person advertised as having charge for the time being) for a warrant for such interment, which warrant the Sexton (or person in charge) is hereby authorised to grant upon payment to him of the following fees, viz. :—

13. The said warrant when received by the gravedigger shall be sufficient authority to him for such interment.

14. The Record Book shall be open for the inspection of the public on payment of a fee of one shilling for each inspection.
