PROCLAMATION

Reserving for purposes of Sale and Exempting from Mining Operations the Towns of Waipori and Wetherston, in the Province of Otago.

By His Honor THOMAS DICK, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

WHEREAS by Proclamation dated the fifteenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, published in the *Government Gazette* of the said Province, certain lands were constituted a Gold Field under the name of the "Tuapeka Gold Field," and the limits of the same were thereby defined: And whereas the Town of Waipori and the Town of Wetherston, hereafter described, are within the limits of the said Tuapeka Gold Field: And whereas I deem the said lands hereinafter described to be necessary and required for purposes of settlement, public purposes, and roads, and that it is expedient that the said lands should be reserved and withdrawn for sale, and should be exempted from occupation under Miners Rights or Business Licenses:—

Now therefore I, Thomas Dick, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by virtue of the powers delegated to and vested in me in this behalf by His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand, in Council, under the authority of the "Gold Fields Act, 1862," do hereby proclaim and declare that I do withdraw and reserve for sale the lands hereinafter described as contained within and occupied by the Towns of Waipori and Wetherston respectively, that is to say:

TOWN OF WAIPORI,

being all that area of land situate in the Tuapeka Gold Field, in the said Province of Otago, containing sections numbered respectively 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, and 28, block I; sections numbered respectively 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22, block II; sections numbered respectively 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, and 18, block III; sections numbered respectively 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, and 14, block IV; and sections numbered respectively 1, 2, 3, and 4, block V; together with all streets and street lines as shewn on the Record Map of

the Town of Waipori, deposited in the Provincial Survey Office, in the Town of Dunedin, in the said Province of Otago.

And by virtue and in exercise of the power vested in me in this behalf, I do proclaim and declare all the said lands included within the said towns, to be exempt from occupation under any Miner's Right or Business License.

Appointing a certain portion of the Province of Otago a Quarantine Ground, under the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861."

I, Thomas Dick, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by virtue and in exercise of the powers delegated to and vested in me in this behalf, do hereby appoint to be a Quarantine Ground, under the "Dis-

eased Cattle Act, 1861," all that piece or parcel of Land, being section numbered 1, block X., North Harbor and Blueskin District, as the same is bounded on the Selection Map, in the Office of the Waste Land Board, Dunedin.

TOMAHAWK ROAD DISTRICT.—NOTICE.

WHEREAS it is intended to stop up those Roads and Portions of Roads situate and being in the Tomahawk Road District, and which are hereinafter described, and are delineated on the map or plan mentioned and referred to in the "Roads Diversion Ordinance, 1865," a copy of which plan has been deposited in the Public School in the said District;—Now therefore I, Thomas Dick, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by virtue and in exercise of the power vested in me in that behalf by the "Roads Diversion Ordinance, 1865," do hereby give notice that all persons objecting to the stopping up of such roads, or portions of roads, [or any of them, are required to set forth a statement in writing of any well grounded objection they may have to the stopping up of such roads or portions of roads, [and to leave such statement addressed to me, at my office in Dunedin, within sixty days from the date hereof, otherwise such objections will not be considered by me.

Description of the Roads and Portions of Roads in the Tomahawk Road District which the Superintendent is empowered to Stop Up.

No. 20.—TOMAHAWK ROAD DISTRICT.

1.—60 chains in length, 60 links wide, from application 1528 Otago Peninsula Survey District, to Tomahawk Valley Creek; boundaries, north, sections 30 and 31, block III, and section 15, block II, and part of section 21, block I, Tomahawk; south, sections 28 and 29, block III, and section 14, block II, and part of 19, block I, Tomahawk.

2.—2 chains 50 links in length, 60 links wide, from District Road between blocks I and II to near Trunk Road on section 1, block I, Tomahawk; north, part of section 1, block I, Tomahawk District; south, part of section 4, block I, Otago Peninsula.

3.—16 chains in length, 60 links wide, from Trunk Road on section 1, block I, to District Road between block I, Tomahawk, and block I, Otago Peninsula; boundaries, towards the north, part of section 1, block I, Tomahawk; towards the south, part of section 4, block I, Otago Peninsula.

4.—5 chains in length, 60 links wide, from southwest angle of section 1, block I, Tomahawk, to Trunk Road on section 1, block I, Tomahawk; boundaries, towards the north by part of section 1, block I, Tomahawk; south, part of block I, Otago Peninsula.

5.—14 chains in length, 60 links wide, from District Road between blocks II and III, Tomahawk, to Trunk Road on section 1, block II, Tomahawk; boundaries, towards the north by part of section 1, block II, Tomahawk; south, by part of application 1749.

6.—5 chains in length, 60 links wide, from Trunk Road on section 1, block II, to south angle of application 1749; boundaries, towards the north by part of section 1, block II, Tomahawk; towards the south by part of application 1749.

WOOLSHED CEMETERY.—The following Rules and Regulations have been submitted to the Superintendent and Executive Council, in terms of the "Cemetery Reserves Management Ordinance, 1864," and are published for general information.

Rules and Regulations, made in pursuance of Section V. of the "Cemetery Reserves Management Ordinance, 1864," for the management of the Public Cemetery at Woolshed. (See "Cemeteries Ordinance, 1865.")

1. The said Managers shall divide a portion of the Cemetery into three classes, viz. :—

2. CLASS I., being ground of which the perpetual and exclusive right may be acquired, with the privilege of enclosing the ground, and of erecting headstones or other monuments thereon. A portion of ground of this Class shall be staked off along the present fence, into Lots of 8 feet by 10, each having a frontage to the road around the Cemetery. These Lots shall be sold—one Lot for £1 10s., and two Lots for £2 10s.

3. CLASS II., being ground of which the perpetual and exclusive right may be acquired; but the purchaser shall not have right to enclose the same, or to erect a monument thereon other than a flat stone, laid horizontally, with inscription, or marked out by corner stones with initials or figures; provided that these horizontal or corner stones do not rise more than six inches above the surface of the adjoining ground. A portion of land of this Class shall be staked off into Lots for single graves, 8 feet by 6, having a frontage to the road, and directly opposite the Lots of the 1st Class. The price of each Lot shall be—for one Lot, 15s.; two Lots, £1 5s.

4. Class III., being a portion of ground which has been set aside for the interment of such persons as are not purchasers of, and have not acquired, a right to private ground. On ground of this Class no monuments or memorials whatever shall be allowed, and no grave shall, under any circumstances, be opened for any new interment sooner than after the expiry of five years from the time of the first or last interment, as the case may be.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

5. All graves to be six feet deep; but in the event of the purchasers of private ground desiring a greater depth, an extra charge of 3s. shall be made for every foot more than six feet deep.

6. The Manager shall provide all necessary furniture and attendance for properly conducting interments.

7. Any purchasers of private ground in which no interment shall have taken place, may transfer his or her interest in said ground to any other person, upon payment being made to the Clerk for the time being, of a fee of 5s. for such transfer.

8. A plan of the Cemetery shall be prepared showing particularly the Lots so laid off, together with the numbers thereof.

9. The Clerk for the time being shall keep a Book, in which he shall enter, from time to time, the number of every Lot sold, the name of the purchaser thereof, together with the date of the sale of the same, and shall keep a Record of the burials in the Cemetery.

10. The Clerk for the time being shall receive the purchase-money for the sale of such Lots, and shall give a receipt for the same, which receipt shall be held conclusive evidence of the purchase and selection of the Lots mentioned therein.

11. In all cases of intended interment the person having the management or control of the same shall apply to the Clerk for the time being for warrant for

such interment, which warrant the said Clerk is hereby authorised to grant, upon payment to him of the following fees, viz. :—

In the 3rd Class, or Public Ground, the same fees will be charged as in 2nd Class Purchased Ground.

12. The said warrant, when received by the grave-digger, shall be sufficient authority to him for such interment.

13. The moneys arising from the sale of such Lots, and the said Fees, shall (after deducting thereout all necessary expenses incurred, and to be incurred), be expended in improving the Cemetery.

14. The Manager shall publish a statement once a year, showing the amounts received and paid by them on account of the Cemetery.

15. The said Record Book shall be open for the inspection of the public, on paying a fee of 1s. for each inspection.
